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REPORT ON THE WORKING OF THE FACTORIES ACT, 1948 IN
THE STATE OF MADRAS FOR THE YEAR 1962 WITH A NOTE
ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE MADRAS MATERNITY
BENEFIT ACT, 1934.

Part I.

1. *Personnel.*—Sri T. N. Lakshminarayanan, I.A.S., Commissioner of Labour and Director of Employment continued to be in overall charge of the administration. Sri P. V. Viswanathan continued as Chief Inspector of Factories, Madras during the year 1962. Sri T. V. Lakshmanaswamy continued as Deputy Chief Inspector of Factories on 1st January 1962 and 2nd January 1962. On his return from deputation abroad and on the expiry of some leave, Sri P. Perianayagam assumed charge on 3rd January 1962 and continued as Deputy Chief Inspector of Factories till 23rd January 1962 when he suddenly passed away. Sri T. V. Lakshmanaswamy succeeded him in the post of Deputy Chief Inspector of Factories from 30th January 1962 and continued as Deputy Chief Inspector of Factories during the year under report. In the enforcement of the various Labour enactments, the Chief Inspector of Factories was assisted by the Deputy Chief Inspector of Factories, One Inspector of Factories (Productivity), One Inspector of Factories, (Accidents, Research and Statistics) four Inspectors of Factories, Grade I, five Inspectors of Factories, Grade II, one Inspectress of Factories, twenty-five Assistant Inspectors of Factories and three statistical Inspectors.

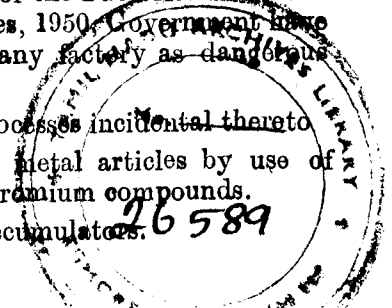
2. *Important meetings and conferences.*—A conference of the Officers of the Labour and Factories Wings of the Department was held on 30th and 31st July 1962.

3. *Factories covered by the Factories Act.*—The Factories Act, 1948 applies to all power factories employing ten or more persons and to all non-power factories employing twenty or more persons. By the notification issued during 1962 by the Government, the Act was extended under section 85 (i) of the Act to some categories of factories such as minor engineering factories, Rice Mills, Oil Mills, etc., employing less than 10 persons with power.

4. (a) *Number of factories and workers employed therein.*—At the beginning of the year 1962, there were 5,803 factories on the registers. During the year, 1,580 factories were brought on the registers and 926 factories were removed from the registers. At the end of the year, 6,457 factories were covered by the Act of which, 6,242 factories were in commission.

(b) *Dangerous operations.*—Under section 87 of the Factories Act, 1948 read with Rule 95 of the Madras Factories Rules, 1950, Government have declared the following operations carried on in any factory as dangerous operations.

- (i) Manufacture of aerated water and processes incidental thereto
- (ii) Electrolytic plating or oxidation of metal articles by use of an electrolyte containing chromic acid or other chromium compounds.
- (iii) Manufacture and repair of electric accumulators.
- (iv) Glass manufacture.



(v) Grinding and Glazing of metals.

(vi) Manufacture and treatment of lead and certain compounds of lead.

(vii) Generating petrol gas from petrol.

(viii) Cleaning and smoothing of articles by a jet or sand, metal shot or grit or other abrasive propelled by a blast of compressed air or steam.

(ix) Liming and tanning of raw hides and skins and processes incidental thereto.

(x) Cellulose spraying.

(xi) Graphite powdering and incidental processes.

(xii) Certain lead processes carried on in printing press and type foundries.

(xiii) Cashewnut processing.

(xiv) Dyeing, stenciling, and painting of mats, mattings and carpets in coir and fibre factories.

(xv) Pottery and ceramic industry.

(xvi) Chemical works.

There were 727 factories of the above categories in the State employing 38,711 workers (vide Statements 1-A and 1-B).

