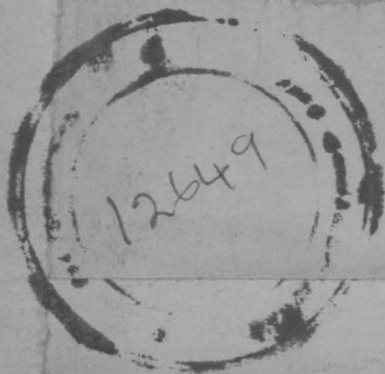

ECLIPSES.

For the Year 1800.

There will be four Eclipses this Year, two of the Sun, and two of the Moon, they will happen in the following Manner.

The first Eclipse will be of the Moon, on Wednesday April the 9th.

Digits Eclipsed, 6^o 50' on the Moons south Limb. She will be Vertical at the time of the Middle in Lat. 7^o 36' S. and Long. 46 13 East.

The Second will be of the Sun, April sixth at 5^h 4^m past 5 in the Morning, a small part of which will be visible to the North East parts of Asia on Sun rise, and will be central at Noon in Lat. 53^o N. and Long. 103^o East.

The third will be a small Eclipse of the Moon, visible October the 3d.

Digits Eclipsed 2^o 44' on the 1st North Limb. She will be Vertical at the Middle Lat. 4^o 30' N. and Long 129^o E.

N. B. A Clerk or Watch showing true time will be 11 minutes faster than the time here, and in the above Eclipse.

The fourth Eclipse will be of the Sun, October the 16th at 33 min. past 2 in the Afternoon, visible to all parts of the world.

The Planet Mars will come within the Ecliptic Limit of the Moon, and be obscured by her on the 15th of June, between 3 and 4 o'Clock in the Morning. The true time of Conjunction 54 min. past 4 Apparent time.

Jupiter is an Evening Star from the beginning of the Year to the 5th July, then a Morning Star to the end of the Year.

Venus is a Morning Star from the beginning of the Year to the 5th August, then she becomes an Evening Star to the Years end.

14th July, Jupiter and Venus in Conjunction, distance 25'

The Georgian Planets in Opposition to the Sun 16th March at 10 in the Morning, and may be seen near a Star of the 3d. Magnitude marked ϵ in η ; when on the Meridian he is 15^o 32' North of the Zenith.

The Time given in the Almanac is for the Meridian of Fort St. George, but it will serve for any other Meridian by adding 4 Minutes of time, to every degree Eastward, or Subtracting 4 Minutes to every degree of Longitude Westward.

60 Minutes make 1 hour, 60 hours 1 Day and Night, 365 days, 15 hours 31 minutes 1 Year, and 60 Years make 1 Chattrum, a Cycle of Years amongst the Natives.

The 54th Year of the 25d Chattrum called Roury commenced at 38 hours 12 minutes after Sun rise the 10th April 1800, and corresponds with the 4602d Year of the Calycoogum, being the fourth and last Age of the World, and likewise with the 1723d Year of Saka regana, which commenced in the 98th Year of the Christian Era.

When the given hours exceed 30 the Day following is reckoned the first of the Malabar Month. The Day always begins at Sun rising.

The manner the Natives divide the time, and calculate the duration of the Calycoothum is as follows.

The time that is necessary for the middle finger resting on the thumb to be taken off quickly, is an instant, called *Matiro* and is equal to the twinkling of an Eye.

100 Years, the common term of the Life of Man.

These 100 Years multiplied by 6, on account of the above six sub-divisions, make 600, which multiplied by 360 the Days in a Year amounts to 216,000. And this again by 210 on account of the quality of Virtues and Vices, gives the Number of 45,360 Years, which expresses the duration of the Calycoothum; of which period 4901 years are past, and there remains 40,459 to the finishing of the last Age of the World, according to the Indian Chronology.

The Mohomedans keep Lunar Time; and their Months consist alternately of 29 and 30 days, but the intercalary day is added to the last day of every 2d, 4th, 7th, 10th, 13th, 15th, 18th, 21st, 24th, 26th, and 29th Year, by which they become Bissextile or Leap years of 365 days.

