Approving the rules submitted by the Director of Public Instruction for regulating the payment of — to students of training schools other than teachers employed in Government, Local or Municipal schools.

ABSTRACT.—Informing the Director of Public Instruction that the Government are not prepared to address the Government of India for sanction to the payment to private students in Training Schools and Colleges of travelling allowances for the journey from the training institutions.

With reference to G.O., No. 530, Educational, dated 13th July 1908, I have the honour to request you to be so good as to obtain the early sanction of Government to the introduction of the following set of rules with effect from 1st January 1909 which is the date from which I intend bringing into force the last sentence of article 123 of the Madras Educational Rules so far as it is applicable to the payment of travelling allowances to private students for the journey to the training institutions:—

“(i) Collegiate and secondary grade students shall be treated as third-class officers under article 1002 of the Civil Service Regulations, drawing less than Rs. 50, and shall receive travelling allowance as for journeys on transfer.

“(ii) Elementary grade students shall be treated as fourth-class officers, not ministerial or menial, and shall receive travelling allowance as for journeys on transfer.

“(iii) The station from which travelling allowance is admissible to students of any grade shall be the school which they leave for the course of training or in the case of those who are not employed in a school their place of residence as shown in their application for admission.

“(iv) The allowances shall be drawn in consolidated bills by the Principals in the case of training colleges, and by the Headmaster or Headmistress in the case of training schools, the bills in the case of training schools being countersigned by the Inspector of European and Training Schools or by the Inspectress of the Circle.”

G.O., No. 530, Educational, dated 13th July 1908, disapproves of the payment of travelling allowances to private students in training institutions only for their journeys from them, but as it has not explicitly sanctioned the rules in so far as they relate to the payment of travelling allowances for their journeys to such institutions, the Accountant-General considers a further reference to Government necessary.

Order—No. 783, Educational, dated 23rd November 1908.

The rules submitted by the Director of Public Instruction for regulating the payment of travelling allowances to students of training schools, other than teachers employed in Government, Local or Municipal schools, are approved. The travelling allowance will be for a single journey for joining the training institution.

2. For the last sentence of rule 123 of the Educational Rules, 5th edition, will be substituted the following, namely,—

“Other students shall be allowed travelling allowances from public funds for a single journey on joining the institutions in accordance with the following rules:—

“(i) Collegiate and secondary grade students shall be treated as third-class officers under article 1002 of the Civil Service Regulations drawing less than Rs. 50, and shall receive travelling allowance as for journeys on transfer.

“(ii) Elementary grade students shall be treated as fourth-class officers, not ministerial or menial, and shall receive travelling allowance as for journeys on transfer.

“(iii) The station from which travelling allowance is admissible to students of any grade shall be the school which they leave for the course of training or in the case of those who are not employed in a school, their place of residence as shown in their application for admission.

“(iv) The allowances shall be drawn in consolidated bills by the Principals in the case of training colleges, and by the Headmaster or Headmistress in the case of training schools, the bills in the case of training schools being countersigned by the Inspector of European and Training Schools or by the Inspectress of the Circle.”

[SUBJECT.—*Rules regulating the payment of travelling allowances to
private students undergoing training.*]

From the Director of Public Instruction, dated 10th September 1908, No. 8032.

Please see G.O., No. 530, Educational, dated 13th July 1908, and the notes therewith.

2. In that order the Government refused to address the Government of India for sanction to the payment of travelling allowances to private students under training for the journey *from* the training institutions. Consequently, the draft rules submitted for sanction by the Director of Public Instruction for regulating the payment of travelling allowance to private students for their journeys both *to* and *from* the training institutions were not approved.

3. The Director now submits for sanction a revised draft of the rules providing for the payment of travelling allowance to private students for the journey *to* the training institutions. The draft rules run:—

“(i) Collegiate and secondary grade students shall be treated as third-class officers under article 1002 of the Civil Service Regulations, drawing less than Rs. 50, and shall receive travelling allowance as for journeys on transfer.”

“(ii) Elementary grade students shall be treated as fourth class officers, not ministerial or menial, and shall receive travelling allowance as for journeys on transfer.

“(iii) The station from which travelling allowance is admissible to students of any grade shall be the school which they leave for the course of training or, in the case of those who are not employed in a school, their place of residence as shown in their application for admission.

“(iv) The allowances shall be drawn in consolidated bills by the principals in the case of training colleges, and by the Headmaster or Headmistress in the case of training schools, the bills in the case of training schools being countersigned by the Inspector of European and Training Schools or by the Inspectress of the Circle.”

4. The Accountant-General states that there is no audit objection to the rules being approved by Government.

5. The draft put up is submitted for approval.

The draft appears to be incomplete. It does not make it clear that the rules apply only to students *other* than teachers employed in Government, Local or Municipal institutions, nor is it made clear that the allowance is only for a *single* journey *to join* the institution.

A preliminary qualifying sentence seems necessary: "Other students shall be allowed travelling expenses from public funds for a single journey on joining the institution in accordance with the following rules:—"

2. The draft order appears to require amplification as the Educational Rules are to be altered, and the alteration should be set out in full. Are there any classes of students other than "Private students" to whom the last sentence of article 123 of the Educational Rules applies?

A revised draft is submitted for approval.

2. Students of training schools fall under the following classes:—

Vide rule 115 of the Educational Rules, page 28. (1) Teachers employed in public schools;

(2) Persons to whom Local Boards or Municipal Councils have given provisional appointments in schools under their management;

(3) Village schoolmasters to whom teaching is a regular profession, and whose schools are about to come under departmental inspection;

(4) Persons specially selected by managers, or headmasters, or headmistresses, under an agreement to return as teachers; and

(5) Persons desirous of adopting the teacher's profession.

The first two classes of students appear to come under the head "Teachers employed in Government, Local or Municipal schools" and the remaining three classes under the "private students". It will thus be observed that all students other than teachers in schools under public management come under the category of "private students".

A copy of the Civil Service Regulations is submitted.

2. For the purposes of travelling allowance, officers are divided into four classes—*vide* article 1002 of the Civil Service Regulations.

In the third class are included all officers in the *superior* service not included in the first or second class. Generally speaking, all officers, in superior service drawing Rs. 100 and less, who are not specially classed as second class officers, belong to the third class. All officers in *inferior* service are included in the fourth class.

3. Under articles 1011, 1012 and 1091 of the Civil Service Regulations, an officer of the third class drawing less than Rs. 50 *per mensem*, is entitled for journeys on transfer to double third class fare, for journeys by railway; and to a mileage of two annas for journeys by road (article 1034, Civil Service Regulations).

4. An officer of the fourth class is entitled to single third class fare by railway (article 1012, Civil Service Regulations) and to a mileage of 1 anna by road (article 1034, Civil Service Regulations).