5. *Employment.*—(a) The average daily number of workers employed in 6,242 factories which were in commission at the end of the year was 3,35,747. (This figure includes the estimated average daily number of workers employed in factories in respect of which returns were not received.)

(b) All the units from which prescribed returns were received have worked 9,18,20,427 mandays.

(c) There were 233 factories in the public Sector (Government and Local Fund Factories) at the end of the year, employing 49,175 workers as against 186 factories employing 41,228 workers in the previous year.

ANALYSIS.

Coimbatore.—A highly industrialised district, Coimbatore has 1,038 factories with a labour complement of 85,173 roughly 27 per cent of the factory labour population in the State. Cotton mills employ 56.3 per cent of the total number of workers in the District; Ginning factories 8.9 per cent, engineering 11.2 per cent knitting factories 2.1 per cent and other industries 21.5 per cent.

Madras.—Second in the order of labour population, Madras has 875 factories employing 70,448 workers. Cotton mills employ 18.9 per cent of the workers in the district; Printing presses 12.5 per cent, transport industry 11.3 per cent, railway workshops 17.9 per cent and other industries 39.4 per cent.

Madurai.—Third in the order of employment Madurai, has 511 factories employing a total labour force of 32,631 workers. Cotton mills employ 52.8 per cent of the labour force in the district, rice mills 6.2 per cent, ginning factories 3.4 per cent, printing presses 2.7 per cent and other industries 34.9 per cent.

Tirunelveli.—Fourth in the order of labour population this district has 603 factories employing 27,205 workers, cotton mills employ 52.0 per cent, match industry 12.5 per cent, cotton ginning 5.5 per cent, rice milling 4.8 per cent and other industries 25.2 per cent.

Chingleput.—Twenty-three thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven workers were employed in 267 factories, 33.3 per cent of workers were employed in Transport industry, 8.4 per cent in tanneries, 7.9 per cent in engineering, 5.1 per cent in matches and 45.3 per cent in other industries.

Tiruchirappalli.—Twenty-three thousand one hundred and six workers were employed in 449 factories, Railway workshops employ 33.8 per cent, cotton mills 16.3 per cent, rice mills 9.8 per cent and other industries 40.1 per cent.

Salem.—Nineteen thousand nine hundred and forty-nine workers were employed in 645 factories of which 24.0 per cent of workers were employed in cotton mills, 16.1 per cent in sago industries, 10.9 per cent in silk mills, 9.2 per cent in rice and oil industries and 40.8 per cent in other industries.

Ramanathapuram.—Seventeen thousand five hundred and ninety-five workers were employed in 513 factories in which 25.3 per cent was in match industries, 21.2 per cent in cotton textiles, 14.5 per cent in cotton ginning 9.9 per cent in printing presses and 29.1 per cent in other industries.

North Arcot.—Twelve thousand four hundred and two workers were employed in 443 factories of which 30.6 per cent of workers were in tanneries, 18.0 per cent in railway workshops, 16.4 per cent in cotton mills, 13.2 per cent in match industry and 21.8 per cent in other industries.

South Arcot.—Eight thousand six hundred and forty-six workers were employed in 183 factories of which 36.5 per cent was in rice mills, 28.6 per cent in engineering, 7.3 per cent in cotton mills and 27.6 per cent in other industries.

Thanjavur.—Seven thousand eight hundred and fifty-four workers were employed in 495 factories of which 33.5 per cent was in rice mills, 14.8 per cent in Transport and 51.9 per cent in other industries.

Nilgiris.—Four thousand one hundred and forty-eight workers were employed in 128 factories, of which 78.5 per cent were employed in Tea Factories and 21.5 per cent in other industries.

Kanyakumari.—Two thousand seven hundred and twenty-one workers were employed in 92 factories, of which 15.8 per cent was in cotton textiles, 10.4 per cent in transport, 9.3 per cent in rice milling and 64.5 per cent in other industries.

Serial numbers 1 to 4 and 9 to 13 in the above table, have retained the same relative positions at the top and bottom as in the year 1961. In the middle, however, during the year 1962, Chingleput has gained precedence over Tiruchirappalli and likewise, Salem has gained precedence over Ramanathapuram.

