Scholarship for Europeans and Eurasians.

Approving the proposal of the Director of Public Instruction to award an additional Primary — in the current year and stating that the Director of Public Instruction cannot be given general permission to grant extra scholarships.

In the examinations for the award of scholarships under the Code of Regulations for European schools held in November 1907, six boys and four girls have qualified for the Primary scholarships and only four boys and three girls for the Middle school scholarships. The number of scholarships fixed in paragraph 2 of G.O., No. 415, Educational, dated 1st July 1907, is six for boys and four for girls under primary and the same number under middle grade. If this number remains unchanged, the number of primary scholarships will be fully utilized for this year but of the Middle school scholarships two for boys and one for girls will lapse, a sufficient number of pupils not having qualified for them. In submitting his remarks on the above examinations, the Inspector recommends that an extra primary scholarship may be awarded to a candidate who has obtained nearly as many marks as the successful candidates. I beg, therefore, to request that I may be permitted to award the extra Primary scholarship recommended by the Inspector from savings from the three unappropriated Middle school scholarships referred to above.

2. In this connection, I beg to request that a general permission may be granted to me for utilizing the savings from the unallotted scholarships in one grade for awarding extra scholarships in the other grades up to the limit of savings, if any, available.

Order—No. 225, Educational, dated 23rd March 1908.

The Government approve the proposal of the Director of Public Instruction to award in the current year an additional Primary scholarship for Europeans and Eurasians out of the savings in the allotment for the Middle school scholarships.

2. It does not appear that under the Code of Regulations for European schools, the Government have authority to delegate to the Director of Public Instruction the powers vested in them under article 102 of that Code. They are therefore unable to comply with his request that he may be granted general permission to utilize the savings from the unallotted scholarships of one grade for awarding extra scholarships of other grades up to the limit of the savings available. Proposals for the variation in any year, of the allocation of the scholarships as approved in G.O., No. 415, Educational, dated 1st July 1907, should therefore be submitted for the special sanction of Government.

[SUBJECT.—*Permission to utilize the Savings from unappropriated European scholarships.*]

From the Director of Public Instruction, dated 29th February 1908, No. 9381.

In paragraph 2 of G.O., No. 415, Educational, dated 1st July 1907, the Government fixed, with reference to article 102 of the Code of Regulations for European schools, the number of scholarships of each grade to be awarded to Europeans in each year and the proportion in which they should be allotted between boys and girls as follows:—

2. The Government further ruled that when one of the scholarships allotted to Paragraph 2, page 4 of G.O., No. 415, Educational, dated 1st July 1907. any one class—boys or girls—was not appropriated, the Director of Public Instruction might, in lieu of it, give an extra scholarship to the other class, provided an additional candidate had qualified in that class, and that any unappropriated scholarship in either class in excess of one should lapse for the year, unless granted with the special sanction of Government.

3. The Director of Public Instruction reports that in the examination for the award of these scholarships held in November last, only four boys and three girls qualified for the Middle school scholarships and that consequently three scholarships—two for boys and one for girls—will lapse for the year. He therefore requests that out of the savings from these three unappropriated scholarships he may be permitted to award an extra primary scholarship to a boy who has qualified for it.

4. Dr. Bourne also requests that a general permission may be granted to him for utilizing the savings from the unallotted scholarships in one grade for awarding extra scholarships in the other grades up to the limit of savings, if any, available.

5. It is for consideration whether the Director's proposals may be accepted.

The power delegated to the Director of Public Instruction in paragraph 2 of G.O., No. 415, Educational, dated 1st July 1907, to transfer *one* allotted scholarship from one class to another, applies only to the distribution of the scholarships between boys and girls. The question as to the disposal of unallotted scholarships of one grade, by utilizing them for awarding extra scholarships of other grades was not raised by the Director of Public Instruction, when the proposals regarding the scholarships were submitted by him in 1907. The present proposal of the Director of Public Instruction to award an extra Primary scholarship out of savings in the Middle school scholarships may be accepted. It is for consideration whether the general power asked for by the Director of Public Instruction to utilize savings under one grade of scholarships for allotting extra scholarships of other grades may be granted.
