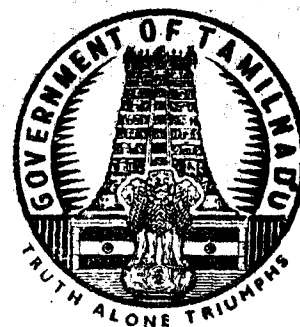

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REPORT ON THE WORKING OF THE FACTORIES ACT, 1948, IN THE STATE OF
MADRAS FOR THE YEAR 1964 WITH A NOTE ON THE ADMINISTRATION
OF THE MADRAS MATERNITY BENEFIT ACT, 1934.

Personnel.—Sri R. Balasubramanian, I.A.S., as Commissioner of Labour, till 15th March 1964 and Sri M. G. Balasubramanian, I.A.S., from 16th March 1964 continued, to be in overall charge of the administration. Sri T. V. Lakshmanaswamy, B.E., M.I.E., continued as Chief Inspector of Factories during the period under report. Sri T. Duraiswami, B.E., continued as Deputy Chief Inspector of Factories up to 23rd April 1964 and Thiru C. T. Sreenivasan, B.E., succeeded him as Deputy Chief Inspector of Factories on 24th April 1964. For the enforcement of the various enactments administered by the Factories Department, under the present set up, the Chief Inspector of Factories is assisted at Headquarters by one Deputy Chief Inspector of Factories, one Superintending Inspector of Factories (Accidents, Statistics and Research) and one Superintending Inspector of Factories (Productivity) and at the district level by six Superintending Inspectors of Factories, twenty-three Inspectors of Factories, one Inspector of Factories, five Assistant Inspectors of Factories and three Statistical Inspectors.

With a view to make factory inspection more effective and to reduce the incidence of accidents and to improve productivity in industries, the administrative set up of Factory Inspectorate was reorganised with effect from 1st February 1964. In the revised set up introduced from 1st February 1964, the State has been divided into six divisions, each in charge of a Superintending Inspector of Factories and the six divisions have been sub-divided into twenty-three circles each in charge of an Inspector of Factories. The five Assistant Inspectors are attached one each to the Divisional Offices except Madras City Division. Under the divisional scheme, for the first time, there has come about the decentralisation of some of the functions which have all along been discharged at the Headquarters Office of the Chief Inspector of Factories and the Divisional Officers exercise an intermediate level of control and supervision over the work of the Inspectors of Factories.

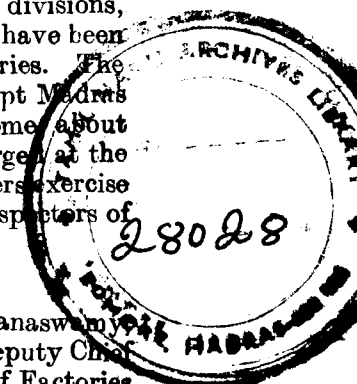
Conferences, Seminars and Deputation.—(a) *Conference.*—Sri T. V. Lakshmanaswamy, B.E., M.I.E., Chief Inspector of Factories, and Sri C. T. Sreenivasan, B.E., Deputy Chief Inspector of Factories attended the 17th Conference of the Chief Inspectors of Factories of all States held at Calcutta from 7th to 12th December 1964.

(b) *Seminar.*—Sri T. V. Lakshmanaswamy, Chief Inspector of Factories, attended the Seminar on "Treatment of Trade Wastes and Effluents in Sugar Factories" held at Patna on 20th December 1964.

(c) *Deputation.*—Sri T. R. Srinivasan, B.E., Superintending Inspector of Factories, was deputed to Yugoslavia where he attended a training course for nine months from Industrial Hygienists under the sponsorship of the World Health Organisation.

3. *Factories covered by Factories Act, 1948.*—The Factories Act, 1948, applies to all power factories employing ten or more persons and all non-power factories employing twenty or more persons. By the notification issued during 1962, the Act was extended to some categories of small power factories such as minor engineering industries, Rice mills, oil mills, etc., employing less than ten workers.

4. (a) *Number of factories and workers employed therein.*—At the beginning of the year 1964, there were 6,572 factories on the Register. During the year, 606 factories were brought on the registers and 308 factories removed from the register. At the end of the year, the total number of factories covered by the Act was 6,870 of which 6,475 were in commission.



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(b) *Dangerous operations.*—Under section 87 of the Factories Act, 1948, read with rule 95 of the Madras Factories Rules, 1950, Government have declared the following operations carried on in factories as dangerous :—

- (i) Manufacture of aerated waters and processes incidental thereto.
- (ii) Electrolytic plating or Oxidation of metal articles by action on electrolyte containing chromic acid or other chromium compounds.
- (iii) Manufacture and repair of electric accumulators.
- (iv) Glass manufacture.
- (v) Grinding and glazing of metals.
- (vi) Generating petrol gas from petrol.
- (vii) Manufacture and treatment of lead and certain compounds of lead.
- (viii) Cleaning and smoothening of articles by a jet or sand, metal shot or grit or other abrasive propelled by a blast of compressed air or steam.
- (ix) Liming and tanning of raw hides and skins and processes incidental thereto.
- (x) Cellulose spraying.
- (xi) Graphite powdering and incidental processes.
- (xii) Certain lead processes carried on in printing processes and type foundries.
- (xiii) Cashewnut processing.
- (xiv) Dyeing, stencilling and painting of mats, matings, and carpets in coir and fibre factories.
- (xv) Pottery and ceramic industry.
- (xvi) Chemical works.
- (xvii) Manufacture of dichromates.

There were 1,098 factories of the above categories in the State and the average daily number of workers employed in them was 39,964 during 1964 (*vide* Statements I-A and I-B).

5. *Employment.*—(a) The average daily number of workers employed in 6,475 factories which were in commission at the end of the year was 366,231. (This figure includes estimated average daily number of workers employed in factories in respect of which returns were not received.)

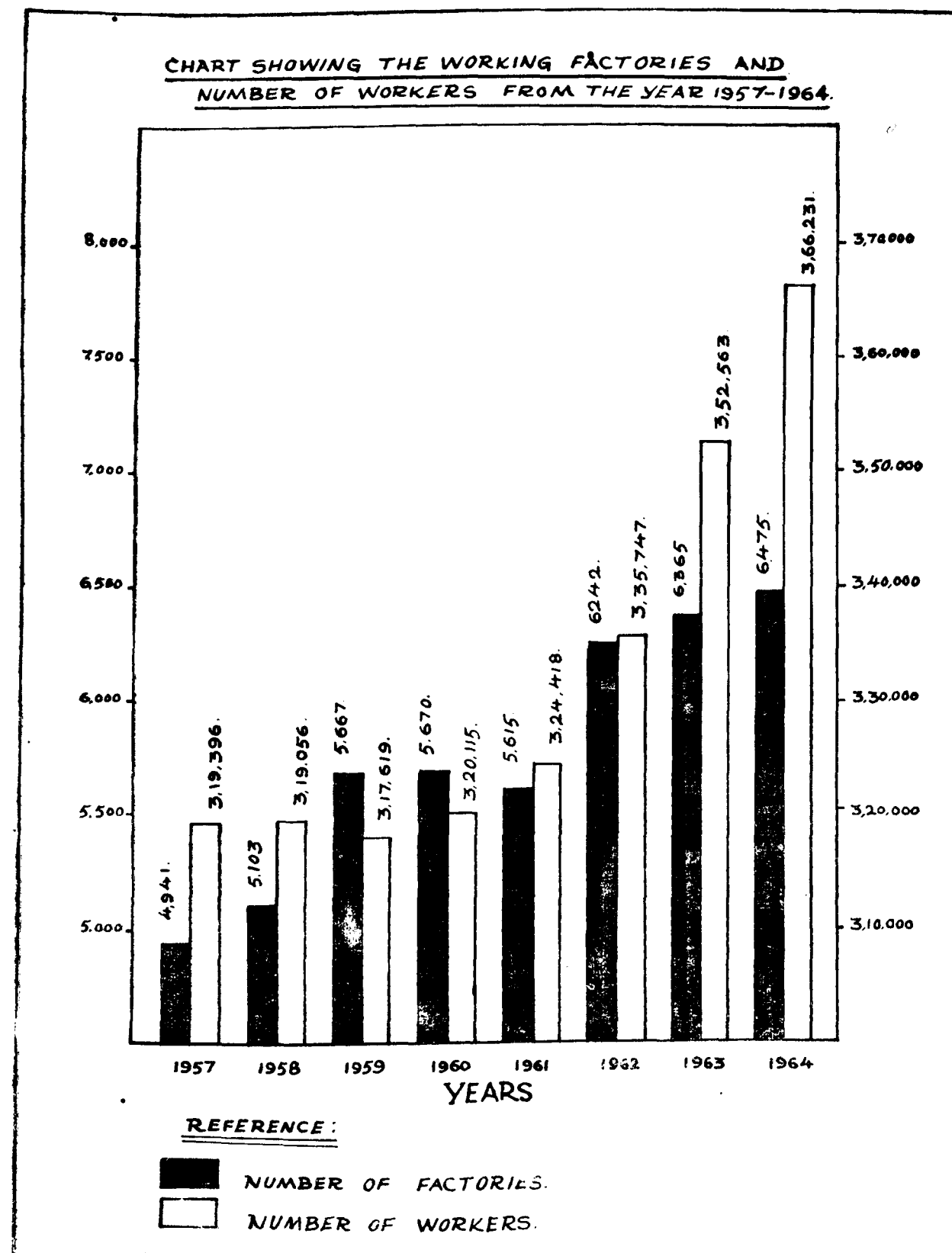
(b) All the Units from which prescribed returns were received have worked 105,902,556 mandays.

