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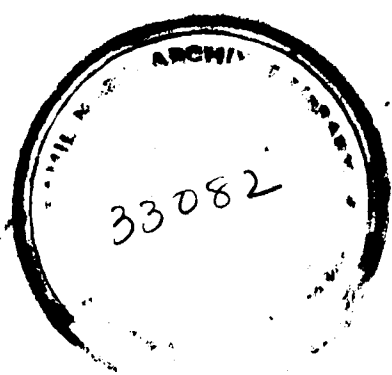

THE WORK DONE FOR THE AMELIORATION OF THE CONDITIONS OF THE
ELIGIBLE COMMUNITIES FOR THE YEAR 1962-63.

1. PERSONNEL:

Sri R.Subramanian, I.A.S., continued as Director
of Harijan Welfare during the period under report.

The post of Joint Director was created in lieu of
the post of Special Deputy Collector for Land colonisation
schemes. Sri B.Radhakrishnan, B.A., assumed charge as
Joint Director of Harijan Welfare on 3.5.62 and continued
upto 14th November 1962. Sri T.R.Venkataraman B.A.(Hons).,
assumed charge as Joint Director of Harijan Welfare on
A.M. of 14th November 1962 and continued during the ^{next} report
of the period under report.

Sri T.M.Meenakshisundaram, B.A., continued as
Personal Assistant to Director of Harijan Welfare upto
3.7.62. Sri S.Krishnaraj, B.A., assumed charge as Personal
Assistant to the Director of Harijan Welfare on 4th July 1962
and continued during the rest of the period under report.

Sri C.Venkatasami Saibu, B.A., continued as
Additional Personal Assistant to the Director of Harijan
Welfare upto 5th May 1962. The post of Additional Personal
Assistant was vacant with effect from 6th May 1962 to
21st September 1962. Sri T.R.Kesavan, B.A., assumed charge
as Additional Personal Assistant on 22nd September 62 and
continued during the rest of the period under report.

Sri ~~Chinn~~ C.S.Palanivadivelu, B.A., assumed

The post was vacant from 21st September 1962 to 19th

October 1962. Sri V.Palaniappan, B.A., assumed charge as

Special Additional Personal Assistant on 20th October 1962 and continued during the rest of the period under report. The Special Additional Personal Assistant has since been designated as Special Officer for Government of India Scholarships.

Sri A. Muhammad Sultan, M.A., continued as Senior Accounts Officer during the period under report.

Sri V. Mahalingam, M.A., continued as Junior Accounts Officer during the period under report.

DISTRICT ESTABLISHMENT: The Collectors of the districts continued to be responsible for the ameliorative work done in the districts with the Director of Harijan Welfare as co-ordinating officer. Collectors are assisted by the District Welfare Officers who were in the grade of Deputy Collectors in all districts except the Nilgiris where the Districts Welfare Officer is in the grade of Tahsildar. One Additional District Welfare Officer in Madurai district in the grade of Tahsildar was continued during the year under report.

Particulars of the staff who assisted in each district and the Director of Harijan ^{Welfare} in Madras City are shown in the statement Nos. 1A to 1C.

COMMUNITIES ELIGIBLE FOR HELP BY THE HARIJAN WELFARE DEPARTMENT

The ameliorative work undertaken by the Harijan Welfare Department, was confined, as usual to the communities specified in Annexure 'A'.

2. SUCCESS STATE HARIJAN WELFARE COMMITTEE:

The State Harijan Welfare Committee reconstituted in G.O.Ms.No.3600 Home dt.10.11.60 with a strength of 28 non-official members continued to function as an Advisory Committee. During the period under report the Committee met thrice on 3.5.62 at Madurai, on 17.8.62 at Kanyakumari and on 23.12.62 at Chidambaram and discussed various measures to be undertaken to improve the economic conditions of the Scheduled castes.

3. DISTRICT HARIJAN WELFARE COMMITTEE:

The District Harijan Welfare committees continued to function with the respective district Collector as Chairman. The No. of meeting held in these committees in the districts are given below:-

4. THE MADRAS TRIBES ADVISORY COUNCIL:

The Madras Tribes Advisory Council was reconstituted in G.O.Ms.No.4033 Home dt.4.9.61 with a strength of 10 members who were all non-officials of whom 9 members belong to scheduled tribes. The Minister in charge of Harijan Welfare is the Chairman of the Council. During the period under report the council met twice at Coimbatore on 1.6.62 and at Thuraiyur 1 Trichi district on 4.12.62 and discussed the various ameliorative measures to be taken undertaken for the welfare of Scheduled tribes.

5. STATE BACKWARD CLASSES ADVISORY COMMITTEE:

The State Backward Classes Advisory Committee was reconstituted by the Government in their order Ms.No.2580 Home Department dt.26.7.62 with twenty new official members with effect from the date of the order. The Minister in charge of the Harijan Welfare was the Chairman and the Secretary to Government, Home Department and the Director of Harijan Welfare, Madras were the Ex-Officio members of the Committee. The Director of Harijan Welfare Madras was the Secretary of the above committee during the period under report. During

During 1962-63 the committee met once at Secretariat, Fort St. George, Madras on 18th October 1962 and discussed various measures to be undertaken for the uplift of the Backward classes in the State. The Government in their order Ms.No.461 (Home) dt.6.2.63 have ordered that the meeting of the above committee should be held once in six months during the period of emergency. Hence one meeting was conducted during 1962-63.

G. AMELIORATIVE MEASURES UNDERTAKEN BY THE HARIJAN WELFARE DEPARTMENT.

The ameliorative work consists of

1. Provision of house sites.
2. Maintenance of schools, grants of scholarships, stipends, boarding grants, and grants to private educational institutions for the benefit of the communities mentioned in Annexure A.
3. Provision of wells and tanks for the supply of drinking water.
4. Provision of Irrigation wells, sanitary amenities, pathways, street lights, ^{burning} ~~burying~~ and burial grounds.
5. Grants to private bodies, engaged in social and economic uplift of the eligible communities.
6. Grant of subsidy for the purchase of bullocks and sinking of wells for agriculture purposes.
7. Grant of subsidy for Housing.
8. Starting of cottage Industries etc.

Details of the work turned out during the year under the heads mentioned above are given in the following paragraphs.

