Under the Orders of Govt. dated 21st Nov. 1817. 29th. No person not belonging to the Department, can be admitted into the interior of the Post Office, or to be allowed of themselves to examine the records—all complaints or applications for information, must be made to the Post Master General in writing.

30th. Persons addressing the Post Master General respecting any delay in the delivery of their Letters, are requested to transmit, at the same time, the Envelopes of such Letters bearing the Post Office Stamp, which specifies the date on which the Letters were issued for delivery.

31st. No persons can be permitted to take Letters from the Poost, except in the regular course of delivery, and it is requested that the Poosts may experience as little detention at the doors of houses as possible.

32d. Persons receiving Letters, are required to pay the amount of Postage marked on them, and if they have occasion to complain of any surcharge, they must state their complaint officially to the Post Master General; should his decision not prove satisfactory, they are at liberty to appeal to the Governor in Council.

33d. All Letters refused by the Party to whom they are addressed, and all Ship Letters transmitted from subordinate Stations to the General Post Office on which the Ship Postage has not been paid, shall be returned to the Office from whence they were dispatched, and the Writer, or the Person who brought them to the Office, shall be required to pay Postage both to and from the place of address—if the Writer cannot be discovered, the Letters shall be entered in a List which shall be exposed by the Post Master in the most public part of his Cutcherry, and a Copy of which shall be transmitted from time to time to the Post Master General, who shall advertise the Letters in the Government Gazette, with notice that they will be delivered to the Writers on payment of the postage due on them.

34th. Should the Writer of a returned Letter refuse to pay the Postage due on it, the Post Master is authorized to detain all future Letters to such Person's address, until the demand in question shall be liquidated—the same rule is applicable to all other cases of refusal to pay Postage.

35th. Any Person opening a Letter or Envelope, shall be bound to pay the Postage of the same, whatever may be the contents.

GOVERNMENT ADVERTISEMENT.

PUBLIC DEPARTMENT.

THE Honorable the Governor in Council having had under consideration the Post Office arrangements of this Presidency, has been pleased to adopt the following supplementary rules, which are now published for general information, and are required to be duly observed by all Public Officers whom they concern.

1.—The employment of expresses, having at times considerably retarded the transmission of the mails, is hereby forbidden, except in cases of urgent importance; and, in such cases, the Officer employing the express is to state in the body of his despatch that he had deemed it incumbent upon him to do so,—whereby the circumstance will stand upon record and be open to investigation.

2.—It is provided by the existing regulations that public despatches exceeding a certain weight shall be reserved for the Puggy, unless endorsed with the words "by Tappal;" and it is hereby further required, that they shall not be so endorsed, unless the early receipt of them be of real importance.

3.—With the view of diminishing the bulk and weight of public despatches, it is hereby required that in future they be copied within the smallest space compatible with perfect legibility,—that they have $\frac{1}{4}$ th instead of $\frac{1}{2}$ th margin,—that all

blank leaves be withdrawn,—that the enclosures whenever practicable, be written consecutively,—and that the packets be made up in the most compact form which the nature of their contents will allow.

4.—The payment of full postage having been sometimes evaded, by enclosing a number of letters under one cover and transmitting them by baggy instead of parcel, no packet will in future be received by the baggy, unless it be open at the ends, like a newspaper, and be fastened up to contain letters.

ADVERTISEMENT.

MARINE DEPARTMENT.

The following Extract of a Letter from Lieut. John Sievers Criddle, 2d Assistant to the Marine Surveyor General, addressed to the Secretary to the Marine Board, at Fort William, under date the 4th of September last, is published for general information.

"With respect to the Arnegon shoal, there is no Flag Staff at that place, nor can Arnegon Hill be discerned from the Southern end of the shoal; and it frequently happens, that the Pulicat Hills are obscured for many days—Soundings then become the only guide; I therefore recommend, that no Ship proceeding down the Coast should come under 12 fathoms; she will then be from 2 to 3 miles off the shoal, consequently out of danger."

The following directions for Vessels approaching the Roadstead of Calicutapatam, extracted from the Survey of the local Marine Officer, are published for general information.

In the S. W. Monsoon, the Flag Staff to bear W. by N. 1/2 N. 10 to 7 or 8 fathoms, and in the N. E. Monsoon, the Flag Staff to bear West in 8 fathoms, to give room for clearing a reef of rocks, on which the sea breaks at low water, a little to the Southward of the Roads,—which may be known by several Rocks on the beach and in the Surf.

Vessels coming along Shore from the Southward, should not come under 10 fathoms, till the Flag Staff bears N. W. by W. when they may haul in for less water.—Anchoring to the Southward of the above Bearings, ships will have rocky ground.

From the Northward of the Rocks on the Beach, and in the
Surf, the reef runs out about 1/2 of a mile, to an E. N. E. direction.

STAMP REGULATIONS.

AN Abstract of the most generally important provisions of
Regulation XIII of 1816, and of Regulation II of 1817,
enacted for consolidating the fees on the Institution of civil suits,
on the admission of exhibits and on summonses for witnesses,
with the duty on stamps; and for modifying the rules regarding
the stamp duties on all descriptions of deeds executed within
the Presidency of Fort St. George, the Provinces subject to the
which Regulations are to be in force from the 1st day of July
1817.

REGULATION XIII OF 1816.

OF MARKS WHICH STAMP MATERIALS MUST NECESSARILY BEAR.

Section.
III. IV. 3. All stamp materials must bear two stamps, the
treasury stamp, and the duty stamp. Moreover, on all
stamp paper there must be the signature of the Collector
Assistant or other authorized European Officer; and on all
stamp cadjas there must be the signature of the authorized
Native Stamp Register—without these they are not valid.

OF THE MATERIALS WHICH WILL BE PROVIDED AT THE SEVERAL
STAMP OFFICES, FOR PREPARING DEEDS, &c.

V. (Second.) In all cutcheries where the sale of stamp
paper is authorized, there will be to be procured, the ma-

terials, of the prescribed size, for preparing all deeds, that
is to say, country paper and cadjas for bonds and other
deeds and instruments—and English paper for copies of
decrees passed in the Sudder Ameen, Zillah, Provincial,
and Sudder Adawlat Courts—But any person may write a
deed or instrument on any other material, and take it to the
Collector, who, on payment of the prescribed stamp duty, will
cause it to be stamped, after which such deed will be valid.

SECTION. OF BONDS AND OTHER DEEDS.

IX. Any bond, promissory note, bill of exchange, letter of
credit, or other obligation for the payment of money; any
receipt or acquittance by which a sum of money or demand
shall be acknowledged to have been paid, received, liqui-
dated, discharged, accounted for, or in any manner satisfi-
ed; any deed of gift, sale, devise, or other transfer of pro-
perty, real or personal; any lease, deed of mortgage, or
other limited assignment of land; any deed of contract,
marriage settlement, partnership, agreement, security or
engagement which may not have hereafter been written on
paper, cadjan or other material bearing the stamp hereunder
prescribed, shall not be admitted in evidence, or otherwise re-
ceived or filed in any Court of Judicature: Provided, however
that if any person shall inadvertently have taken any such
deed on a material not bearing the stamp, and shall pre-
sent the same to the Collector within sixty days from the
date on which it might have been executed, with a penalty
equal to ten times the amount of the stamp duty which
would have been payable on such deed if it had been pre-
pared on any material bearing the prescribed stamp, the
Collector will procure it to be duly stamped.

OF POTIONS AND SECURITY BONDS, &c.

SECTION

XII. Relative to Lockraj lands.—All potions and cautionary or other engagements between Landlord and Tenant, and all receipts for rent for an amount exceeding 10 Rupees, shall be written on stamps.—But the like deeds concerning Malgoujar lands need not be written on stamps.

All authenticated copies of the documents specified above, whether relating to Lockraj or to Malgoujar land prepared as legal vouchers by a Court or other authorized person, shall be written on stamps.

All bazaris and security bonds, security bonds for the costs of suits, or for any other purpose, all deeds of contract, partnership, or agreement of whatever nature, not relating to a specific value, are required to be written on stamps of the value of one Rupee.

OF THE STAMP DUTY ON PLAINTS, SUBSTITUTED FOR THE INSTITUTION FEE.

XIII. The fees hitherto paid to Government on the institution of civil suits, on summonses and on exhibits shall be discontinued; and the following stamp duties shall be levied in lieu thereof.

All petitions of plaint shall be written on stamp paper of the value undermentioned, according to the amount of the suits to which they relate.

XVI, XVII. All applications to any Court of Judicature for the admission of exhibits or for summonses to witnesses shall be on stamp paper, as follows:

EXHIBITS ADMISSIBLE WITHOUT A STAMP APPLICATION.

Vakalatnamahs, moekhtarnamahs, arbitration bonds, security bonds, for appearance, for the payment of costs, or for staying or enforcing the execution of a decree, shall not be liable to the stamp duty on exhibits.

OF APPLICATIONS FOR THE ADMISSION OF SEVERAL EXHIBITS.