(c) There were 249 factories in the Public Sector (Government and Local Fund Factories) at the end of the year employing an average daily number of 53,327 workers as against 242 factories employing 54,175 workers in the previous year.

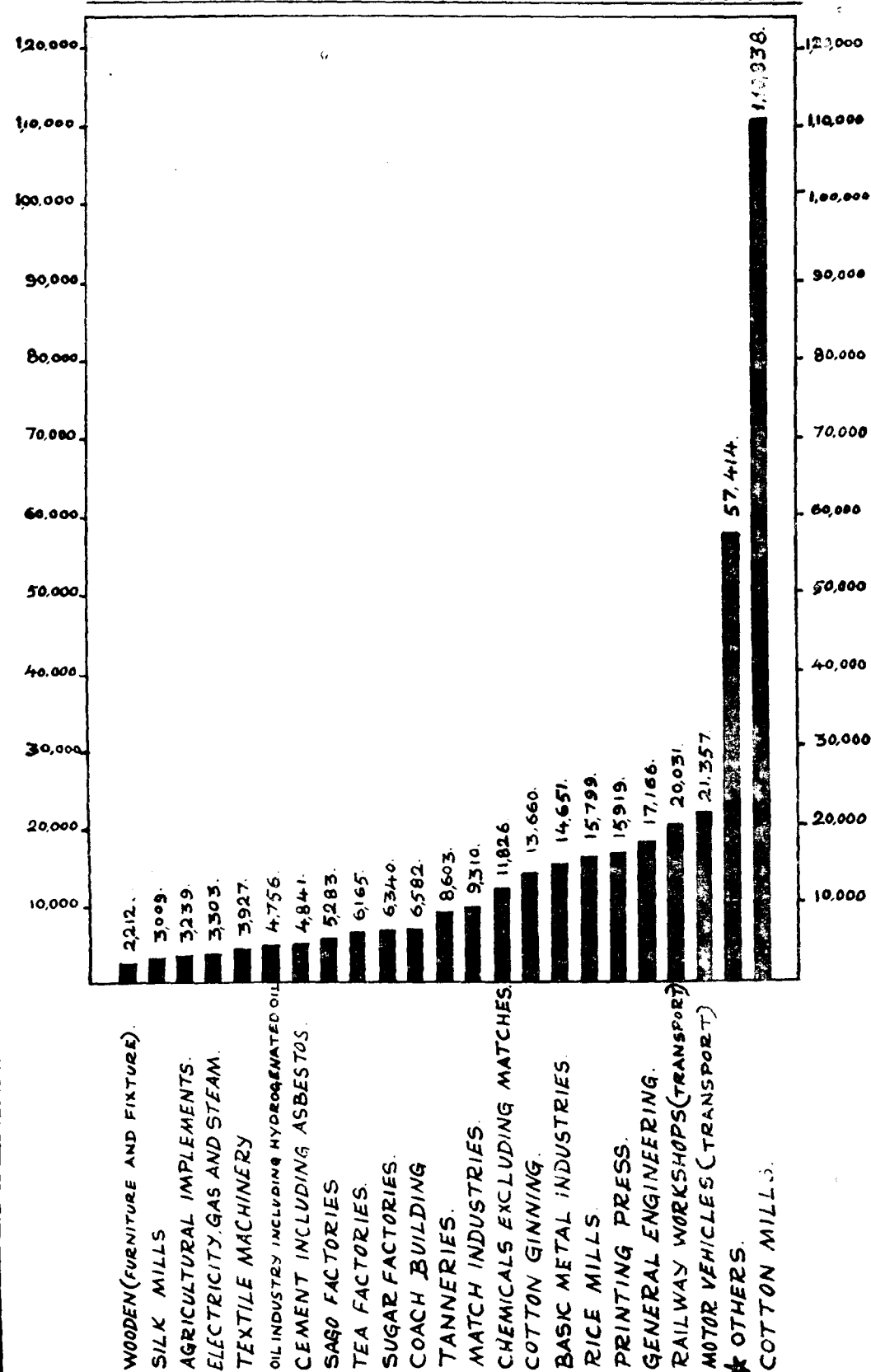

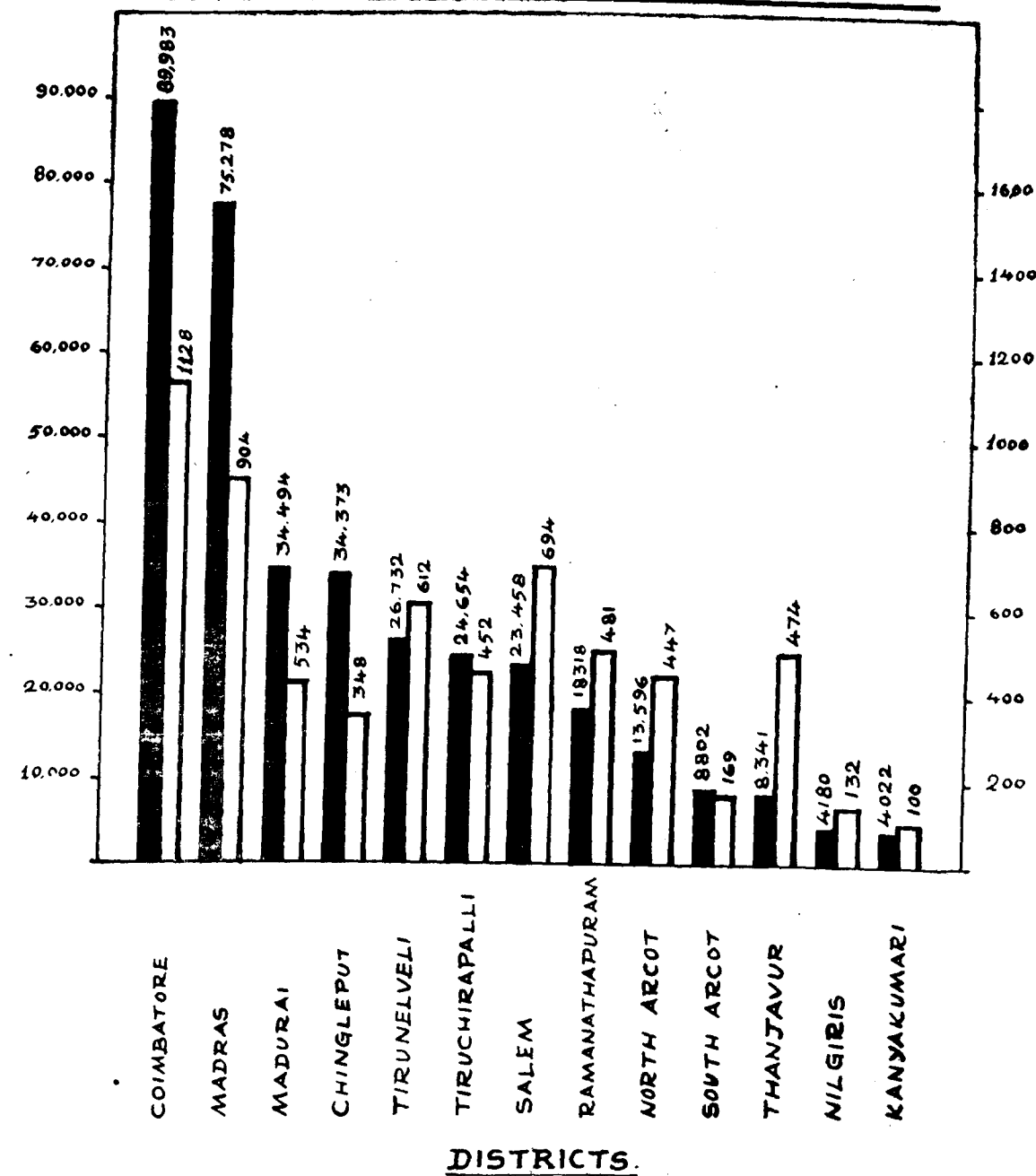
DISTRIBUTION OF WORKERS IN VARIOUS INDUSTRIES.