7. HOUSE SITES:

House sites had been provided by assignment of lands at the disposal of the Government and by acquiring private lands. Details of house sites provided by assignment of Government lands are furnished in statement No. II.

3507 house sites covering an extent of 163.55 acres of lands were provided for the scheduled castes in the State. The Total no. of house sites provided since the commencement of operation of the Harijan Welfare Department upto 31.3.63 were 51521.

An extent of 1139.00⁸⁴ acres was acquired at a total cost of Rs.16,77,940-⁸⁴64 as detailed in Statement No. III. The total no. of house sites provided during the year were 17524. The Government contributed a sum of Rs.10,6400²⁴8-94 towards the cost of acquisition of house sites and private individuals contributed a sum of Rs.13,937-60. The Total no. of house sites provided by way of acquisition since the commencement of operation of the ~~activities~~ activities of the Harijan Welfare Department upto 31.3.63 were 1,10,544.

8. LOANS TO INDIVIDUALS FOR THE ACQUISITION OF HOUSE SITES:

The arrear demand at the beginning of the year under the head of account "Loans for the acquisition of the house-sites for the communities eligible for the help by the Harijan Welfare Department" was Rs.82,712-15. The demand during 1962-63 was Rs.4,475.92. The total demand for the year was Rs.87,188.07. A sum of Rs.4021-60 was collected during the period under report. The balance of demand to be collected at the end of the year under the head of account is Rs.83166.47 (The figures are subject to variations as they are not reconciled).

8(a) PERSONAL DEPOSIT:

The Personal Deposit account in the name of the Director of Harijan Welfare was re-opened for the year 1962-63 with reference to G.O.No.1115 Home dt.21.3.62. During the year under report 5042 bills were passed for which 2021 cheques were issued involving Rs.52,81,244.43 in respect of payment of State and Government of India scholarships.

277) Government hostels functioning all over the State at the end of the year 62-63. The total strength of the boards of the 277 hostels is 17,469 (13,290 boys plus 4179 girls). The details of the 277 hostels are furnished in Annexure B.

Admission is open to all communities in the hostels. This enable them to mingle with each other freely and this aids the removal of untouchability to a great extent. With a view to accelerate the removal of untouchability in the State, the Government have ordered in their order No.3431 I.L & G dated 25.7.56 that the following percentage should be followed in the admission of the students coming from the various communities in Government Hostels under the Control of the Harijan Welfare Department.

Scheduled Castes,	75%
Backward Classes.	15%
Forward Communities.	10%

In practice it was found difficult to adhere to the ratio fixed as sufficient Number of pupils belonging to Backward Classes and Forward Communities were not forthcoming and hence the Government have issued the following instructions in their Order No.798 I.L & G dated 1.3.58.

1. If the students belonging to Forward Communities are not forthcoming upto the requirements, the Number of seats thus falling vacant may be fixed up by giving preference first to Scheduled Castes and then to Backward Classes.

2. If Backward Classes students are not available upto the percentage prescribed the seats falling vacant may be filled up by Scheduled Castes.

3. Old boarders already residing in the Government hostels are not sent out of the hostels, with a view to maintain the ratio fixed by the Government.

In respect of Backward Class hostels taken over by Government the Government in their Memo. No. 92665-H. U. V 61-2 Home dated 30-11-61 have ordered that the students should be admitted in such hostels in the following proportion:-

Backward Classes.	55%
Scheduled Castes.	30%
Forward Communities.	15%

The system of collecting 1/3 rd boarding and lodging charges from the boarders of Forward Communities was discontinued in G.O.Ms.No.1787 J.L & C (H.W) dated 1.4.60.

GOVERNMENT HOSTEL FOR COLLEGE BOYS: MADRAS CITY:

This hostel is intended mainly for College students. The sanctioned strength of the hostel during 1962-63 was 204. During the year under report a sum of Rs.25,894 was spent towards the maintenance of this hostel.

GOVERNMENT BOYS HOSTEL FOR INDUSTRIAL STUDENTS, MADRAS CITY.

This hostel is intended for students who are undergoing industrial courses of training in the various industrial institutions in Madras City. The sanctioned strength of the hostel was 200. During the year under report a sum of Rs.60,112/- was spent towards the maintenance of this hostel.

GOVERNMENT BOYS HOSTEL, ROYAPURAM, MADRAS.

The hostel is intended for students who are studying in Elementary and Higher Elementary and High Schools in North Madras area. The sanctioned strength of the hostel was 150. A sum of Rs.18,024-83 was spent towards the maintenance of the hostel during the period under report.

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GOVERNMENT BOYS HOSTEL, KODAMBAKKAM, MADRAS.

The hostel is intended for students who are studying in Elementary, Higher Elementary and High Schools in South, Madras area. The hostel was newly opened on 3.8.62 with a strength of 30 boarders. The sanctioned strength of the hostel was 30. A sum of Rs.3,689.57 was spent towards the maintenance of hostel during the year under report.

GOVERNMENT GIRLS HOSTEL, KEILPAUK, MADRAS.

The hostel is intended for the girl pupils studying in the Elementary, Higher Elementary and High Schools in the South Madras area. The sanctioned strength of the hostel was 125. A sum of Rs.17,340.02 was spent towards the maintenance of hostel during the year under report.

GOVERNMENT GIRLS HOSTEL, ROYAPURAM, MADRAS, 13.

The Hostel is intended for girls pupils studying in the Elementary Higher Elementary and High Schools in North Madras area. The sanctioned strength of the hostel was 150. A sum of Rs.14,535.05 was spent towards the maintenance of hostel during the year under report.

11. EDUCATION IN MADRAS CITY:

There were five Harijan Welfare Schools in the City under the direct control of the Director of Harijan Welfare, Madras. The total No. of teachers employed were 66.

MIDDAY MEALS:

During the period under report the supply of midday meals to the pupils in the five Harijan Welfare Schools in the City was entrusted to private contractors. 2624 pupils of the Harijan Welfare Schools in the City were supplied with midday meals for the period under report. A sum of Rs.59,737 was spent towards the supply of midday meals to these children during the year under report.

A sum of Rs.36,517/- was spent towards the supply of midday meals to Harijans in Non-Harijan welfare Schools in Madras City. The No. of students benefitted approximately by this scheme during 62-63 was 1200 as detailed below:-

12. BRISLEENAGAR SETTLEMENT, PERAMBUR.

A sum of Rs.200/- (Rupees two hundred) only sanctioned in G.O.No.1583 Home dated 30.4.63 has been drawn and spent towards the expenditure in connection with the continuance of library in Brisleenagar settlement during the year under report.