9. *Distribution of factories according to the number of days worked.*—The statement appended below shows the number of factories and number of workers employed in them according to number of days worked.

10. *Registration and licencing of factories.*—During the year under report licences issued to the factories for the year 1961 were renewed for 1962 and fresh licences were issued to factories newly brought under the purview of the Act during the year. A sum of Rs. 7,16,782 was collected as licence fees under the Factories Act 1948.

11. *Plans.*—One thousand six hundred and seventy-three plans were scrutinized and approved during the year, when attention was paid to the aspects of stability, ventilation, lighting, temperature conditions, etc. In addition, the specialist knowledge of the Inspector of Factories (Productivity) was utilized in scrutinising the plans from the productivity angle with special reference to plant lay-out and materials handling. It has been noticed from the scrutiny of plans that in the construction of new factories, managements are keeping abreast of contemporary developments in their design, with an increasing eye to better lay-out of machinery and the provision of a decent standard of welfare amenities and other facilities. In the case of old factories attempts are being constantly made to improve the standards in all big factories. In the case of medium and small factories also, the attempt has been made to improve standards at least to the minimum required by the Act with suitable relaxation wherever necessary.

12. *Health of workers*.—Attention to the possible extent has been paid by Inspectors of Factories to safeguard the general health of the workers and to protect them against industrial diseases. Though it is the endeavour of the Inspectorate to do its best in this regard, it is strongly felt that this work should be attended to by a specialist in this particular field. The appointment of a separate Medical Inspector of Factories, is therefore, considered essential.

13. *Sanitation*.—Generally a fair standard of sanitation and cleanliness has been noticed in almost all factories.

14. *Dust nuisance*.—Adequate steps were taken to mitigate dust nuisance wherever necessary and also to prevent inhalation of dust by employees working in dusty processes in factories such as textile mills, decorticating factories, tea and coffee curing factories, etc. It is felt that the Inspectorate should be provided with instruments to record dust counts and that a laboratory with the necessary staff and equipment should be set up at Madras to undertake dust sampling and connected investigations.

15. *Fencing and other safety measures*.—Fencing and guarding of machinery continued to receive the active attention of the Inspectorate with the tendering of advice and instruction as due, to the managements of factories in the provision and upkeep of fences and guards. The advice tendered also continued to receive due attention and compliance from the managements with the results that the fencing of dangerous part of machinery, etc., was fairly satisfactory.

16. *Hours of work*.—A majority of the factories worked on the 43 hour week basis with a working day of 8 hours each. Compliance with the provisions of the Act relating to hours of work was generally found to be satisfactory. Irregular employment beyond scheduled working hours or on weekly holidays, etc. was checked and curtailed by surprise visits.

17. *Inspections*.—Of the 6,467 factories on the registers at the end of the year 1962, 1,414 factories were inspected once, 3,181 factories were inspected twice, 505 factories were inspected thrice and 63 factories were inspected more than three times. (Vide Statement XI) This leaves 1,294 factories as not inspected during the year. Out of them, 204 are known to have been out of commission during the year. Besides the notification of small factories issued in G.O. Ms. No. 5072, Industries, Labour and Co-operation, dated 16th October 1962, superseding the previous notification thereon was communicated to the Inspectorate only at the fag end of the year and all of them could not be inspected due to paucity of time. The remaining factories 211 in number under sections 2m (i) and 2m (ii) were left uninspected as some of the posts of Inspectors of Factories and Assistant Inspectors of Factories were vacant for long periods. In addition to the regular inspection, the Inspectors have made 4433 Sunday, surprise, special and night visits to factories to check employment of workers outside their specified hours of work and on their weekly holidays. They have also visited 480 unregistered establishments to find out whether there is proof of employment to bring them under the purview of the Factories Act, 1948. This is exclusive of 462 other establishments which were so visited and taken on the Registers on the availability of proof of employment for registration. One thousand three hundred and eighty-three inspections were also made by officers of other Departments connected with the administration of the Factories Act.