They begin their Months from the first Appearance of the New Moon or about 36 hours after the Moon's change.

The 1214th. Year of the Hegira commenced on the 5th June, 1799, and the 1215th will begin 11 days before, i.e. on the 25th. May 1800.

ON THE REFORMATION OF THE CALANDER.

THE length of the Year first made use of by the Egyptians, consisted of 365 days, which wanted almost 6 hours of the Tropical Year, by which means the beginning of the Year moved through all the Seasons in 4 times 365 or 1460 Years.

Julius Caesar in order to reduce the Civil nearly to an equality with the Tropical Year, and considering that the Tropical Year consisted of 365 days 6 hours nearly, which exceeded the Civil Year by 6 hours, and consequently in 4 Years exceeded by one whole day, which day was ordered to be added to the Month of February every fourth Year, and so make it to consist of 366 Days; the Civil and Solar Years were then reduced pretty nearly to an equality.

But the true length of the Solar year being found to be 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes and 37 Seconds, and the Julian Year being 365 days and 6 hours, it is plain the Civil exceeds the true Solar Year by 11 minutes 3 Seconds; consequently if the Sun in any Year enters the Equinox on the 20th day of March at Noon, the next Year he will enter it the same day 11 minutes 3 Seconds before Noon, the next 22 Minutes 6 Seconds before Noon and so on; consequently in 130 years the Solar Year, will anticipate the Civil Year by one whole day; And so either Equinox will not happen always on the same day of the Civil Year, but be carried in a retrograde Order through all the days of it.

This put Pope Gregory XIII upon reforming the Julian Calendar: for finding, that at the time of the Nicene Council, when the celebrating of Easter was instituted, the Vernal Equinox happened on the 21st day of March, and by flowing continually back at the rate of 11 minutes 3 Seconds every Year; it happened at his time in the Year 1572 on the 11th day of March, anticipating its former time by 10 whole days, he ordered that these 10 days should be taken out of the Calendar, and the 11th day of March should be reckoned the 21st. And to prevent the Seasons of the Year from going backwards as they were before, he ordered that every hundredth Year of the Christian Era (which according to the Julian Calendar is Bissextile) should be a common Year, and to consist of 365 days: This however being too much, every four hundredth Year was to remain Bissextile.

The present Year 1800 being only the third hundredth year since the reformation of the Calendar by Pope Gregory, it is therefore to be reckoned a common year of 365 days, which would have been a Leap Year by the Julian Account; and which fixes the time of the Equinox to the 21st. March, where it was at the Council of Nice in the Year 325.

THE LIGHT HOUSE on the Exchange, in Fort St. George, was erected by the Exchange Company, with the sanction of Government, in December 1746, and is of essential service to Ships coming into the Roads in the Night.

The Light is 90 feet above the level of the Sea at high water. It can be seen from the Decks of the Honourable Company's Ships, about 17 Miles and from their Mast heads near 26 Miles. The south part of Pottum Shoal lies from the Light House N. by E. half E. distance about 12 Miles. To keep clear of the Shoal the light should always bear to the Westward of S. S. W. that quarter N.



Signals for Ships, or Vessels in the Offing.

SIGNALS respecting Ships or Vessels in the Offing whether Men of war or Merchantmen, are made from the top of the Fort Square of Fort St. George, consisting of an upright Mast, representing the East point of the Compass with a Yard hung by the middle across, the Arms thereof points to the North and South points of the Compass.

Three Classes of Vessels are represented by these Signals: Vessels of three Masts, of two Masts, and of one Mast.

An Ensign, or Square National Flag, represents a Ship of three Masts, a National Flag with two points or a Swallow Tail, represents a Brig or Schooner, of two Masts, and a broad National pendant, terminating in One point, represents a Sloop or Cutter of One Mast.

If either of these Flags are hoisted to the top of the upright, the Vessels seen are in the East quarter of the Compass; Staff hoisted to the North or South Arms of the cross Yard, the Vessels seen are in the North or South quarters of the Compass.

