I have the honour to submit herewith copy of letter No. 75/5828, dated 1st October 1909, with its enclosures and to request that, in the circumstances stated therein, you will be good enough to obtain the sanction of Government for the issue of the following amendment to the rules for the training of Hospital Assistants, approved in G.O., No. 721, Educational, dated 30th October 1907.

(1) Rule 9.—After “qualification” in line 4 add:—“Ward orderly native military pupils will receive instead, their regimental pay and good conduct pay and allowances and will not be seconded in their regiments while under instruction. They will be struck off the strength of their regiments on the completion of their medical training, when they will join the Indian Subordinate Medical Department under the usual conditions of service.”

In the penultimate line, for “they” read “all native military pupils”.

(2) Rule 28.—Add at the end of the rule—

“Service as ward orderly will not count towards a Hospital Assistant's pension.”

It was recently brought to my notice that a ward orderly native military pupil who came out successful in the examination for Hospital Assistants, was immediately ordered by the Superintendent of the Medical school to report for duty to the Senior Medical Officer, Madras Brigade, without due intimation being given to the Officer Commanding the Regiment to which the ward orderly was attached.

2. After protracted correspondence as to how these ward orderlies should be considered while undergoing instruction (copies of letters No. 6441, dated 7th August 1909 and No. 7351, dated 9th September 1909 enclosed), the Director-General has decided that they should be considered as attached to the Regiment under paragraph 907 (d), Army Regulations, India, Volume I, and not as seconded in the regiments as, in the absence of any specific instructions, is implied in paragraph 2 of the rules for the training of Hospital Assistants.

3. I have therefore the honour to request that you will be good enough to obtain the sanction of Government for the issue of the following amendment to the rules for the training of Hospital Assistants in Medical Schools—

(1) Rule 9.—After “qualification” in line 4, add—“Ward orderly native military pupils will receive instead, their regimental pay and good conduct pay and allowances and will

not be seconded in their regiments while under instruction. They will be struck off the strength of their regiments on completion of their medical training, when they will join the Indian Subordinate Medical Department under the usual conditions of service.”

In the penultimate line, for “they” read “all native military pupils”.

(2) Rule 28.—Add at the end of the rule—

“Service as ward orderly will not count towards Hospital Assistant's pension.”

I have the honour to acknowledge your letter No. 89/T. 68, dated the 22nd July 1909, in which you enquire whether any part of the provisions of G. O. C. 539 of 1899 may be construed as still effective. In reply I have the honour to point out that paragraph 7 of that order is reproduced in Army Regulations, India, Volume I, paragraph 907 (d), where it is laid down that “a ward orderly admitted to a Medical school receives regimental pay and allowances”. This clearly implies that they are not seconded.

2. As regards paragraphs 8 and 9 of the order, I think there can be no question that they too are still operative.

3. India Army Order 155 of 1906 was based on Government of India, Military Department, letter No. 4202-D, dated the 24th September 1905, a copy of which was forwarded to you with this office Memorandum No. 6053, dated 25th October 1905. This letter cancelled the special facilities for admission enjoyed by ward orderlies except higher age limit; but it was not intended to modify the rules regarding their pay, which were defined in Army Regulations, India, Volume I, paragraph 907, quoted above.

With reference to your letter No. 89/T. 87, dated the 16th August 1909, I have the honour to say that the necessary information is contained in paragraph 907 (d), Army Regulations, India, Volume I, and that Government therefore will never agree to repeat this information by making any addition to paragraph 1, Appendix II, Army Regulations, India, Volume VI, regarding the admission of ward orderlies as military medical pupils. The additions proposed may be made to the “Rules and Regulations of the Hospital Assistant Department” which are issued under your orders.

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 4762, dated 30th August 1905, submitting, with reference to Military Department No. 286-D, dated 13th January 1904, a report on the further trial of the scheme sanctioned in Military Department No. 1805-D, dated

10th May 1899, for the training of ward orderlies as military Hospital Assistants. The results obtained conclusively show that the measure has failed owing to the want of preliminary education and general intelligence of the ward orderlies sent to medical schools. It is therefore recommended that the orders contained in Military Department No. 1805-D, dated 10th May 1899, regarding the admission of ward orderlies to medical schools as native military pupils be cancelled and that in future ward orderlies should be subject to the same conditions * as apply to ordinary candidates for admission to a medical school with a view to qualifying as Hospital Assistants, with the modification that the maximum age may, in their case, be extended to 25 years. Each applicant must also furnish a recommendation from the medical officer under whom he may be serving.

2. In reply I am to say that the Government of India accept your recommendation. I am to add that it is undesirable to lower the standard of medical education by admitting to a medical college any individual whose preliminary education and general intelligence are not such as to enable him to derive full benefit from the course of training.

Order—No. 615, Educational, dated 22nd November 1909.

