With reference to correspondence ending with G.O. No. 666, Educational, dated 17th July 1913, I have the honour to state that I have received only telegram No. 56, dated 15th July 1913, on the subject of nominating a lady medical graduate for a scholarship to Europe. The Principal, Medical College, whom I consulted, has forwarded to me two applications, one from Miss Gainsford who passed the recent Apothecary's examination in the first class and the other from Miss Cammiade who passed the recent L.M.S. Degree Examination.

2. Colonel Giffard has a very high opinion of Gainsford of whom he says : "It is many years since we have had so excellent a lady student." The Acting Principal (Major Miller) writes that he considers Miss Gainsford by far the more intelligent and more deserving of the two. I therefore trust that Government will be pleased to consider her application for the scholarship although she does not possess a degree in Medicine.

3. If, however, Government are not prepared to do so, I would recommend Miss Cammiade for the scholarship. She is of French origin, she possesses a degree in Medicine and is therefore eligible for the scholarship under the strict letter of the Government of India communication.

4. Seeing the present demand for the organization of medical relief to women in India by women, I trust that Government will recommend a candidate qualified in Medicine for the scholarship in preference to any other candidate.

The Government of India having decided to award annually a scholarship of £200 a year for three years to young women of the domiciled community to enable them to complete their education abroad and qualify for work in India, I shall be very grateful if one of these scholarships can be awarded to me.

I have just taken the B.A. Degree of the Madras University having fully qualified in History and Political Economy, English language and literature. I passed in History and English from His Highness the Maharaja's College in April 1912, and afterwards studied Latin under Mr. Tait, M.A., Principal of the Central College, Bangalore. I appeared for this subject last April and have passed in the first class. I enclose copies of testimonials from teachers and professors under whom I have studied, a telegram informing me of my success in Latin and a medical certificate.

I was born in September 1887 and am a daughter of the late Mr. F. Watts, Chief Secretary to the Government of Travancore.

Should the Government of India be pleased to award me the scholarship I seek, it is my intention to further qualify for the teaching profession. Thereafter I propose to return to India for educational work, in which capacity I trust I shall prove as useful as my sisters, of whom one, Miss A. M. Watts, L.R.C.P.S., is principal lady doctor of the Dufferin Hospital and Medical School, Agra; another Miss D. H. Watts, B.A., is Principal of the Maharaja's College and High School for Girls, Trivandrum (an institution with 750 girls on its rolls), while two others are qualified music mistresses in institutions in Trivandrum and Mussoorie.

As regards friends and relatives in England I should mention that my brother Mr. M. G. Watts, Assistant Accountant-General, Post and Telegraphs, Delhi, will be in England from either April or October 1914 for about two years. I can also depend on the assistance of Mrs. Harvey of Edinburgh, widow of the late Dr. Harvey, Principal of the Maharaja's College, Trivandrum, and Mr. French, retired Assistant Secretary, Finance department, Government of India, and other friends of good standing, known to my people, who will make arrangements for my vacations.

I hereby certify that Miss Amy Watts was a pupil in the High School of the Presentation Convent, Vepery, Madras, for four years, during which time she gave us entire satisfaction by her application and conduct which was commendable. She has a bright intelligence, correct judgment and a will ready to do right. She is of an obliging disposition, pleasant manners and modest unassuming ways which cannot but make her a favourite wherever she goes.

DATED 5TH AUGUST 1913.

[SUBJECT.—*Regarding State scholarship for girls or women of domiciled community for study in the United Kingdom.*]

Please see letter No. 336, Educational, dated 22nd April 1912, in which this Government furnished the Government of India with their opinion as to the desirability of instituting a scholarship for the girls or women of the domiciled community. The purpose of the scholarship has been, as suggested by this Government, restricted to educational or medical training. The resolution referred to in the telegram will presumably be received in a day or two. An abstract of it is published in the *Madras Mail* of 12th July. Apparently the rules will be similar to those of the general scholarship for the members of the community in G.Os. No. 200, Educational, dated 5th April 1907, and No. 754, Educational, dated 13th November 1907.

2. The Surgeon-General has been anxious about this scholarship. In May last he enquired whether the scholarship had been sanctioned and offered to submit an application. The Director of Public Instruction has also submitted separately a proposal to grant a scholarship for a course of study in kindergarten in the United Kingdom to one Miss Gordon. But this case will not satisfy the conditions prescribed by the Government of India for the new scholarship, as the nominee does not hold any degree. A fresh nomination will therefore be necessary.