SECTION

XVIII. If it be required to apply for the admission of several exhibits, the applications need not be made on separate sheets of stamp paper, but may be written on one or more sheets, the duty on which is equal to the aggregate amount of the duty if separate applications had been made.

OF MORE SHEETS THAN ONE BEING REQUIRED FOR PLAINTS.

SECTION

XXXIII. When it shall be found impracticable to write on one sheet of Stamp paper any petition of complaint or appeal in a fair legible manner, and as such papers have hitherto been written, then as many additional sheets as are required shall be of the description of paper mentioned in Section XIX.—Any party or valued preparer of papers not conforming to those provisions, may be fined by the Court in a sum not exceeding three times the duty on the stamps which should have been used.

WHAT AUTHORITY THESE REGULATIONS DO OR DO NOT CONCERN.

XXXI. The provisions of this Regulation are not intended to affect suits instituted before the Village Moonsiff, District Moonsiff, Village Panchayats or District Panchayats, or before Collectors under Regulation XII of 1816.—But they are applicable to appeals to the Courts from the decisions of the District Moonsiffs, and to all other appeals.

VIII. All persons who on the 12th July 1817, shall have in their possession blank stamp paper, on returning the same to the Collector, shall be entitled to receive back the duty paid thereon.

Notice is hereby given that such native inhabitants of Madras, as may be permitted to proceed into the interior of the Country with fire-arms or other articles falling under the description of Military Stores, will in future be furnished with passports to that effect at the Office of the Superintendent of Police, instead of the Board of Revenue.

EXTRACTS from the Rules for the Management of the Port of Madras.

All applications for Boats must be made at the Office of the Master Attendant, and all Boat hire paid for at the time of application.

Persons wishing to engage a certain number of Boats for the following day, must make their applications at the Master Attendant's office before five o'clock on the preceding evening.

All such applications will be registered in the order in which they are made in a Book to be kept for the purpose—it is recommended that the applications referred to be made in the following form:

Boats for landing Cargo are to be despatched from the Beach between the hours of 4 and 5 in the morning; no Boat for that purpose shall be allowed to leave the Beach after 5 p. m. except in particular cases, the emergency of which will be determined by the Master Attendant, and no such Boats to be detained alongside any Vessel after six p. m. and upon a signal being hoisted at the Master Attendant's Flag Staff, all such Boats with or without Cargo are immediately to return.

All payments on account of the hire of Boats and all Port charges demandable under these rules shall be received and acknowledged by the Boat Paymaster.

Any Person deeming himself aggrieved by any Public Officer acting under the rules of the Port, may represent the subject of his complaint to the Marine Board, who are vested with authority to give redress when the rules appear to have been departed from, or to submit the representation of the party complaining, should he require it, to Government for their decision.

Full information regarding the rules established for the control and management of the Massulih Boats, for the collection and distribution of their hire, for determining the amount of the several charges to be made, and for the general management of the Port may be obtained on application at the office of the Master Attendant.

CUSTOM HOUSE.

EXPORT DUTIES.—The Right Honorable the Governor in Council having been pleased to resolve, that the Export duties charged upon Foreign Vessels shall be hereafter regulated by the rates listed in Bengal; and also that a Drawback shall in certain cases be allowed on Cotton Piece Goods exported upon British or Asiatic Vessels, the following rules are laid down for the conduct of the Officers of Customs.

1st.—Goods exported from Madras in Foreign European or American bottoms, shall be chargeable only with the aggregate rates of duty specified in the annexed Table.

2d.—On this principle, if the Goods shall already have paid a duty exceeding the tabular rate, the difference is to be allowed as drawback.—If the duty already paid upon the Goods shall not amount to the tabular rate, the difference shall be levied as export duty; provided always, that such export duty upon Cotton Piece Goods and Sugar shall never exceed 5 per cent. and upon other articles 3 per cent.

3d.—Goods exported from the subordinate Ports on Foreign European or American Vessels, shall be charged only with the rates mentioned in the table according to the Tonnage of the Port; but the certificates of inland or of Sea import duties shall be received in part payment.

4th.—Piece Goods manufactured entirely of Cotton, exported on British Vessels, or on Vessels belonging to the Native Inhabitants of the British territories, or to subjects of the Native Powers of Asia, from Madras or from the subordinate Ports, shall in like manner be subject only to a duty of 2½ per cent. and shall be allowed such a drawback as may reduce the duty already received to that rate.

5th.—No drawback shall be allowed upon any Goods unless applied for at the time of exportation, and unless they are exported to places not subordinate to this Presidency.

6th.—Returned Cotton Piece Goods shall in all cases pay full import duties as above.

7th.—For the purpose of making the before mentioned adjustments at the Port of Madras, it is absolutely necessary that the duties paid upon importation by land should be properly certified; the Collector of Madras shall therefore within a reasonable time after application shall be made to him, and upon his certificate of the identity of the Goods, grant printed certificates in the following form for all Articles which may have passed his Office.

8th.—The Commanders of all Vessels on which the Goods entitled to drawback may be shipped, shall produce in duplicate the export manifest required by Section XLVIII Regulation IX, and Section XXX Regulation XI, A. D. 1803, and shall in all cases where it may be practicable, subscribe and make oath to the truth of such manifests in duplicate; one copy of the manifest endorsed by the Local Officer of Revenue shall be returned to the Commander to be produced at the Port to which he is bound, and the other copy shall be retained as an official document in the Customs House.

9th.—No drawback shall be allowed, except on Goods so entered in the export manifest.

10th.—The drawback hereby allowed shall be payable after the departure of the Vessel, either to the Shipper of the Goods, or to such person as he may authorize in writing to receive the amount.—The certificates for the amount of drawback shall be issued in conformity with the rules laid down for granting drawbacks under Regulation II, A. D. 1816.

11th.—All documents requisite to certify the amount of duty already paid, or to substantiate the claim for drawback shall be presented to the Local Officers of Revenue together with the export application, and no such document shall on any account be received after the Goods are actually shipped.

12th.—The provisions contained in Class Second, Section IX, Regulation I, A. D. 1812, and in Regulation IV, A. D. 1819 in far as they relate to Goods passing from the Honorable Company's territories into the Settlements of Foreign Europeans, are to be considered as subject to the modification herein enacted.

These rules are to take effect from the 1st May 1820.

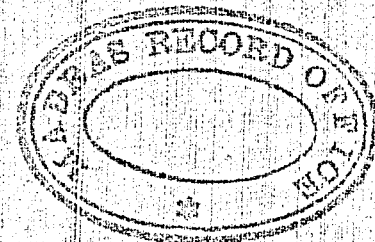

PROSPECTUS of the MADRAS MILITARY FUND.

This Fund, which has been instituted by the Honorable Company's Army at this Presidency, has for its objects;

To provide for the Families of Officers left, by their death, destitute of an adequate maintenance; and to assist Officers unprovided with aid by the Regulations of the Service, or from their own resources, under such circumstances of urgent sickness as renders a voyage to England necessary for the preservation of their lives.

This Institution holds out advantages to Subscribers of so superior a kind, that all Officers of the Madras Army, are invited to become Members of it. It is honored with the Patronage of the Honorable Court of Directors, by whom it is likewise liberally endowed.

It is not to be doubted, now, that the Fund has commenced operations, and the benefits derived from it are fully ascertained, that such Officers belonging to the Madras Establish-

have not hitherto had an opportunity of becoming subscribers to so benevolent a Fund, or were unacquainted with its existence, will readily avail themselves of this occasion for contributing, both by their Donations and Subscriptions, to the furtherance of so philanthropic an Institution, of which, though all who contribute to its maintenance, may not themselves experience its benefits, still in the uncertainties of life, it is not impossible, that some so contributing may, at some future period, by an unexpected change of circumstances, partake of its advantages: at all events they will possess the gratification of affording their aid, to a source from whence comfort and support will be derived to the families of many a valuable friend, and cotemporary in the field.

Officers becoming Subscribers, within the period of six months after their first arrival, or the expiration of that period, they are to pay up their arrears from the date of their arrival with compound interest:—Officers who were in the service at the establishment of the Fund, 1st April 1808, are to pay up all arrears from that period, calculated agreeably to the Regulations, and are to furnish affidavits of health.

Any unmarried Officer becoming a Subscriber shall, upon his marriage, pay up the additional Donation attaching to Subscribers who are married; that is, he shall pay 30 days Garrison pay and allowances of the rank he may then hold.

Any Subscriber proceeding to Europe on sick certificate, in conformity to the existing Regulations of the Government of Port St. George, or such as may be hereafter framed, such Officer not being provided with passage money by the Regulations of the Service shall, on making oath that he does not possess the means of paying for his passage, be entitled to receive from the Military Fund the passage money regulated for his rank; and on a similar declaration, on oath, to the Agents in England, he shall be entitled, on his return to India, to receive the sum regulated for the outward passage.