As regards the provision of houses due to non-availability of suitable vacant sites in Madras City and suburban areas in Chingleput District. The entire allotment of Rs.12,500/- provided for has been surrendered during 62.63.

13. HOSTELS SUBSIDISED BY THE HARIJAN WELFARE DEPARTMENT.

The policy of granting financial assistance to organisations such as Harijan Sevak Sangh and private individuals towards the cost of maintenance of Boarding Homes conducted by them for the benefit of the communities eligible for help by the Harijan Welfare Department was continued during the period under report. The names of such institutions, the No. of boarding grants and the amount of boarding grants sanctioned are shown in Annexure 'C'. A sum of Rs.7,38,589.00 was sanctioned to the managements of these hostels towards the maintenance of 4651 Scheduled Caste pupils residing in these subsidised hostels.

BOARDING GRANTS TO BACKWARD CLASSES:

During the period under report boarding grants amounting to Rs.3,99,526.00 were sanctioned to 2,599 boarders belonging to Backward Classes residing in the subsidised hostels. The details of hostels, Number of grants and amount sanctioned etc. are furnished in Annexure 'C'.

BOARDING GRANTS TO FORWARD COMMUNITIES:

With a view to eradicate untouchability and also to avoid segregation of Scheduled Caste pupils from other communities, a sum of Rs.39,928.50 was sanctioned to 299 boarders . .

belonging to various Forward Communities residing in the subsidised hostels during the year under report. The amount of such grants sanctioned to a pupil was Rs.106.65 at Rs.10.66 p.m. for 10 months in a year. Particulars of the No. of grants and the amount sanctioned are furnished in Annexure 'D'.

MATRONE SUBSIDY:

The Government in their Memo. No.410 R.W.D.IV.1953-1 dated 27.1.53 have permitted the Director of Harijan Welfare to grant subsidy towards the pay of Matron employed in the Girls and mixed hostels subsidised by this Department at the rates sanctioned in G.O.Ms.No.781 R.W.D dt.4.4.52 for every year. Particulars of hostels which were in receipt of Matron subsidy for the year 62.63 are given in Annexure 'E'. A sum of Rs.2310 was sanctioned for giving subsidy towards the pay of matrons employed in the subsidised hostels in the Madras State.

14. SCHOLARSHIPS TO ELIGIBLE COMMUNITIES:

The grant of scholarships to pupils of the eligible communities was continued on the usual lines. According to the orders in G.O.Ms.No.2282 Home dated 7.7.61 the work relating to the sanction of scholarship for pre-matric and post-matric courses except for courses for which limit in the No. of scholarships to be awarded is fixed) was attended to by the District Welfare Officers in the Districts and Director of Harijan Welfare in Madras City. The Director of Harijan Welfare continued to sanction scholarships for courses for which the limit in the No. of scholarships is fixed. The courses for which the numerical limit is fixed for the sanction of scholarship is shown in Annexure 'F'.

According to the orders in G.O.Ms.No.2672 Home dated 2.8.62, the students belonging to Eligible Communities undergoing teachers training courses in basic and non-basic training schools were granted Residential Scholarships at a flat rate of Rs.25/- p.m. for 10 months in a year in lieu of stipend from the Education Department. The Expenditure on this account has been included in the statement showing the particulars of Residential scholarships to pupils in Secondary schools....

NON RESIDENTIAL SCHOLARSHIPS (ELEMENTARY BAS C AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS.)

97,878 Non-residential scholarships for ordinary general education in Elementary, Basic and Secondary Schools involving an expenditure of Rs. 18,22,724.55 was sanctioned during the year under report both by the Collectors in Districts and by the ~~Ray and~~ ~~the~~ Personal Assistant to the Director of Harijan Welfare, in Madras City as detailed below:-

With a view to ensuring that there was no disparity in the value of scholarships given by the Harijan Welfare Department and the Government of India and to see that more scholarships of the Government of India were availed of by the students belonging to Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes of the State, the Government, in their order Ms.No.2466, I.L.C. dt.19.7.55, empowered the Director of Harijan Welfare, Madras, to pay to the students the difference in the value of scholarships of the Government of India and those of State Government wherever the scholarships given by the former are less in value. An expenditure of Rs.1,71,978. was incurred towards supplementing the Government of India scholarships in 1227 cases during the year under report.

COMMERCIAL:

Twentyeight fresh non-residential scholarships to the value of Rs.1,278/- were sanctioned for commercial courses of xxm studies in shorthand, typewriting and book-keeping.

20. CONSTRUCTION AND REPAIR OF WELLS.

During the year 151 new wells were constructed and 64 old wells were repaired. Besides these the construction of 104 wells was started and they were in various stages of progress. A total expenditure of Rs.2,79,751.20 was incurred on this item during 1962-63. The total expenditure incurred for this purpose since the commencement of the operation of the Harijan Welfare Department upto 31st March 63 works out to Rs.63,24,736.62. 22. ASSIGNMENT OF LANDS:

23. THE UNTOUCHABILITY OFFENCES ACT 1955

The Untouchability Offences Act 1955 introduced in supersession of the Madras Removal of Civil Disabilities Act 1947 and the Madras Temple Entry Authorization Act 1947 has continued to improve the social conditions of the Harijan to a great extent during the period under report. Though the practice of untouchability could not be eradicated completely the above said Act has helped much to minimize the offences relating to social disabilities to the extent possible. As the offences under this Act have been declared as cognizable, prosecutions are launched against the offenders by the Police Department which is entrusted with the working of this Act ~~successfully~~ successfully and the Government are watching the progress. 24. HARIJAN DAY CELEBRATION

The Harijan Day was celebrated on the 25th February 1963 and on the 30th of each of the remaining months of the year throughout the districts. Meetings were held during these celebrations and ameliorative measures undertaken for the uplift of the Harijans and the evils of untouchability were explained to the public. Besides this the last week of January 1963 was celebrated as 'Harijan Week' throughout the State including Madras city in all the seven days. Meetings were conducted. Commemorative dinners were also arranged wherever possible. These celebrations proved a great success in getting the Harijans full their equality of status in the Society and the rights they have and the various facilities the Government have provided for their benefit. For celebrating the Harijan Week a sum of Rs.15981 was spent during 62-63.

