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PREFACE TO THE FIRST

Publications.

THE need for such a work as the present has been felt by Advertisers both in India and in Europe. Newspapers, Magazines and Periodicals in India increased during the past few years, and with an increased demand for British manufactures, there has been a corresponding demand to make those manufactures known to Indian consumers. Advertisers have ample opportunity for so doing, as throughout almost every part of the country English or Vernacular Papers circulate. The demand for Newspapers printed in the English language is very great, and the circulation of daily papers among the native, as well as the Indian Community is large and ever growing; while the number of Newspapers printed in the Vernaculars is great, and increasing faster than that of the English Papers. A few of the Vernacular Papers have an extensive circulation, while others have but a local issue. In order to promote the acquaintance of the European Indian advertiser with the advertising media available, the compiler has attempted to furnish a complete list of all the newspapers, magazines, reviews, periodicals, &c., published in India, Burmah, Ceylon and other Eastern Countries. The task, however, has been no easy one, and was not been finished this year. Several important features, which would greatly enhance the value of the book, would have been introduced, if all the publishers of newspapers promptly replied to the communications addressed to them, but, as it is, some have not taken the trouble to furnish the requisite data. Next year, however, it is intended to make improvements, and the compiler will be very much obliged to the publishers who will send in, early, particulars of their publications. Suggestions, corrections and any information calculated to improve the work will be gratefully received. The compiler returns his thanks to those gentlemen who have kindly assisted him.

The subscription rates of the Indian newspapers are given in rupees, annas, and pies. In order, however, to enable readers to ascertain the equivalent rates in sterling, the following calculations are given:—

At present the rate of exchange with England is 1 rupee equal to 16 annas; 1 anna is equal to 4 pies. The rates for Ceylon papers are given in rupees and pence of a rupee.