ANALYSIS.

(i) *Coimbatore*.—A highly industrialised district, Coimbatore has 1,128 factories with a labour population of 89,983 roughly 25 per cent of the factory labour population in the State. Cotton mills employ 56·4 per cent of the total number of workers in the district. Ginning factories 8·0 per cent; engineering industries 9·1 per cent; tea factories 3·2 per cent; knitting factories 1·9 per cent and other industries 21·4 per cent.

(ii) *Madras*.—Second in the order of labour population, Madras City has 904 factories employing 75,278 workers. Cotton mills employ 16·7 per cent in the district; printing Presses 12 per cent; transport industry 17·8 per cent; railway workshop 18·2 per cent; engineering workshops 15·3 per cent and other industries 20 per cent.

(iii) *Madurai*.—Third in the order of employment, Madurai has 534 factories employing a total labour force of 34,494 workers. Cotton mills employ 53·9 per cent of the labour force in the district. Rice mills employ 6·6 per cent; ginning factories 4·3 per cent; printing press 2·3 per cent; transport industry 9·6 per cent and other industries 23·3 per cent.

(iv) *Chingleput*.—Fourth in the order of the labour population, this district has 348 factories employing 34,373 workers. Transport industry employ 29·4 per cent; tanneries 5·9 per cent; engineering industry 20 per cent; match industry 3·8 per cent and other industries 40·9 per cent.

(v) *Tirunelveli*.—Twenty-six thousand seven hundred and thirty-two workers were employed in 612 factories in this district. Cotton mills employ 52·6 per cent of the workers in the district. Match industry employ 12·8 per cent; cotton ginning 5·5 per cent; rice mills 5 per cent and other industries 24·1 per cent.

(vi) *Tiruchirappalli*.—Twenty-four thousand six hundred and fifty-four workers were employed in 452 factories in this district. Railway workshop employ 37·9 per cent of the workers; cotton mills employ 19·7 per cent; rice mills 8·7 per cent; sugar industry 7·1 per cent and other industries 26·6 per cent.

(vii) *Salem*.—Twenty-three thousand four hundred and fifty-eight workers were employed in 694 factories of which cotton mills employ 21·6 per cent; sago industry 19·9 per cent; silk mills 9·2 per cent; rice and oil mills 8·1 per cent; chemical industry 6 per cent; mineral products industry 6·5 per cent and other industries 28·7 per cent.

(viii) *Ramanathapuram*.—Eighteen thousand three hundred and eighteen workers were employed in 481 factories in this district of which 23·5 per cent workers were employed in cotton mills; 19·3 per cent in match industry; 13·3 per cent in cotton ginning; 12·5 per cent in printing presses and 31·4 per cent in other industries.

(x) *North Arcot*.—Thirteen thousand five hundred and ninety-six workers employed in 447 factories in this district of which 33·1 per cent of workers were employed in tanneries; 18·2 per cent in transport industry; 16 per cent in railway workshops; 7·3 per cent in cotton mills; 4·8 per cent in rice mills and 20·3 per cent in other industries.

(xi) *South Arcot*.—Eight thousand eight hundred and two workers were employed in 169 factories in this district of which 26·8 per cent were employed in sugar mills; 30·3 per cent in engineering industries; 8·8 per cent in transport industries; 4·8 per cent in rice mills; 5·7 per cent in oil mills; and 23·6 per cent in other industries.

(xii) *Thanjavur*.—Eight thousand three hundred and forty-one workers were employed in 474 factories in this district of which 27·4 per cent were employed in rice mills; 14·1 per cent in transport industry; 5·3 per cent in printing presses; and 53·2 per cent in other industries.

(xiii) *The Nilgiris*.—Four thousand one hundred and eighty workers were employed in 132 factories in this district of which 75 per cent of workers were employed in tea factories; 3·2 per cent in engineering industries and 21·3 per cent in other industries.

(xiii) *Kanyakumari*.—Four thousand and twenty-two workers were employed in 100 factories in this district of which cotton mills employ 9.7 per cent; rice mills 7.6 per cent; transport industry 8.2 per cent; match industry 4.5 per cent and other industries 70 per cent.

Serial number (i) to (xi) in the above table have retained the same relative position as in the year 1963. However, during the year 1964, the Nilgiris district and Kanyakumari district have exchanged places.

10. *Registration and licencing of factories*.—During the year under report licences issued to the factories for the year 1963 were renewed and fresh licences were issued to factories newly brought under the purview of the Act. A sum of Rs. 12,05,457 was collected as licence fees under the Factories Act, 1948.

11. *Plans*.—Of the 1,773 plans received and scrutinised by the Chief Inspector of Factories, Madras, during the year, 1,299 plans were approved. The rest of the plans were returned to the managements of factories for rectification of defects pointed out to them. Attention was paid to the aspect of stability, ventilation, lighting, temperature conditions, etc. In addition, the specialist knowledge of the Superintending Inspector of Factories (Productivity) was utilised in scrutinising the plans from productivity angle with special reference to plant layout and material handling. It has been noticed from the scrutiny of plans that in the construction of new factories, managements are keeping abreast of contemporary developments in their design with a discriminating eye to better layout of machinery and the provision of a decent standard of welfare amenities and other facilities. In the case of old factories, attempts are being constantly made to improve the standards in all big factories. In the case of medium and small factories also, the attempt has been made to improve standards at least to the minimum required by the Act with suitable relaxation wherever necessary.

12. *Health of workers*.—Attention to the possible extent has been paid by the Inspectorate to safeguard the general health of the workers and to protect them against occupational hazards and industrial diseases. No cases of industrial diseases or occupational hazards were reported during the year. However in view of the ever increasing industrial processes and usage of new kinds of very many toxic chemicals coming into use with complex processes, etc., with consequent increases in the number of such peculiar problems, it is strongly felt that this work should be ably aided by a few specialists in the particular field. For this purpose, the formation of a medical factory Inspectorate wing and the appointment of few medical inspectors and also the establishment of an industrial hygiene unit and laboratory are considered essential.

13. *Sanitation*.—Generally a fair standard of sanitation and cleanliness has been maintained in the majority of the factories. Where necessary, inspectors have issued directions to occupiers to improve them.

14. *Dust nuisance*.—Adequate steps were taken to mitigate dust, fumes, mists, gases and vapours in factories wherever necessary. In work-rooms where there is an evolution of dust, fumes, vapours, mists or gases, besides improving general ventilation, suggestions have been given to provide local exhaust ventilation to collect the dust, fumes or vapours at source and dispose them suitably. In factories where contaminants are highly dangerous, fumes cup-boards have been suggested for separating the entire process and exhaust the fumes. Surveys have been conducted in factories to find out the adequacy and suitability of personal protective equipment supplied to workers working in areas where they are exposed to dust, fumes, mists, vapours and gases. Wherever such protective equipment are not supplied, instructions are issued for the supply on the basis of such surveys. In processes where the contaminants are highly dangerous, regulations of the working hours of the workers exposed to the fumes, dust, vapours, mists and gases have been introduced in such a way that no worker will be permitted to inhale the contaminants to an extent greater than safe level. It is felt that in such works, services of the Medical Inspectors of Factories would be highly beneficial.