25. AWARD OF GOVERNMENT OF INDIA SCHOLARSHIPS FOR OTHER BACKWARD CLASSES

Under the Government of India scheme for the award of scholarships to Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribes and Other Backward Classes, scholarships are awarded every year to the

students belonging to these communities for post matriculation studies in India. The Government of India, Minister of Education were themselves awarding the scholarships till 1958-59. The scheme was decentralized to respective State Government from the year 1959-60. This scheme was continued during 62-63.

A sum of Rs.29,28,400 was provided during the period under report for the award of Government of India scholarships to the Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribes and Other Backward Classes. Against this provision, a sum of Rs.29,13,971.29 was spent towards the grant of scholarships to the students belonging to Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribes and Other Backward Classes. These scholarships were given for the post matriculation studies.

26. SCHOLARSHIPS TO SCHEDULED CASTES:-

During the year 62-63 the Government of India Ministry of Education have provided a sum of Rs.14,29,400 for the award of Government of India scholarships. The particulars of expenditure incurred for the above purpose in respect of Scheduled Castes is given below:-

39 As regards renewal of scholarships to the students studying in institutions in Kanyakumari district who were getting scholarships under the Travancore-Cochin State, their scholarships will be renewed by this department applying the rules in force in this State.

40. The heads of institutions should report to the Director or to the Collector when any scholarshipholder discontinues his/her studies or when his/her name is struck off the rolls or where the scholarship has to be cancelled for any other reason, so that further action may be taken to cancel the scholarship.

41. (i) *Exemption from payment of examination fees.*—The value of the examination fees of those who will appear for the Government or University examinations will be sanctioned by the authority who are empowered to grant scholarships combining the same as it would facilitate the students to get the examination fees for the remittance of the same in time.

The heads of institutions are therefore requested to mention the value of the examination fees in the scholarship application forms or in the renewal forms that has to be paid by the students who are appearing for the Government or University examinations.

(ii) Whenever scholarships (State Scholarships) are sanctioned, the students concerned should be given individual receipts by the heads of institutions for the examination fees and the amount of examination fees should be retained by the heads of institutions themselves. But, the institutions must get the acquittances from the students for the entire amount of scholarships and send these acquittances to the office of the Director of Harijan Welfare or the District Welfare Officers as the case may be. In case, the students are not sent up for examinations, the institutions must remit back the examination fees in respect of those detained students to Government account and send the chalans to the Office of the Director of Harijan Welfare or the District Welfare Officer as the case may be. To ensure that the above procedure is followed strictly, the heads of institutions should furnish with two consolidated lists (i) showing the details of scholarship holders who were sent up for the examination and (ii) list of scholarship holders not sent up for the examination in respect of whom fees withheld were refunded to Government (Details of chalan number and date should be furnished soon after the students are sent up for examination.)

NOTE : The term "Backward classes" includes "Most Backward classes" also wherever occurs.

The small decline in the strength of pupils in Kallar Schools was due to the opening of new elementary schools in Panchayat Unions in the villages adjacent to the villages where schools are run by this department.

The non-kallar children are freely admitted in all Kallar Schools as per G.O.No.4200 (Hema) dated 15.11.1948. The number of such non kallar pupils receiving instruction during the year under report is 10,396.

Library books are being supplied to all the children reading in Kallar Schools. The Special Deputy Collector and his executive subordinate officers visit the schools by surprise and see to their proper functioning.

The teachers employed in Kallar Schools are qualified and trained hands. The distribution of teachers according to the grades is shown below:

All the Kallar Schools are complete elementary Schools of which 30 are higher elementary Schools. 87 are basic schools and the remaining 120 are lower elementary schools. The pay of the teachers is disbursed on a fixed day in each month by the Supervisors of the respective ranges at their headquarters or at ~~any~~ centres fixed for the purpose. Advantage is taken of these meetings to impart departmental instructions to them by the respective supervisors. These schools are visited by the Special Deputy Collector by surprise and are ~~also~~ inspected by the Supervisors and the Officers of the Education Department periodical. The Officers of the Revenue Department are also ^{making} visits to the Kallar Schools when they tour the area.

Method of teaching:

The syllabus for Elementary Schools prescribed by the Government and approved by the Deputy Inspector of Schools. Of the ranges concerned, year after year, is being followed in all the Kallar Elementary Schools. Necessary steps are taken to enroll all the school age children and to enforce their regular attendance and to reduce stagnation. Record sheets introduced in 1.5.Rs.No.2193 (Education) dated 22.10.1935 are being used, for all the pupils in the schools. There are 24 Adult Literacy ^{Schools} ~~centres~~ to impart education to adults in the evenings. These evening schools are maintained and supervised by the Officers of the Education Department.

Equipment for schools:

A sum of Rs.5459.50 was spent towards the supply of equipments for Kallar Schools during the year.

The pupils staying in the above Boarding Homes are provided with free boarding and lodging. Full time wardens have been appointed to exercise effective supervision and control over the inmates. Non-kallar pupils are also admitted into these Boarding Homes, at a fixed percentage.

Boarding Grants:

In addition to the above Boarding Homes, grants have also been awarded for 652 Tirumalai Kallar pupils residing in private subsidised Hostels as noted in the annexure, as against 606 pupils last year.

Mid-wifery Grants:

There was no award of midwifery grant during this year as there was no application.

Midday Meals:

The Midday-meals supply was introduced in Kallar Reclamation for the first time in September '60. Children of all communities studying in the elementary and higher elementary schools are supplied with midday meals on all working days. The rate of a meal is 10p. During the year under report, a sum of Rs.854474.47 p. was spent out of an allotment of Rs.8,54,500.00 p.

7. Rallies Displays etc:

All the National festivals were celebrated by the units in their area and apart from that many guide activities were organised. The teachers of all the flocks were frequently met and suggestions given for the improvement of the flockwork. Meetings of all the flock leaders are being held frequently and new methods and activities were taught.

Visits of High Personages:-

During Madras Governor's visit to the Govt. Girls Hostel at Udilampatti on 12.12.62, the bul bulls and the guides received. His Excellency the Governor with a guard of honour. The State Organising Commissioner and the Asst. State Organising Commissioner visited Kallar groups this year.