18. *Prosecutions*.—Six hundred and thirty-two prosecutions against 289 factories were launched during the year. Details of convictions obtained during the year are furnished in Statement XII which includes some of the prosecutions which were pending at the end of the previous year.

19. *Notices, Registers, etc.*—Nearly 80.7 per cent of the working factories submitted returns. The prescribed registers and notices under the Act and Rules were maintained and exhibited in almost all factories.

20. *Leave with wages and compensatory holidays*.—Particulars relating to the grant of leave with wages under the Act are shown in Statement XIV. Exemptions were granted from Chapter VIII of the Factories Act, 1948, to factories whose leave rules were not less favourable than what is provided under the Factories Act, 1948.

Rest intervals.—Rest intervals as required by section 55 of the factories Act, 1948, were given in all factories.

Weekly holidays.—Sundays or substituted weekly holidays were observed as weekly holidays in all the factories except those engaged in continuous process and hence exempted from section 52. Compensatory holidays for the weekly holidays so lost were given in all such cases as required by section 53 of the Act (vide Statement XV).

21. *Complaints*.—The Inspectors enquired into 762 complaints lodged by individual workers, trade unions, etc., and took suitable action wherever necessary. The details of the complaints are furnished in Appendix VIII.

22. *The cost of living index figures*.—The consumer Price Index numbers (Cost of living index figures) for industrial workers in the City of Madras and in five other centres in the State furnished by the Director of Statistics, Madras are given in Appendix IX.

23. *Average daily earnings of workers*.—The average daily earnings of workers for the following industries are at present collected on districtwise basis:—

1. Cotton Textile Industry.
2. Printing Presses.
3. Cement Workers.
4. Sugar Industry.
5. Foundries.
6. Engineering Works.
7. Groundnut Decorticating.
8. Cotton Ginning.
9. Rice Milling and Paddy Boiling.
10. Oil Mills.
11. Tile Factories.
12. Type Foundries.

The details regarding the average daily earnings of workers in those industries are furnished in Appendix IV.

24. *Miscellaneous*.—There were two cases of fire accidents in factories in the State which resulted in a loss of Rs. 52,000.

25. *Multiple shifts*.—The details of industries engaged in multiple shifts are furnished in Appendix III.

Part II.

LABOUR WELFARE.

1. *Washing facilities.*—Necessary washing facilities as prescribed in the Act and Rules were provided in most of the factories. The Inspectorate is constantly attempting to improve the standards.

Lockers.—Managements of factories coming under industries like Engineering, Chemicals, etc., have provided lockers for the use of workers for keeping their clothes not worn during working hours.

2. *First Aid Appliances.*—First aid boxes or cupboards equipped as prescribed, as well as Ambulance rooms in the larger factories employing more than 500 workers have been provided as due, in most of the factories.

3. *Housing.*—Decent housing contributes in no small measure to the welfare of labour. Some managements have voluntarily provided good living quarters for their workers to a certain extent. Managements are being persuaded to take advantage of the facilities under the Industrial Housing Scheme sponsored by Government and extend this essential amenity to as large a sector of the industrial population as possible.

4. *Canteen.*—In every factory wherein 250 or more workers employed, a canteen should be maintained by the occupier for the use of workers as per section 46 of the Act. Particulars of canteen provided in industries are furnished in statement XIII.

5. *Rest shed and creches.*—Rest rooms and creches are provided in most of the factories which employ more than 150 workers and 50 women workers, respectively (Vide Statement XIII).

6. *Drinking water.*—Adequate supply of whole some drinking water in the factories was ensured with particular attention paid to the cooling of water and its hygienic distribution. Water coolers have been installed in some of the big units.

7. *Education.*—Some of the big factories are maintaining High Schools and Elementary Schools or making donations to Schools catering to their workers children. In some cases, subsidies are handed out towards fees, or for the purchase of books for the workers' children (Vide Appendix V).

8. *Medical facilities.*—Apart from the medical facilities provided by the Employees' State Insurance Scheme, some of the factories in areas where the scheme has not been implemented, have provided medical facilities to their workers. Particulars, in detail, are furnished in Appendix V.