The non-provision of instruments to record dust counts and a laboratory with the necessary staff and equipment to undertake sampling of dust, fumes and gases in the various processes and connected investigations is a great handicap which should be removed before long.

15. *Fencing and other safety measures*.—Fencing and guarding of machinery continued to receive active attention guarding of the Inspectorate with the tendering of advice and instructions to the managements of factories in the provision and upkeep of fences and guards. The necessity and type of guards to be provided have been explained to the managements in detail in order to secure compliance with the statutory provisions. The advice tendered continued to receive due attention and compliance from the managements with the result that the fencing of dangerous parts of machinery, etc., was fairly satisfactory. Safety posters and pamphlets issued by the Chief Adviser of Factories and by the department were distributed to all factories free of cost with a view to inculcate safety consciousness in the minds of workers engaged in factories and this seems to have the desired effect.

16. *Hours of work*.—A majority of the factories worked on the 48-hours week basis with a working day of 8-hours each. Compliance with the provisions of the Act and rules relating to hours of work was generally found to be satisfactory. Irregular employment beyond scheduled working hours or on weekly holidays, etc., was checked and curtailed by surprise visits.

17. *Inspections*.—Of the 6,870 factories on the registers at the end of the year 1964 factories numbering 1,218 were inspected once, 4,895 factories were inspected twice, 589 factories were inspected thrice and 53 factories were inspected more than three times (*vide* Statement XI). This leaves 109 factories as not inspected. These are mostly notified factories and a few 2m (i) factories not in commission. In addition to the regular inspections, the inspectors have made 690 Sunday, 251 surprise, 1,554 special and 551 night visits. In addition to the above 979 inspections were made of establishments not covered by Factories Act, i.e. (un-registered factories) which were likely to be brought under the Factories Act so as to ascertain whether there was proof of employment under section 2m (i) or 2m (ii) of the Act as the case may be. Officers of other departments have made 1,076 inspections of factories.

18. *Prosecutions*.—Prosecutions are launched by this department against managements of factories as a last resort and in respect of persistent defaulters only. This department functions more as a social service department, educating workers and management to adhere to the provision of the Factories Act and lessen accidents to reduce human suffering and loss of trained skilled workers. Seven hundred and fifty-four prosecutions were taken against 459 factories during the year. Details of convictions obtained during the year are furnished in Statement XII. These figures include some of the prosecutions of the previous year pending at the beginning of the year and disposed of during the year.

19. *Notices and registers.*—Nearly 92·7 per cent of the working factories submitted returns as against 82·2 per cent in the previous year. The prescribed registers and notices were fairly well maintained in almost all the factories.

20. *Leave with wages and compensatory holidays.*—Particulars relating to the grant of leave with wages under the Act are shown in Statement XIV. Exemptions were granted from Chapter VIII of the Factories Act, 1948, to factories whose leave rules were not less favourable than those provided under the Factories Act, 1948.

Rest interval.—Rest intervals as required by section 55 of the Factories Act, 1948, were given in all factories.

Weekly holidays.—Sundays or substituted weekly holidays were observed as weekly holidays in all the factories except those engaged in continuous processes and hence exemption from section 52. Compensatory holidays for the weekly holidays so lost were given in all such cases as required by section 53 of the Act.

21. *Complaints.*—The inspectors enquired into 795 complaints lodged by individual workers, trade unions, etc., and took suitable action wherever necessary. The details of the complaints are furnished in Appendix VIII.

22. *The Cost of Living Index Figures.*—The Consumer Price Index Numbers (Cost of Living Index Figures) for industrial workers in the City of Madras and in five other centres in the State, furnished by the Director of Statistics, Madras, are furnished in Appendix IX.

23. *Average daily earnings of workers.*—The average daily earnings of workers for the following industries are at present collected on district-wise basis:—

- (1) Cotton Textile Industry;
- (2) Printing Presses;
- (3) Cement Workshops;
- (4) Sugar Industry;
- (5) Foundries;
- (6) Engineering Works;
- (7) Groundnut Decorticating;
- (8) Cotton Ginning;
- (9) Rice Milling;
- (10) Oil Mills;
- (11) Tile Factories; and
- (12) Type Foundries.

The details regarding the average daily earnings of workers in those industries are furnished in Appendix IV.

24. *Multiple shifts.*—The details of industries engaged in multiple shifts are furnished in Appendix III.

25. *Miscellaneous.*—There was only one case of a fire accident in a factory during the year. The total loss incurred in this case was Rs. 10,000 covered by insurance and an amount of Rs. 9,000 was reported to have been realised from the insurance company.

PART II.

LABOUR WELFARE.

1. *Washing facilities.*—Necessary washing facilities as prescribed in the Act and rules were provided in most of the factories. The Inspectorate is constantly attempting to improve the standards.

2. *Lockers.*—Managements of factories coming under industries like engineering, chemicals, etc., have provided lockers for the use of the workers for keeping their clothes, not worn during working hours.

3. *Housing.*—Decent housing contributes in no small measure to the welfare of labour. Some managements have voluntarily provided good living quarters for their workers to a certain extent. Managements of factories have not taken advantage of the facilities under the Industrial Housing Scheme sponsored by the Government. It would appear that legislation for providing housing facilities is inevitable.

4. *Canteens.*—In every factory wherein 250 or more workers are employed, a canteen should be maintained by the occupier for the use of workers as per section 46 of the Act. Particulars of canteens provided in industries are furnished in Statement XIII.

5. *Rest shed and creches.*—Rest rooms and creches are provided in most of the factories which employ more than 150 workers and 50 women workers respectively (vide Statement XIII).

6. *Drinking water.*—Adequate supply of wholesome drinking water in the factories was ensured with particular attention paid to the cooling of water and its hygienic distribution. Water coolers have been installed in some of the big units.

7. *Education.*—Some of the big factories are maintaining night schools and elementary schools or making donations to schools catering to their workers' children. In some cases, subsidies are handed out towards fees or for the purchase of books for the workers' children (vide Appendix VII).

8. *Medical facilities.*—Apart from the medical facilities provided by the Employees' State Insurance Scheme, some of the factories including those in areas where the scheme has not been implemented, have provided medical facilities to their workers. Particulars in detail are furnished in Appendix V.

PART III.

Under the Factories Act, 1948, injuries resulting from industrial accidents and involving absence of the workers from work for at least 48 hours immediately after the injury are required to be reported to the Factory Inspectorate. The statistics discussed are collected from such reports.

The following table gives the number of factories, number of workers employed, number of fatal and non-fatal accidents, accident rate per 1,000 workers, and frequency rate per one lakh man-days worked:—

During the year 1964 under report, as can be seen from the above table, despite an increase in the number of factories and in the number of workers employed, the incidence of accidents has shown a downward trend.

The accident rate per 1,000 workers for the year 1964 is 46·4 as against 48·9 in the previous year. So also the frequency rate has registered a downward trend. This is a healthy trend evidencing the earnest efforts of the Inspectorate in bringing down the incidence of accidents and it is expected this downward trend will continue in the years to come.

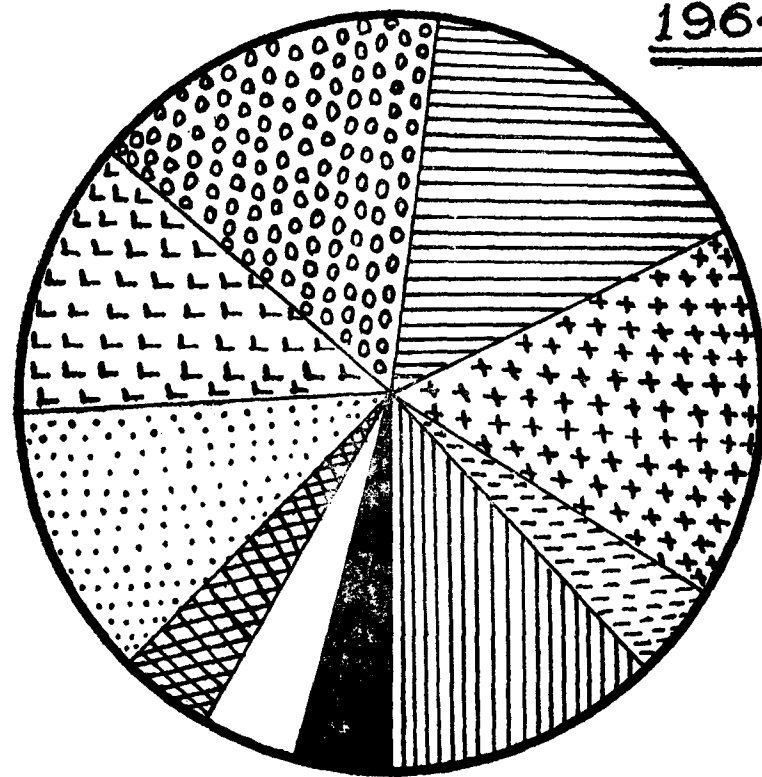

1964.