General:

Local Association Kallar Reclamation:

The new Local Association of Kallar units was formed and the Special Deputy Collector (Kallar Reclamation) was nominated as the President.

Other activities:

The Lady Organiser (Kallar Reclamation) assisted the State Organising Commissioner guides in the conduct of training camps.

It is noted that there is a good response for the scout and guide movement in the Kallar area and it is also

recognised by the Public that the movement has promoted the character and the general outlook of the children.

8. Provision of drinking water wells:

9. Agricultural subsidy under centrally sponsored schemes:

A sum of Rs.76138 was spent during the year under report towards the purchase of plough bulls, Agricultural implements and seeds at the rate of Rs.400/- each to 195 Piramalai Kallar ryots in Tirumangalam, Dindigul and Palni Taluks. When bulls worth Rs.350/- were not available in the shandy, bulls costing less than Rs.350/- were purchased leading to the remittance of an unspent balance of Rs.2012/-

Sinking of irrigation wells:

Under the centrally sponsored schemes, loan-cum-subsidy was granted to Kallars to sink irrigation wells. During the year under report a sum of Rs.60000/- was spent under loan portion on 80 cases and a sum of Rs.529250/- was spent under subsidy portion of 79 cases. As one of the grantees did not utilise the loan portion granted subsidy portion of Rs.750/- was not granted and the summary recovery of the loan portion was ordered.

Out of 4 + 11 Co.op. Inspectors (3 + 8 Co-operative Inspectors) are working in Co-operative Institutions as ~~man~~ Secretary or Manager and only 1 Senior Inspector and 3 Junior Co-op. Inspectors are attending to the supervision of all Kallar Co-op. Societies.

The Govt. have ordered in G.O.Ms.No.1349 (H.W.)I.L.C. dated 14.3.60 and G.O.Ms.No. 4016 (H.W) dated 12.12.60 to affiliate all Kallar Co-op. Societies with the Madurai District Co-op. Central Bank so that the bank can finance these societies. Accordingly 185 Kallar Co-op. Societies were affiliated and the bank is sanctioning loans for these affiliated societies.

Loans due by Societies:

A sum of Rs.10,11,720.52 was outstanding at the beginning of the year and Rs.64827.12. was collected during the year.

Trust Fund Loans:

A sum of Rs.248538 was out standing at the beginning of the year and Rs. 19,037/- was collected during the year. The balance at the end of the period was Rs.2,29,501/-.

13. Kallar Co-op. Sale society:

This society with 4 branches is also affiliated with the Madurai District Co-op. Central Bank and the Bank is granting loans to this society. The Govt. have since ordered to transfer the control of this society to the Deputy Registrar, Madurai for supervision.

14. Kallar Labour Society.

The year under report is the 24th year of the working of Kallar Labour Society. There were 658 working member as on 31.3.63 with a paid up share capital of Rs.23,560/-. A sum of Rs.77,782/- is out standing in the T.F. Loans under principal at the end of the year. ~~The entire amount is over due and the society may not be able to repay even the principal under loans to T.F.~~ The society is managed by a Senior Inspector at Madurai as ex-officio Secretary. The Special Deputy Collector is its ex-officio President. The society is carrying out all work connected with building through sub contractors who are members. All the works pertaining to Kallar Schools etc. under the control of Special Deputy Collector are entrusted to this society for execution.

15. Urban Banks:

This has since been revived and affiliated with the Madurai District Co-op. Central Bank during January 1962 and the Bank is granting loans to this bank and a central bank employee is working in this bank.

16. Usilampatti Cottage Industries Society:

At the beginning of the year there were 322 members with a paid up share capital of Rs.1923/- and 95 members were admitted during the year. The working capital of the society as on 31.3.63 amounted to Rs.6,519.35/- The loan due by the society to the Trust fund as on 31.3.63 was Rs.5000/-. This amount is being utilised for the purchase of raw materials such as paddy, gingelly seeds and groundnut etc. The society undertakes the following items of work viz. purchase and sale of honey, production of hand pounded rice and supplying it to the Govt. Boarding Homes and Hospital at Usilampatti etc. and extraction of oil and its sale to the public. A sale depot is functioning at Usilampatti. 17. Milk Supply Societies:

There were 7 milk supply societies at the beginning of the year. Out of 7 milk supply kallar co-op. societies 3 milk supply societies were affiliated and the Milk Co-op. society at Andrewsapuram is dormant and steps have been taken to affiliate the running 3 societies with the Central Bank.

18. Employees Co-op. Society:

Out of 2 Employees societies formed for the employee of Kallar Reclamation, Madurai South District. Kallar Reclamation Employees Society, was affiliated with Madurai District Co-op. Central Bank and North District Kallar Reclamation Society is under liquidation. As regards the financing for south Employees Society, the Madurai District Co-op. Central Bank is sanctioning short term loans for its members and is working satisfactorily. A sum of Rs, 1,34,070 (One lakh thirty four thousand and Seventy Only) have been disbursed to this society by the Central Bank during the year.

The General working of Kallar Cooperative Societies continues to be satisfactory.

19. Piramalai Kallar Common Fund:

The fund registered under the societies Registration Act XXI of 1860 continued to function as usual for the uplift of the Piramalai Kallar Community. It is administered by a committee consisting of 15 members elected from Piramalai Kallar Community with the District Collector as its Ex-Officio President, the Spl. Dy. Collector (Kallar Reclamation) Madurai as its Ex-Officio Secretary and the Head Clerk, Office of the Spl. Dy. Collector (Kallar Reclamation) as its Treasurer. New members of the committee are elected during the year. Four meetings of the Kallar Common Fund Committee were held during the year.

Objects:

The main object of the fund is to uplift the Piramalai Kallar community educationally and economically by giving loans and advances to the Kallars & Institutions formed for the benefit of the community. The sources of income to the fund are by way of collection of donations and subscription from the Kallars. A sum of Rs.3644.20 was collected by way of subscription & donations during the year as against Rs.13,398.11 of the last year.

The fund has contributed Rs.2601/- towards NATIONAL DEFENCE FUND & Rs.1501/- for supply of uniforms to Piramalai Kallars in the VILLAGE VOLUNTEER FORCE.