Any Subscriber so proceeding to Europe on sick certificate, being provided with a passage, either at the public expense, or as above recited, who shall moreover make oath that he does not possess the means of procuring the requisite clothing and equipment for the voyage, shall be entitled to receive from the Fund a further sum not exceeding 100 Pagodas; but not to any further sum on account of equipment on his return to India. No Officer, although a Subscriber, who may proceed to Europe on furlough, and fall sick during such absence, is entitled to any of the benefits of the Fund, which are exclusively confined to Officers quitting India on sick certificate.

Smallern Officers who may proceed to England on Sick Certificate, and who shall make oath that they do not possess property which will produce an Income, including their pay equal to £140 per annum shall be allowed such sum annually as with their Pay, and other resources will make up that amount during the period of Furlough as regulated by the Court of Directors.

No Subscriber eligible to receive passage money or equipment allowance more than once in eight years, but in cases of urgent sickness which may occur within that period will be entitled to receive an advance equal thereto as a loan.

Officers who shall have subscribed to the Fund for a period of 8 years, are entitled to loans under the following circumstances, should the state of the Funds admit of it.

A Subscriber being desirous to send his Wife and Children to Europe or in the case of a Wife and Child returning from Europe shall be allowed a loan equal to the amount of 20 months subsistence of the rank he then holds, provided he shall have previously deposited with the Directors an irrevocable order engaging to repay the amount so borrowed, with interest at 8 per cent. within 22 months immediately succeeding the date of the advance. He shall also be required to deposit for the ultimate security of the Fund, a Personal Bond, in which he shall be joined by two Securities to be approved by the Directors, and assignment on any property he may possess.

A Subscriber who may be desirous to remit money to his Wife or Children in Europe, shall be allowed to receive an Order on the Agents of the Fund in England for any amount which he may have previously paid into the Fund here, either by Instalment or otherwise, provided always that any loss by exchange or otherwise shall be borne by such Subscriber.

A Subscriber proceeding to Europe on sick certificate with his Wife and Children shall be authorised to apply for the regulated passage money for such Wife and Children, to be advanced by the Military Fund as a loan; such loan, however, can only be advanced upon the Personal Bond of the Subscriber, including two Securities to be approved by the Directors.—The amount to be repaid within two years after the Subscriber's return to India, provided he may have attained the rank of Captain, otherwise within two years after he shall have attained that rank; and the Securities to be bound to make good any balance or deficiency in the event of, the Subscriber ceasing to be a Member, of the Fund, by death or otherwise, before the Bond is discharged.

To a Female substituted in the Widows and Orphan Children of Medical Officers, Subscribers to the Fund, dying in circumstances of indigence and distress.

To assist Medical Officers, (Subscribers) who are obliged to go to Europe in consequence of ill health.

And to refer to the Medical Department (Sub-
scribers) retiring from the Service, amounts for the year under certain limita-
tions, and depending on the rate of the Fund.

The Archdeacons to be considered as next in rank to the Senior Merchants.

BENGAL PROVIDENT SOCIETY.

In pursuance of Public Notice given, in the Journals of Calcutta, that a Meeting of the Subscribers (and others intend- ing to subscribe), to the newly proposed Institution, to be styled the 'Bengal Provident Society,' would take place in the Town Hall of Calcutta, on this day, the 11th of September 1815, in order to take into consideration the several Proposi- tions for Establishing, Regulating, and Managing the said Society, the said Meeting was convened accordingly, when

Mr. Palmer being requested by the unanimous voice of the Meeting to take the chair, the following Propositions were made, discussed, and finally agreed to.

Article I.—That it is desirable for the Population of India, and particularly the rising generation, that a Perpetual Society should be formed and established by an unlimited number of Subscribers, the chief object of which will be to secure to Children surviving a fixed period a sum of money, according to their respective interests in the said Society.

Article II.—That in order to effect so desirable a purpose, the Society shall be divided into periodical Classes, each to terminate fourteen years after its commencement, (except the

First Class, that is to say, the First Class shall commence on the 1st of October 1815, and Subscriptions will be received for that Class only, until the 31st December 1816, when the Lives entered on the Books of the said First Class who shall survive the 31st day of December, 1829, at midnight (the meridian of Calcutta) will be entitled to a Dividend of the Capital subscribed in the First Class, and the Interests accumulated thereon as hereafter to be mentioned.

Article III.—That the Second Class will commence on the 1st of January 1817, for which Subscriptions shall be received until the 31st of December of the same year, when the Lives entered upon the Books of the said Class, who shall survive the 31st of December 1830, at midnight as aforesaid, will be entitled a Dividend on the Capital subscribed during the said year of 1817, with the Interest accumulated thereon.

Article IV.—That the succeeding Classes shall commence on the 1st of January in every year, and close on the 31st of December following, when the Lives entered, and Subscriptions received between those periods, will constitute a distinct Class and distinct Capital, the Dividend on each to fall due 14 years after they have respectively commenced.

Article V.—That the Capital of each Class shall be raised by Shares nominally valued at Sa. Rs. 200, an averaged addition being made, agreeable to the following rates, which are in exact proportion to the probabilities attending Life in every Age, viz.

Article VI.—That individuals may take shares either on their own Lives or the Lives of others, and in either case the Parties subscribing to be considered as Member of the Society, and have a voice in the management of its Concerns.

Article VII.—That in order to be admitted on the Books of the Society, no attestation of the Parties subscribing is or shall be required, or any Certificate of Health from a Medical Gentleman.

Article VIII.—That the Premiums for Shares, shall be made in one Collection, and no Subscriptions shall be forfeited on any account, except, that of the Life being extinct, on which such

shares have been taken, and for the convenience of Subscribers, the Government Notes and Securities, will be taken in payment at the value of the day.

Article IX.—That the Funds shall be invested in the Notes of Government, or such other undeniable Securities, as the Directors (hereafter to be chosen) shall deem most eligible; said Securities to be indorsed to three or more of the Directors on behalf of the Society.

Article X.—That Entries into a Class after the date of its commencement will be charged Interest, at the rate of 12 per Cent. per Annum on the amount of Premiums from that date to the day of entry.

Article XI.—That five persons residing in Calcutta, shall be nominated Directors of the First Fourteen Classes, who shall continue until a Dividend is declared on the surviving Members of the First Class, after which period they will retire, and their seats be filled by an equal number chosen from among the Members of the Second Class, and on the same principle, every succeeding year's Direction shall be chosen.

Article XII.—That the business of the Directors shall be to superintend and control the management of the Funds, to examine the Accounts from time to time, and attend to the general concerns of the Society; the opinion of a majority thereof shall be conclusive in all cases relating thereto, provided they do not interfere with these Regulations; but that no Director is to have a voice in any Proposition in which he may be individually interested.

Article XIII.—That on all appointed Meetings, three of the Directors shall form a quorum; and in the event of death or removal of any Director or Directors, another or others shall be chosen by the resident Members of the Society.

Article XIV.—That a person shall be appointed Secretary to the Society, who shall undertake the active management of its Concerns, for which he shall be allowed a Commission of Two and a Half per Cent on the amount of Premiums received, and one per Cent on the Amount to be divided after the termination of each Class, but in the event of death or removal of the Secretary, the latter Commission of one per cent only, shall devolve to the Secretary, who may be officiating when such Dividends fall due, and are paid.

Article XV.—That the Firm of a respectable House of Agency shall be appointed to act as Treasurers, who will receive the Certificates from the Secretary properly filled up, and collect the sum mentioned upon each for which the said Treasurers shall be allowed a Commission of one per cent on the amount collected.

Article XVI.—That a Meeting of the Directors shall take place, during the months of January and July in every year, in order to audit the Accounts of the Society, and pass them when approved; and should any extra Meeting be deemed necessary during the intervals of the said months of January and July, on the requisition of one or more of the Directors, the Secretary will give proper notice that the same may be convened, and that, on a convenient day in the month of January 1817, after the Directors have examined and finally passed the Accounts of the First Class, a General Meeting of the Subscribers shall take place, to which the Directors will make a Report thereon, at the same time, any point connected with the interests of the Society will be discussed if deemed to be requisite, and decided by the voice of the majority of the Members; further, that a General Meeting shall be called on a convenient day, in the month of January of every succeeding year for the same purposes.

Article XVII.—That a Journal shall be kept by the Secretary, which is to contain the Proceedings on every Meeting.

Article XVIII.—That the Interest account shall be balanced on every 30th day of June and 31st day of December, and the amount carried to the credit of the existing Class or Classes in exact proportion to their respective Capitals.

Article XIX.—That applications for Admission into the Society, are to state the names of the party to be entered, the sex, age, native country, and actual place of residence, which application will be addressed to the Secretary, who will, under the authority of the Directors, issue a Certificate on the life of each individual named, bearing date the day on which it is received.

Article XX.—That one year previous to a dividend being made on the First Class, the Society shall commence to give Public Notice in the *India and London Gazette* for the surviving Members of that Class, to present themselves after the 31st day of December 1829, following, at the Office of the Society, (or to the Agents in distant parts then appointed,) producing at the same time, the Certificate of the Office, and legal proofs of identity.

