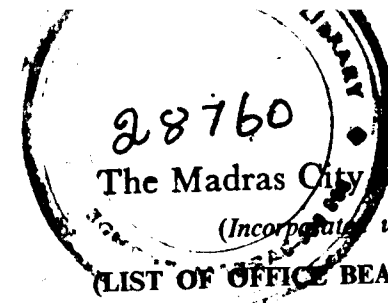

ANNUAL REPORT 1959—60

History of the Institution.

It was found that about 2,000 children of ages eight to sixteen go begging in the City of Madras. To successfully reclaim and rehabilitate these destitute and disadvantageously placed children in the City, the then Mayor of Madras Sri M. A. Chidambaram convened a conference of persons interested in Child Welfare during October 1955. The conference decided to form an Association called the Madras City Council for Child Welfare and desired me, who happened to be the Commissioner, Corporation of Madras, at the time to prepare a scheme for running a Home with a Workshop to train them in crafts and useful occupations, so that when they were discharged, they could eke out their living as useful citizens.

I drew up a scheme for starting such a Home and drafted rules and regulations for an Association of officials and non-officials, which were duly approved. The scheme was also approved by the Standing Committees and the Council of the Corporation of Madras. In accordance with the scheme as finally approved, the committed inmates of the Corporation Industrial Home at Royapuram, namely, the able-bodied beggars, were transferred to the Government Care Camp at Avadi and the inmates of the Poor House, a voluntary reception home for the aged and the infirm, were transferred to the authorities of the Monegar and Raja of Venkatagiri Choultries, subject to the Corporation meeting the cost of maintenance of these inmates. The premises of the Industrial Home and the Poor House at Royapuram thus vacated, were placed at the disposal of the Council for Child Welfare by the Corporation, which also agreed to pay an annual subsidy of Rs. 50,000/- for running the Home. The Government of Madras agreed to meet the net cost. The Madras Rotary Club agreed to meet the cost of equipments for running a Workshop to the tune of Rs. 25,000/-.

The Council for Child Welfare was registered under Act XXI of 1860 on December 22, 1955. It was inaugurated on the evening of the 26th December 1955 at the premises No. 81, Suryanarayana Chetty Street, Madras, by Srimathi Durgabhai Deshmukh, Chairman, Central Social Welfare Board, New Delhi. The Child Welfare Home

was declared open on the same date by Sri C. Subramaniam, Finance Minister, Government of Madras. A Workshop attached to the Home with tools and plant equipped for carpentry, tailoring etc., by the Madras Rotary Club, was declared open by the then Union Finance Minister, Sri Chintaman Deshmukh.

The State Government, in their order G.O. Ms. No. 3670 (Home) dated 22-12-55, declared the Home to be a place suitable for custody of boys and girls of ages 8 to 16 dealt with under section 29 of the Madras Children Act, 1920. Until 22-4-56, the institution was under the management of the City Corporation. On the afternoon of 23-4-56, the Council for Child Welfare took over the management of the Home and Workshop.

In order to open a section for Girls, the Central Social Welfare Board were approached for financial assistance. In their letter No. CBG/Mds/C-67-57 dated 12-12-57, the Central Social Welfare Board sanctioned a grant of Rs. 3,000/- for running a Girls' section for the period from the 1st January 1957 to the 31st December 1957, subject to the condition that the institution should raise, an equivalent amount by way of matching contribution and spend during the same period on welfare activities coming within the Board's purview. The institution raised a matching contribution equivalent to the amount of grant towards the expenditure on the object.

The Board was requested to renew the grant for the next following year 1958-59 also and to enhance the contribution in view of the expanding activities of this particular section. Somehow or other the grant was not given, but the section was run from out of funds of the institution. This had put the finance of the institution under great strain. The Board sanctioned for the period from 1st April 1959 to 31st March 1960, a grant not exceeding Rs. 2,500/- for maintenance of girls' section. It was represented that for the year 1959-60 the cost of maintenance of girls section would exceed twice the amount sanctioned by the Central Social Welfare Board and they were requested to reconsider the matter and to sanction a further grant of Rs. 1,200 so that half the minimum needs of the section might be met. So, far, there had been no response. A matching contribution of Rs. 2,500 was met from fees collected from ordinary members under Account 1 of the Madras City Council for Child Welfare.

