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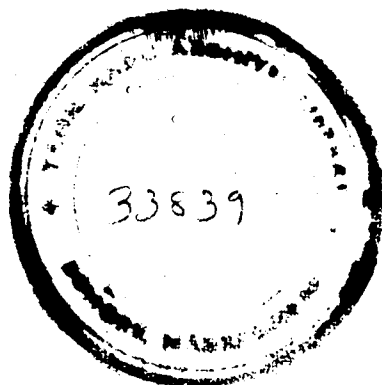

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ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1973-74

INTRODUCTION

What is started as a small venture in the later half of forties with hardly 1800 spinners and 500 weavers, has grown many fold during these 26 years. Taking into consideration the progress registered by the Khadi and Village Industries the Government of Tamilnadu thought it fit to create a separate organisation exclusively for planning, organising and implementing the various Khadi and Village Industries Schemes during the year 1960. Thus in 1961 Tamilnadu Khadi and Village Industries Board came into existence. Hence during the year under report, the Board has completed its thirteenth year.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BOARD

As per the Tamilnadu Khadi and Village Industries Board Act of 1959 (Tamilnadu Act 18 of 1959) the Board consists of a President, Vice-President and 16 members. The President of the Board is the Minister incharge of the Khadi and Village Industries Programme in Tamilnadu. The Vice-President of the Board is elected by the non-official members of the Board from among themselves. The Board is to be constituted once in 3 years. But the last Board which was constituted in April 1969, was allowed to continue till October 1973. A new Board was constituted only during October 1973 for a period of 3 years.

During the year under report Hon'ble Thiru Mannai P. Narayanaswami (Minister for Food) was the President. Consequent on the changes of portfolio among the Ministers, Hon'ble Thiru M. Kannappan, Minister for Hindu Religious Charitable and Endowments was also in charge of Khadi and Village Industries became President of the Board since 13-7-73. The present Board consists of following :

The Standing Finance Committee which is the statutory committee of the Board met 13 times during the year.

KHADI

The Khadi Industry continued to play its important role in the Tamilnadu Khadi and Village Industries Board.

The details of artisans and wages paid are appended in Annexure-I.

During the year under report 20 Main Centres with 104 production Sub-Centres continued to function. The details of Khadi Production Centres and Silk Production Centres are furnished in Annexure-II.

During the year under report 39.6 Lakhs Kisan yarn hanks 23.4 lakhs Ambar Hanks 88.4 lakhs of N.M.C. yarn hanks i.e. a total of 1.51 lakhs hanks of yarn was produced.

Under Khadi Production 21.8 lakhs mts. of Cotton cloth valued at Rs. 1.03 lakhs and 1.92 lakhs mts. of Silk valued at Rs. 85 lakhs were produced.

SALE

173 Khadi Krafts functioned throughout the State including the Khadi Kraft at Kuralagam in Madras. The total sales of Khadi during the year under report was of the order of Rs. 243 lakhs. The variety-wise sales particulars during the year 1973-74 are as follows:

PROCESSING, DYEING, BLEACHING & PRINTING UNITS:

The Dyeing, Bleaching and Printing Units at Tirupur and Erode continued to function during the year under report. In these units yarn, Khadi cloth etc., are being dyed, bleached and Printed. Mercerisation of Khadi was also undertaken to satisfy the developing demand. The turn over of the Dyeing, Bleaching and Printing Units for the year 1973-74 are detailed below:

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Besides dyeing and Bleaching of Khadi Silk are being undertaken in Khadi Silk Production on Centre at Kumbakonam and Kancheepuram.

TAILORING UNITS:

Tailoring Units are functioning at Madras, Cuddalore, Thanjavur and Tirupur. Ready mades to the value of Rs. 7.1 lakhs were produced during the year.

QUILT MANUFACTURING UNITS

To meet the demand of Khadi mattresses and Pillows the Tamil Nadu Khadi and Village Industries Board has quilt manufacturing units at Bodinayakanur, Tirupur and Madras. These units have produced 4988 mattresses and 7479 Pillows during the year under report. Their total value was Rs. 7.95 lakhs.

