I have the honour to submit the annual report on the examinations under the control of the Commissioner that were held during the year 1907-1908.

Mr. Logan acted for me till the 14th September, on which date I resumed charge of the office on return from furlough.

2. As in the previous year, there were seven examinations in all held at various centres in the Presidency. Of these, the Technical Examinations were held also in the Native States of Travancore and Mysore.

3. Detailed information in respect of each examination is given below :—

(a) *The Upper Secondary Examination.*

The total number of candidates that registered their names for the compulsory test was 456 or eighty-one more than in the previous year. Of this number, 415 presented themselves for examination, 290 of these being pupil candidates who came up from 69 institutions. Forty-three candidates were successful, 27 of whom were pupils. The percentage of success was 10. As many as 312 of the number examined and as many as 28 of the number that passed were Brahmans. Only one of the candidates examined was a female candidate (Muhammadan), and she failed.

Twenty-two candidates appeared for examination in a second language only, of whom eighteen passed.

Twenty-one candidates completed their success in the year. Including these, the total number of candidates that have passed the Upper Secondary Examination and have thus qualified themselves for appointments in "superior service," during the eighteen years that the examination has now been in existence, is only 128.

(b) *The Technical Examinations.*

The total number of individual candidates registered for the three grades of examination was 7,287, of whom 175 were for the Advanced grade, 1,759 for the Intermediate, and 5,353 for the Elementary. There was an increase in the numbers registered for all three grades. Ninety-five of the candidates for the Advanced, 523 of those for the Intermediate, and 1,042 of those for the Elementary grade were pupils, who belonged to 9, 35 and 56 different institutions, respectively.

The total number of subject-candidates examined was 9,047, of whom 3,640 were successful. There was an increase in the total number of candidates both under "examined" and "passed" as also in the percentage of subject-passes for the Advanced grade, but there was a decrease in the percentage of passes for the Elementary grade and also on the whole.

Five of the subject-candidates for the Advanced grade, 46 of those for the Intermediate, and 212 of those for the Elementary were female candidates. All the female candidates for the Advanced grade and 39 and 108 of those for the Intermediate and Elementary grades, respectively, were successful. The five female candidates for the Advanced grade came up in Needle-work and Dress-making, and the largest number of those for the Intermediate and Elementary grades took up Free-hand Outline Drawing.

The number of papers set last year for the Advanced, Intermediate and Elementary grades, respectively, was 43, 110 and 77, the number of subjects for the corresponding grades being 19, 69 and 52.

Brahmans and non-Brahman caste Hindus formed, as usual, the bulk of the subject-candidates that passed in the case of all three grades.

Sixteen diplomas, of which three were for Commerce, and 70 group certificates, among which there were two for Shorthand, were issued during the year.

Miss Thomson, a "Private" candidate of Madras, qualified herself for the silver medal of the Madras Musical Association.

(c) *The Handwriting and Dictation Test for Undergraduates.*

Two thousand one hundred and thirty-six candidates appeared for the test that was held in May and 1,259 for the test held in December as part of the Upper Secondary Examination, and 762 of the former and 268 of the latter were successful.

(d) *Examinations in connection with the Subordinate Medical Department.*

There were ten vacancies for the grade of Civil Medical Pupil, and the number that appeared for the competitive examination for this grade was 50, among whom there was not a single Muhammadan. The general education qualification required in the case of candidates for the grade of Native Military Pupil having been lowered by Government in their Order, Mis. No. 219, Educational, dated the 13th April 1907, the great majority of the candidates for the competitive examination for this grade, for which there were fourteen vacancies, were men who had passed the Lower Secondary Examination, or were duly certified to be fit for admission to the fourth form. Fourteen matriculates were examined for the grade of Madras-Burma Hospital Assistant Pupil for the twelve vacancies thrown open to competition.

(e) *Special Test Examinations.*

For these examinations, 5,345 candidates in all registered their names, 4,572 presented themselves for examination and 1,414 passed. The numbers that were registered and examined and that passed during the previous year were 5,066, 4,307 and 1,434, respectively. The results were fair on the whole. In the Revenue Test, both grades, they were good probably because candidates were allowed the use of books in answering certain papers, as sanctioned in G.O., No. 69, Educational, dated the 8th February 1907. In the Précis-writing Test, only about 11 per cent. of the candidates examined passed.

Under G.O., No. 779, Educational, dated the 27th November 1905, an examination in the Code of Criminal Procedure was held for the second time for graduates in law. Sixteen candidates were examined for the higher grade, of whom 13 were successful, while eight appeared for the lower grade, of whom seven passed.

(f) *Special Tests for Officers of the Salt, Abkari and Customs Department.*

For these tests, 273 candidates in all presented themselves, of whom 193 were successful, against 178 and 100, respectively, in the year previous. The results were good in certain tests and there was a fall in the percentage of success in Tests A (Criminal Law) and D (Engineering).

4. *Finance.*—The receipts of the Commission amounted to Rs. 67,247, or Rupees 2,639 more than in the previous year, while the expenditure, inclusive of refunds and of the charges for printing work done at private presses, was Rs. 64,224 against Rs. 61,749 in the previous year, leaving a surplus of Rs. 3,023.

5. An inventory of valuable stock was duly maintained and checked during the year.