9. *Welfare Officers.*—The managements of factories employing more than 500 workers have appointed Labour Welfare Officers.

Part III.

Accidents causing death or bodily injuries by reason of which the injured persons is disabled for a period of 48 hours or more immediately following the accident are to be reported under the Act. For statistical purposes, the number of persons receiving injuries is taken as the number of accidents, as one accident may result in injury to more than one person. In 1962, the total number of reported accidents was 18,224, of which 20 were fatal.

The table annexed below gives some particulars of the accidents during the years 1951 to 1962 and a comparative study for the years 1961 and 1962.—

It is heartening to note that, as between 1961 and 1962 against a 11.3 per cent increase in the number of factories and a 4.1 per cent increase in the labour population, the increase in the total number of accidents is only 2.2 per cent, resulting in a decline in the accident rate per 1,000 workers from 55.3 to 54.2 by 2 per cent. This is a healthy trend evidencing the earnest efforts of the Inspectorate in bringing down the incidence of accidents and it is expected that this downward trend will continue in the years to come.

But the picture is not as encouraging when we see the paradoxical increase (as high as 31.8 per cent) in the number of man-days lost due to accidents, when there has been an actual decline in the accident rate. The high increase in absenteeism due to accidents, may be due to the tendency on the part of workers, initially to stay away for more than 2 days in every case of accident so as to qualify for the half wages payable under the Employees' State Insurance Scheme and also to avail themselves of leave for accidents injuries for a period longer than that really required for the cure of the injury. As this aspect of increasing absenteeism impinges vitally on production, it calls for express attention, especially in the context of the present emergency. A tighter check on the certification of leave for accident injuries seems called for to curb this unhappy trend of increasing absenteeism.

ANALYSIS OF ACCIDENTS.

Tables II to IV below contain the analysis of accidents with reference to their industrial origin on a broad classification of 7 major industries and the rest.

These tables show a downward trend from 1961 to 1962 in the number of accidents as well as the accident rate per 1,000 workers, in the three major groups, viz. Motor Vehicles, Textiles and Railways. In the case of the Rest, though there has been an increase in the number of accidents, there is a decline in the accident rate per 1,000 workers. The decline in the accident rate in the case of Railways from 71.3 in 1961 to 59.9 per cent in 1962 is appreciable and evidences the concerted effort in this public sector industry.

The increase in the accident rate in the Sugar, Cement and General Engineering Industries may be attributable to the setting up of new factories and increase in the tempo of production. The notable increase in the case of the Match Industry calls for deeper examination which is being undertaken.

Table V below gives the analysis of the accidents in eight causation groups.

The marked decline under the causation group "Miscellaneous" as well as the slight decrease under the group "Handling of Goods" from 1961-62 go to show that the propaganda efforts of the Inspectorate through training courses and talks are beginning to bear fruit through better house-keeping and greater safety consciousness in the factories. Continued activity in this regard is bound to result in similar reduction in the other non-machinery causation groups, in the years to come.

In the causation group 'Power Driven Machinery' when compared to 1961 there is an increase of 2.2 per cent. This may be due to the setting up of new power factories and increase in the tempo of production. However, attempts will be made to keep the incidence down through an adequate enforcement of the safety provisions in the Act.

The pattern of distribution for the year 1962 is nearly the same as for 1961. The larger share (71 per cent) of the accidents befell the younger workers in the age groups upto 35. Lack of experience, tendency to take risks and bravado are the factors that occasion accidents on the part of youth. Systematic and preplanned training and induction will help to curb these tendencies. The training programme in accident prevention instituted by the Department has helped to train supervisory personnel, who in turn will plan training schemes to train the younger men on safe performance.