Article XXI.—That in due time previous to a Dividend falling payable on the First Class, the Society shall appoint one Agent in each of the Presidencies of India, and one in London, who shall be furnished with Transcripts from the Office Entry Books of every Class as they become due, in order to enable them to question the parties presenting themselves, and they the said Agents shall be authorized to call for such further proofs of identity as they shall judge expedient.

Article XXII.—That the Agent in London on being satisfied with the identity of the parties, shall cause two Notarial Copies of the Office Certificate to be taken, one of which copies shall remain with the claimant, and the original and duplicate be transmitted by the most eligible opportunities to the Secretary to the Society, the charges of the said Agent to be borne by the respective claimants.

Article XXIII.—That members residing in England, or any parts to the Westward of the Cape of Good Hope, shall be allowed two years grace beyond the period of each Class falling due in order to present their claims; and such Members as may reside in any parts to the Eastward of the Cape, will be allowed one year's grace beyond the period of each Class falling due, for the same purpose.

Article XXIV.—That as soon after the 31st day of December 1829, as may be practicable, a Dividend of the total Capital of the First Class shall be ascertained on the number of Shares then claimed by surviving Members, when a sum of 75 per cent will be paid upon each Share, reserving 25 per cent on Interest to answer such claims as may be forthcoming during the following two years.

Article XXV.—That the Institution shall be distinguished by the name of the *BENEFICENT SOCIETY*.

Article XXXI.—That the Regulations now adopted, shall continue invariable during the existence of this Society.

Article XXXII.—That these Regulations shall be published twice in the Government Gazette, and in other Weekly Papers, for general information.

Goods consigned and afterwards withdrawn, or sent to out cry; if no advance on them has been made, only half commission.

2.—On giving orders for the provision of goods, 2½ per cent.

FIFTH CALCUTTA LAUDABLE SOCIETY.

The object of the institution of the Laudable Society is to provide a Fund for the Insurance of Lives, whereby individuals may secure a provision for their Families, after their death, or Orphans may guard themselves against loss in the event of the decease of their debtors.

The Laudable Society differs from an office for the Insurance of Lives, for such Offices have been generally constituted in European Countries, in that the whole Fund of the Society is commuted for the benefit of the insured, and of them alone, that no insurer receives profits from the Institution, and that even the charges of management are regulated in so economical a scale, as scarcely to form a sensible burthen on the Establishment.

It differs both from a Life Insurance Office and from most of these public associations into which certain orders of the community are frequently induced to enter for the purpose of providing a Fund for the maintenance of their Families after their death, in that it does not profess to insure any specific sum of Money or Annuity to the representatives of the deceased, but merely their proportion of such sum as its accumulated fund shall eventually yield. This uncertainty however is entirely in favor of the insured, for on the one hand, by the ultimate division of the funds he derives the utmost possible benefit which any Life Insurance could afford him without a positive loss to itself, while on the other hand he is perfectly secured against that disappointment to which the contributors to public Charitable Funds are not unfrequently liable, from the total failure of a scheme founded on false or over-sanguine calculations. The Members of the Laudable Society have a certainty of benefiting to the utmost extent proportioned to their respective contributions, and neither more nor less.

The subscriptions to the Laudable Society are partitioned into certain shares, and though the rules of the Institution do not warrant the precise sum which each share is to yield in case of a lapse of the life subscribed on, an approximation to that sum may be obtained from the result of former societies. In the third Laudable Society, each share on a lapsed life yielded about Rs. Rs. 1316 exclusive of the regulated advance of 4000. The present state of the Funds of the Laudable Society now about to close, justify expectation that the holders of shares on lapsed lives will not receive less than Rs. Rs. 5500 in addition to the prescribed advance already drawn. The difference on the

productiveness of shares in the two societies respectively may be chiefly ascribed to an unusual mortality amongst the insured in the last two or three years, notwithstanding the high premium, which the Government six per cent. Loan Securities continue to bear: without any imprudence, a share in the Fifth Laudable Society may be taken as covering the risk of Sa. Rs. 8000, and at the close of the institution, the holder of a share on lapsed life may justly expect to receive an addition at least of Sa. Rs. 800 out of the profits accumulated on the funds. The Fifth Laudable Society will commence on the 1st January 1822, and its rules will be found to agree essentially with those of the Fourth, except in respect to the term of its duration. The period for this, in conformity to the general wishes of Subscribers, is fixed at five years.

Regulations of the Fifth Calcutta Laudable Society,

ARTICLE I. The object of this association is to provide a fund for the insurance of Lives. This fund is to be portioned into shares. And an individual may subscribe for a certain number of shares, either on his or her own life, or on the life of any other individual. In the former case, the general estate of the deceased, or such person or persons as he or she may by will or assignment have appointed, shall benefit in the event of a lapse; in the latter, the person who may have subscribed on the life of the deceased, shall benefit to the extent of the shares subscribed for; unless, in either case, such shares be specially declared at the time of subscription, to be for the benefit of any other person or persons, or be subsequently made over according to the form hereafter prescribed, for the benefit of any other person or persons, in which case such person or persons shall be entitled to benefit in the event of a lapse, and no other.

ART. 2. In the case of a person subscribing on the life of another, the party subscribing, and not the party on whose life the subscription is made, shall be considered a Member of the Society, and have a voice in the management of its concerns. Co-partners or other bodies of individuals may hold one or more shares jointly on any given life, either for their own benefit or for that of others; but in such case, the parties joining in the subscription, shall not be entitled each to a separate voice in the concerns of the Society, but must vote collectively, or by the deputation of one of their number on all matters therein relating.

ART. 3. The great principle of this Society is the equal division of its accumulated funds among the parties entitled to benefit by lapse of lives subscribed on, according to the number of shares which those parties may respectively hold.

ART. 4. The Fifth Laudable Society shall commence on the 1st of January, 1822, and shall close on the 31st December, 1826, at midnight.

ART. 5. Not more than ten shares can be subscribed for, on any one life, whether those shares be held by one or more individuals.

ART. 6. Persons shall be at liberty to subscribe for half or quarter shares, either on their own lives, or on the lives of others, and in case of lapse, the estate of the deceased, or the parties for whose advantage the subscription is declared to be, or who may have become entitled to such advantage by will or assignment, shall benefit by the fund in a like fractional proportion.

ART. 7. The following are the rates of Subscription to be paid half yearly on each share, half share and quarter share, according to the ages of the parties, whose lives are subscribed on, at the time of their admission into the Society, viz.

ART. 8. All persons entering the Society, between the 1st January and the 30th of June, in the year 1822, shall pay on admission their full Subscription in advance, for that year, or for the remaining part thereof, computing the same from the date of their becoming Members, until the 1st of January 1823, and paying for any number of days less than a month, one whole month's subscription. The subsequent half yearly subscription shall be payable on the 1st of January and 1st of July, in each year, commencing with the 1st of January, 1823.

ART. 9. All persons who may be admitted into the Society, subsequent to the 30th of June 1822, shall in the first place, pay their proportion of the current half yearly Subscription,

to be calculated agreeably to the above Rule, from the first day of the month of their admission, until the next following period of payment, and in the second place, shall pay a Premium of Admission, to be regulated agreeably to the following Scale, viz.

Art. 10. In pursuance of the terms of the 31st Article of the Regulations of the Fourth Laidable Society, persons having held shares on unexpired term in that society, shall be entitled without any renewed warranty of health, to receive a certificate of admission for a like number of shares in the Fifth Laidable Society, on payment of the full subscription money for twelve months, at the rates corresponding with their respective ages at the period of transfer: for the accommodation of individuals, it shall be in the discretion of the Directors, if

any time on or before the 1st of January 1822, to receive, in payment of such subscription money, the Promissory Notes of entries, payable on or before the 1st of February following, together with interest thereon from the 1st of January aforesaid, at the rate of eight per Cent. per Annum; but until either the subscription money shall be paid in Cash, or a Promissory Note for the same shall be granted, no new certificate of admission shall in any case be issued, nor shall the party be entitled to any benefit from the Funds of the society, in case of the intermediate lapse of the life intended to be insured. In the event, moreover, of the payment of the subscription money being delayed beyond the term of one month from the commencement of the society, or of any Promissory Note for such subscription money not being paid when due, the party subscribing shall be liable to pay to the society a penalty of two per Cent. on the principal amount of his subscription money; and should he fail to make good such subscription money together with the penalty aforesaid, within the second month from the commencement of the society, he shall entirely forfeit all claim of admission into the society, or to benefit by its Funds, except on a new application to be submitted to the Directors, accompanied by the prescribed testimonial of health and age. If any Promissory Note received in payment of subscription money, shall remain unpaid after the expiration of the second month from the commencement of the society, the amount of such Note shall be forfeited to the society, and the subscription cancelled.