The amendments proposed by the Director of Public Instruction to rules 9 and 28 of the rules for the training of Hospital Assistants in medical schools are approved. The rules as amended will stand as follows:—

“9. Native military pupils will be allowed in addition to free-quarters, clothing and books, and appliances for study, a stipend at the rate of Rs. 7 a month throughout the whole course with Rs. 2 a month extra for English qualification. Instead of a stipend, ward orderly native military pupils will receive their regimental pay and good conduct pay and allowances and will not be seconded in their regiments while under instruction. They will be struck off the strength of their regiments on the completion of their medical training, when they will join the Indian Subordinate Medical Department under the usual conditions of service. These rates of pay are inclusive of compensation for dearness of provisions. When not provided with free-quarters, all native military pupils will receive the hutting allowances authorised for havildars.”

“28. A Hospital Assistant is entitled to retire after a service of thirty years reckoning from the date of appointment to the rank of third-class Hospital Assistant on a pension equal to one-half his average pay (including extra pay for English qualification) during the preceding five years. Retirement is compulsory at the age of fifty-five years. Service as ward orderly will not count towards Hospital Assistant's pension.”

[SUBJECT.—Amendments to the rules for the training of hospital assistants.]

Previous paper.

G.O., No. 721, Educational, dated 30th October 1907.

From the Director of Public Instruction, dated 18th October 1909, No. 6723.

In G.O., No. 721, Educational, dated 30th October 1907, the Government approved the revised rules and regulations for the training of hospital assistants in the medical schools in this presidency. Rule 2 of these rules stated that “ward orderlies recommended by the medical officer under whom they are serving may compete for the hospital assistant class under the same conditions except that in their case the maximum age limit is extended to 25 years.” The question was recently raised by the Surgeon-General whether the ward orderlies under training in medical schools should be regarded as “seconded” or as “attached” to their regiments. The Director-General, Indian Medical Service, to whom the point was referred by Paragraph 2 of Surgeon-General's letter, the Surgeon-General has decided that under paragraph 907 (d) of the Army Regulations, India, Volume I, they should be considered as attached to the regiment and not as seconded in the regiments.

2. To make this point clear in the rules for the training of hospital assistants the Director of Public Instruction proposes certain amendments to rules 9 and 28. These are reproduced below with the proposed amendments underlined:—

Rule 9.—“Native military pupils will be allowed in addition to free quarters, clothing and books, and appliances for study, a stipend at the rate of Rs. 7 a month throughout the whole course with Rs. 2 a month extra for English qualification. Ward orderly native military pupils will receive instead, their regimental pay and good conduct pay and allowances and will not be seconded in their regiments while under instruction. They will be struck off the strength of their regiments on the completion of their medical training, when they will join the Indian Subordinate medical department under the usual conditions of service. These rates of pay are inclusive of compensation for dearness of provisions. When not provided with free-quarters, [they] will receive the hutting allowances authorised for havildars.”

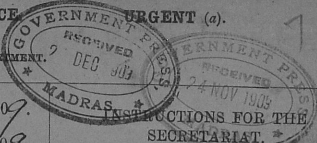

(a) If a paper is marked to be printed urgently, the Superintendent of the section concerned should sign the Press slip. The Superintendent should exercise a careful discretion in the matter.

(b) Each letter, memorandum, or order, or set of orders, in the file of correspondence should be headed in succession with the Roman numeral I, II, III, etc., the number being written in red ink or blue chalk above the item. The particular papers to be printed in the special issue-copies should be indicated by the Roman numeral (I, II, etc.) by which that item has been headed in the correspondence file. All matter, including marginal remarks or references, to be printed should be written in ink and matter which should not be printed should be encircled. Initials and signatures that are not quite legible should be re-written distinctly.

(b) For rules regarding printing of notes, see the rules in G.O., No. 1220, Public, dated 30th November 1900.

(c) The number of copies and the details of distribution should be filled in by the Superintendent or reference concerned.

(d) In the absence of special instructions to the Press to keep matter standing for a specified period, ordinary papers of 8 pages and under will be kept standing for one week, and larger papers for two weeks only. The type of notes and of all confidential papers is distributed immediately after striking.

(e) This slip, properly and completely filled in, should accompany every paper sent to Press; it will be returned by the Press when proofs are furnished; it should be sent to the Press when a call is made for revised proofs or when a corrected proof is sent for striking. When finally returned by Press it should be filed with the original order or letter.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE PRESS.

(a) If in the opinion of the Superintendent of the Press, a paper has been marked urgent unnecessarily, he should send the Press slip to the Deputy Registrar with a remark to that effect.

(b) Unless a note to the contrary is made against the matter, pencil entries should not be printed. The Superintendent of the Press may bring to the notice of the Deputy Registrar any instance of incomplete or careless editing.

(c) Signature copies of letters to the Secretary of State or to the Government of India should be printed on hand-made paper.

(d) This slip should be returned by the Press to the Secretariat when proofs are furnished; it will be sent back to the Press when proofs are returned corrected and should be finally returned to the Secretariat when struck-off copies are supplied.

(e) The names of the Secretary and Members should be printed in full when they occur on the right hand side, but only the first time when they appear on the left side, the initials alone being printed later.
