Halting allowances.

Sanctioning, as a special case, the payment to Mr. W. E. Middlemast and M.R.Ry. A. C. Pranatartihara Aiyar of — at half the rates ordinarily admissible for the days in excess of ten during which they were required to halt at Ootacamund in connection with the meeting of the Committee on the scheme for the School Final Examination and for inspection of European schools.

ABSTRACT.—Requesting the Accountant-General to pass to the official members of the Committee appointed to consider the scheme for the institution of a School Final Examination the travelling and daily allowances they are entitled to under the rules; and permitting Mr. Hadaway, as a special case, to draw halting allowance at half the rates ordinarily admissible for days halted at Ootacamund in excess of ten.

With reference to G.O., No. 663, Educational, dated 15th September 1908, I have the honour to state that Mr. Middlemast and M.R.Ry. A. C. Pranatartihara Aiyar had also to halt at Ootacamund on the same duty for more than ten days, and I request that you will be so good as to obtain the sanction of Government for their drawing, as a special case, like Mr. Hadaway, under article 1056 (b) of the Civil Service Regulations, halting allowance at half the rates ordinarily admissible for days halted at Ootacamund in excess of ten.

With reference to his letter R.C. No. 4164, dated 7th October 1908, requesting that Mr. Middlemast and M.R.Ry. Pranatartihara Aiyar may be permitted as a special case to draw halting allowance at half the rates ordinarily admissible for days halted at Ootacamund in excess of ten, the Director of Public Instruction is requested to state the total number of days Mr. Middlemast halted at Ootacamund in connection with the School Final Examination Committee and with inspection duty respectively.

Under article 1056 (b) of the Civil Service Regulations, the Government sanction, as a special case, the payment to Mr. W. E. Middlemast and M.R.Ry. A. C. Pranatartihara Aiyar of halting allowance at half the rates ordinarily admissible for the days in excess of ten during which they were required to halt at Ootacamund in May and June 1908 in connection with the Committee to consider the scheme for the School Final Examination and for inspection of European schools.

NOTES CONNECTED WITH G.O., No. 791, EDUCATIONAL,
DATED 26TH NOVEMBER 1908.

[SUBJECT.—*Exemption of Messrs. Middlemast and Pranartihara Aiyar who served on the School Final Examination Committee from the operation of article 1056 (b) of the Civil Service Regulations.*]

Previous paper.

G.O., No. 663, Educational, dated 15th September 1908.

From the Director of Public Instruction, dated 7th October 1908, No. 4164.

Please see G.O., No. 663, Educational, dated 15th September 1908, and the notes connected therewith.

2. In that order Mr. Hadaway, one of the official members of the Committee appointed to consider the scheme for the institution of a School Final Examination, was permitted, as a special case, to draw halting allowance at half the rates ordinarily admissible for the days he halted at Ootacamund in excess of 10. As regards the other official members of the Committee the Accountant-General was requested to pass to them the travelling and daily allowances they would be entitled to under the rules.

3. The Director of Public Instruction now states that Mr. Middlemast and M.R.Ry. Pranartihara Aiyar, two other official members of the School Final Examination Committee, had also to halt at Ootacamund for more than 10 days and requests that, like Mr. Hadaway, they may also be permitted as a special case to draw halting allowance at half the rates ordinarily admissible for days halted at Ootacamund in excess of 10.

4. The cases of Mr. Middlemast and M.R.Ry. Pranartihara Aiyar were considered in connection with the orders passed in Mr. Hadaway's case in G.O., No. 663, Educational, dated 15th September 1908, and it was then decided that specific application from the Director of Public Instruction on their behalf might be awaited—*vide* pages 3 and 4 of K.W. G.O., No. 663, Educational, dated 15th September 1908.

5. The Director of Public Instruction has now made a special recommendation and it is for consideration whether his recommendation may be accepted.

T.K.—18-10-08.

In his note, dated 14th August 1908, on page 3 of K.W. G.O., No. 663, Educational, dated 15th September 1908, the Secretary noted—

" . . . of the officials, Nos. 2 and 5 (Mr. Hadaway and Mr. Pranartihara Aiyar) would not have come to Ootacamund in the ordinary course. They may be allowed full halting allowance for the period of their stay.

" 2. Mr. Middlemast doubtless combined this work with his duties as Inspector of European and Training Schools: his case should be specially sent up for orders with reference to his total stay."

2. Attention is also solicited to the notes of the Financial Department and to the Secretary's later note, dated 8th September 1908, on page 4 of K.W. to the same Government Order.

3. The Director of Public Instruction now recommends that, as a special case, Mr. Middlemast and Mr. Pranartihara Aiyar may be granted halting allowance at half rates for the days they halted at Ootacamund in excess of 10.

K. RANGASWAMI AIYANGAR—19-10-08.

The same rates as those granted to Mr. Hadaway may be granted to these two officers. Mr. Pranartihara Aiyar came to Ootacamund specially for this meeting and Mr. Middlemast would probably not have stayed so long in the ordinary course of his tour if he had not to serve on the Committee.

Mr. Pranartihara Aiyar's case is the same as that of Mr. Hadaway and may be dealt with on the same lines, but as regards Mr. Middlemast's a further reference may be made to the Director of Public Instruction as to the total period of his stay at Ootacamund in connection both with the Committee and also inspection duty.

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SECRETARIAT.

(a) If a paper is marked to be printed urgently, the Superintendent of the section concerned should sign the Press slip. The Superintendent should exercise a careful discretion in the matter.

(b) Each letter, memorandum, or order, or set of orders, in the file of correspondence should be headed in succession with the Roman numeral I, II, III, etc., the number being written in red ink or blue chalk above the item. The particular papers to be printed in the special issue-copies should be indicated by the Roman numeral (I, II, etc.) by which that item has been headed in the correspondence file. All matter, including marginal remarks or references, to be printed should be written in ink and matter which should not be printed should be encircled. Initials and signatures that are not quite legible should be re-written distinctly.

(b1) For rules regarding printing of notes, see the rules in G.O., No. 1220, Public, dated 30th November 1900.

(c) The number of copies and the details of distribution should be filled in by the Superintendent or Referencer concerned.

(d) In the absence of special instructions to the Press to keep matter standing for a specified period, ordinary papers of 8 pages and under will be kept standing for one week, and larger papers for two weeks only. The type of notes and of all confidential papers is distributed immediately after striking.

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(a) If, in the opinion of the Superintendent of the Press, a paper has been marked urgent unnecessarily, he should send the Press slip to the Deputy Registrar with a remark to that effect.

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(d) This slip should be returned by the Press to the Secretariat when proofs are furnished; it will be sent back to the Press when proofs are returned corrected and should be finally returned to the Secretariat when struck-off copies are supplied.
