The management of the Civil Orphan Asylum, Madras, propose to construct the undermentioned buildings for the use of the institution and have applied for a building grant under the Code of Regulations for European Schools :—

The enclosed plans and estimates (in duplicate) which have been signed by Mr. S. D. Pears, Superintending Engineer, V Circle, have been submitted. No plan and estimate for the stables, etc., have been received. These and the site plan which is under revision will be submitted as soon as they are received.

2. The Inspector of European and Training Schools says that the new buildings are urgently needed for the use of the institution. I may state that the present proposal to enlarge the accommodation is due to the scheme decided on by the management for reorganizing the working of the institution. The appointment of a joint Principal and Secretary who is to reside on the premises, and of a technically trained master from England for starting classes in industrial work form part of the scheme. The management say that they are unable to contribute anything towards the cost of the buildings under reference and they request that the whole cost may be paid as grant. The Inspector supports their request, and I have the honour to recommend that the request be granted as a special case. If sanctioned, a large part of the grant may be paid during the current year from the special allotments available for European Schools.

3. A copy of the Honorary Secretary's letter, dated 27th March 1913, and copies of the printed reports of the institution for 1911 and 1912 which contain information regarding the financial position, etc., are submitted herewith.

With reference to your letter R.C. No. 327, Educational, of 1912, dated the 21st February 1913, I have the honour to return the plans and estimates for (1) New class rooms (Rs. 30,000) and (2) quarters for the new Principal and Secretary, and to submit the following particulars.

(1) I have signed the plans and estimates on behalf of the Directors.

(2) The Civil Orphan Asylums were founded over a hundred years ago. An account of them is given in the Lawrence Asylum Press Almanac, and in an appeal appended to the Report for several years back and contained in the "Advance copy" of the Report for 1912, one of which I enclose.

(3) The report gives the financial position of the institution—vide appendix D in the report for 1911, a copy of which also is sent. A copy of the full report for 1912 with the financial statement as it stood on the 31st December 1912 (new being printed) will be forwarded shortly.

(4) There have been no striking variations in the strength of the school during the past five years.

(5) The plans and estimates are forwarded in duplicate. They have been prepared in accordance with the conditions of the code, by the Superintending Engineer, V Circle, Public Works Department, who has signed them.

The following details have been noted :—

- (a) The points of the compass.
- (b) The levels of the ground at the principal points.
- (c) Distance and height of adjoining buildings.
- (d) Nature and depth of soil and sub-soil.

I regret to have to add that the Directors can hold out no hope of contributing towards this scheme from any funds now at their command.

In continuation of this office letters R. C. No. 3961/12, dated 21st May 1913, and 10th June 1913, I have the honour to submit the plan with estimates amounting to Rs. 1,540 (in duplicate) for the construction of stables, etc., for the Civil Orphan Asylum, Madras.

Note by the Chief Engineer, Public Works Department, No. 563 D,
dated 25th July 1913.

The Director of Public Instruction submits for sanction, through the Educational Department, five plans and estimates amounting to Rs. 46,910 for constructing certain buildings at the Civil Orphan Asylum at Madras :—

II. The amounts of the estimates are detailed below :—

III. The plans and estimates have been scrutinised in the Chief Engineer's office and some minor alterations have been effected in the scantlings of the floor and roof timbers and rolled steel girders, but the amounts of the estimates have not been altered.

IV. Surki should be used with the shell lime as per Chief Engineer's Memorandum No. 594 C., dated 21st July 1899.

V. In the plan of the class rooms the girders in the committee room have been now spaced equidistant so as to have the same section of joists in all the bays—*vide* plan C. A. No. 169/1913.

VI. It is observed that one trial pit B is at one end of the class rooms and the other A about 500 feet away; also that the Principal's quarters is about 500 foot away from both trial pits. The pressures on the soil under the foundations of the class rooms and Principal's quarters work out to 1.55 and 1.50 tons per square feet, respectively. The Superintending Engineer will satisfy himself that the foundations provided are suitable.

VII. With the above remarks the estimates, amounting to Rs. 46,910 are recommended for sanction.

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

The estimate as approved by the Chief Engineer amounts to Rs. 46,910 on which under article 57 of the Code of Regulations for European schools, a maximum of one-half or Rs. 23,455 is admissible ordinarily and of two-thirds grant (Rs. 31,273 in this case) in special cases where there is a small or poor European population. The current application is, however, for an entire grant on the ground that the institution cannot contribute any amount. The application is recommended by the Director of Public Instruction as a special case.

2. The recommendation of the Director of Public Instruction goes beyond the provisions of the Code. There is, however, no objection to Government's overriding them provided they are satisfied that the relaxation is justified. From the statement of receipts and charges in Appendix D of the report of the Asylum for 1911 (current file) it is clear that the institution cannot contribute any thing from its current funds towards the cost of the buildings. The object of the institution is moreover one deserving of Government's sympathy—"the gratuitous education, board and

4. As regards funds the Director of Public Instruction states that a large part of the grant can be paid during the current year from the special allotments available for European schools—*vide* provisions* under 22. Education—Grants in-aid. Besides those there are also the non-recurring and recurring grants referred to in G.O. No. 264, Educational, dated 27th March 1913.

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(a) If a paper is marked to be printed urgently, the Superintendent of the section concerned should sign the Press slip. The Superintendent should exercise a careful discretion in the matter.

(b) Each letter, memorandum, or order, or set of orders, in the file of correspondence should be headed in succession with the Roman numeral I, II, III, etc., thenumber being written in red ink or blue chalk above the item. The particular papers to be printed in the special issue-copies should be indicated by the Roman numeral (I, II, etc.) by which that item has been headed in the correspondence file. All matter, including marginal remarks or references, to be printed should be written in ink and matter which should not be printed should be encircled. Initials and signatures that are not quite legible should be re-written distinctly.

(b) For rules regarding printing of notes, see rule 815 of the office Manual.

(c) The number of copies and the details of distribution should be filled in by the Superintendent or Referencer concerned.

(d) In the absence of special instructions to the Press to keep matter standing for a specified period, ordinary papers of 8 pages and under will be kept standing for one week, and larger papers for two weeks only. The type of notes and of all confidential papers is distributed immediately after striking.

(e) This slip, properly and completely filled in, should accompany every paper sent to Press; it will be returned by the Press when proofs are furnished; it should be sent to the Press when a call is made for revised proofs or when a corrected proof is sent for striking. When finally returned by Press it should be filed with the original order or letter.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE PRESS.

(a) If, in the opinion of the Superintendent of the Press, a paper has been marked urgent unnecessarily, he should send the Press slip to the Registrar with a remark to that effect.

(b) Unless a note to the contrary is made against the matter, pencil entries should not be printed. The Superintendent of the Press may bring to the notice of the Registrar any instance of incomplete or careless editing.

(c) Signature copies of letters to the Secretary of State or to the Government of India should be printed on hand-made paper.