3. It is not clear whether only one nomination—either for educational or medical training—should be submitted to the Government of India, or whether two nominations, one for each kind, could be sent, the question of final selection being left to India. For the present it may perhaps be better to communicate the telegram both to the Director of Public Instruction and the Surgeon-General with the request to submit nominations by the 1st August the latest. In the meanwhile, India's resolution would have been received and it will be clear how nominations should be submitted.

Please see paragraph 4 of India's resolution Nos. 1233-1247, dated 10th July 1913, for the procedure to be observed in the selection of candidates for the scholarship. The name of Miss Gainsford may be left out because she is not a graduate in medicine—*Cf.* paragraph 4 (a) of the resolution quoted above.

2. There then remain the names of two candidates namely, Miss Cammiade, L.M.S., recommended by the Surgeon-General for medical training and Miss Amy Watts, B.A., recommended by the Director of Public Instruction for educational training. With regard to the need for medical training the Surgeon-General trusts that "seeing the present demand for the organization of medical relief to women in India by women, the Government will recommend a candidate qualified in medicine for the scholarship in preference to any other candidate." The Surgeon-General has also for some time past been anxious about securing a scholarship for medical study. It may, at the same time, be pointed out that with the present expansion of education, training of women for the teaching profession is also becoming important—please see paragraphs 16 to 18 of the resolution of the Government of India on educational policy on page 7 of G.O. No. 394, Educational, dated 1st May 1913.

3. Apart from the need of the respective services, it may perhaps be better to base the selection on the relative merits and qualifications of the candidate. Miss Cammiade, the medical candidate, has passed the L.M. & S. degree of the Madras University. In regard to this degree as a qualification for further study in England, the Surgeon-General stated in paragraph 3 of his letter No. 100/187, dated 13th February 1912, that a candidate who had studied for it would be handicapped for an English University training by not having taken the subjects of Biology* and Physics. The Surgeon-General does not

also seem to be hearty in his recommendation about this candidate. He says that "she possesses a degree in medicine and is therefore eligible for the scholarship under the strict letter of the Government of India communication."

4. On the other hand the qualifications of the other candidate Miss Watts seem to satisfy the requirements for the scholarship. It is for consideration whether she may be recommended. The Public Department may be consulted.

Miss Watts comes of good people and seems otherwise suitable. Women teachers are badly wanted. Educational gives her its vote.

RESOLUTION.

With a view to meeting to some extent the demand for well educated women in India in the teaching and medical professions the Government of India have for some time past had under consideration the question of instituting a State scholarship for domiciled European or Anglo-Indian girls or women to enable them to complete their studies abroad.

2. After consulting Local Governments on the question and considering the recommendation made by the Conference on the education of the domiciled community held at Simla in July 1912, the Government of India have now obtained the sanction of the Secretary of State to the grant of one scholarship annually, tenable in the United Kingdom or, with special sanction, in foreign countries to a domiciled European or Anglo-Indian girl or woman.

3. The Governor General in Council is accordingly pleased to announce that—

(a) one scholarship of the value of £200 a year, the cost of which will be defrayed from Imperial revenues, will be awarded annually to a European or Anglo-Indian girl or woman who is a native of India within the meaning of Statute 33 Vict., Chap. 3, section 6, and whose parents are not resident in India for temporary purposes only;

(b) the scholarship will be granted for educational or medical training. The term 'educational training' will be construed in a wide sense and will include the following:—

(i) Training of a secondary character for the teaching profession.

(ii) Training in one or more branches of domestic science.

(iii) Training as teachers of modern European languages.

(iv) Training as music mistresses.

(v) Training as art teachers.

(vi) Training in kindergarten methods;

(c) the scholarship will be tenable in the United Kingdom or, with special sanction, in foreign countries, for a period of three years in the first instance, with the possibility of extension in special circumstances and in particular in the case of medical students to four and five years;

(d) the scholarship will carry with it no conditions as to any subsequent career or service under Government and no expectations of such employment will be held out.

4. The following procedure will be observed in the selection of candidates for the scholarship:—

(a) Each Local Government will be invited to nominate annually a candidate who has passed the B.A. examination of an Indian university or, in the case of a medical candidate, who possesses an Indian

degree in medicine. The candidate must produce medical evidence of physical fitness to undergo abroad the course of study proposed and must have friends or relatives in England to whom her parents or guardians would be willing to commit her guardianship during vacations. Nominations should be submitted by the 31st March of each year.