RURAL FABRIC CENTRE

With a view to make Khadi Industry self supporting by introduction of technological improvement and use of power, the Tamil Nadu Khadi and Village Industries Board embarked on some research and development work for some time.

Thanks to these Rural and Development Work it has evolved Rural Fabric Centres. The Board has sanctioned starting of 5 R.F.Cs as pilot projects in a different districts to study its working under different conditions. Thus such pilot Centres are at present functioning in Perumanallur and Sulur, in Coimbatore District. The remaining three Centres are to be started shortly. Each centre will provide employment for 68 persons, and a worker in these centres will get on an average a wage between Rs. 3.50 to Rs. 4/-per day.

These Rural Fabric Centres were started as State Board ventures since Government of India have yet to approve it as one of the Village Industries. If the scheme is recognised as a Village Industry the Board wants to explore possibility of starting at least one centre to cover all the Community Development blocks or Panchayat Unions so as to offer job opportunities to the Rural masses, to improve their standard of living.

VILLAGE INDUSTRIES

To solve the unemployment and under employment in both urban and rural area the programme of Khadi and Village Industries are being implemented within the resources available. Attempts have been made all these years by the State Board, to provide gainful employment to a sizeable not of rural artisans.

At present there are 259 Departmental units and 2430 Industrial Co-operatives. The total value of Village Industries goods produced is Rs.,1,032.61 lakhs. The total sales effected is Rs. 1,125.86 lakhs. Employment (both part time and full time) was provided to 2.61 lakhs persons, and Rs. 196.98 lakhs were distributed as wages.

PALMGUR INDUSTRY

Palmgur is the biggest nature based Village Industry employing 2.11 lakhs persons, all through 1554 Industrial co-operatives, accounting for an annual production of over Rs. 500/- lakhs. The export trade of Rs. 25.68 lakhs worth of Palm Fibre was done through the Co-operatives. A sum of Rs. 194.26 lakhs was distributed as wages.

Apart from production of jaggery and other edible and non edible products, palm sugar production is encouraged in Tamilnadu. Refined sugar is being produced at Kumarappapuram and at Kadapakkam.

Palm Industry enjoys the distinction of being an export industry thanks to its vast exports of palmyrah fibre. Hitherto palm fibre after processing has been exported and considerable foreign exchange earned. It is no doubt true that if finished products such as household brushes, brushes used in factories are also being encouraged. Exploration in these directions are being attempted.

Besides the production and export activities, following are the special items by which the tappers are being assisted under Palmgur Industry.

1. Tappers rehabilitation scheme :

Consequent on the closure of toddy shops with effect from 1-9-73 thousands of *ex-toddy tappers* were rendered jobless and in order to extend ameliorative measures, financial assistance at the rate of Rs. 200/- (Rs. 25 as grant and Rs. 175/- as loan) per tapper is being provided.

A total allotment of Rs. 30.45 lakhs has been received from the Khadi Commission and the Government of Tamilnadu has given Rs. 10.15 lakhs. Out of this 75% is loan and 25% is grant.

(2) Another benefit made available to the tapper or to their families is the Accident Benefit Scheme under which any tapper, if met with accident or lost his life while tapping neera, will be given Rs. 1,000/-, 500/- or 100/- as compensation with reference to death, major and minor accidents. So far 347 tappers and their families were given compensation from the year 1969 onwards to the tune of Rs. 2,38,100 under Accident Benefit Scheme as on 15-11-74.

VILLAGE OIL INDUSTRY

This is one among the several major Village Industries taken up by the Board for revival and enable people to have good un adulterated edible oil at a time when it is hardly possible to get unadulterated food stuff. The Board supplies this good oil, through a net-work of its own Khadi Krafts spread over the entire state. Further the Oil is available at the Co-operative Societies where it is made.

The Board provides financial assistance technical know how and improved tools to the traditional oil mongers.

During the year under report the Khadi and Village Industries Commission sanctioned 138 power driven oil ghanies and 10 were erected within the close of the year. All the ten have started functioning after the power cut was lifted. During the year 1973-74 Rs. 375/- as grant and Rs. 7,82,000 as loan were provided to these societies.