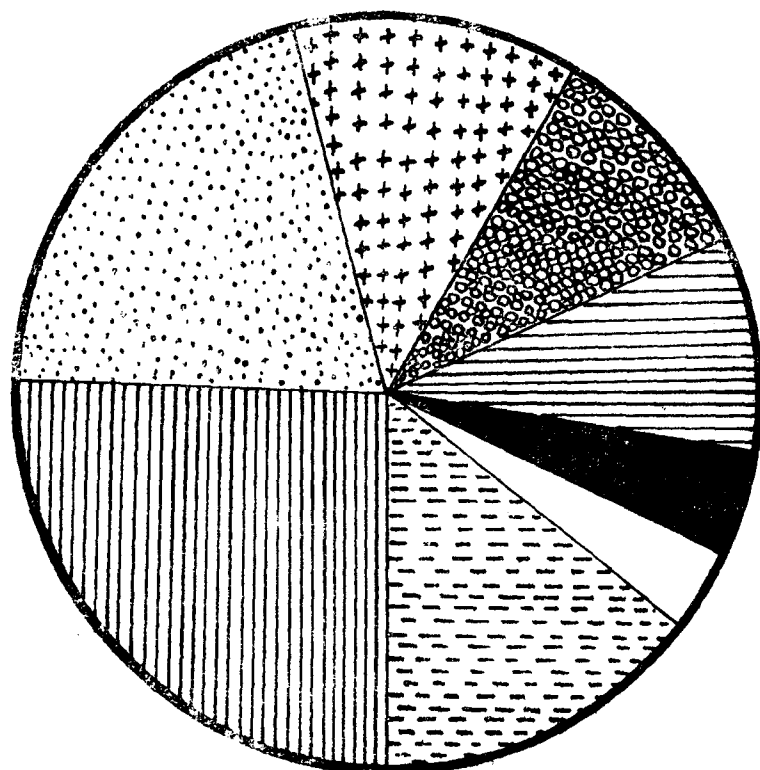

From the tables it can be seen that Cotton Mills contributed 17.39 per cent, Motor Vehicles (Transport) contributed 13.78 per cent, General Engineering 9.59 per cent, Metal Products 9.28 per cent, Chemicals including Matches contributed 8.52 per cent, Railway Workshops 6.17, and the rest by other industries not specified above.

Table IV below gives the analysis of the accidents in 8 major causation groups.

* The increase was due to such reasons as faulty instructions, lack of concentration, adoption of unsafe practices, negligence, etc. The Inspectorate has taken steps by investigation accidents that have become serious and preventive measures for the prevention of recurrence of similar accidents have been suggested to the managements of factories.

Details of the fatal accidents are furnished in Appendix VI to this report.

It can be seen from the details in Statement VI, that twenty per cent of the accidents are due to causes on machinery which include accidents like flying particles from revolving machinery, etc. The balance of 80 per cent of the accidents are non-machinery accidents which could be classified as those due to falling objects, striking against objects, dropping of materials, falls and slips, etc.

Some of the main causes for the industrial accidents are.—(1) Inadequate training, lack of job experience and proper induction programme for the industrial employees.

(2) The attitude of some of the managements that they are not responsible for unsafe habits and working of the worker.

(3) Improper house-keeping.

(4) Inadequacy of firms specialising in safety devices, appliances and suitable personal protective equipments.

(5) Inadequate maintenance (even if provided) of floors, stairs, fences, guards personal protective equipments, etc.

Activities of the department to minimise accidents.—The primary objectives of the department is to ensure complete safety for all workers in industry in this State and during the year the Inspectors have played an increasingly prominent part in assisting and advising factory managements on the several problems associated with industrial safety.

The Inspectorate has been devoting special attention to accident prevention work and inculcating safety consciousness in the minds of the workers, supervisors and managements by enlisting their co-operation by.—

(1) Conducting courses on industrial safety (so far 50 courses have been conducted.

(2) Forming safety committees in factories for the purpose of internal investigation of accidents and adoption of preventive measures and creating safety consciousness among workers; the Committees meet regularly and work satisfactorily.

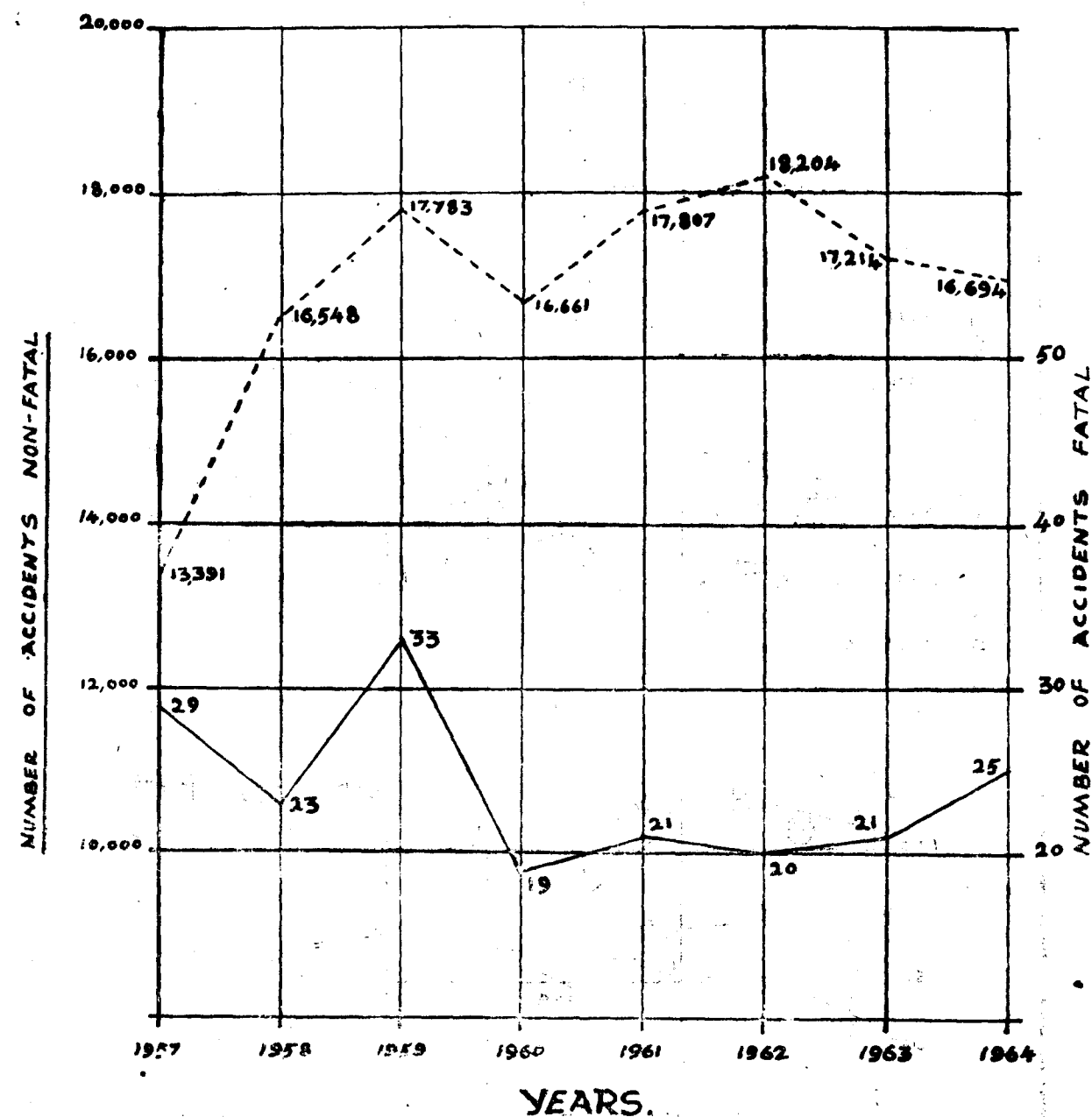
(3) Exhibiting films on safety to workers.