Management and Activities

The Child Welfare Home continued to work as a separate unit under the administrative control of the Governing Body and the Executive Committee of the Madras City Council for Child Welfare. Until 31st March 1959, the Deputy Secretaries to Government in the Home and Finance Departments were members of the Executive Committee. In G.O. Ms. No. 932 (Home) dated 28-3-59, the Government stated that the Child Welfare Home had established itself firmly and that the Deputy Secretaries, Home and Finance Departments need not be members of the Committee any longer. The decision of the Government was accepted by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 18-6-59 and subsequently the rules of the Madras City Council for Child Welfare were amended suitably.

Strength

At the beginning of the financial year on the 1st April 1959, there were 319 boys and 19 girls. The strength of the institution steadily increased during the year to 340 being the net result of committals of 45 boys and 5 girls and reductions due to discharges and escapes. In accordance with rule 30 of the rules for the management of the Child Welfare Home, Royapuram, issued in G.O.Ms. No. 3208 (Home) dated 19-11-58, pupils discharged were sent to the Chief Probation Superintendent under escort with a request to him to do what he could towards helping the pupil to start a fair life. All pupils discharged were paid pocket money accrued weekly to their credit at rates specified in rule 81 of the Madras Children Rules, 1960. Certificates were issued for pupils in deserving cases. There were during the year, certain escapes which worked out to 2% as against 3% in the previous year.

Audit

The accounts of the Madras City Council for Child Welfare and those of the Child Welfare Home were audited for the year 1959-60 by the Examiner of Local Fund Accounts. The Audit Report together with remarks are furnished separately.

Membership

There were 42 ordinary members on 31-3-60. Besides, there were two individuals and the institutional Life Members. The institutional Life Members were M/s. Easun Engineering Co. Pte. Ltd., and the South India Corporation (Agencies) Pte. Ltd., It is expected that in the year following, a good number of institutions would enlist themselves as Life Members on payment of a lump sum, viz. Rs. 250/- each in response to the appeal made to them by the Chairman, Sri M. A. Chidambaram.

Meetings of the Executive Committee

The Executive Committee of the Council for Child Welfare met nine times during the financial year and disposed of 54 subjects.

Governing Body

The Governing Body of the Madras City Council for Child Welfare met twice during the year 1959-60.

General Body

The General Body of the Council for Child Welfare met in the year on Friday the 8th January 1960, when His Excellency the Governor, Sri Bishnuram Medhi presided. In his speech, he commended the work of the institution and said that he was always prepared to help Homes of this kind as much as possible and it was upto the Society to see that these children inmates were taken proper care of and provided with opportunities for full development. Mrs. Medhi distributed prizes to the children. Sri M. A. Chidambaram, Chairman, earlier in welcoming the Governor suggested that similar institutions be started in district headquarters.

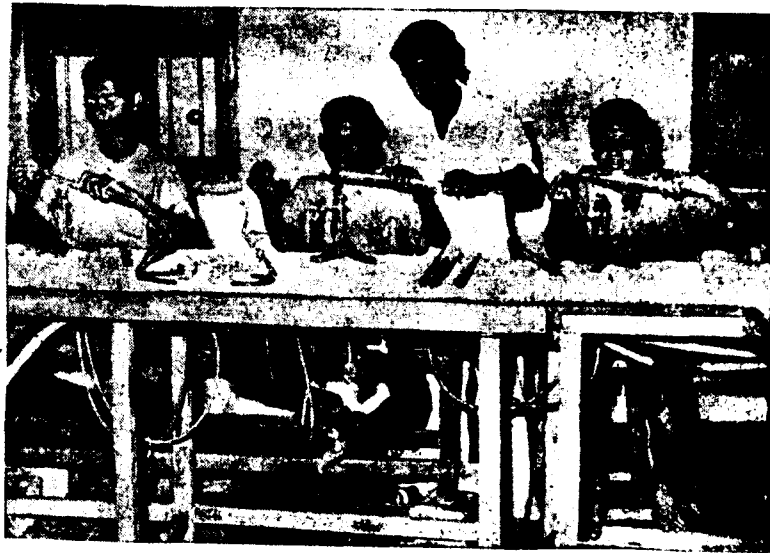
Education

Education based on the ordinary avocation practised in villages was provided upto the eighth standard in the school attached to the