Art. 11. Five persons residing in Calcutta, shall be nominated Directors of the Fifth Laidable Society, whose business it shall be to superintend and control the management of the funds, to examine the accounts, to decide on all applications for admission, and generally to transact the current business of the society. The concurrent opinion of three of the five Directors shall be decisive on all matters relating to the concerns of the society, not at variance with these fundamental Regulations, which can be altered only by a majority of the members residing in Bengal. No question, however, shall be proposed to the members at large, without the concurrence of the whole of the Directors. In case of the death or removal from Calcutta of any of the Directors, another or others shall be chosen by a Majority of the Members of the Society then residing in Calcutta, or by a Majority of such Members residing in Calcutta, as may attend at a General Meeting to be convened for that purpose.

Art. 12. A Meeting of the Directors of the Society shall be convened annually, between the 1st of January and 30th of April in each year, when a statement of the accounts of the Society shall be laid before them by the secretaries, and no ac-

ment, which shall once have been submitted to, and passed by the Directors at such meeting, shall afterwards be called in question, unless for some special and manifest error to the amount of five hundred Sicca Rupees or upwards.

ART. 13. In the election of Directors, as well as on all other questions relative to the concerns of the Society, which may be proposed for the decision of the members at large, a member holding ten shares or any one Life shall be entitled to three votes; one holding from five to nine shares to two votes, and one holding any number of Shares less than five, to one vote only. Members holding Shares on different lives shall be entitled to the number of votes proportioned to the number of Shares which they hold on each Life.

ART. 14. Messrs. ALEXANDER & COMPANY shall officiate as Secretaries and Treasurers to the Society, with a fixed allowance of Sicca Rupees Two Hundred per month, and a Commission of one per Cent. on all Receipts of Subscriptions, to be paid out of the Funds of the Society, and they shall charge a fee of Sicca Rupee One on each Certificate of Admission, and One Rupee for Registry of each assignment of Share, in lieu of all Charges. Advertisements, Printing and Law expenses excepted.

ART. 15. The Secretaries and Treasurers shall act in all cases, according to the orders of the Directors.

ART. 16. All application for Admission into the Society, from persons residing at any of the King's or Company's Settlements, shall be made by Letters to the Secretaries, and shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Health, signed by a Medical Gentleman in the King's or Company's Service; (those from all other places to be certified by a Medical Gentleman to the satisfaction of the Directors);—and by an Affidavit sworn to and signed by the individual on whose Life the Shares are applied for; such Letter, Certificate and Affidavit to be according to the following Forms, printed copies of which may be had on application to the Secretaries, viz.

The above Affidavit must be sworn to before a Magistrate, who shall attest the same by his counter-signature; or if the party be residing at a station where there is no Magistrate, it may then be attested by the Principal Civil or Military Officer of the station.—In case of an application for shares on the Life of a Minor under fourteen years of age, an Affidavit to the same effect as above must be produced from the Parent, Guardian, or next of Kin of the party, or of the person under whose protection he or she may be residing.

ART. 17. All applications for Admission, accompanied by the above prescribed forms of Certificate and Affidavit, which may be transmitted to the Secretaries, shall be submitted by them to the Directors for their decision: And the Directors, shall in all instances be at full liberty to reject any such application, without assigning any reason to the Applicant for so doing.

ART. 18. In all cases, it shall rest with the Committee to judge, whether with reference to the circumstances of situation and distance, the interval which may have elapsed between the date of any Certificate and Affidavit of Health, and the time of their presentation be reasonable or otherwise, and to admit or reject such Certificate and Affidavit accordingly. In no case however, is the party subscribing to have any claim on the

funds of the Society, in the event of the life lapsing between the date of the Certificate, and the date on which the Applicant may be admitted a Member, unless where the Directors may at the instance of such Applicant, have originally permitted the subscription to take effect from the date of the Certificate and Affidavit of Health, which it shall at all times be in their discretion to do, on the arrears of Subscription being paid up. In the event however, of a person dying between the dates of his Certificate and Affidavit of Health and his Admission, and the Insurance on his Life was not effected from the date of the Certificate and Affidavit, the amount of Premium paid for such Insurance shall be refunded.

Art. 19. No Subscription on any life shall be considered as entitling the party or parties concerned, to benefit by the Society, until the life subscribed on shall have been approved by the Directors, the amount of the first subscription and premium of Admission paid, and a Certificate of Admission granted under the signature of the Secretaries, agreeable to the form annexed to these Regulations. And if any Applicant shall omit to pay the amount of such Subscription and premium of Admission, within two months after the life subscribed on shall have been approved by the Directors, such Applicant shall forfeit his claim to be admitted, except on a fresh application, accompanied by a new Certificate and Affidavit of Health.

Art. 20. All Subscriptions (except the first which is to be paid on admission, shall be paid within one month of the time at which they become due. If not paid within that time, a penalty of two per Cent. on the amount of the instalment shall be added; and any Member who shall not have paid his Subscription, together with the said penalty within two months of the day on which such Subscription shall have become due, shall be considered to have absconded and entirely forfeited his Share or Shares.

Art. 21. Any Member shall be at liberty at any time, to pay up his subscription for the whole unexpired period between the time of such payment and the close of the Society, or for any part thereof; and, in the event of a lapse of the life subscribed on, such Member or his Representatives shall be entitled to receive back any part of the Subscription Money so paid up, which would not have been due at the time of the lapse taking place; forfeiting however to the Society all interest which may have intermittently accrued thereon.

Art. 22. No subsequent increase of Shares on any life shall be allowed, except on a fresh application to be again approved of by the Directors, and accompanied by a Certificate

and Affidavits there. The subscription on the additional shares to be according to the age of the party at the time of making the new application.

Art. 23. Any Member desiring to transfer his Interest in any share or shares which he may hold in the Society, shall be at liberty to do so, by an Indorsement to be written on the original Certificate, which Indorsement however shall not be valid, until the Certificate bearing the same shall have been produced to the Secretaries, and the transfer duly registered by them in a general Book of Registry, to be kept in the office of the Society.

Art. 24. A loan of a sum exceeding Five Rupees Five Annas shall be collected, it shall not be laid out in the purchase of Government Paper, Bank Shares, or in Loans secured by a Deposit of Government Paper, to be granted under the control and authority of the Directors; it being clearly understood, that in all cases of Loan, the market value of the Deposit shall be more than sufficient to cover the sum lent. All Public Securities purchased for the Society, shall be specially endorsed to three or more of the Directors, and the Interest only shall be made payable to the Secretaries and Treasurers.

Art. 25. The person or persons entitled to benefit by the lapse of a Life in this Society shall, on making application to the Secretaries in writing, accompanied by such proof of the Certificate as may be satisfactory to a Majority of the Directors, immediately receive the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Rupees on each Share; Two Thousand Rupees on each half Share, or One Thousand Rupees on each Quarter Share, which he or they may have held or be entitled to on the lapsed Life; provided that, in the opinion of the Directors, the state of the Funds of the Society will admit of so large a payment being made. Should the Directors think however, that the Funds will not allow of an immediate payment to this amount, then such sum only shall be advanced as they may deem proper; and the balance of the prescribed advance shall be paid, as soon as the Directors shall be of opinion that the Funds will safely admit of it.

Art. 26. Arrears of Subscription or any other sums due to the Society by the holders of any Share or Shares on a lapsed Life, shall be deducted from the amount of the Advance.

Art. 27. At the expiration of this Society on the 31st of December 1870, it is proposed, that a new Society on a similar plan, but subject to such further alterations as experience may suggest, shall be immediately constituted, into which Society all Members then holding Shares or unexpired Lives in the Fifth Lovable Society, shall be at liberty to transfer those Shares without any renewed Certificate of Health, in consideration of a

sum of Money to be paid to such new Society out of the Funds of the Fifth Lovable Society, and without taking into account any proportion of the advances previously paid by the Society on account of lapsed lives. To enable Members of the Fifth Lovable Society to transfer the shares held by them into the ensuing or Sixth Lovable Society, an regular form of application shall be necessary; but a Certificate of Admission into the new Society shall be immediately issued to them on the simple payment of the usual first year's Subscription in advance, subject however to the established penalty of two per Cent. in the event of the payment being delayed beyond the term of one month from the commencement of the new Society, and to the entire forfeiture of the privilege of transfer, (excepting on a new application to the Directors, accompanied by the regular Certificate of Health, and a good will in the second month from that period.) The current subscription for Members transferring their shares from any of the said Lovable Societies, shall be according to the respective ages of the Parties, on whose lives the shares are held, on the 1st of January 1827.

Art. 28. It is proposed to render the institution of the Lovable Society permanent, by establishing a new Society in succession to each Society as it expires, and arranging the transfer of the shares agreeably to the above principle.

Art. 29. Upon the transfer to the sixth Lovable Society of any share or shares in the Fifth Lovable Society, which may stand assigned by endowment, or otherwise, for the benefit of any other person or persons, than the person or persons originally interested therein, or upon any subsequent transfer of any share or shares so assigned from the sixth or any succeeding Society to the Society next ensuing, both such share or shares shall continue null and all rights, subject to the Act of the Assignee, and shall be declared to stand for the benefit of such Society in the Certificate of Admission to be issued from the new Society.