(4) Issuing booklets in Tamil on "Rules for prevention of accidents in Industries" and "Keep it clean" for distribution amongst workers.

(5) Safety survey of factories which have large number of accidents and suggesting remedial measures after analysing the courses.

(6) Inculcating safety consciousness even while under training amongst craftsmen by giving talks to the senior boys in Industrial Training Institutes on accident prevention and safe methods of working.

FATAL AND NON-FATAL ACCIDENTS.

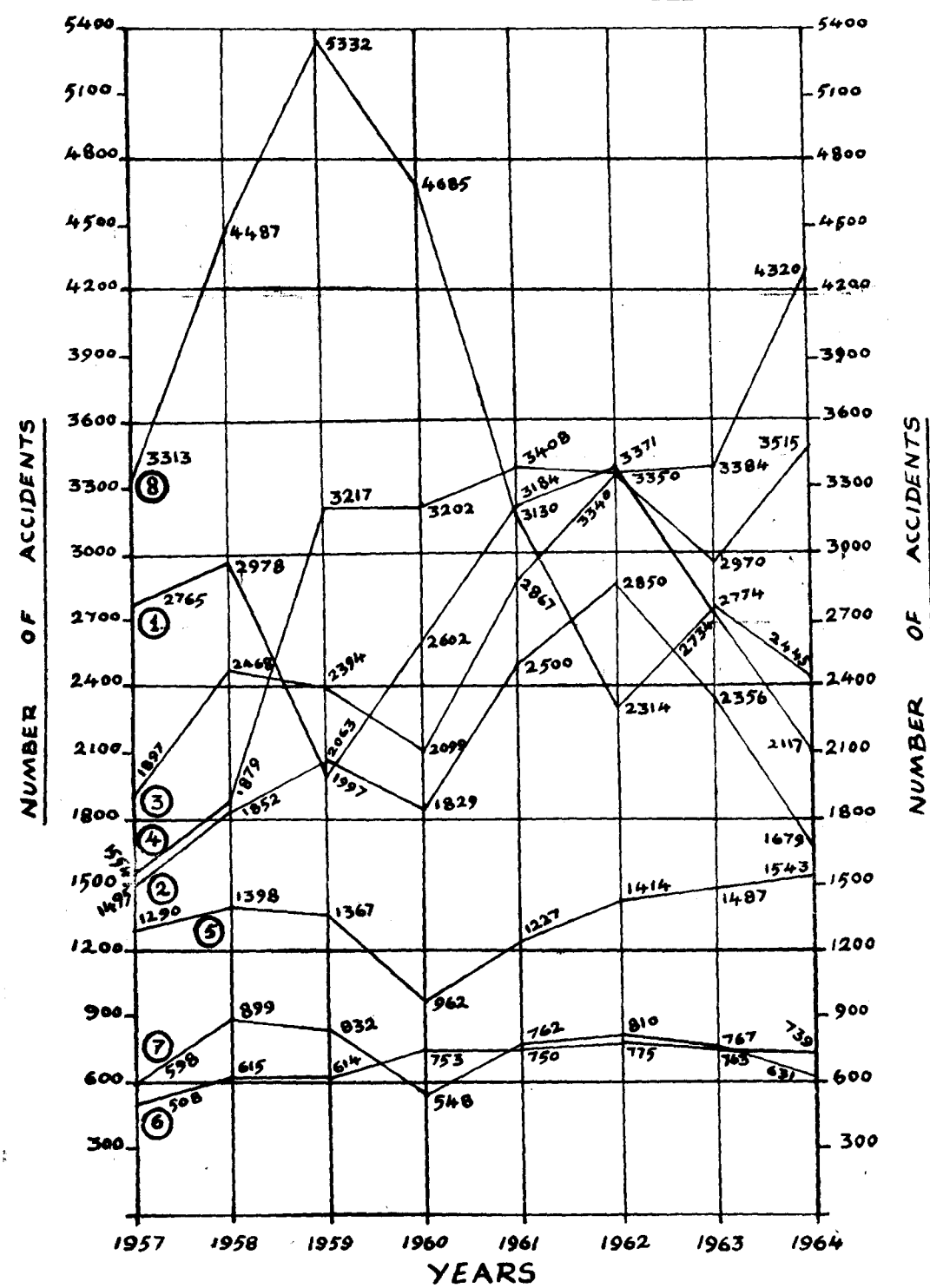

7. creating consciousness amongst people of all ranks, talks are given by the officers of this Department on the provisions of the Act and Rules to avert accidents and for safeguarding the workers from the peculiar industrial health hazards.

Under the State Safety Schemes the Government have also sanctioned as an initial measure awards with rolling shields to factories under various categories of industries which have the largest percentage reduction in the frequency rates of accidents in the award year. Government have also sanctioned cash awards to workers who give useful suggestions regarding safety in factories, safety slogans and safety posters. Managements are getting interested in the Scheme and steps are being taken by them for reduction of accidents. It is also proposed to enlarge the scheme so that coverage of a large number of factories under all categories like small, medium and large could be obtained. Additional Schemes for Awards for lowest frequency and longest accident free period are also under the consideration of Government.

It is gratifying to note that quite a good number of factories are aware of the importance of the accident prevention and safety programme and they continue to evince keen interest and are constantly taking steps to reduce and minimise industrial accidents. It is proposed to encourage such industrial institutions and factories by allowing them to fly a pennant (or flag, with Green Cross) to be presented to them whenever the unit continues to work without a lost time accident. It is also planned to require large factories to put up a Safety Board at the main entrance giving details about their Safety Record as is being done in highly industrialised countries.

PART IV.

OTHER ACTS.

(a) *Madras Maternity Benefit Act.*—The provisions of the Act are applicable to women employed in factories, provided they have entered the service under the employer from whom they claim maternity benefit, not later than 35 weeks immediately before the week in which confinement takes place. Of the 3,013 factories which employ women and were covered by the Madras Maternity Benefit Act, 2,789 factories submitted returns. Average daily number of women employed was 49,521 in the factories submitting returns. One thousand and twenty-two claims were made of which 674 claims were accepted and either fully or partially paid by the employers of women workers. A total sum of Rs. 63,336.85 was paid as maternity benefit during the year. Details of the claims are furnished in Appendix X (Statement I). Inspections were made by the full time inspectors and Inspectress of Factories and the claims made and the benefits paid were checked up by them. Prosecutions against 16 managers of factories were launched in the year, of which 14 cases involving 14 managers of factories, were disposed of during the year under report and a sum of Rs. 270 was realised as fine. The cases involving two factories were pending at the end of the year.

(b) *Employment of Children Act.*—Most of the establishments are covered by the Factories Act, 1948. Action was taken under this Act.

(c) *Cotton Ginning and Pressing Factories Act.*—The provisions of section 9 of the Act were generally complied with.

PART V.

Productivity.—In the Factories Section, Sri C. T. Sreenivasan was holding the post of Superintending Inspector of Factories (Productivity) from 1st January to 23rd April 1964 and as Deputy Chief Inspector of Factories from 24th April 1964 held additional charge of the post of Superintending Inspector of Factories (Productivity) from 24th April to 4th October 1964. During this period he also underwent an intensive course of training in 'Industrial Engineering' and undertook a "Study" in project work in the Government Press, Madras.

Sri P. Sotiasundaram took charge of the post of Superintending Inspector of Factories (Productivity) from 9th October 1964 forenoon.

Regular contracts with the important organisations in the Public and Private sectors and the Local Productivity Councils in the State were maintained through the Officers of this Department and they also helped the Managements in the application of various productivity techniques to their plants.

The officers of this department attended to the formation and functioning of Emergency Production Committees at enterprise level and also assisted the Chief Inspector of Factories in the scrutiny of plants of factory buildings with special reference to layout of machinery and plants, material handling, etc.

(a) *Staff*.—Particulars relating to the Staff of the Inspectorate under the Factories Act, 1948, in the State of Madras as on 31st December 1963 are furnished in Appendix XIV of this report.

(b) *Classification of factories*.—As indicated in the report for 1962, for the purposes of buildings standards factories are classified as small, medium and big on the following basis:—

Small factories.—Those units employing upto 20 persons using power operated machinery or up to 50 persons without power operated machinery.