Assets:

The Kallar ware-houses at Usilampatti, Checkanurani and Thendur continued to be occupied by the Madurai Dist. Kallar Co-op. Marketing Society, Usilampatti and its branches for stocking the produce pledged by its members paying rent to the fund. The two buildings at Checkanurani & Batlagundu owned by the fund, are being used as Govt. Boarding Homes at the control of the Kallar Reclamation Department on payment of rent to the fund by the Govt. A portion of the site within the premises of the Kallar Ware House, Thendur has been leased to the Madurai District Kallar Co-op. Marketing Society, Usilampatti for installation of decorticator. An extension of the Boarding Home at Checkanurani was completed during the year and final pay-ment of Rs.4417/- made. Construction of compound wall at an estimated cost of Rs.9300/- at the vacant site measuring about 45 cents in Madurai Town is under progress. A sum of Rs.1500/- was advanced to the Contractor towards this work. The construction work of compound wall, cross wall and drainage at the Kallar ware

House, Theni at an estimated cost of Rs.9800/- was completed during the year and a sum of Rs.7891/- was paid towards this work. Repairs to Boarding Home at Katlagundu were done at a cost of Rs.1700/- The lands at Uailampatti owned by the fund have been leased from 16.3.62 for a period of three years, on annual lease of Rs.850/- for the lands and an annual rent of Rs.250/- for the electric motor installed on the well in the same lands.

**RECLAMATION OF KALLARS KORAVARS AND BENOTIFIED TRIBES IN
RAMANATHAPURAM DISTRICT DURING 1962-63.**

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The Kallar Reclamation work in respect of this District was confined to the maintenance of two Kallar Schools in Srivilliputhur Taluk. The Strength of the School was 230 of which 148 Boys and the rest were girls. The pupils were provided with free books and six slates. Two sets of dresses were also supplied to girl students studying in these schools. A sum of Rs.500/- has been spent towards construction and repair of school building.

RECLAMATION OF KORAVARS:

There were two hostels, one for Koravar Boys and another for Koravar Girls at Aruppukottai. The sanctioned strength of the hostels is 50 and 20 respectively.

BENOTIFIED TRIBES:

For the Welfare of Benotified Tribes, five Koravar Schools -(one Higher Elementary School and 4 Elementary Schools) were continued to be maintained during this year. There were 15 Higher Grade and 5 Secondary Grade Teachers. The children were supplied with free books, slates and midday meals. The total strength of the Schools was 590. Five reading rooms and libraries were attached to these schools. A Boarding Home at Kamudhi with a strength of 110 students and another Boarding Home at Mudukulathur with a strength of 55 were continued during the year under review:

III. RECLAMATION OF KORAVARS IN SALEM DISTRICT DURING 1962-63.

The District Welfare Officer Salem was incharge of the work relating to the Welfare of Benotified Tribes in the District. Four Koravar schools and one boarding home for Koravars were being run in the District. 254 boys and

150 Girls studied in the above four schools during 1962-63. Books and slates for Rs.1978-77 nP. were purchased and supplied to the students. A sum of Rs.9463.00 was spent towards the supply of midday meals to the pupils in Korava schools.

A Korava Boarding Home was being run at Attur taluk for Boys and Girls. 90 Boys and 70 Girls were benefitted in this Home. A sum of Rs.1920/- was spent towards the maintenance of Boarding Home during 1962-63.

3. AGRICULTURE:

The main occupation of the settlers within the settlement is agriculture. The total extent of the settlement is 1411 acres. During the period under report 492.70 acres were brought under cultivation. Paddy to an extent of 296.51 acres and dry crops to an extent of 64.01 acres were raised during the period. Both paddy and dry crops were harvested with a fair outturn. The agricultural wealth of the settlers has improved by the supply of plough bulls and agricultural implements every year. During the period under report a sum of Rs.14000/- was spent under the Centrally Sponsored Schemes for the supply of 35 pairs of plough bulls and agricultural implements to 35 beneficiaries.

During the period under report 6 beneficiaries were granted subsidy of Rs.750/- each and loan of Rs.750/- each for sinking wells. As there was no possibility for sinking wells in the settlement, the beneficiaries of outside the settlement were selected for this purpose.

One pair of Government work bulls were maintained properly as usual. A sum of Rs.937.50 was spent during the period for the maintenance of the work bulls. The condition of the cattle owned by the settlers was found to be fair. The Government cart was also maintained properly. A sum of Rs.50/- was spent for carrying out repairs to the cart. A total sum of Rs.102.87 was collected towards cart hire during the year

CARPENTRY INDUSTRY:

The work in this Industry was normal due to lack of more workmen. Twelve persons were employed in this Unit. Some

of the workers in this Industry were not inclined to work as they diverted their attention to the Melvelli Lignite Corporation. Steps were being taken to engage non settlers to this Industry. A sum of Rs.20504.64 was spent for this Industry during the period under report as against the allotment of Rs.20,500-00. The Unit had to meet the requirements of Harijan Welfare Department of this State in regard to furniture as contemplated in G.O.Ms.No.3927 Home dated 20-11-1962. As such arrangements were being made to expand this Unit by employing more workmen and for providing amenities to them. Furniture to a tune of Rs.169.91 were disposed of by private sales during the period. Standardised articles of furniture such as Desks, Record boxes, tables, chairs, sub-boards, benches and sitting planks were supplied to the different Harijan Welfare Schools and Hostels during the period under report. The work in this Industry was below normal due to ^{dearth} ~~lack~~ of skilled men and requisite machinery. The Instructor himself was attending to the manufacture of finished goods of this Industry. Most of the employees who got trained in this Industry had been employed outside the settlement in private Industrial Units. Leather articles worth of Rs.503.22 were disposed of by private sales during the period. A sum of Rs.500/ was spent for this unit during the period. Articles worth of Rs.20.23 were sold at the exhibition at Salem. In addition to the above three Industries, one Coir making Industry was functioning in this settlement under the Women's Welfare Department. 12 Women settlers were being trained in that Unit by a qualified Instructor.

OTHER FORMS OF OCCUPATION.

Some of the settlers were engaged in neighbouring lands as labourers during the cultivation and harvest seasons. Some were employed in the Neivelli Lignite Corporation on monthly emoluments and weekly and daily wages. About 200 settlers were employed in different capacity such as teachers, clerks, Main runners, Maternity Assistants etc., outside the settlement. About 20 settlers were working as teachers in the Government Senior Basic School, Arignagar Settlement and menials in this office.