Art. 30. Within one month and fifteen days after the 21st December 1823, the accounts of the fifth Lovable Society shall be made up, and the balance of Funds actually on hand, after deducting the stipulated payment of ten per cent. to the new Society, shall be divided by the number of shares held on the 21st December 1823, and the parties entitled to bear by such dividend, shall each receive his or their proportions of the said Funds, according to the number of shares respectively held by them on the several lapsed lives, &c. the

holders of half or quarter shares, dividing according to those fractional proportions.

Art. 31. With respect to any lapses of lives in this Society, which may not be ascertained on or prior to the 12th of February 1827, such lapses shall be in the view of the next ensuing or sixth Lovable Society, and the advances or dividends to which the parties claiming to be entitled by such lapses may be entitled, shall be paid out of the Funds, and agreeably to the Regulations of the said ensuing Society, on the said lapses being ascertained. But it is hereby expressly provided, with respect to any lapses which may have occurred at any interval to the outward of the term of three months, that notices of such lapses, accompanied by satisfactory proof of the same, must be given to the Secretaries to the fifth Lovable Society, within one year from the expiration of the fifth Society, on the 21st December 1823, or within two years, if the lapses have occurred in Europe or elsewhere, beyond the term of Good Hope, and that in the event of their party or parties interested neglecting to prefer his or their Claim or account of any such lapses within the period here prescribed, he or they shall entirely forfeit all right and title to any benefit, whatever, by reason of such lapses from the Funds of the fifth or of any succeeding Society.

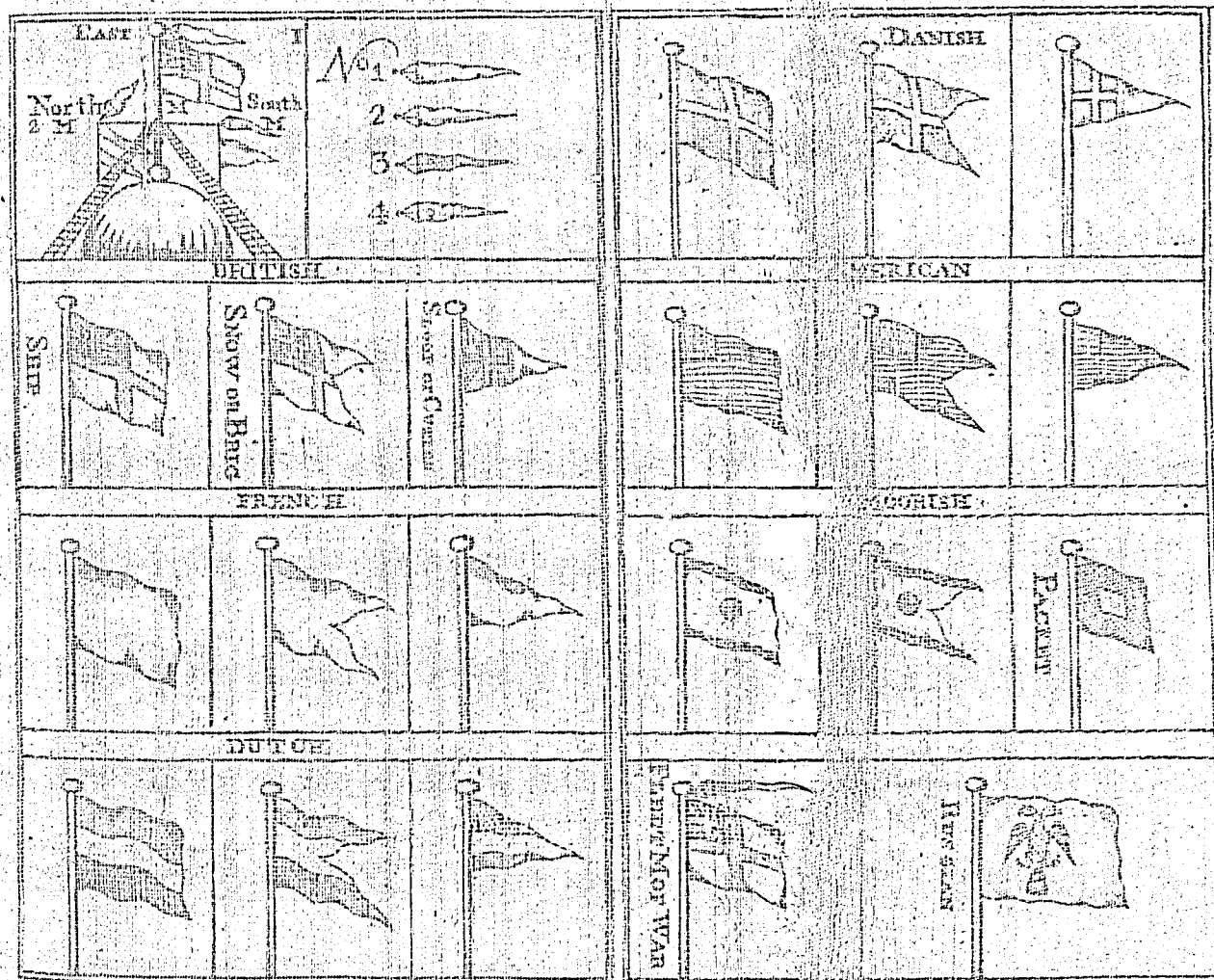

SIGNALS FOR SHIPS OR VESSELS IN THE OFFING.

SIGNALS respecting Ships or vessels in the Offing, whether Men of War, or Merchantmen, are made from the top of the Fort Square of Fort St. George, on which there are three Signal Sticks. One consisting of an upright Mast, representing the East point of the compass with a yard hung by the middle across, the Arms of which pointing to the North and South points of the compass.

Three classes of Vessels are expressed by these Signals; Vessels of three Masts, of two Masts, and of one Mast.

An ensign, or square national flag, represents a Ship of three masts; a national flag, with two points or swallow's tail, represents a Brig or Schooner, &c. of two masts; and a broad national pendant terminating in one point, represents a Sloop or Cutter, of one mast.

If either of these flags are hoisted to top of the upright staff, the vessels seen are in the East Quarter of the compass; if hoisted to the North or South arms of the cross yards, the vessels seen are in the North or South Quarters of the compass.

The number of Ships that appear in the offing, are expressed by pendants. A white pendant, signifies one Ship or Vessel; a red and white pendant, two Vessels; a red pendant, pierced with white, three Vessels; and a yellow pendant pierced with blue, four Vessels; when the number of vessels exceed four, they are to be considered as a Fleet; on which occasion a long blue and yellow pendant will be hoisted.

If the Vessels in sight are men of War in the East Quarter, one of the numerical pendants will fly from the national flag of the upright staff; if in the North or South Quarters, the pendants will fly at the extremity of the yard arm over the national flag, hoisted on the stay of the North or South Arms of the cross yard.

If Merchantmen are seen in the North, South, or East Quarters, the numerical pendant will fly under the national flag. If the Ships are Indianmen, a blue pendant will be displayed as usual under the Union Jack of the Fort.

If a fleet is in sight, one Gun will be fired after the Signal for the Fleet is made, and if there are two Fleets of different Nations in the same point of the compass, the signal of the first Fleet will be lowered after the space of 15 minutes, and a fresh signal hoisted, which is likewise to be accompanied by a Gun.

A Packet is announced with a blue flag pierced with yellow, hoisted to the extremity of the Staff or Arms, expressive of the quarter she is in.

The annexed Plate represents the Flag of all Nations, that

trade to Madras; in the upper corner of which is represented the flag, staff and yard, and the manner in which the Signals are made to Express Ships or Vessels discovered in the North, South, and East Quarters of the compass.

The St. George's flag hoisted on the upright staff with a yellow pendant pierced with blue over it, announces that four sail of British Men of War appear to the Eastward; the Dutch flag of two points or swallow's tail hoisted on the stay of the Northern staff, and a red and white pendant over it at the extremity of the Arm, represents two Dutch armed Btigs or Sloops in the North Quarter, and a French broad pendant hoisted to that stay of the South Arm of the cross yard, with a red pendant pierced with white flying over it at the extremity of the Arm, represents three French armed Cutters in the South Quarter of the compass.

If the numerical pendants, instead of flying at the extremity of the staff, are hoisted under the National flag, in the manner expressed by the letter M they will describe the same class of vessels to be Merchantmen.

N. B.—The blue pendant flying under the Union flag of the Port, with the St. George's Colours hoisted upon any one of the Signal staffs, expresses an Indiamen. A yellow pendant flying under the Union flag with either of the three white flags hoisted under any of the Signal staffs, represents a Spanish Vessel; and if a red pendant flies in the place of the yellow pendant, it will express a Portuguese; a blue and yellow pendant, flying over the national flag, represent a Fleet of Men of War, and under it, a fleet of Merchantmen.