Medium factories.—Those units employing upto 50 persons using power operated machinery or upto 100 persons without power operated machinery.

Big factories.—All those units employing 50 or more using power operated machinery or 100 or more persons without power operated machinery.

The number of factories in each classification as detailed above is furnished in Appendix XIII.

General.—The Chief Inspector of Factories, heard and disposed of 22 appeals, and 202 factories were also check-inspected by him. The Commissioner of Labour inspected Offices of two Superintending Inspectors of Factories during the year. The rest of the Offices of the Superintending Inspectors of Factories and Inspectors of Factories were inspected by the Chief Inspector of Factories, Madras. The Officers of this Department attended to the work relating to the formation and functioning of Emergency Production Committees at the enterprise level in selected establishments on a Master list for the purpose. The Factory Inspectorate at the District-level assisted the Department of Co-operation in connection with formation of Consumers' Co-operative Societies and the opening of Fair Price Shops in the factories for the benefit of workers.

The Inspectorate has been reorganised from 1st February 1964 to tune up the efficiency of this Department. Hence the Government were approached to upgrade all the 25 posts of Assistant Inspectors of Factories to that of Gazetted rank as Inspectors of Factories. The Government were pleased to upgrade only 20 of the posts of Assistant Inspectors of Factories into that of Inspectors of Factories due to National Emergency.

With the existing 23 posts of Inspectors of Factories and six Senior Grade-I Inspectors, the entire State was divided into six divisions and each division was placed in charge of a Superintending Inspector of Factories (Formerly Grade-I Inspector). This nomenclature was given as in England. The Superintending Inspectors of Factories were all allotted for regular inspection, etc., all factories employing more than 100 workers and those in the public sector and under the Local Board Authorities. Except in the case of Coimbatore Division wherein the Superintending Inspector of Factories has been allotted only those factories which employs more than 250 persons, as the Coimbatore Division is the highly industrialised town consisting of large number of Engineering and Textile Industries, the remaining factories were allotted to the Inspectors of Factories and their jurisdiction were fixed taking into consideration the number of factories and the incidence of accidents and the consequential work-load and to enquire into all serious accidents. The various Superintending Inspectors of Factories exercise control over the Inspectors of Factories as indicated below:—

Of the five posts of Assistant Inspectors of Factories, one Assistant Inspector of Factories is attached to each one of the Divisional Offices except that at Madras to attend to office work in connection with the plans, investigation of accidents by the Superintending Inspectors of Factories and to inspect some non-power and smaller power factories spread all over the division to relieve those Inspectors of Factories whose work load is heavy.

The original idea of placing about 150 factories per Inspector of Factories as per International Labour Organization Standards could not be translated into action as the number of factories (i.e., 6870) had to be distributed amongst the Inspectors of Factories actually sanctioned. The notified factories in all divisions except Coimbatore Division were directly inspected by the Assistant Inspectors of Factories whereas in Coimbatore, registered factories also had to be given to the Assistant Inspector of Factories due to paucity of Inspectors of Factories. The number of inspections done in 1964 indicate an increased care of factories compared to previous years. The inspections have been exhaustive leading to better observance of the provisions of the Factories Act. The serious accidents, i.e., the accidents, which resulted in an absence of more than 21 days, in all factories have been thoroughly investigated by the Inspectors of Factories and remedial measures suggested by them. The Superintending Inspectors of Factories with their longer experience have guided the Inspectors of Factories in this field of investigation and the accident prevention techniques have brought an appreciable decrease in the number of accidents in 1964 as compared to 1963.

- 1 Gordon Woodroffe and Company, Madras-1 .. Services of a registered medical practitioner are retained in the factory. Also provided free consultation and such prescriptions of the doctor are paid by the management.
- 2 Richardson and Crudass, Limited, Madras-13 .. Employees are covered by Employees' State Insurance Scheme. Addition to that a qualified medical practitioner is made available every morning free cost.
- 3 Addisons Paints and Chemicals, Limited, Madras-11. There is a medical centre at No. 1, Cooum River Road, Chintadripet, Madras-11 for the benefit of the employees of the group companies. In the case of accidents, sicknesses the employees in the first instance are rendered medical aid in the First-Aid centre, situated in the factory estate and employees who are covered by the Employees' State Insurance Scheme are directed to take their treatment in their respective dispensaries. The medical centre is giving free medical treatment to families of several employees. The medical benefit is also extended to workers' wives and children below 18 years. The medical centre performs annual medical health check up of all the employees and also periodical health examination of infants. Two hours permission is allowed freely to the employees who are governed by Employees' State Insurance Scheme to take treatment in Employees' State Insurance dispensaries (not exceeding 30 hours in a year).
- 4 The Buckingham and Carnatic Mills, Madras-12 .. Dispensary.—The company runs a dispensary which is recognised also as a dispensary under the Employees' State Insurance Scheme. It has on its staff five medical officers, six compounders, seven dressers and other hands. All employees of the mills receive here free treatment for minor ailments not requiring abstention from work even if they are not registered at this dispensary under the Employees' State Insurance Scheme. All accident cases are attended to at this dispensary which is open for all the 24 hours of the day. An ambulance car has been provided to take to hospital patients requiring such conveyance.

The average daily attendance during the year 1964 was 250, the same as in 1963. The man-days lost due to sickness was 215,447 as against 208,639 in the previous year.

Clinics.—A part from the main dispensary, the company runs two clinics one at the Buckingham Mill Village and the other at the Carnatic mill Village, where wives, children, unmarried sisters and widowed mothers of mills workers are given free treatment. These clinics are in the charge of a lady medical officer who is assisted by two health visitors, a staff nurse and 12 nurse-cum-midwives, five of whom attend solely to maternity cases.

Ante-natal and post-natal clinics.—Ante-natal clinics are held separately in the said two villages on specified days so that the medical officer may give individual attention to women who need care and advice. The total number of ante-natal cases registered during the year was 699 as against 679 in the previous year.

All normal cases of delivery of workers' wives are attended to at their houses by the midwives of the Welfare Centre. These two who required hospitalisation are sent to the hospital in the mill ambulance car. The total number of cases delivered at home with the assistance of midwives is 171 and 68 cases were sent to hospital for confinement as against 167 and 85 in the year 1963. All cases delivered at home and in the hospital are followed up for some days as required by the State of health of the mother and child.

Mobile Dispensary.—The Company has a mobile Dispensary. The mobile van with its special personnel and medical equipment goes to village centres within a radius of four miles from the mills. Worker's families including wives, mothers, daughters, and sons below ten years of age receive treatment free of cost from the dispensary.

- 5 Sri Rama Vilas Service Limited, Madras-2 .. The Company runs a Medical and Welfare Centre for the benefit of all workers.
- 6 Simpson and Company, Limited, Madras-2 .. A medical centre near the factory, where there is provision for eight beds for inpatients is provided. Qualified medical officers are rendering treatment to workers and their families for all illness, and major injuries.
- 7 Vasantha Press, Madras-20 .. Members of the workers' family were given medical treatment in the dispensary conducted by the Theosophical Society.
- 8 Oldham and Son (India), Limited, Madras-32 .. Company doctor is giving medical treatment twice in a week. Smears of lead workers are sent to U.K. for examination. One cup of pure whole some milk and vitamin tablets are also supplied to the workers.
- 9 Raptokas Brett and Company, Private, Limited, Madras-32. First-Aid Medical rooms are provided in the factory. Medical aid (Monetary) is given to the low paid employees and their children in deserving cases.
- 10 Jammi Pharmaceutical Factory, 29, Arcot Road, Saligramam, Vadapalani, Madras. Medical aid allowance equivalent to one half of one month's basic wages is allowed per year to all classes of employees.
- 11 The Dunlop Rubber Company (India), Limited, Ambattur, Madras-53. A dispensary with a part-time doctor and three full time compounders is provided for the treatment of the employees in the case of accidents and sudden sickness when they are unable to go to their Employees' State Insurance dispensaries.
- 12 Southern Roadways (Private) Limited, Salem .. A sum of Rs. 9,508.07 has been spent towards medical aid to employees.
- 13 Associated Drug Company (Private), Limited, Yercaud. A sum of Rs. 5,723.42 has been spent towards medical facilities.
- 14 Mettur Hydro-Electric Power Station, Mettur .. Reimbursement towards expenditure incurred to meet the cost of drugs purchased by the workers are being made.
- 15 The India Cements, Limited, Sankari .. A dispensary is provided in the factory in charge of a qualified doctor. This is open throughout day and night. For every shift a nursing orderly renders first-aid.
- 16 T. V. Sundaram Iyengar and Sons (Private), Limited Tiruchirappalli. The T.V. S. hospital with two qualified doctors for providing first aid and emergency aid has been established. This hospital provided Employees' State Insurance basic medical aid to non-Employees State Insurance personnel. T. V. S. hospital has been shifted to a more spacious building at No. 9, Reynolds Roads, Cantonment, Tiruchirappalli and provision for inpatient treatment has been made. An operation theatre and a female ward have been added on.
- 17 Dalmia Cement (Private), Limited, Dalmiapuram .. Free medical treatment including supply of specialist medicines is given to workers and their families. The hospital building costing about a lakh of rupees contains an out-door dispensary, one ward for in-patients and one for maternity cases. The hospital staff consists of two male doctors, one lady doctor (A 11 M.B.B.S.) one nurse, two midwives, three compounders, one laboratory technician, two clerks, two ward boys and one ayah.
- 18 Kothari Sugars and Chemicals, Limited, Kattur .. A well-equipped dispensary has been provided in the factory colony managed by a full time qualified medical officer and assisted by a qualified compounder. The employees and their families enjoy free medical advice and treatment.

