The Inspectress of Girls' Schools, Southern Circle, reports that the teachers in the Government Girls' schools in her Circle who were all trained under the old system are unable to carry out the new curricula for Elementary Girls' schools and employ intelligently modern methods of teaching and she considers that in order to make them useful and increase the efficiency of the schools it is necessary to give them definite instruction in the teaching of such subjects as Drawing, Needle-work, Health and House management, Arithmetic, Geography, Drill and Games. With this object she proposes to hold regular classes at Coimbatore, her head-quarters, during the ensuing Christmas holidays with the help of the staffs of the Coimbatore and Calicut Training Schools for Mistresses and with that of paid outside lecturers,

as noted in the margin, for whom it is proposed to allow remuneration at Rs. 25 per course of lectures delivered. The Assistant and Sub-Assistant Inspectresses who will also attend will be required to deliver special lectures in school organization and discipline. It is not proposed to make the attendance of teachers compulsory, but it is expected that about 70 teachers will attend.

The total cost of the scheme is estimated at Rs. 750 as per details given below:—

[SUBJECT.—*Vacation classes to be held at Coimbatore during the ensuing Christmas vacation.*]

G.O., No. 786, Educational, dated 3rd December 1906.

From the Director of Public Instruction, dated 6th November 1908, No. 6071.

At the instance of the Inspectress of Girls' Schools, Southern Circle, the Director of Public Instruction proposes to institute at Coimbatore during the ensuing Christmas holidays regular classes with the object of giving definite instruction in such subjects as drawing, needle-work, health and house management, arithmetic, geography, drill and games to the teachers in Government Girls' Schools of the Southern Circle. The total cost of the scheme is estimated at Rs. 750 as follows:—

1. Remuneration to outside lecturers for eight lecturers at Rs. 25 each.	RS. 200
2. Travelling allowance at single rates and mileage, without daily allowance.	500
3. Contingencies	50

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SECRETARIAT.