The pattern of distribution is much the same as in 1961. The high percentage of hand and finger injuries (45 per cent) is tokens the large use of manual handling methods in our factories. As this has to be tolerated in the overall employment situation, in increasing use of proper gloves has to be propagated to bring down this incidence. Likewise, discussing recourse to protective foot-wear is called for to counter the next high percentage of leg and foot injuries (23 per cent). Due to insistence on the use of suitable goggles and eye-shield, a very small decline in eye injuries from 15.3 per cent in 1961 to 14.2 per cent in 1962 has been recorded and a special safety circuit on eye hazards is under formation in Madras to combat this incidence.

In 3 of the above cases, prosecution was launched and conviction obtained, the total amount of fine realised being Rs. 375.

9. Activities of the Department to minimise accidents.—The post of the Inspector of Factories (Accident, Statistics and Research) sanctioned in July 1961, has been extended for one more year. His services continue to be received well by industry and the training courses conducted by him are getting increasingly popular. To aid in the conduct of these courses, six films on safety and a number of slides have been purchased. The details of the 18 courses conducted during the year 1962 are furnished in the table appended below. While 16 of the courses were for Middle Supervisory Personnel, one at Coimbatore was for Managers and another at Madras was for Trade Unionists. Higher level Managers and workers in general were covered by special talks at several factories and in the Workers' Education Classes, given by the Chief Inspector of Factories, Inspector of Factories (Accident, Statistics and Research) and the other Inspectors of Factories. In addition, five discussions in Tamil were broadcast through the All-India Radio, Madras in their programme for Industrial Workers.

A good beginning, has been made in the collection of current literature on safety available in other countries, and extracts of useful information on accident prevention are being distributed to the parties concerned.

The formation of Safety Committees in individual factories is gaining momentum. During the year, 68 such Committees were formed in addition to the 45 formed during the previous year. The Inspectors of Factories attend the meetings of these Committees periodically and tender advice on practical accident prevention work.

From the members who received training in the courses conducted by the Department, two safety Circuits one each at Madurai and Madras and two safety groups one each at Tiruchirappalli and Coimbatore were formed during the year. The Circuit members survey the factories in turn, study the accident situation, compare notes and derive mutual benefit in the practical implementation of the safety provisions. The safety groups meet periodically and papers are read and discussed. One more Safety Circuit on Eye Hazards to combat the high incidence of eye injuries is under formation in Madras.

Part IV.

OTHER ACTS.

(a) *Madras maternity Benefit Act.*—The provisions of the Act are applicable to women employed in factories, provided they have entered the service under the employer from whom they claim maternity benefit, not later than 35 weeks immediately before the week in which confinement takes place. Of the 2,421 factories which employ women and were covered by the Madras Maternity Benefit Act, 2,217 factories submitted the returns. Average daily number of women employed was 43,284 in the factories submitting returns. One thousand seven hundred and forty-five claims were made of which 1,538 claims were accepted and either fully or partially paid by the employers of women workers. A total sum of Rs. 91,925.81 nP. was paid as maternity benefits during the year. The details of the maternity benefits paid by Employees State Insurance Corporation are not available. Details of the claims are furnished in Appendix X. Statement-1. Inspections were made by the full time Inspectors and Inspectress of Factories and the claims made and the benefits paid were checked up by them. Thirteen prosecutions against 12 managers of factories were launched in the year of which eleven cases involving 10 managers of factories were disposed of during the year under report and a sum of Rs. 320.00 was realised as fine. Two cases involving one factory were pending at the end of the year.

(b) *Employment of Children Act.*—Most of the establishments are covered by the Factories Act, 1948. Action was taken under this Act.

(c) *Cotton Ginning and Pressing Factories Act.*—The provisions of section 9 of the Act were generally complied with.

(d) *Indian Merchandise Marks Act.*—The provisions of Section 12 of the Act were generally complied with.

Part V.

GENERAL.

Productivity.—The proposal for the establishment of a fullfledged State Productivity Unit in this Department has been deferred by Government. However, the Inspector of Factories (Productivity) had taken up the following items of work, during the year under report.

B. Projects.—(1) In connection with the implementation of the scheme of rationalisation in the Textile Mills in the State in his capacity as a Technical Assessor to the umpire (Industrial Tribunal, Madras) he had surveyed over 30 textile mills for the assessment of working conditions and other factors influencing production.

