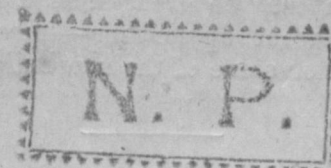

I have the honour to submit the enclosed plans with estimates amounting to Rs. 12,800 for providing the Mylapore girls' school with a suitable accommodation and to recommend that under rule 51 of the Grant-in-Aid Code a grant of Rs. 4,183 may be sanctioned. This is a third of the proposed expenditure exclusive of Rs. 250 provided for "foundation ceremonies," an item for which aid is not contemplated in the Code.

2. The necessity for the proposed accommodation is explained in column 12 of the application for aid which is herewith submitted together with a copy of the report of the institution for 1906 furnished by the management.

3. The site selected and the plan proposed appear to be suitable.

4. The management which is vested in a committee consisting of those whose names are given in column 2 of the application has the necessary funds. The committee appears to be composed of influential residents. No information is furnished as to whether it is an association registered under the Companies Act.

5. The grant, if sanctioned, may be made payable when funds become available. It is requested that permission may be granted, as a special case, to start work at once without prejudice to the grant applied for—since the ceremony in connection with the laying of the foundation stone of the new building is proposed for February 1908.

II

Memorandum No. 2954-1, Educational, dated 24th December 1907.

The Government accept the Director's recommendation that the Committee of the Mylapore girls' school be permitted to commence the construction of the proposed building without prejudicing the eligibility of the school to the grant now applied for. This permission will also be without prejudice to the right of Government to refuse the grant or to sanction it on such special conditions as the circumstances of the case may require.

Note by the Chief Engineer, Public Works Department, dated 10th March 1908.

The estimate amounting to Rs. 12,800 for constructing a girls' school at Mylapore is recommended for sanction.

If work has not already been begun, which does not seem quite clear, it would be advisable to construct the foundations as shown in the accompanying sketch.

Order—No. 205, Educational, dated 18th March 1908.

The Government are pleased to sanction a maximum grant of Rs. 4,100 towards the cost of providing the Mylapore girls' school with a suitable accommodation subject to the following conditions:—

(1) that in carrying out the work the suggestions of the Chief Engineer in his note read above are adopted;

(2) that the work is completed before the 30th of November 1909;

(3) that a certificate of the actual expenditure incurred on the work is submitted before the 28th of February 1909;

(4) that the amount expended on the work does not fall short of Rs. 12,300 as actually verified;

(5) that all other conditions prescribed in the Grant-in-Aid Code have been duly complied with.

2. On the above conditions being fulfilled the grant will be paid as funds become available.

The Director of Public Instruction submits plans and estimates amounting to Rs. 12,800 for providing the Mylapore girls' school with a suitable accommodation. This estimate includes a sum of Rs. 250 provided for "foundation ceremonies", an item for which aid is not contemplated in the Grant-in-Aid Code. The Director accordingly deducts Rs. 250 from the estimate and recommends—

(1) that under article 51 of the Grant-in-Aid Code a grant of Rs. 4,183 may be sanctioned, and

(2) that permission may be granted, as a special case, to start work at once without prejudice to the grant applied for.

2. It is submitted that in the circumstances stated by the Director of Public Instruction, his recommendations may be accepted.

This is the third year of the Administration of the School by the Committee. The Institution continues to do good work. The Committee have been able to secure for the Institution a complete set of qualified female teachers with the exception of the Religious Instructor. The immediate, urgent want of the Institution is sufficient and suitable accommodation with a play-ground for drill and out-door games.

Finances:— The Building Fund endowed last year by H. H. The Maharanee of Rewa and invested in the names of the Hon'ble Sir V. Bhashyam Aiyangar, Kt., C.I.E. and Mr. V. Krishnaswami Aiyar, B. A., B. L. now amounts



with the last year's interest to Rs 5360-12-0 and is now invested in the R. M. M. S. T. Firm of Nattukottai Chetties.

The Permanent funds did not receive much addition during the year. Statement No. 1 shows that a sum of Rs. 300 was collected during the year towards this fund which now amounts to Rs. 6,050. Out of this amount Rs. 1,050 had to be utilized for meeting current expenses and covering deficits, on account of the with-holding of the Government grants pending the revision of grants under the new Code; and the Committee hope to be able to recoup the amount as soon as the grants are sanctioned. Rs. 5,000 are invested in the R. M. M. S. T. Firm of Nattukottai Chetties in the names of the trustees. Of the amounts subscribed Rs. 1,050 yet remain to be collected.

In pursuance of the resolution of the trustees of Raja Sir T. Madhava Rao's Charities, the Government allotted a sum of Rs 2,000 with accumulations for the education of girls of Mylapore and directed the trustees to transfer the amount to the Committee. The Secretary is in correspondence with the trustees and hopes to receive from them in a short time the fund so allotted.

Statement II shows current receipts and disbursements during the year. The deficit goes on increasing from year to year and the Committee are doing all in their power to secure help from Government and other sources. The deficit at the end of 1906 is Rs 1,302-13-4.