The number of Ships that appear in the Offing are expressed by Pendants. A White Pendant signifies one Ship or Vessel, a Red and White Pendant, two Vessels; a Red Pendant pierced with White three Vessels; and a Yellow Pendant pierced with Blue, four Vessels; and when the number of Vessels ranged four, they are to be considered as a Fleet; on which occasion a long Blue and White Pendant will be hoisted.

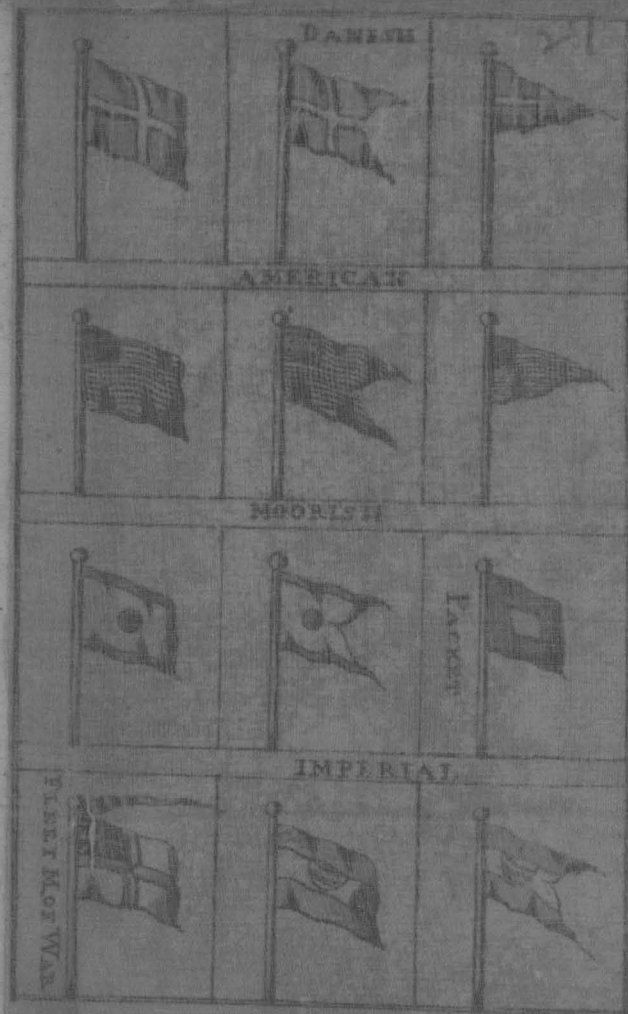
If the Vessels in Sight are Men of War in the East Quarter, one of the numerical Pendants will fly from the National Flag, of the upright Staff; if on the North or South Quarters, the Pendants will fly at the extremity of the Yard Arm over the national Flag, hoisted on the Stay of the North or South Arms of the Cross Yard.

If Merchantmen are seen in the North or East Quarters, the numerical Pendant will fly under the National Flag.

If the Ships are Indiamen, a Blue Pendant will be displayed as usual under the Union Flag of the Fort.

A Packet is announced with a Blue Flag pierced with Yellow, hoisted to the extremity of the Staff, or Yard, according to the Quarter the Vessels are in.

The annexed Plates represent the Flags of all Nationalities.

Trade to Madras, in the upper corner of which, is represented the Flag Staff, and Yard, and the manner in which the Signals are made to express Ships or Vessels discovered in the North, South, and East Quarters of the Compass.

The St. George's Flag hoisted on the upright Staff with a Yellow Pendant pierced with Blue over it, announces that four Sail of Men of War appear to the Eastward.

If the numerical Pendants, instead of flying at the extremity of the Staffs, are hoisted under the National Flags, in the manner expressed by the letter M, they will describe the same Class of Vessels to be Merchantmen.

A Blue and White pendant flying over the National Flag represents a Fleet of Men of War, and under it a Fleet of Merchantmen.