LIGHT HOUSE.

The Light House on the Exchange in Fort St. George was erected by the Exchange Committee, with the sanction of Government, in December 1795, and is of essential service to Ships coming into the roads in the night.

The Light is 90 feet above the level of the Sea at high water; it can be seen from the decks of the Honorable Company's Ships about 17 miles, and from their mast heads near 20 miles.

The South part of Polkat shoal bears from the Light House, N. by E. half E. distance 12 miles; and to keep clear of the shoal, the light should always bear to the Westward S. S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.

GENERAL PHENOMENA OF THE HEAVENLY BODY.

DIES, in the YEAR 1822.

JANUARY.

I. *Of the Sun and Planets.* On the 4th Mercury and the Georgian Planet are seen near together East of the Sun. On the 6th the Moon passes the star *beta* in Taurus; On the 10th Mars is stationary; on the same day the Moon passes the star *Regulus* in the heart of the Lion; and on the 19th *Spica Virginis*. On the 20th the Sun enters the constellation *Aquarius*. On the 23d the Moon passes Mercury, and on the 26th Venus. Mercury at the beginning of the month rises about an hour and a quarter before the Sun, is at the superior conjunction on the 23d and passes to the eastward of the Sun, rising at the end of the month about half an hour after that Luminary. Venus is an evening star and at the beginning of the month sets about three hours and a quarter after the Sun. Mars passes the meridian at 4 o'clock in the morning. Jupiter and Saturn are in quadrature about the 11th of the month, when they pass the meridian at 6 p. m. at the same time of the month the Georgian Planet is an hour west of the Sun.

II. *Of the Stars at 12 o'clock p. m.* The firmament at the beginning of the year presents a magnificent appearance, many of the brightest Constellations being now above the horizon. Near the meridian we see the Zodiacal Constellations of Aries and the Bull, the former to the westward, and the latter to the eastward. Under the meridian to the north is the Constellation of Perseus, to the South the Eastern part of the Whale, and the middle of the River Eridanus. *Aldebaran* the bright (red) Star in the Bull is about an hour and a half to the Eastward of the meridian; the *Pleiades* are a little to the westward of *Aldebaran*; further east are the Zodiacal Stars *Castor* and *Pollux* and the whole of *Cancer*. The head of the Lion is just beginning to appear above the Eastern horizon. To the North is the Constellation of *Auriga*, with its bright Star *Capella*; to the eastward is the *Lynx* and the Western half of the Great Bear; South and East of Taurus is the magnificent Constellation of *Orion*. *Sirius* in *Canis Major*, the

brightest Star in the Heavens, follows close; and also *Procyon* in *Canis minor*: a part of the Ship *Argo*, with its bright Star *Canopus*, is also above the horizon to the eastward. On the west of the meridian, besides Aries, we see the Zodiacal Constellations of *Pisces*, *Aquarius* and *Capricornus*, the latter in the horizon: North of Aries are seen the Constellations of the Fly, the Great and Little Triangles, *Andromeda*, *Cassiopea*, *Cepheus*, and a part of the *Dragon*. West and to the Northward of *Pisces*, is the Constellation of *Pegasus*—west of which and cut by the horizon is the *Swan*, while the *Eagle* has just disappeared to the westward. To the South of Aries we find a part of the *Whale*—more South the *Phoenix*, and still more the bright Star *Achernar* in *Eridanus*—South and Westward of the latter is the *Toucan*; westward of the *Whale* is seen the bright Star *Romalhaut* in the Southern Fish, and South of that Star and near the horizon to the westward is the Constellation of the *Crane*.

FEBRUARY.

I. *Of the Sun and Planets.* On the 2d the Moon passes *beta* in Taurus, On the Moon eclipsed not visible at Madras. 7th the Moon passes *Regulus*. On the 15th the Moon passes the Star *Antares* in the heart of the *Scorpion*. 17th, the Sun enters the Sign *Pisces*; 22d, the Sun eclipsed invisible at Madras; 23d the Moon passes Mercury; 26th Mercury is stationary; and on the 29th the Moon again passes *beta* in Taurus. Mercury is at the greatest distance east of the Sun on the 19th, Venus at the beginning of the month sets two hours and a half after that luminary. Mars is in opposition to the Sun on the 10th, Jupiter and Saturn are on the meridian at about 4 o'clock p. m., and the Georgian Planet at 9 a. m.

II. Part of *Orion* is now under the meridian. *Rigel* one of its brightest Stars is just passing; on the North, *Capella* has passed the meridian but a short time; *beta* in Taurus is a very little East of it; the Stars which were on the meridian at 8 o'clock last month are now two hours distant from it to the Westward. The Constellations of the *Dragon* and *Swan* to the North—with *Aquarius*, the Southern Fish, the *Crane* and *Toucan* on the South, have all disappeared below the horizon to the westward; while to the eastward, we find the Constellations of

the Lion, the Great Bear, and the Ship almost wholly above the horizon.

MARCH.

I. Of the Sun and Planets. On the 6th the Moon passes the star Regulus; and on the 14th Antares. On the 21st the Sun enters the Constellation of Aries, when it is equal day and night over all the earth. The southern Polar region would now begin to be deprived of the light of the Sun, did not the refractive power of the atmosphere keep his image above the horizon some time longer. On the 21st the Moon passes Mercury, the Planet being stationary on that day--at Venus is on the 30th. On the 28th the Moon passes the star β in Taurus. Mercury is at the inferior conjunction on the 8th, and passes to the west of the Sun: Venus on the 10th, and also passes to the west of the Sun and becomes the morning star. Mars on the meridian at 10 o'clock p. m. Jupiter between 2 and 3 o'clock p. m. Saturn a little earlier, and the Georgian at about 7 o'clock in the morning.

II. The Stars Castor, Procyon and Pollux with the head of Ursa Major, are approaching the meridian--while Sirius and Canopus have not yet risen. Taurus, Orion, and Antares are now west of the meridian--west of Aurigae, Taurus and Andromeda, beginning to disappear--part of the Whale and of Bridget are no longer visible. To the eastward, we find the Lion, the Great Bear, Charles's Heart, and the greater part of the Hydra, above the horizon--while the western part of the Dragon, the Zodiacal Constellation of the Virgin, the Crow, the Flying Fish, and the Centaur, are cut by it.

APRIL.

I. Of the Sun and Planets. On the 21 the Moon passes Regulus. On the 11th Antares; and on the 18th Venus. On the 20th the Sun enters Taurus. On the 25th the Moon passes β in Taurus, and on the 30th Regulus again. On the 4th Mercury is at the greatest distance West of the Sun. Venus is still a morning star, and about the middle of the month rises two days and a half before the Sun. Mars is on the meridian at about 2 p. m. Jupiter about 3. Saturn is in conjunction with

the Sun on the 20th, while the Georgian passes the meridian at about 5 o'clock in the morning.

II. In the beginning of this month at 8 o'clock in the evening, we find a part of the Great Bear, of the Crab, the Head of the Hydra and the eastern part of the Ship, on the meridian. Aries, a part of Cassiopeia, and almost the whole of the Whale have disappeared to the Westward--Taurus and Perseus approach the horizon to the Westward--The Lion, the Star Sirius, Capella and Canopus are about midway--while Procyon and Pollux are between the meridian and the Stars just named--The Lion is now approaching the meridian to the Eastward. The Zodiacal Constellation of the Virgin (its bright Star Spica) and Bootes (in which is the bright reddish Star Arcturus) nearly the whole of the Centaur, and of the Cross, are now clear of the horizon to the Eastward.

MAY.

I. Of the Sun and Planets. On the 4th the Planets Mercury and Saturn are seen at the distance of 45 minutes from each other. On the 8th the Moon passes Antares. On the same day Mars approaches very near the Star Regulus. On the 10th Mercury and Jupiter approach one to the other within about one third of a degree. On the 21st the Sun enters Gemini. On the 23d the Moon passes β in Taurus; and on the 27th Regulus. Mercury is at the superior conjunction on the 15th and passes to the East of the Sun and becomes a Morning Star. Venus is at the greatest distance West of the Sun on the 15th. Mars is in quadrature on the 26th, and passes the meridian at about 6 p. m. and Jupiter is in conjunction with the Sun on the 4th. Saturn passes the meridian at about an hour before noon, and the Georgian at 3 o'clock in the morning.

II. The Lion is now cut by the meridian. Regulus its brightest Star, having passed about an hour to the western Stars

In the square of the Great Bear, called the Pointers from their pointing to the Pole Star, are now near the meridian, which also cuts the Hydra. Cassiopeia, Perseus, nearly the whole of Taurus, part of Orion, of the Crane and Ship Argo, have disappeared below the horizon to the westward. The Virgin (near the meridian)—the Serpent, the Northern Crown, and the zodiacal Constellation Libra are far above the horizon to the eastward—and the head of the Dragon, part of Hercules, and Antares, the bright (red) Star in the Scorpion are cut by it.