The Committee regret they are not able to declare that the Institution is placed on a sound financial basis. The permanent funds yield annually Rs 500 on an average; the school fee income is about Rs 300 per annum; and the Government grant is Rs 600 per annum. The total annual income of the School is about Rs 1,400. The cost of establishment alone is over Rs 1,700 and the total expenditure including the cost of establishment is not less than Rs 2,500. The Committee are therefore obliged to depend

to a large extent on contributions from the public of Mylapore; but this is a source of income which requires constant and continued effort to keep up and which at best is too precarious for a sound financial condition. Experience also testifies to the same effect: and statement III shows how the monthly contributions have dwindled. The public of Mylapore however have already responded generously and liberally to the appeal of the Committee for funds in aid of the Institution and it may not be possible to expect more funds forthcoming from local contributions. The only other direction from which the Committee expect help is from Rajas, Zamindars and the Government.

The grant which the Institution enjoys with the exception of a sum Rs 40 per annum was fixed for the school, so far back as 1903 when the School was a Primary School, teaching only up to the fourth standard class with a mixed staff of 3 male and 2 female teachers and with a strength of only 78 girls on its rolls. Now that the School teaches up to the Second Form with a set of female teachers nearly double in number, and that the number of girls attending the School has also doubled itself, the Committee venture to think they have a claim for a substantial increase in the Government grant in aid of the Institution. It is hoped that the Department to whom these matters are represented will help the Committee in grappling with the situation. *

The grateful acknowledgments of the Committee are due to the subscribers for their monthly contributions and to the Hindu Association for their grant of Rs. 30 per annum, towards the salary of a Religious Instructor.

Premises:—The want of good accommodation interferes with School work and progress very badly. The Committee's efforts to secure a suitable building within the

four big streets of Mylapore, within which alone the Institution has to be housed, have not thus far met with success. The Committee, however, hope to secure one shortly. The Committee resolved more than once to add a class to the Institution where the grown up girls and women may meet in the afternoon for a few hours and receive instruction similar to that imparted by the Home Education Classes; but the resolution cannot be given effect to, till the Institution has a building and compound of its own where separate and suitable accommodation may be provided for such a class. H. H. The Maharanee of Rewa's Building Fund may not be sufficient to erect a building spacious enough for the Institution. The generous donor has again to be approached for augmenting the donation.

Staff:—Statement IV shows the staff and its changes during the year. Miss K. Appasawmi took charge of the School as Head Mistress in April 1906. The Committee is glad to note she is taking much interest in the Institution and the education of girls. K. Sundrammal who was doing excellent work as a teacher, left during the year to take up the Head Mistressship of the Municipal School at Kumbakonam; her place has been temporarily filled up by Miss R. Appasawmi, a trained Lower Secondary teacher of the year 1888. On account of the division of Infant Class into 2 sections and of the re-opening of the Second form this year, Kamakshi, a highly recommended Lower Secondary teacher, from the Presidency Training School, has been appointed to be third assistant teacher. The services of the needle work Mistress who is not a trained teacher have been dispensed with, class teachers being entrusted with the needle work of the respective classes.

* Miss R. Appasawmi has been since confirmed as first assistant.

Strength:—The year under report began with 129 girls. There were 98 admissions during the year and 73 withdrawals, leaving 154 girls at the end of the year. Of these 73 withdrawals, 66 have actually left School; on account of marriage (6), age (39), and change of residence (21), the others rejoined the School after some interval. The average attendance during the year was 109.7 or 78.5 per cent as against 84 or 65.1 per cent during 1905. 27 girls are free-scholars as against 16 free-scholars of the last year. Statement V shows the strength of each class at the end of the year.

Library:—The Library consists of 130 books. The School gets the Vivekachintamani, Vani Vilasini and the Viyavasaya Dipika. There were only 43 references to books in the Library. The Committee wish to make the Library and the reading table more attractive by the addition of books and Journals.

Results:—The school was inspected by Miss. P. F. Parsons, the Assistant Inspectress of Girls' Schools on the 24th and 25th October 1906. The General, Educational and Professional qualifications of the Head Mistress and the Assistants on the staff were declared to be as required by the Educational Rules with the single exception of the extra division of the Infant Class (needle work mistress) who holds no certificate. The Inspectress was of opinion that the condition has improved since the last inspection though some of the subjects still need attention, and considered that the general condition of the School was satisfactory and that it deserved the grant to be sanctioned for it. Discipline was considered good except in the Infant Class.

There were no other visitors to the School during the year. Owing to the insufficient accommodation of the School, the Committee hesitate to invite ladies

and gentlemen to make periodical visits to the Institution. The Secretary on seven occasions and Mr. M. Ramachandra Iyer, B.A., on one occasion visited the School and gave away the monthly prizes to the girls. The Head Mistress has been instructed this year to invite native ladies to visit the School frequently and to make them take interest in the education of their girls.

Needle work:—Mr. G. E. Sampathu Chettiar was kind enough to present the School with a Sewing Machine, and Machine Stitching is being taught from the First Form upwards.

Religious Instruction:—Statement VI shows the curriculum of Religious Instruction followed in the School.

Music:—Mr. V. C. Seshachariar's Music School held in the School premises after School hours from 4 to 6 P. M. continues to be popular and well attended and is doing good work. It consists of two sections Vocal and Instrumental, and of a two years' course in each section. The Vocal section contains 8 girls and the Instrumental section which teaches girls to play on violin (fiddle) contains 35 girls.

The fee income is Rs. 35—0—0 per mensem and the staff consisting of an Instructor and an assistant is paid Rs. 37—7—7 per mensem. The improvement and development of this Institution is highly necessary and can be done only with more local support and encouragement and by securing a grant in aid from Government.