Home. Instructions in the institution were in Tamil and it was of senior basic standard. Every child in the Home had to attend the school by shift either in the morning or in the evening for three hours in the day, except on Sundays and Holidays. Most of the children committed to the institution practically knew nothing and they were all socially or morally maladjusted requiring proper shelter and succour. The school was growing in usefulness year by year. Basic Seminars were conducted in this Home by the Deputy Inspector of Schools, Royapuram Range, in Dec. '59 and in Feb. 1960, for orienting primary schools towards Basic pattern and to guide its working. This Home served well as a guide in the Royapuram Range and demonstrated the full meaning and possibility of Basic Education.

Crafts Section

Attached to the Basic School, crafts section run for the training of children in various cottage industries like spinning, weaving, knitting, tailoring, coir rope making, mat plaiting, carpentry and glass

ampoule manufacture inculcated amongst children an enthusiasm for labour and aptitude for self-help. Children attended the crafts section either in the forenoon or in the afternoon for four hours in the day

by shift. Carpentry section was able to manufacture the furniture and some parts of the equipment required for maintaining the basic and crafts sections. Natural Glass Ampoules of sizes, white and amber coloured, continued to be supplied to the King Institute, Guindy, during the year under report. At the fag end of the year, envelope making industry was planned and is being introduced.

Other activities : Games and Recreations

The daily routine observed in the institution had been drawn up after careful study of the activities of other similar institutions. Since this institution is imparting both industrial and basic education, the following schedule was accepted by the Executive Committee of the City Council for Child Welfare.

Film shows and Radio programmes were other activities added to the institution in the evenings.

In her endorsement in the Visitor's book dated 10-12-58, Mrs. Indira Gandhi, President, Indian Council for Child Welfare, New Delhi, had remarked that there was a need for games such as volley ball, carrom etc., for inmates of the Home both for boys and girls and she assured to help the institution for the said cause. Accordingly, she offered a munificent donation of Rs. 500/- during the year

towards equipping the Home with game materials. As the Home had already tennikoits, parallel bars, swings, sea-saw, besides indoor games like carrom, skipping etc., it was decided to utilise the donation for acquiring basket ball game equipments and to instal it in the institution, so that bigger boys of age group 14 and 16 years might play. Besides one more swing exclusively for girls section was acquired.

Mass physical exercise and parades were conducted for children by the Police staff attached to the Home every Monday and Thursday before breakfast between 7 a.m. and 8 a.m. This developed amongst the youngsters, a sense of unity and team spirit to work amongst themselves.

Group Arrangements

The children inmates were placed in groups of fifty, each group consisting of one leader for every ten boys, so that every group had atleast four leaders and one chief. There were seven groups during the year.

Health of the Children

During the year under report, the dispensary attached to the Home was further equipped with surgical instruments and drugs. Minor ailments were attended to in the institution itself by a part-time doctor-in-charge of the Home. Cases which required special treatment were sent to Government Stanley Hospital. There was one case of death as in-patient in Govt. Stanley Hospital and the cause of death had been attributed to 'Tetanus'.

Health of the inmates is periodically checked up and recorded. Besides periodical medical check up, scheduled balanced and nutritious diet is served for children. The scheduled diet followed in the institution as approved by the Executive Committee is detailed below:—

Two ounces of mutton will be issued twice a week and on these days vegetable will be reduced by 4 ozs. and dhall by 1 oz.

Nutritious palatable biscuits gave very encouraging results in improving the health of vulnerable groups. This provided the much needed portein in the diet of growing children.

Improvements

The compound wall of the institution school, workshop and dormitories were colour washed and maintained clean all through the year with the labour of inmates of the institution. No cost for labour was incurred in this respect. Hedge stones in the garden were planted and colour washed.

2. One Horse Power G. E. S. Pump set with starter was installed separately to pump well water to the sump, relaying 1" pipes, for purposes of distribution of sufficient water by the overhead tank both morning and evening at regular turns.