Physical achievements of this industry is given below.

GUR AND KHANDASARI

As on 31-3-74 there are 6 departmental demonstration units. Some societies have also been formed under the Board.

The particulars of production and sales under this Industry are furnished below.

This Industry offers opportunities for part time employment which could not only supplement the income but also increase the production of crops by polination activity of the bees.

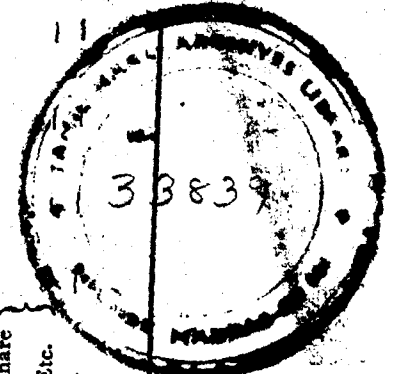
VILLAGE POTTERY INDUSTRY

LEATHER INDUSTRY

The artisans employed in this industry are the poorest of the poor and Khadi and Village Industries Board aims at improving their lot by giving them suitable employment in leather Industry. To help this unfortunate lot, the Board itself has taken up the responsibility of marketing the tanned hides and skins by opening small Leather marketing Depots. In addition to this the Board has undertaken manufacture of—Leather goods like Shoes and other fancy leather articles by running Foot Wear Units and Leather show room under a Special Scheme, the Board has opened two 'B' type Leather goods and Foot Wear Show Rooms; one at Madras and the other at Tiruchy, exclusively for exhibiting and marketing Leather goods and foot-wear as done by Batas etc. As a sale promotion measure the Board has opened separate counters for exhibiting and selling leather goods and foot-wear at Khadi Krafts, Tiruchy and Coimbatore. We have taken up Chrome tanning also, this year by reviving Tiruchy Chrome tannery Unit. The Board deputed two of its Officers to study the modern Technique in the manufacture of leather goods in and around Delhi to places like Agra and Kanpur with a view to introduce latest models in ladies Chappals.

During the year under report goods worth of Rs. 38.30 lakhs were produced and Rs. 35.35 lakhs worth of goods were sold.

TRAINING

KHADI GRAMODYOG VIDYALAYA

This Training Centre imparts training to the Departmental candidates. The last course of Khadi Training, condensed course for experienced but untrained workers VI batch, ended during November '73. When the Board introduced the Industrial Co-operative Training, S.S.L.C. 6 month course during the period from 1-12-73 to 31-5-74 the usual Khadi courses were suspended with a view to train the supervisors of the Rural Textile Centres. The Board has approached and obtained permission from the Commission for starting the Khadi Gramodyog Sangatak/Saghayah courses at Kamuthi to train the Departmental Candidates.

INDUSTRIAL COOPERATIVE TRAINING

In order to give a strong base to the future of Khadi and Village Industries Board, the Board decided to train some persons at Madras, Cuddalore and Kamuthi in Industrial Co-operatives and Khadi and Village Industries etc. Hence a course of Industrial Co-operative Training was conducted at Madras, Cuddalore and Kamudhi. 300 candidates were trained in these centres as detailed below:

REGIONAL TRAINING CENTRE, SEVVAPET

This training centre is one of the five all India Institutions which is entirely financed by Khadi Commission, and caters to the needs of four Southern States (i.e.) Tamilnadu, Karnataka, Kerala, Andhra Pradesh and Pondicherry. This Training centre conducts training course of 5 months for artisans. It aimed at improving the capacity of the artisans for higher production and greater efficiency. The Khadi and Village Industries Commission has enhanced the stipend for the trainees from Rs 75/- to Rs 90/- p.m. with effect from 1-4-1974.

PROPAGANDA AND PUBLICITY

The Tamil Nadu Khadi and Village Industries Board, in order to popularise the sale of Khadi and Village Industries Products give advertisements in various Newspapers, magazines etc., through the Director, Public (Information and Public Relation) Department, Madras. The also participated in the Pongal Tourist Trade Fair conducted by the Tamil Nadu Government during January - February 1974 and effected sale of more than Rs. 25,000/- Palmgur sales counter, Spinning and Gobar gas demonstrations were the salient features of the Khadi Board exhibited in the Trade Fair.

