Sanctioning the proposition statement for the employment of an additional teacher on Rs. 30 per mensem in the Hobart Training School for Mistresses for teaching exclusively needle-work to the pupils of the practising section.

Letter—from the Hon'ble Mr. A. G. BOURNE, D.Sc., F.R.S., C.I.E., Director of Public Instruction, Madras.

I have the honour to request you will be so good as to obtain the sanction of Government to the entertainment from the 1st March 1909 of an additional teacher on Rs. 30 per mensem in the Government Hobart Training School for Mistresses for teaching exclusively needle-work to the pupils of the practising section.

The Inspectress of Girls' Schools, Central Circle, reports that the number of pupils admitted to the Training section from the practising department is now very small, that the parents of the great majority of the pupils have no intention that their children should become teachers, and that most of the pupils leave the school without completing their school course with the result that they soon forget what little they have learnt in the school. She, therefore, suggests that an industrial side should be attached to the school and that pupils who do not show much mental capacity should be drafted into it to learn needle-work for half the day so that if they should develop an aptitude for the subject they would be furnished with a means of obtaining a livelihood later. It is intended that the above industry should be strictly Indian in material, colour and design and that an allotment of Rs. 300 should be made in the next budget under contingencies for cost of material, tools, etc. I consider that the proposal is worth a trial and, accordingly, beg to recommend it for sanction as an experimental measure for two years from 1st March 1909. A proposition statement for the pay of the new teacher is herewith submitted and the necessary provision for it will be made in the Budget Estimate for 1909-10, in anticipation of sanction.

[SUBJECT.—*Employment of an additional teacher for teaching needle-work in the Government Hobart Training School for Mistresses, Madras.*]

From the Director of Public Instruction, dated 15th September 1908,
No. 3803.

The Director of Public Instruction requests the sanction of Government to the employment from the 1st March 1909 of an additional teacher on Rs. 30 *per mensem* in the Government Hobart Training School for Mistresses for teaching exclusively needle-work to the pupils of the practising section.

2. The Director of Public Instruction states that the number of pupils admitted to the training section from the practising department of the Hobart Training School is very small; that the parents of the great majority of the pupils have no intention that their children should become teachers; and that most of the pupils leave the school without completing their school course, with the result that they soon forget what little they have learnt in the school. He adds that the Inspectress of Schools,

3. The Director of Public Instruction considers that the proposal is worth a trial and recommends that it may be sanctioned as an experimental measure for two years from the 1st March 1909.

4. The Director further states that the needle-work to be taught would be strictly "Indian" in material, colour and design, and that provision will, in anticipation of sanction, be made in the budget estimate for 1909-1910 for the pay of the additional teacher proposed and for the purchase of material and tools required.

5. It is for consideration whether the Director's proposal may be approved.

The Director of Public Instruction's proposal seems to be acceptable.

K. RANGASWAMI AIYANGAR—8-10-08.

The proposal is all right in a sense, but it shows clearly that the Hobart Training School is not used by the majority of the pupils for the purpose for which it is intended. If this proposal is sanctioned, the school will be turned into a combined training and industrial school which is a curious combination. If an industrial school is wanted it should, I submit, be separate. The Hobart School is primarily for training teachers. Those pupils who do not intend to become teachers should go elsewhere.

There are two sections in the school, viz., the training section and the practising section. Those who are admitted to the training section are admitted with the object of their becoming teachers at some future date, i.e., teachers in subjects of general education.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE
SECRETARIAT.

(a) If a paper is marked to be printed
urgently, the Superintendent of the section
concerned should sign the Press slip. The
Superintendent should exercise a careful discre-
tion in the matter.

(b) Each letter, memorandum, or order, or set
of orders, in the file of correspondence should be
headed in succession with the Roman numeral I,
II, III, etc., the number being written in red ink
or blue chalk above the item. The particular
papers to be printed in the special issue-copies
should be indicated by the Roman numeral (I,
II, etc.) by which that item has been headed in
the correspondence file. All matter, including
marginal remarks or references, to be printed
should be written in ink and matter which should
not be printed should be encircled. Initials and
signatures that are not quite legible should be
re-written distinctly.

(b¹) For rules regarding printing of notes,
see the rules in G.O., No. 1220, Public, dated
30th November 1900.

(c) The number of copies and the details of
distribution should be filled in by the Superin-
tendent or Referencer concerned.

(d) In the absence of special instructions to
the Press to keep matter standing for a specified
period, ordinary papers of 8 pages and under
will be kept standing for one week, and larger
papers for two weeks only. The type of notes
and of all confidential papers is distributed
immediately after striking.

(e) This slip, properly and completely
filled in, should accompany every paper sent to
Press; it will be returned by the Press when
proofs are furnished; it should be sent to the
Press when a call is made for revised proofs or
when a corrected proof is sent for striking.
When finally returned by Press it should be
filed with the original order or letter.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE PRESS.

(a) If, in the opinion of the Superintendent of
the Press, a paper has been marked urgent
unnecessarily, he should send the Press slip to
the Deputy Registrar with a remark to that
effect.

(b) Unless a note to the contrary is made
against the matter, pencil entries should not

may bring to the notice of the Deputy Registrar
any instance of incomplete or careless editing.

(c) Signature copies of letters to the
Secretary of State or to the Government of
India should be printed on hand-made paper.

are returned corrected and should be finally
returned to the Secretariat when struck-off
copies are supplied.