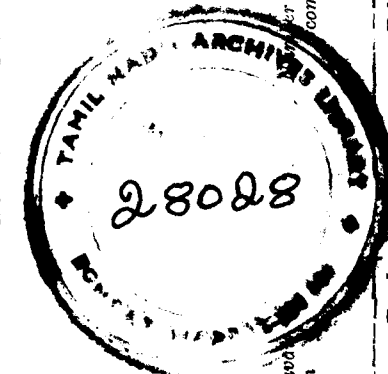

**SALIENT FEATURES OF THE REPORT ON THE WORKING OF THE
FACTORIES ACT, 1948 AND MADRAS MATERNITY BENEFIT ACT, 1934 FOR
THE YEAR 1964.**

Factories and their inspections.—There were 6,572 factories covered by the Factories Act, 1948, at the beginning of the year 1964. The number of such factories at the end of the year 1964, was 6,870 of which 6,475 were in commission, the number in 1963 being 6,365. The average daily number of workers employed in these factories at the end of the year was 366,231 as against 352,563 workers at the end of 1963. In the public sector, there were 249 factories employing at the end of the year 53,327 workers as against 242 factories employing 54,175 workers in the previous year.

Out of 6,870 factories, which were on the registers during the year 1964, 1,218 factories were inspected once, 4,895 inspected twice, 589 factories were inspected thrice and 53 factories were inspected more than three times.

The Inspectors also made 3,046 Sunday inspections, surprise inspections and special inspections and also night visits to factories to check employment of workers outside the specified hours of work and on their weekly holidays. They also inspected 979 unregistered factories.

Reorganised set up of the inspectorate of factories.—With the existing 23 posts of Inspectors of Factories and six Senior Grade-I Inspectors, the entire State was divided into six divisions and each division was placed in charge of a Superintending Inspector of Factories (formerly Grade-I Inspector). This nomenclature was given as in England. The Superintending Inspectors of Factories were all allotted for regular inspection, etc., all factories employing more than 100 workers and those in the public sector and under the Local Board Authorities. Except in the case of Coimbatore Division where in the Superintending Inspector of Factories has been allotted only those factories which employ more than 250 persons, as the Coimbatore Division is the highly industrialised town consisting of large number of engineering and textile industries, the remaining factories were allotted to the Inspectors of Factories and their jurisdiction were fixed taking into consideration the number of factories and the incidence of accidents and the consequent work load to enquire into all serious accidents.

Of the five posts of Assistant Inspectors of Factories, one Assistant Inspector of Factories, is attached to each one of the Divisional Offices except that at Madras to attend the office work in connection with the plans, investigation of accidents by the Superintending Inspectors of Factories and to inspect some non-power and smaller power factories spread all over the division to relieve those Inspectors of Factories whose work load is heavy.

The notified factories in all divisions except Coimbatore Division were directly inspected by the Assistant Inspectors of Factories whereas in Coimbatore registered factories also had to be given to the Assistant Inspector of Factories due to paucity of Inspectors of Factories. The number of inspections done in 1964 indicate an increased care of factories compared to previous years. The inspections have been exhaustive leading to better observance of the provisions of the Factories Act. The serious accidents (i.e.), the accidents which results in an absence of more than 21 days, in all factories have been thoroughly investigated by the Inspectors of Factories and remedial measures suggested by them. The Superintending Inspectors of Factories with their longer experience have guided the Inspectors of Factories in this field of investigation and the accident prevention techniques have brought an appreciable decrease in the number of accidents in 1964 as compared to 1963.

Industrial position.—The rice mills continued to be the largest in number in any single category in the State, but they only employed 15,799 workers, while 534 cotton mills, including cotton ginning factories, employed 124,498 workers. The largest number of factories are concentrated in Coimbatore, Madras, Salem, Tirunelveli and Madurai districts. The factories in Coimbatore employ the largest number of workers and the districts of Madras, Madurai and Chingleput come next in the order given.

Coimbatore is a highly industrialised district, cotton mills, including ginning factories and engineering works, predominate in that district. Railway workshops, transport industry, cotton mills, printing presses, figure predominantly in the industrial set up in the Madras City, cotton mills, transport industry and rice mills in Madurai district and transport industry, engineering industry and tanneries in Chingleput district.

Plans.—One thousand and seven hundred and seventy-three plans were scrutinised during 1964 as against 2,010 during 1963 and 1,299 plans were approved, with reference to stability, ventilation, light, etc., as against 1,477 approved during 1963.

Health.—As in the previous years, special attention, to the possible extent, was paid by Inspectors of Factories to safeguard the general health of the workers and to protect them against industrial diseases.

Average daily earnings.—The details regarding average daily earnings of workers in certain industries collected on district-wise basis are added to the Annual Report as a separate appendix (Appendix IV).

Fencing and other safety measures.—Fencing and guarding of machinery continued to receive the active attention of the Inspectorate with the tendering of advice and instructions to the managements of factories in the provisions and upkeep of fences and guards. The advice tendered also continued to receive due attention and compliance from the managements with the result that the fencing of dangerous parts of machinery, etc., was fairly satisfactory.

Steps to minimise the rate of accidents.—The Inspectors played increasingly prominent part in assisting and advising factory managements on the several problems associated with industrial safety. To assist industry, supervisory personnel were trained in industrial safety and accident prevention work. The Department conducted 50 courses on industrial safety for workers, supervisors and managements. A booklet in Tamil entitled "Rules for Prevention of Accidents" containing safe practices in general, was prepared, printed and supplied to all factories in this State during the year under report.

Several talks on safety, with audio-visual aids, were given by the Officers of the Department under the provisions of the Act and Rules, to avert accidents and for safeguarding the workers from the peculiar industrial health hazards.

Under the State Safety Schemes, as an initial measure awards with rolling shields to factories were sanctioned under various categories of industries which have the largest percentage reduction in the frequency rates of accidents in the award year. Government have also sanctioned cash awards to workers who give useful suggestions regarding safety in factories, safety slogans and safety posters. Managements are getting interested in the scheme and steps are being taken by them for reduction of accidents. Additional schemes for Awards for lowest frequency and longest accident free period have also been sanctioned.

Accidents.—In 1964, the total number of accidents in all factories were 16,989 as against 17,235 in 1963. Of these accidents, 25 proved fatal as against 21 in 1963. The accident rate for 1,000 workers has come down.

Madras Maternity Benefit Act, 1934.—The number of factories, which employed women during 1964, was 3,013, and the average daily number of women employed during this year was 49,521 (as against 2,401 and 45,937 respectively during the previous year). One thousand and twenty-two claims were made for the grant of maternity benefits during the year as against 777 in 1963. Six hundred and seventy-four claims were accepted, and the total number of maternity benefit paid by the employers of women was Rs. 63,336.85. Prosecutions against 16 managers of factories were launched in the year, of which 14 cases involving 14 managers of factories were disposed of and a sum of Rs. 270 was realised as fine.