5. HEALTH AND SANITATION:

The General Health condition of the settlers was satisfactory. The dispensary which was opened on 22nd 24-9-1959 with the following strength of the staff continued to function satisfactorily.

6. EDUCATION:

The amalgamated Co-educational Government Higher Elementary School of Azisnagar Settlement which was converted into Senior Basic School continued to function properly. The Benotified Tribes students were supplied with text books, note books and stationery articles at free of cost as usual. Midday meals, free of clothing, Soaps and other amenities were also provided to them. Religious classes were held for them once in a week during the period. The following are the details of expenditure incurred towards the maintenance of the schools.

In addition to above a sum of Rs.625-27 was incurred towards the sanction of T.A. and D.A. to the Benotified Tribes students who were studying outside of the settlement. A sum of Rs.5984.48 was incurred towards the sanction of Boarding and grants to pupils reading outside the settlement.

7. CO-OPERATIVE STORES:

The Cooperative Stores of this settlement was run by a Board of Directors consisting a seven members with the Manager as Ex-officio President. The activities of the Stores were confined only to the supply of Midday meals to the Benotified A Tribes students of Government Senior Basic School, Asiznagar Settlement.

8. MULTIPURPOSE COOPERATIVE SOCIETY:

The Management of the Society was in the hands of a Board of directors of Benotified Tribes with the Manager as ex-officio President and the Accountant as ex-officio Secretary of the society. The Directors and other members of the society had no interest in running the society since all the residents of the settlement were attracted by Neiveli Lignite Corporation where they get their requirements. It was already been resolved in the General Body Meeting of the Society to close the society permanently.

9. BAND PARTY:

The permanent Band set of Asiznagar Settlement of 12 members continued to function properly. During the year the set was engaged for 35 days for various functions in the district and outside the district. There was heavy demand for the engagement of the Band set, especially in marriage seasons. During the year under report a total sum of Rs.4738.53 was collected by the Band set for the various engagements. The Band training School consisting of 12 trainees for the 2nd set was opened in December 1961, and closed in ~~22 January~~ ^{June} 1962. The instruments were distributed to the trainees at free of cost.

The School for the third set of trainees had been functioning here from 1-3-1963. The Band Master continued to conduct classes both in the morning and in the evening daily. A sum of Rs.7000/- has been sanctioned in G.O.No.3475 dated 16-10-1962 for this purpose.

10. CRIME AND CONTROL:

The discipline among the settlers continued to be satisfactory. A few settlers were in the habit of committing petty crimes and quarrels here and there and they were not amenable to discipline. They were being advised ^{through} ~~through~~ the Panchayatdars of the Village as and when necessary. But in special cases, the crimes were reported to the Local Police station for taking appropriate action. The local Police officials were visiting the settlement frequently. They continued to visit the settlement at night times by surprise at frequent intervals.

11. BOYS HOME:

The Boys Home, which was opened by the Collector of South Arcot on 6--2-1961 as per the instructions of the Inspector General of Police for building up ~~general~~ good character etc. among the juveniles continued to function properly. The ~~removed~~ ^{removed} ~~LA~~ Rural Library and the ^{Radio} Radio-cum-reading room attached to it were functioning properly. A sum of Rs.180/- was paid to the part time worker of the Radio-cum-reading room towards remuneration during the period. A sum of Rs.200/- was spent towards the cost of journals and ^{dailies} ~~details~~ for the Rural Library.

13. SCHEMES FOR NARIKERAVARS.

In J.O.No.2725 Home Department dated 6-8-1962, the Government had sanctioned an expenditure of Rs.54,500/- to make the existing Narikeravar colony at Kemmampuram village more alternative and to enable the 30 Kerevar families to settle down and to take to cultivation there. A special Revenue Inspector was also appointed to assist the Manager to check the work and movements of the Narikeravars so that they could develop a tendency to stay in and to agricultural labour and thus to implement the scheme. The details of the Schemes and the expenditure incurred in this regard are detailed below: -

AGRICULTURE:

A sum of Rs.3000/- for reclamation charges for 90 acres and a sum of Rs.5000/- for sinking an artesian well and a sum of Rs.12,000/- for the purchase of 30 pairs of plough bulls and agricultural implements were sanctioned.

II. COTTAGE INDUSTRIES:

A non-recurring expenditure of Rs.4000/- and recurring expenditure of Rs.6500/- were sanctioned to start a training Centre in the manufacture of coir products and to train 20 Narikeravar candidates.

A sum of Rs.3800/- was sanctioned to repair the existing approach roads to the colony. The entire amount sanctioned for this purpose had been spent.

IV. HOUSES:

A sum of Rs.6750/- was sanctioned to repair the existing 30 type design houses of colonists. The sanctioned amount for this purpose had been spent.

Two new Residential schools and two hostels were opened during the year under report. Twenty eight adult education centres were run in the State during the year under report.

181 Boarding grants and 120 scholarships were awarded for the benefit of Scheduled Tribe students.

II. AGRICULTURE:

A sum of Rs.400/- per head was sanctioned for the Scheduled Tribes for the purchase of plough bulls, Agricultural seeds and agricultural implements. A sum of Rs.0.89 lakh was utilised for the grant of this subsidy. In addition to the agricultural subsidy, plough bulls and 50 milch animals have been supplied in the North Arcot District and an amount of Rs.0.13 lakh was spent for this purpose. Besides a subsidy of Rs.0.57 lakhs was granted for sinking of irrigation wells. 37 new and 11 old wells have been completed and repaired respectively during the year under report. A sum of Rs.1500/- per head was sanctioned under this scheme. During the year under report about 300 families were benefited under both these schemes.

III. COTTAGE INDUSTRIES:

During the year under report 4 Poultry units have been started in North Arcot District and an amount of Rs.0.10 lakhs was incurred under this item. Additional building for the training cum production work shop at Kotagiri was also constructed besides running it. Eight cottage industries work centre for Scheduled Tribe Women in Chingleput, North Arcot, Nilgiris & Madurai and Coimbatore districts were continued to be run during the year under report under the control of Director of Women Welfare, Madras. For these purpose a sum of Rs.0.22 lakh was spent towards the maintenance of these centres during 62-63.