Occupation by Public Works Department

The Executive Engineer, P. W. D., North Presidency Division requested permission for temporary occupation of the vacant building—Major ward of defunct Poor House for purposes of storing cement, iron materials etc. in connection with the erection of a sea wall, alongside the sea. In his further letter No. 2118/183/60 dated 18-3-60 the Executive Engineer, P. W. D., stated that he would make necessary repairs to bring the building which was becoming dilapidated to proper shape, that since the building belonged to Government it was easy for them to undertake and to carry out repairs to the building gradually if it could be in their occupation for a justifiable time; that the P. W. D., who occupied the portion with effect from 20-2-59 might not require it beyond 1-4-61, and that they were grateful to the Madras City Council for Child Welfare for having concurred with their request for occupation until then. If necessity arises, they would approach the Madras City Council for Child Welfare at a suitable time for extension of period for continuing the temporary occupation.

Gifts

1. Mrs. Shanti Humayun Kabir offered on 5-5-60 a sum of Rs. 25/- for arranging a treat for the children.

2. The Indian Red Cross Society (Madras State Branch) supplied on 26-5-59 one hundred and fifty cases of Milk Powder each weighing 27 lbs.

3. Mrs. Indira Gandhi, President, Indian Council for Child Welfare, New Delhi, contributed Rupees five hundred (Rs. 500 only) on 3-8-59 towards equipping the Home with play materials for children inmates.

4. The Guild of Service supplied 100 cases of Milk Powder on 3-7-59 and 50 cases again on 2-11-59 each case weighing 27 lbs. and two bags of American corn each measuring 64 Mrs. on 12-1-60.

5. Sri V. N. Subbarayan, Secretary, donated a sum of Rs. 16/- for the institution on 26-12-59.

6. The Meals for Millions Association of India, New Delhi, had supplied for feeding trials on 6-5-59, ninety six pounds in weight and again on 9-11-59 with 96 lbs. in weight of Britannia Nutro Biscuits.

Holiday Camp for Girls

A Holiday Camp for 50 girls drawn from the City Orphanages, viz. the Home for Destitute children run by the Madras City Council for Child Welfare, the Kanya Gurukulam and the Seva Samajam Girls' Home, was held at Tirukalikunram for 15 days from 11-11-59. The project had been conceived by the Indian Council for Child Welfare and it was financed by the Central Social Welfare Board. Miss Monica Dey, Woman Welfare Officer, Child Welfare Home was in full charge of the Camp assisted by the Girl Guide organisers Miss C. John and Miss L. Vedanayagam. One cook and one woman guard were spared for the occasion to serve in the Camp. The Camp was inaugurated by Mrs. Ammu Swaminathan.

The total value of finished products worked out to Rs. 5,952—14 nP., for the year 1959-60. This does not include the cost of stitching uniforms for all the children of the Home, and the vegetables cultivated in the Garden for consumption in the Home.

During the year, sales of articles were effected both for cash and on credit basis. The total proceeds realised by credit and cash sales worked out to Rs. 5,293—25 nP., inclusive of sales tax.

Tailoring

In the tailoring section attached to the Home, all the uniforms required for children were stitched by inmates in the institution. For the year 1959-60, a saving of Rs. 745—72 nP., was effected by not

letting the work of making uniforms for inmates of the Child Welfare Home on contract.

Certain out-door works were taken for tailoring and the proceeds realised by doing came to Rs. 94—45 nP.

Gardening

The Basic school maintained a vegetable garden correlated to the studies and throughout the year under report the garden was maintained with utmost difficulty, inspite of shortage of water. During the year the inmates cultivated 1,358½ lbs. of vegetables, brinjals, snake gourds, tomatoes, pumpkins, greens etc., as against 837½ lbs. in weight for 1958-59. The dry trees cut and utilised worked out to one Ton and eight Gundus.

Excursion

The inmates of the institution were taken by batches to the U.S. Small Industries Exhibition held in September 1959 at the Island Grounds on the invitation of Mr. Frank Gilleland, American Specialist in Wood Fabrication. Children were given a treat there and they were shown round the carpentry section specially.

School of Social Work

During the year, the Madras School of Social Work was sending first year students for field work to the Child Welfare Home on the afternoons of Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. The three students deputed for the year under report maintained proper role as students without interfering with the administration of the institution. Besides, the inmates of the institution were pleased to have them in their midst on these days to organise play and to express to them their background of life.