(2) He had conducted a survey of the working of the Finger Print Bureau of the Police Department at Vellore and made suggestions for improving the operational efficiency of the Bureau.

(3) Had functioned as a member of the sub-committee constituted by the Board of Studies, Madras for training the detailed syllabus for the various subjects in the Mechanical Engineering Branch for the Examinations to be conducted by the Directorate of Technical Education.

C. Visits.—1. Special visits were made to several factories to advise the managements on plant lay-out, plant maintenance and setting up of time standards and incentive plans and for studying work load variations due to method changes, etc.

2. Periodical visits were made to the local Productivity Councils in the State to participate in the Governing Body Meetings and assist in programming and conducting their activities.

D. Talks.—(1.) At the request of the Regional Director, Workers Education Centre, talks were given to the trainees on "Plant and Material Utilisation", "Productivity of Materials" and "Job Evaluation".

(2.) Addressed the participants of the "Course in Trade Unionism" conducted by the Madras Productivity Council, on the Productivity techniques in which Trade Unions are directly interested.

E. Seminars.—(1) Participated in the seminar on Foundry Industry conducted by the Madras Productivity Council.

(2.) Participated in a Seminar for Employment Officers and delivered a talk on "Work simplification in Office".

Staff.—Particulars relating to the staff of the Inspectorate under the Factories Act, 1948, in the State of Madras as on 31st December 1962 are furnished in Appendix XIV to this report.

General.—(a) The Chief Inspector of Factories heard and disposed of 7 appeals, inspected 3 factories in connection with the approval of plans, and check inspected 205 factories. He has also inspected 37 plantations. The Commissioner of Labour (Factories) had inspected one office during the year. The Chief Inspector of Factories, had inspected 11 offices of Inspectors of Factories, and Inspectors of Plantations and the Deputy Chief Inspector of Factories, Madras had inspected 2 offices of Inspectors of Factories and three offices of Assistant Inspectors of Factories. During the year the Chief Inspector of Factories had delivered talks on Industrial Safety to workers and Supervisory personnel in 25 factories.

(b) As indicated in the Report for 1961, for the purposes of building standards, factories are classified as small, medium and big on the following basis.

Small Factories.—Those units employing up to 20 persons using power operated machinery or up to 50 persons without power operated machinery.

Medium Factories.—Those units employing up to 50 persons using power operated machinery or up to 100 persons without power operated machinery.

Big Factories.—Those units employed 50 or more using power operated machinery or 100 or more persons without power operated machinery.

The number of factories in each classification as detailed above is furnished in Appendix XIII.

Factories and their inspections.—There were 5,803 factories covered by the Factories Act, 1948, at the beginning of the year 1962. The number of such factories at the end of the year 1962 was 6,457 of which 6,242 factories were in commission as against 5,615 during 1961. The average daily number of workers employed in these factories at the end of the year was 335,747 as against 324,418 workers at the end of 1961. In the Public Sector, there were 233 factories employing at the end of the year 49,175 workers as against 186 factories employing 41,228 workers in the previous year.

Out of 6,457 factories which were on the registers during the year 1962, 1,414 factories were inspected once, 3,181 factories were inspected twice, 505 factories were inspected thrice and 63 factories were inspected more than three times.

The Inspectors also made 4,433 Sunday inspections, surprise inspection and special inspections and night visits to factories to check employment of workers outside the specified hours of work and on their weekly holidays. They also inspected 460 unregistered factories.

Industrial position.—The Rice Mills continued to be the largest in number on any single category in the State but they only employed 14,859 workers while 475 cotton mills including cotton ginning factories employed 118,536 workers. The largest number of factories are concentrated in Coimbatore, Madras, Salem and Tirunelveli. The factories in Coimbatore employ the largest number of workers and the district of Madras, Madurai and Tirunelveli come next in the order given.