IV. HOUSING:

Under this programme the subsidy for each house at Rs.750/- was granted and the beneficiaries had to contribute Rs.250/- during the

under report a sum of Rs.2.26 lakhs was spent towards the construc-
of ~~236~~ 236 new and 60 old incomplete houses for the benefit of
Scheduled Tribe people in the State.

V. PUBLIC HEALTH:

Under these schemes 27 Drinking water wells sunk in
various places for the benefit of Scheduled Tribes. One
Health Inspector and a Peon were continued in the Lower Palani
Hills of Madurai District and anti malarial measures were provided
for the purposes during the year under report. An expenditure of
Rs.0.50 lakhs was incurred for providing cutcha Road to tribal
colonies.

VI. MEDICAL:

Two medical units were maintained in North Arcot and the
Nilgiris District. Under the supervision^{of} the medical department
for the benefit of Scheduled Tribe peoples.

VII. MISCELLANEOUS:

During the year under review special staff of 2 Special
Revenue Inspectors and 2 Peons were continued in the Nilgiris
District and Coimbatore District. ~~There~~ Three cooperative
marketing societies for the benefit of Scheduled Tribe people of
Trichy, Coimbatore and North Arcot Districts were also subsidised
and maintained. A tribal model village was also sanctioned at
Nedugal, Coimbatore in the Nilgiris District and the execution is in
progress. Besides the Government have sanctioned a survey on the
^{indebtedness}
~~under~~ of the Scheduled Tribes in Salem District by the
statistics department, and the work has been completed after incur-
ring an expenditure of Rs.0.16 lakh.

I. GRANT IN AID SCHEME FOR THE WELFARE OF OTHER BACKWARD CLASSES:

1. HOUSING FOR SWEEPERS AND SCAVENGERS:

During 62-63 the Government have sanctioned a sum of Rs.6/- lakhs towards Housing for sweepers and scavengers. In order to give preference to persons engaged in unclean occupations houses were constructed for sweepers and scavengers employed in Local Boards at a cost of Rs.1000/- each. Out of a sum of Rs.1,000/- Rs.500/- will be paid as subsidy and the other half of Rs.500/- will have to be met by the Municipality or Major Panchayat concerned and in case where the Municipality or Panchayat is not able to meet the contribution amount, necessary loan upto Rs.500/- per house will be paid from Government funds. Against the provision a sum of Rs.5.96 lakhs was spent and 942 houses were in progress upto 62-63.

2. HOUSE SITES FOR HARIJANS:

Under the Housing scheme a sum of Rs.10.50 lakhs was allotted during 62-63 against which a sum of Rs.10.49 lakhs was spent towards the construction of houses. 5467 house sites had been provided.

3. SUPPLY OF WHEEL BARROWS:

The allotment sanctioned for the above scheme was Rs.4/lakhs during the year under review. Wheel barrows were supplied to the scavengers working in Municipalities and Panchayats through the Agency of the Chief Electoral Officer, Madras.

Out of the total provision a sum of Rs 3.87 lakhs was spent and

~~2322~~ 2717 persons were benefited by this scheme.

1. AWARD OF POST MATRIC SCHOLARSHIPS.

Against the provision Rs 1.00 lakh a sum of Rs 5.55 lakhs was spent towards the award of 943 scholarships during the year under report.~~2x~~

2. CENTRALLY SPONSORED SCHEMES FOR THE WELFARE OF SCHEDULED TRIBES:

A sum of Rs 0.40 lakhs was provided during the period under report for the formation of the Forest and multipurpose cooperative societies. This amount was placed at the disposal of the Registrar of Cooperative Societies, Madras for the implementation of the schemes. The Registrar of Cooperative Societies, Madras had reported that a sum of Rs 0.56 lakh was spent during 62-63 for the benefit of these societies.

3. CENTRALLY SPONSORED SCHEMES FOR THE WELFARE OF DENOTIFIED TRIBES.

For the amelioration of the Denotified Tribes, various schemes were executed. A sum of ^{Rs 100.00} ~~Rs 100.00~~ lakhs has been programmed to be spent in III Five Year Plan period. Under this scheme, a sum of Rs 17.34 lakhs was set apart for implementing the welfare schemes for Denotified Tribes. These schemes come under 3 groups viz. education, Economic uplift and health, housing and other schemes. The details of schemes implemented during 62-63 are as follows:-

1. EDUCATION:

This schemes comprises of:-

- i. supply of midday meals
- ii. construction of building to the Denotified Tribe hostel.
- iii. main enance of hostels (newly started)

During the year under report 5703 scholarships were awarded 4800 pupils supplied with free midday meals, 3 hostels were maintained and ~~and~~ one additional building was constructed at Sathur. The expenditure incurred on these items was Rs 3.60 lakhs, 1.47 and Rs 0.95 lakhs as against the provision of Rs 2.10 lakhs, Rs 1.60 and

Rs.2.54 lakhs respectively.

II. ECONOMIC UPLIFT:

This group consists of the award of subsidy at Rs.400/- per family for the purchase of plough bulls seeds etc. and Rs.1500/- for the sinking of an irrigation well on half loans and half subsidy basis and also the starting of new cottage industrial schemes for the benefit of the men and women of the Denotified Community. During 62-63, 602 families were awarded subsidy for the purchase of plough bulls, seeds etc. 195 families were awarded subsidy and loan for the ~~sink~~ sinking of irrigation well which cost Rs.2.38 lakhs and Rs.1.50 lakhs (subsidy portion only) respectively. Besides two Engineering work shops and 6 work centres for the womenfolk were run; two Industrial Cooperative Societies were granted financial assistance and 600 Ambar charkas supplied. The total expenditure incurred in this regard was Rs.1.34 lakhs. *10127-211162*

III. HEALTH, HOUSING AND OTHER SCHEMES:

Under this scheme, provision of house sites to Denotified Tribe people were made. Each house cost at Rs.1000/- out of which Rs.750/- is paid as subsidy while the balance of Rs.250/- has to be contributed by the beneficiary either in the form of labour or materials etc. A sum of Rs.4.64 lakhs was spent during 62-63 for providing 654 houses of which 68 to be completed shortly.

Thus a sum of Rs.15.89 ^{lakhs} was spent for the benefit of Denotified Tribes during 62-63 under the various schemes noted above.