After Care

After Care section was started exclusively for girls with the idea for affording shelter and succour to the destitute girl Mariammaf and others similarly placed, pupil committed in Order J. C. No. 1713/57 dated 29-8-57, who stood discharged on 19-9-58 on her attaining 16 years of age, on 4-7-59. The girl Mariammal was employed during the period to make garments for children in the institution and the wages earned by her had been worked out and credited

to her account. The State Social Welfare Advisory Board, Madras, in their letter SSWAB/Mds/2138/59 dated 11-5-59, requested us to contact Smt. Seethalakshmi Ramaswami, President, Kamala Nehru Nilayam, 'Service Home,' Kozhikalnatham, Salem, for admitting her in their Service Home.' She was accordingly admitted there on 5-7-59. At present there is no inmate in the After Care Girls section.

General

For several months in the beginning of each year, the institution had to be run without sufficient funds for the maintenance of the Home and for purchase of raw materials required for the industrial section in the early part of the year. Sometime on that account, the inmates of the institution had to be idle without sufficient work. The lower rate of production for the year has to be attributed to that cause to some extent. However, the Government have considered this question carefully and had sanctioned in G.O. Ms. No. 72 (Home) dated 8-1-60 the payment of 50% of the budgetted Government assistance for the financial year in the first week of April of that financial year, the other half being paid after the audit of the accounts of the Home for the previous financial year is completed.

The Central Social Welfare Board had contributed for the year a sum of Rs. 2,500/- to be utilised with a matching contribution for maintaining the Girls' Section in the Home.

In conclusion, I place on record the very great assistance rendered by the State Government, the Corporation of Madras, the Police and Members of the Madras City Council for Child Welfare for the efficient running of the Home. I thank all the officers and staff attached to the institution for the great interest taken by them in the proper running of the institution.

Order :—

The Government have considered the Administration Report of the Child Welfare Home, Royapuram, for the year 1958-59. The report is recorded with the following remarks :—

1. **Accommodation :—**The Child Welfare Home provided accommodation for 400 inmates. The strength of the Home at the beginning of the year (i. e. on 1-4-1958) was 259. During the year 98 children were admitted, 13 boys escaped and 6 children were discharged. The strength of the Home at the end of the year (i. e.) on 31-3-1959 was 338. Efforts should be made to round up some more boys and to have them committed to the Home so that the maximum use made of the facilities available.

The Government note with grave concern that the number of escapes during the year has increased to 13. The Secretary, Madras City Council for Child Welfare is requested to see that a careful enquiry is made into the circumstances of each escape and to see that all loopholes are plugged. He is also requested to ensure that strong vigil is maintained. He is also requested to be in constant touch with the Police and to see that effective steps are taken to recapture the inmates and bring them back to the Home.

2. **Education :—**The Government are glad to note that the Home continued to provide Basic education to children upto the eighth

standard. The Government note with pleasure that, besides formal education in the Basic School, Children were taught various cottage industries. Crafts such as spinning, weaving, tailoring, mat plaiting and carpentry were taught to children by qualified Craft Instructors. The Government are glad to note that the scheme for the manufacture of glass ampoules made good progress during the year and that this section was able to supply to the King Institute, Guindy, white neutral glass ampoules of various sizes. The Government note with pleasure that the Home has been making steady advance in the application of physical education as a medium of training.

3. **Health and Food** :—The Government note with pleasure that the general health of the inmates was satisfactory. Cases of minor illness were treated in the Home itself and only complicated cases were sent to the Hospitals.

The Government find that the inmates have been given nutritive food. The Government are also glad to note that philanthropic organisations came forward to supply Multipurpose food, clothes and other articles to this Home.

4. **Industrial Sections** :—The Government are glad to note that the Industrial Sections, viz. Textile Weaving, Tailory, Carpentry, Mat plaiting functioned during the year showed good progress. It is worthy of note that the clothing requirements of all the inmates viz. Shirts, Shorts, Jibbas, Blouses, Skirts and Knickers are stitched by the inmates themselves. A saving of Rs. 510-06 nP., was effected by stitching these uniforms within the institution. It is also worthy of note that the Tailoring section did some outside work. The proceeds realised on this work were Rs. 33-88 nP.,

5. **Revenue and Expenditure** :—The total expenditure during the year was Rs. 1,32,325-28 nP. The total value of the finished products was Rs. 9,230-60 nP. during the year, as against Rs. 5,567-58 nP. in 1957-58. The receipts have gone up. Still they are only a fraction of the total expenditure. Steps should be taken to develop the production and enlarge the receipt.