RURAL ARTS CRAFTS AND INDUSTRIES PROGRAMME

Rural Arts Crafts and Industries Programme is a part of Community Development Programme, which is being implemented in Panchayat Unions.

The Schemes under Rural Arts Crafts and Industries Programme are formulated by Panchayat Unions. Technical advice being rendered by the Board. The basic idea in starting Village Industries Units is to train artisans in the use of improved tools and machinery. After an optimum number of artisans have been trained in a unit, the unit is generally converted into an industrial co-operative with trainees as members or run as production centre by Panchayat Union.

Government have approved a set of model schemes (G. O. Ms. No. 1250/R.D,L.A., dt. 30-5-62) they are as follows :-

The expenditure on the schemes is being incurred initially from the Panchayat Union funds and is reimbursed as post execution grant by Government from the allotment of funds under Rural Arts Crafts and Industries Programme. During the third five year plan a sum of Rs. 50,000/- was allotted informally to each block while for the year 1966-67 a provision of Rs. 10,000/- per block was made. Afterwards allotments were made from schematic budget with reference to actual requirements from year to year. There are at present 315 units under this Programme. Performance of the units is reviewed by the District level adhoc advisory committees.

So far Government have placed a sum of Rs. 294.91 lakhs (from 1961-62 to 1973-74) at the disposal of the Board, besides working capital loan of Rs. 25 lakhs. A sum of Rs. 70.85 lakhs have been received from

the Government for the period from 1969-70 to 1973-74. For the year 1973-74 Government have provisionally provides Rs. 15 lakhs.

Out of the above, a sum of Rs. 13.526 lakhs was sanctioned by Government for special schemes during 1969-70 for establishment of Khadi and Rural Industrial estates at Tiruppur, Perumanallur, Sular, Edayanvalasu, Valliyoor, Omalur and Sriperumbudur. The establishment of Rural Industrial estates at Tiruppur, Perumanallur, Sular and Edayanvalasu was entrusted to the Tamilnadu Khadi and Village Industries Board, while the others are implemented by the Director of Industries and Commerce. Khadi Rural Industrial Estates have been established at Tiruppur, Perumanallur, Sular and Edayanvalasu work is nearing completion at Valliyoor.

FINANCE OF THE BOARD

The Tamil Nadu Khadi and Village Industries Board is financed by the Khadi and Village Industries Commission by way of grants and loans for the implementation of Khadi and Village Industries Programme. The funds provided by the Commission for the year 1973-74 under Agreed Programme for implementation of the various schemes are given in the Annexure.

The State Government extends aid to the Board by way of net cost grant to meet deficit arising out of non-trading activities. The net cost grant granted by the Tamilnadu Government for 1973-74 were as follows :

The State Government also sanctioned a sum of Rs. 12,00,000/- for 1973-74 as lumpsum grant for executing schemes relating to Village Industries Schemes under Rural Arts Crafts and Industries of the Blocks. A sum of Rs. 63,650/- was also placed at the disposal of the Board during 1973-74 by the Tamilnadu Government for implementing Village Industries Schemes pertaining to Harijan Welfare.

During 1973-74 the State Government also granted the following financial assistance to the Tamilnadu Khadi and Village Industries Board for taking ameliorative measures to rehabilitate about 20,300 toddy tappers who have been rendered jobless under Palmgur Industry.

The State Government ordered the separation of the accounts of the Board from Public Accounts of the Government and permitted the Board to have its transaction with commercial banks with effect from 1-7-1973. Accordingly the Tamil Nadu Khadi and Village Industries Board transferred its business by opening its accounts with three Banks viz. India Bank, Canara Bank and Bank of Madras from 1-7-73. At the end of the 1973-74 total cash balance of the Board stood at Rs. 246.08 lakhs including both the balances available in the Banks and amount remaining in the Deposit account of the Board held at Government Treasury yet to be transferred.