Coimbatore is the highly industrialised district. Cotton mills including ginning factories and Engineering works predominate in that district. Cotton Mills, Railway workshops, printing presses and Transport industry figure predominantly in the industrial set up in the Madras City. Cotton Mills and Rice Mills predominate in Madurai district and cotton-mills and match industry predominate in Tirunelveli district.

Plans.—One thousand six hundred and seventy-three plans were scrutinised during 1962 as against 1,761 during 1961. All the 1,673 plans were approved with reference to stability, ventilation, light, etc., as against 1,643 approved during 1961.

Health.—As in the previous years, special attention was paid by Inspectors of Factories to safeguard the general health of the workers and to protect them against industrial diseases.

Average daily earnings.—The details regarding average daily earnings of workers in certain industries collected on district wise basis are added to the Annual Report as a separate Appendix (Appendix IV).

Fencing and other safety measures.—Fencing and guarding of machinery continued to receive the active attention of the Inspectorate with the tendering of advice and instructions to the managements of factories in the provision and upkeep of fences and guards. The advice tendered also continued to receive due attention and compliance from the managements with the result that the fencing of dangerous parts of machinery, etc., was fairly satisfactory.

Steps to minimise the rate of accidents.—The post of the Inspector of Factories (Accident, Statistics and Research) sanctioned in July 1961, has been extended for one more year. His services continue to be received well by industry and the training courses conducted by him are getting increasingly popular. To aid in the

conduct of these courses, six films on safety and a number of slides have been purchased. Of the 18 courses conducted during 1962, 16 were for Middle Supervisory Personnel, one at Coimbatore was for Managers and another at Madras was for Trade Unionists. Higher level Managers and workers in general were covered by special talks at several factories and in the Workers' Education Classes, given by the Chief Inspector of Factories, Inspector of Factories, (Accident, Statistics and Research) and the other Inspectors of Factories. In addition five discussions in Tamil were broadcast through the All-India Radio, Madras, in their programme for Industrial workers.

A good beginning has been made in the collection of current literature on Safety available in other countries, and extracts of useful information on accident-prevention are being distributed to the parties concerned.

The formation of Safety Committees in individual factories is gaining momentum. During the year, 68 such Committees were formed in addition to the 45 formed during the previous year. The Inspectors of Factories attend the meetings of these Committees periodically and tender advice on practical accident-prevention work.

From the members who received training in the course, conducted by the Department, two safety circuits one each at Madurai and Madras and two Safety Groups one each at Tiruchirappalli and Coimbatore were formed during the year. The circuit members survey the factories in turn, study the accident situation, compare notes and derive mutual benefit in the practical implementation of the safety provisions. The safety groups meet periodically and papers are read and discussed. One more Safety Circuit on Eye-Hazards to combat the high incidence of eye injuries is under formation in Madras.

Accidents.—In 1962, the total number of accidents in all factories were 18,224 as against 17,828 in 1961. Of these accidents, 20 proved fatal as against 21 in 1961. There is a decline from 1961 to 1962 in the accident rate per 1,000 workers in the three major groups, viz., Motor Vehicles, Textiles and Railway, vide relevant statistics extracted below:

Analysis of accidents by causation disclosed that striking by falling body, stepping on or striking against objects, etc., were some of the causation groups responsible for a large number of accidents.

The Managers of 289 factories were prosecuted during the year as against the managers of 191 factories prosecuted during 1961, for noncompliance of various provisions of the Factories Act, 1948. Six hundred and ninety-two prosecutions were launched against them and 294 cases ended in conviction.

Madras Maternity Benefit Act, 1934.—The number of factories which employed women and the average daily number of women employed during 1962 were 2,421 and 43,284 respectively as against 2,096 and 39,827 respectively during the previous year. One thousand seven hundred and forty-five claims were made for the grant of maternity benefits during the year as against 1,589 in 1961. One thousand five hundred and thirty-eight claims were accepted and the total number of maternity benefit paid by the employers of women workers was Rs. 91,925.81. Thirteen prosecutions against 12 managers of factories were launched in the year of which eleven cases involving 10 managers of factories were disposed of during the year under report and a sum of Rs. 320.00 was realised as fine.