6. **General** :—The Government note with pleasure that several officials and distinguished visitors have visited the Home. The Government find that the institution has made good progress during

the year and that the working of the Child Welfare Home in general has been satisfactory.

The audit of the accounts of the Child Welfare Home maintained by the Madras City Council for Child Welfare was done with reference to the orders contained in G.O. Ms. No. 1553 (Home) dated 28-5-56. The office of President was held by the Mayor of Madras (Ex-Officio). The Offices of Chairman, Honorary Treasurer and Honorary Secretary were held by Sri M.A. Chidambaram, Sri D. S. Sastri, M.A., C.A.I.B., and Sri V. N. Subbarayan, B.A., respectively.

2. The opening balance in the cash book is in agreement with the closing balance of the previous year. The closing balance in the cash book on 31-3-60 viz. Rs. 19,800 = 48nP., is in agreement with the balance in the Pass Book of the Central Bank of India, Madras after allowing for unremitted revenue on hand. Besides the above balance, there was an investment of Rs. 250/- in Govt. of India 4% Ten-Year Treasury Savings Deposit Certificate.

3. A statement of receipts and charges is appended.

4. **Government Grant.**—In G.O.Ms. No. 1406, Home dated 22-5-57, Government limited the maximum strength of the Home to 400 inmates at any one time. The strength of the Home at the beginning of the year was 338. During the year 50 children were admitted. Out of 388, 31 children were discharged, one child was transferred to the Kilpauk approved school, 15 children escaped, one child died and the strength of the Home at the end of the year was 340. The total expenditure on maintenance incurred during the year was Rs. 1,35,557 = 53nP., and the Government grant admissible to meet the net cost is Rs. 68,866 = 89nP. An advance grant of Rs. 79,400/= was drawn for the year 1959-60. The excess drawal of Government grant viz., Rs. 10,533 = 11nP., would need to be refunded or adjusted towards the Government grant payable for the year 1960-61.

Note of the Secretary.—"The Government in G.O. Ms. No. 72 (Home) dated 8-1-60, have directed that the Child Welfare Home be allowed to draw 50% of the budgetted Government assistance for a financial year in the first week of April of that financial year and that the other half of the Government assistance may be paid to the Child Welfare Home after the audit of accounts of the Home for the previous financial year is completed by the Examiner of Local Fund Accounts. As per approved budget for 1960-61, the Government's share of contribution worked to Rs. 1,04,194 = 00 and 50% of which came to Rs. 52,097/=. As the Government orders approving the Budget estimate were received only at the end of April 1960, it was not possible to claim the half share of the Government's contribution earlier. In the meanwhile, the saving from Government grant for 1959-60, which was anticipated to be Rs. 14,000/= was utilised to run the Home, since the children had to be fed and maintained; consequently only a sum of Rs. 38,097/= (i.e., Rs. 38,097 + Rs. 14,000 = Rs. 52,097/=) being 50 percent of the budgetted assistance from Government minus the anticipated savings was claimed and drawn. But the actual savings out of Government contribution, taking into account all receipts for the year 1959-60 was Rs. 10,533 = 11nP., only and this was adjusted towards advance payable for 1960-61."

FINANCE

The Balance Sheet of Income and Expenditure account for the year 1959-60 will be found included in the Audit Report for the financial year ended with 31st March 1960. These show details of amounts received and expended. Account I relates to the Madras City Council for Child Welfare and Account II relates to the Child Welfare Home run by this Council.

2. A sum of Rs. 430/- was received by way of subscription for annual Membership and Rs. 500/- for Institutional Life Membership.

3. The income from interest on current account investment during the year worked out Rs. 5-83 nP., under Account I and Rs. 11-46 nP., under Account II.

