Establishment.

Approving the proposal of the Director of Public Instruction for the appointment of an additional lecturer for History and of two attenders for the Government College, Rajahmundry.

Letter—from the Hon'ble Mr. A. G. BOURNE, D.Sc., F.R.S., C.I.E., Director of Public Instruction.

I have the honour to submit for the sanction of Government the following proposals in regard to the additions to the staff and establishment of the Rajahmundry Arts College required from 1st January next in view to meet the requirements of the new University Regulations.

2. The Principal recommends the addition of two lecturers—one lecturer of the Provincial Educational Service to control the History section, as the College has been affiliated in Group III of the Intermediate course (History and Logic) and as it is proposed that it should be affiliated in Group V of the ordinary B.A. course (History and Economics), and one assistant lecturer of the subordinate Educational Service to undertake the Chemistry work in connection with optional subject I of the Intermediate course and Chemistry of branch II-A of the present B.A. course; he further suggests the employment of two additional attenders, one for the laboratory and the other for the library.

3. From the enclosed statements giving details as to the present and proposed distribution of work furnished by the Principal it may be gathered that two additional lecturers would seem to be necessary, one for the Chemistry and the other for the History work. A careful scrutiny of the distribution statements, however, discloses the fact that while at present the four lecturers and assistants devote on the average 58½ hours per week to *English*, their work will be reduced to 48 hours only under the new scheme. The number of lecturers for *English* will, I am persuaded, then admit of being reduced from four to three and the assistant thus set free may well be deputed to undertake the Chemistry work. In this case one extra lecturer, who should be a member of the Provincial Educational Service, should, I consider, suffice, and he may do the History work.

I beg also to recommend that an additional laboratory attender on Rs. 10 and a library attender on the same pay be sanctioned. At present there is a laboratory attender on Rs. 12, but even with the science teaching of the B.A. course a single attender is considered insufficient. The services of an additional attender will, therefore, be quite necessary with the introduction of Chemistry work in the Intermediate classes. As for a library attender, the librarian whose work is gradually increasing and who has been managing it unaided, now requires the assistance of an attender.

4. The extra cost for the two months of the current year may be met from the provision of Rs. 20,000 for the equipment and organization of Arts Colleges in the current year's budget.

5. The usual proposition statement will be submitted on receipt of orders on this communication.

The Government agree with the Director of Public Instruction in considering that the requirements of the Government College, Rajahmundry, will be met if one additional lecturer be appointed for History. They are accordingly pleased to approve the addition to the staff of the College of a lecturer who will be placed in the last grade of the Provincial Educational Service. The Government of India will be addressed to sanction an additional appointment in the Provincial Educational Service. The appointment of two attenders on Rs. 10 each — one for the laboratory and the other for the library — is also approved.

2. A proposition statement embodying the proposals accepted in this order should be submitted to Government through the Accountant-General at an early date.

[SUBJECT.—*Proposals for additions to the staff and establishment of the Government College, Rajahmundry, to meet the requirements of the new University Regulations.*]

Under the old University Regulations, the Government College at Rajahmundry was affiliated to the Madras University in the following subjects:—

- (i) Mathematics,
- (ii)-A. Advanced Physics, and
- (iv) Mental and Moral Science.

2. Article 189 of the new University Regulations prescribes the following courses of study for the B.A. degree examination:—

Part I.—English Language and Literature.
Part II.—One of the following groups:—

- (i) Mathematics.
- (ii)-A. Physical Science (Physics).
- (ii)-B. Physical Science (Chemistry).
- (iii) Natural Science.
- (iv) Logic, Psychology and Ethics.
- (v) History and Economics.
- (vi) Two languages already studied in the Intermediate course, with portions of the history and literature of both languages.

3. In G.O., No. 387, Educational, dated 18th June 1907, the Government approved the proposal of the Director of Public Instruction to affiliate the Rajahmundry College to the University in the following subjects for the B.A. (Pass) degree under the new Regulations:—

- (i) Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry.
- (ii) Ancient History, modern history, logic.
- (iv) Ancient or modern history, a classical language, a second classical language.
- (i) Mathematics.
- (ii)-A. Physical Science (Physics).
- (iv) Logic, Psychology and Ethics.
- (v) History and Economics.
- (vi) Two languages studied in the Intermediate course.

The Director of Public Instruction was at the same time requested to address the Government separately regarding the employment of the additional establishment required to teach the additional courses.

4. The Director of Public Instruction now submits proposals for the additional establishment required. He states that the Principal (Mr. Mark Hunter) recommends the appointment of two lecturers—one in the Provincial Educational Service to control the History section, and one Assistant Lecturer in the Subordinate Educational Service to undertake the Chemistry work in connection with the optional subject (i) of the Intermediate course and Branch (ii)-A of the B.A. course. Mr. Mark Hunter further requests sanction to the employment of two attenders—one for the laboratory and the other for the library.

5. The Director of Public Instruction, however, considers that the appointment of a Lecturer in the Provincial Educational Service to do the History work will suffice and that the appointment of an assistant lecturer is not necessary. His reasons for this view are (1) that at present there are four lecturers including assistants for English, (2) that these four have on the average $58\frac{1}{2}$ hours' work per week, (3) that under the new scheme their work will be reduced to 48 hours only, (4) that therefore the number of lecturers for English can be reduced from four to three; and that the assistant lecturer thus set free may be deputed to undertake the Chemistry work.

6. The Director considers that two additional attenders—one for the laboratory and the other for the library—as required by the Principal are necessary and recommends their appointment. He considers that the attenders should be paid Rs. 10 each.

The question of re-grading and re-grouping the service is separately under consideration. It would be better to allow for an extra appointment in the Provincial Educational Service in the 7th grade on Rs. 350.

Meantime the addition may be to the Rs. 200 grade.

8. There is a lump provision of Rs. 20,000 in the current year's budget for the equipment and organization of Arts Colleges. The Director of Public Instruction states that the cost of the additional establishment proposed by him can be met from this provision.

9. It is for consideration whether the proposal of the Director of Public Instruction may be approved. Under article 76 of the Civil Service Regulations, the sanction of the Government of India is necessary to the addition of one appointment to the cadre of the Provincial Educational Service.

When proposals are sanctioned in respect of all these institutions, consolidated proposals may go to India for the reorganization of the Provincial Educational Service and the number to be placed in each grade can be considered accordingly.