JUNE.

I. *Of the Sun and Planets.* On the 4th the Moon passes Antares. On the 11th Saturn and Venus are only a quarter of a degree distant one from the other. On the 19th the Moon passes *beta* in Taurus. On the 21st the Sun enters Cancer, being the longest day in the Northern Hemisphere and the shortest in the Southern, its duration at Madras is 12h. 46m. and the duration of the twilight about 1h. 23m. The Sun rising at 5h. 37m. and setting at 6h. 23m. The regions about the North Pole have already enjoyed the presence of the Sun three months, without his having set. That Luminary is now at his greatest altitude, and performs a circle round the horizon of the Pole, at an elevation of 23½ degrees; he continues above the horizon, approaching it three months longer, when he is lost sight of, and begins to illumine the Southern Polar regions, which had been deprived of his light, during the six months he was to the Northward of the Equator: but the Great and Beneficent Creator of the Universe, with his usual attention to the wants of those he has created, has so ordered the motion of the Moon, that when the Sun is absent from either of the Polar regions, that region has the benefit of the former when at the full; and it is only when her light is so faint as to be of little use, that the Moon is to be found in the Hemisphere illuminated by the Sun. On the 23d the Moon passes Regulus. On the 29th Jupiter and Venus are seen near together. On the 16th Mercury is at the greatest elongation East of the Sun, and is stationary on the 20th. Venus is still a Morning Star and rises about three hours before the Sun. Mars passes the meridian before 6 o'clock in the morning. Jupiter at 10 in the morning. Saturn a little earlier, and the Georgian an hour after midnight.

II. At the beginning of this month at 8 o'clock in the evening, we find the Zodiacal Constellation of the Virgin cut by the meridian, with the Stars of Charles's Heart, and Alloth in the tail of Ursa Major on the north; and the Hydra, Centaur, and Crabs on the South. The Zodiacal Constellation of the Scorpion is above the horizon to the eastward; as are the Dragon, Hercules and Serpentarius to the north. The Stars Arcturus and Spica now approach the meridian; while Antares in the Heart of the Scorpion and Vega in the Harp are nearer the horizon to the Eastward. The brilliant Constellation of Orion, the greater part of the Ship, and the Stars Aldebaran and Sirius, have disappeared. Castor, Præcyon and Pollux are approaching the horizon to the Westward, while the Great Bear and Lion are seen midway.

JULY.

I. *Of the Sun and Planets.* On the 1st the Moon passes Antares. On the 16th *delta* of Taurus, and on the 21st Regulus. On the 23d the Sun enters Leo. On the 29th the Moon again passes Antares. On the 14th Mercury is at the inferior conjunction and recedes from the Sun westerly. Venus is a morning Star and rises about 3 hours before the Sun. Mars is on the meridian at about 5h. 30m. p.m. Jupiter at 8 o'clock in the morning. Saturn an hour earlier, and the Georgian Planet at about 11 at night.

II. In the beginning of this month at eight o'clock in the evening, the Zodiacal Constellation of Libra is on the meridian; its brightest Star Zubenesh, having not long passed. On the north, the western part of the Dragon and the eastern part of Boötes are cut by the meridian; on the south the eastern Stars of the Hydra and of the Centaur are passing. The Northern Crown, the Serpent, the Star Antares in the Scorpion, with the Southern Triangle and Alcor, approach the meridian. More to the eastward, and on the northern hemisphere are seen, the Constellations Serpentarius, Hercules and the Harp—the Star Vega in the latter being of great brightness—The Swan is east of the Harp—and the Eagle south of the Swan—more south is the Zodiacal Constellation of Sagittarius, all being nearly at the same distance above the horizon. To the west, almost all the Crab has

disappeared; the Great Bear, the Lion and the Centaur approach the horizon; while at some distance above the Lion are seen the bright Stars Arcturus of Bootes and Spica of Virgo.

AUGUST.

I. Of the Sun and Planets. On the 3d the Moon is eclipsed partly visible. On the 12th the Moon passes 10° of Taurus. On the 14th Venus, and on the 16th Mercury. On the 17th the Sun is eclipsed, and the Moon passes Regulus. On the 23d the Sun enters the Constellation Virgo. On the 24th Mercury approaches very near the star Regulus in the heart of the Lion. On the 25th the Moon passes Antares, Mercury is at the greatest distance west of the Sun on the 4th, rising about 11^h. 20^m. before that luminary, and is at the superior conjunction on the 28th; Venus rises at about two hours and a half before the Sun, being still a morning star. Mars is on the meridian at 3^h. 30^m. P. M. Jupiter is in quadrature on the 20th and Saturn on the 2d; while the Georgian Planet is on the meridian at about 9 o'clock at night.

II. The eastern part of the Scorpion is on the meridian—Antares the bright (red) Star in the Heart, having passed a short time before 8 o'clock. The Dragon, Hercules (Serpentarius), and the Altar, are also cut by the meridian. Cepheus to the north—and south of that Constellation, Pegasus, the Dolphin, Capricornus, and far south the greater part of the Peacock, are visible. The western part of the Great Bear—almost the whole of the Lion, with part of the Hydra and of the Centaur, are now below the horizon.

SEPTEMBER.

I. Of the Sun and Planets. On the 8th the Moon passes 3rd in Taurus, and on the 12th Venus. On the 15th Venus is seen within half a degree of the Star Regulus. On the 21st the Moon passes Antares. On the 23d the Sun enters Libra, when it is again equal day and night over the earth. At the regions about the North Pole the Sun has gone below the horizon; his image, however, remains visible some time longer, owing to the refractive power of the atmosphere. Mercury is an evening star, and towards the end of the month sets about 12.

20^m. After the Sun. Venus is a morning star, and rises an hour and a half before the Sun. Mars is on the meridian at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. On the 9th Venus and Mercury are seen within 10° of one of the others, and on the 11th Venus and the bright Star in Libra are near together. On the 15th the Moon passes Antares. On the 23d the Sun enters Sagittarius. On the 29th the Moon again passes *beta* of Taurus. Mercury is at the inferior conjunction on the 5th, and at the greatest elongation west of the Sun on the 24th. Venus is still a morning star, but by the end of the month rises only half an hour before the Sun. Mars passes at about 2 o'clock in the afternoon. Jupiter is in opposition to the Sun on the 24th, Saturn about the middle of the month passes the meridian at about 11 at night, and the Georgian at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

II. Part of Capricorn, and of Pegasus to the north, with the Zodiacal Constellation of Aquarius, the eastern wing of the Crane, and the head of the Telescop, are on the meridian,—the bright Star Ramebant being only a few minutes east of it. Taurus in the Zodiac, Perseus to the north, and the whole and part of Eridanus to the South are now above the horizon.—the bright Star Aldebaran in Taurus, Capella in Auriga, and Achernar in Eridanus, having just risen; part of the Dragon, the Northern Crown, the western part of Hercules, and of Serpentarius, with almost the whole of Scorpio, and a small part of the Pegasus have now disappeared below the horizon.

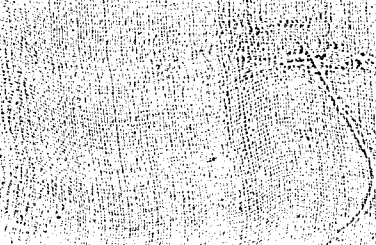

The length of the day at Madras is 11h. 14m. and the duration of the twilight about 20m.—On the 27th the Moon passes *beta* of Taurus, and on the 30th Mercury and the Georgian star reach year together. II. *Of the Stars at 8 o'clock, &c.* The Zodiacal Constellation of Pegasus is on the meridian, with Antares and Cassiopeia to the North, the western part of the Whale, the Pegasus, Telescop to the South. The brilliant Constellation of Orion is now above the horizon—the Stars Sirius, Rigel, Procyon and Pollux, are about above the head of the Great Bear is just above the horizon. The Zodiacal Constellation of Capricorn, with the Harp, the Swan and the Eagle, now approach the horizon to the westward, while half of Sagittarius has disappeared below it. 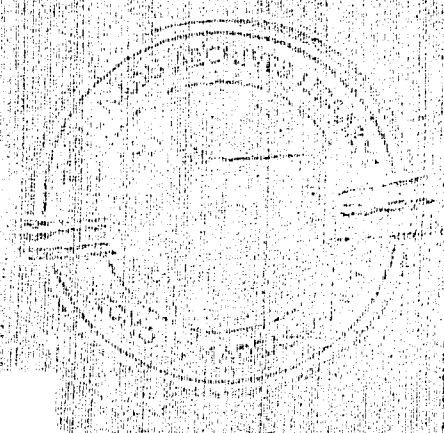

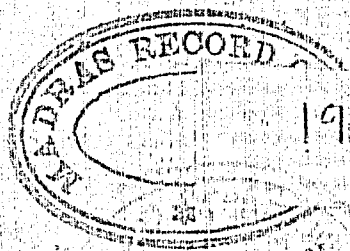