4. The Corporation contributed a sum of Rs. 50,000/- payable by them for the year ended 1959-60.

5. A saving of Rs. 10,533-11nP., shown under Account II accrued to the credit of the Child Welfare Home out of the grant paid by the Government during 1959-60. As the Government orders approving the Budget Estimate were received only at the end of April 1960, it was not possible to claim the half share of the Government's contribution earlier. The amount was utilised to run the Home to be adjusted towards advance payable for 1960-61.

6. No amount could be invested under fixed deposit during the year and it was only towards end of the financial year on the 25th Jan. 1960, a sum of Rs. 10,000/- under Account I of the Madras City Council for Child Welfare was invested.

7. The anticipated expenditure for running the Child Welfare Home with an average strength of three hundred and seventy five children for 1960-61 would work out to Rs. 1,64,494/-. Under receipts, the annual contribution of Rs. 50,000/- payable by Corporation has been taken into account. A claim for this amount was made as usual even as early as in April 1960. Every year, releasing of grant is delayed as Corporation of Madras takes its own long time to obtain sanction from Government in Local Administration Department every year for releasing the scheduled recurring grant payable to the institution annually.

**Extract from the Proceedings of the Minutes of the Meeting
of the Executive Committee of the Council for Child Welfare
held on 20—11—1959.**

Sub :—Draft Budget Estimate for 1960—61 and Revised Estimate for the period from 1—10—'59 to 31—3—'60 for Child Welfare Home—for approval.

Read the Secretary's following note dated 2-11-59.

1. While examining the Revised Estimate for 1958—'59 and the Budget Estimate for 1959—60 in respect of the Child Welfare Home, Royapuram, the Government observed in their G.O.Ms. No. 878 (Home) dated 25—3—'59 that no provision need be made in the Budget Estimate for 1959—60 for the employment of additional staff and that it may be made in the Revised Estimate for 1959—60.

2. A Revised Estimate for the Child Welfare Home has been put up for 1959—60 including Receipts and Charges for the first seven months and on the basis of a rough assessment anticipated expenditure for the last five months from 1—11—59 to 31—3—60. At the beginning of the financial year, on 1—4—59, the strength of the institution was 338 inclusive of 19 girls. For the last few months, the average strength of the institution was 350.

3. The Accounts of the Child Welfare Home for the year 1958—59 had been audited by the Examiner of Local Fund Accounts and there was no savings out of contributions granted by the Government and the Corporation for the year ended with the 31st March 1959. Actually there was a deficit of a sum of Rs. 7,587.21 nP. for the year 1958—59 and the Government have to meet the deficit. This was met by utilising the Security Deposit amounts of Contractors.

4. In G.O.Ms. No. 878 (Home) dated 25—3—59, the Government requested the Commissioner of Police to draw and disburse in the first week of April 1959 an amount equal to the requirements of the Child Welfare Home based on the approved Budget Estimate for 1959—60. This advance amount viz. Rs. 13,235/- payable for April was received only on 25—6—59. Another advance of Rs. 26,470/- for the months May and June 1959 was sanctioned later. In spite of these advances, the expenditure of the institution could not be met in full and part of it had to be met by temporary diversion from

Account 1 of the Council for Child Welfare, being the donation of Rs. 13,127/- received in January 1956 from the Rotary Club of Madras to equip the workshop of this institution.

5. The Corporation also released their share of contribution viz. Rs. 50,000/- for the current year late, in the last week of October 1959 as they had to await orders of the Govt. in Health, Education and local Administration Department for releasing the grant.

6. The Receipts under disposal of finished products in the Home worked out for the period to Rs. 3,475.53 nP., of which a sum of Rs. 832.25 nP. is still to be collected from the Corporation of Madras, to whom supply is made on credit basis.

7. The Basic School attached to the Home, had on the establishment two senior and three junior grade basic teachers. In G.O.Ms. No. 1783 (Education), the Government have approved as a special case from date of its inception, the Senior Basic School run by the Child Welfare Home. By virtue of it, the Home is getting teaching grant, sanctioned on the monthly returns submitted to the District Educational Officer (Madras North). Annually a sum of Rs. 4,300/- by way of Education grant is expected under receipts for the institution.

8. The Woman Welfare Officer is continued temporarily on year to year basis to attend to welfare work of the entire institution and also to maintain the girls' section. The Central Social Welfare Board had been requested to release half grant annually to meet the cost of maintenance of the girls' section..

9. The temporary Police staff attached to the Home continued to serve on the institution. The cost of Police staff and their leave and pensionary contributions have not been paid yet for the period from 1—2—59, as no claim has been made by them so far.

10. The Pension and leave salary contribution payable for Corporation staff who were on foreign service basis with the Council for Child Welfare had been paid upto July 1959.

11. The sum of Rs. 12,598.61 nP. temporarily diverted during the period from Account 1 to meet the expenditure of the Child Welfare in April and May 1959 could be adjusted only now in Oct. 1959,

when the Corporation released their share of grant for the current year.

12. This Home could not proceed with annual repairs and to accelerate the work of production of finished articles in the handi-crafts section due to great delay in obtaining grants and contribution for running the institution. The question paying an advance grant to enable the institution to run efficiently is under the consideration of Government.

13. In the Budget Estimate for 1960—61, provision has been made for the continuance of Police staff consisting of 1 Sub-Inspector and 3 Head Constables on the establishment and to maintain the sanctioned strength of 400 children inclusive of girls.

14. Provision has been made for creating a post of one Store-keeper and one Peon in the scale of Lower Division Clerk and Peon respectively for the year 1960—61.

15. The expenditure of the institution for the ensuing year has been worked out to maintain an average strength of 375 children and it is expected to be Rs. 1,70,325.40 nP. and the Government's share of contribution will come to Rs. 1,10,025.40 nP. The Central Social Welfare Board have promised to release a sum of Rs. 2,500/- for 1959—60; but the amount has not been realised yet. The entire cost of the girls' section had been provided for in the estimate, as the Central Social Welfare Board appears to be a most unreliable organisation.

16. The draft Revised Estimate for 1959—60 and the Budget Estimate for 1960—61 are appended for consideration.

Order :—

The Government have examined the Revised Estimate for 1959-60 and Budget Estimate for 1960-61 in respect of the Child Welfare Home, Royapuram, submitted by the Secretary, Madras City Council for Child Welfare.

2. The Government find that the Budget Estimate contains provision for the appointment of one Store-Keeper and an additional peon in the Child Welfare Home. The Government have already sanctioned in G.O.Ms. No. 191, Home, dated 21-1-1960 the employment of one Store Keeper. The Government did not consider it necessary to sanction the employment of a peon for the Home. The Government therefore consider that no provision need be made in the Budget Estimate for 1960-61 for the employment of a Peon in the Child Welfare Home.

3. The Government also find that a sum of Rs. 65,000 has been included in the Budget Estimate for expenditure on food. The Budget Estimate for 1959-60 under this head was only Rs. 60,000. This earlier estimate was fixed assuming that the strength of the Home would go upto 400. The Secretary, City Council for Child Welfare has stated that the expenditure of the Home for 1960-61 has been worked out to maintain an average strength of 375 children. The Government do not therefore consider it necessary to increase the estimate by Rs. 5,000/- under this head.

4. The Government, therefore, approve the Budget Estimate for 1960-61 subject to above cuts. The Government also approve the Revised Estimate for 1959-60 submitted by the City Council with some modifications. The Revised Estimate of Expenditure for 1959-60 and Budget Estimate for 1960-61, as approved, are reproduced in the Annexure to this order.

5. The City Council for Child Welfare has anticipated a saving of Rs. 13,000/- Rs. 14,000/- for the year 1959-60. The Commissioner of Police is requested to instruct the Secretary, City Council for Child Welfare, to surrender the savings in time.

6. A provision of Rs. 9,000/- has been made in the Budget Estimate for 1959-60 under the head "Repairs to Buildings." No expenditure has been incurred by the City Council upto 31-10-59 because there were no funds. The Secretary, City Council for Child Welfare has stated that the anticipated requirements of Home for the last five months of 1959-60 (from 1-11-59 to 31-3-60) are Rs. 9,000/-. The Government consider that this entire amount would not have been utilised before 31-3-1960 towards repairs to buildings. The Commissioner of Police is therefore requested to instruct the Secretary, City Council for Child Welfare to surrender this amount or a portion of it, if it had not been spent.