- (b) The Government of India will select from among the candidates nominated by the Local Governments the one who appears to them to be the best fitted to hold the scholarship.

5. The candidate to whom the scholarship is awarded will be required to proceed to England within a reasonable time from the date of her selection and to reside there for a period of three to five years, as the case may be, unless compelled to return sooner by ill-health. The scholarship will be payable from the date of her reporting her arrival in England. She will be provided with a free second class passage to England and also with a free return passage if she completes the full period of residence or is compelled by sickness to return within that period.

6. The scholar will, on arrival in England, be required to bind herself by a written engagement to submit to the following rules and to such other regulations as may from time to time be framed by His Majesty's Secretary of State for India for the guidance of scholars in England :—

- (a) Every scholar shall, on reaching England, at once call upon the Secretary for Indian students and report her arrival in writing. She shall leave her address with the Secretary for Indian students and intimate to him from time to time all changes therein.
- (b) Every scholar shall, without unnecessary delay, inform the Secretary for Indian students to which university she intends to proceed, and shall at once take steps to enter herself at the college she has finally selected with his approval.
- (c) Every scholar shall, within four weeks of reaching England, submit to the Secretary for Indian students for the approval of the Secretary of State, a statement showing the general course of study she proposes to follow, with a view to carrying out the objects of the scholarship granted to her; and the course approved must not be changed without the sanction of the Secretary of State.
- (d) Every scholar shall, at the end of each term of residence at a university, submit to the Secretary for Indian students a certificate from the proper college or university authority, showing that her residence, conduct and progress in study have been satisfactory during the term.
- (e) Every scholar shall at all times obey such instructions as she may receive from the Secretary of State either directly or through the Secretary for Indian students.
- (f) Subject to a due compliance with the above conditions, the allowance, at the rate of £ 200 a year for three, four or five years, will be paid quarterly, in advance, by the India Office, commencing from the date of the scholar's reporting her arrival in England. The first payment will be £ 50. Three months after the date of reporting arrival the amount to the ensuing official quarter day will be paid. Subsequent payments will be made in advance, on or after each official quarter day. The allowance will be reduced by the amount of any other sum which may become payable to her out of the revenues of India in respect of residence at a university during the same period or any part of it, and also by the amount of any university or college bills, of which payment is made by the India Office.
- (g) Travelling expenses, hotel bills, and charges for medical attendance are not defrayed by the Secretary of State.

- (h) Every scholar will forfeit her scholarship who, not being disabled by illness or prevented by any other cause which the Secretary of State may consider sufficient, fails to complete a residence in England for the prescribed number of years of the scholarship according to the terms and conditions approved by the Secretary of State under (c) above, or who is guilty of misconduct or disregard of the instructions of the Secretary of State. If a scholarship be forfeited, or if it be resigned before completion of its term, or if a scholar on completion of the term of her scholarship declines to return to India when instructed to do so, the scholar will lose her claim to a free return passage to India, and will further become liable, at the discretion of the Secretary of State, to refund the cost of her free passage to England.

- (i) At the expiration of her scholarship a scholar is provided by the India Office with a free second class passage to India. The scholar is not entitled to make her own passage arrangements and to claim an allowance in lieu thereof from the India Office without the special sanction of the Secretary of State. All communications on this subject shall be made to the Secretary for Indian students.

- (j) Should the Secretary of State be advised that the state of a scholar's health is such as to render her return to India desirable, the scholarship may be terminated forthwith and a free return passage granted to the scholar.

(a) If a paper is marked to be printed urgently, the Superintendent of the section concerned should sign the Press slip. The Superintendent should exercise a careful discretion in the matter.

(b) Each letter, memorandum, or order, or set of orders, in the file of correspondence should be headed in succession with the Roman numeral I, II, III, etc., the number being written in red ink or blue chalk above the item. The particular papers to be printed in the special issue-copies should be indicated by the Roman numeral (I, II, etc.) by which that item has been headed in the correspondence file. All matter, including marginal remarks or references, to be printed should be written in ink and matter which should not be printed should be encircled. Initials and signatures that are not quite legible should be re-written distinctly.

(b) For rules regarding printing of notes, see rule 315 of the office Manual.

(c) The number of copies and the details of distribution should be filled in by the Superintendent or Referencer concerned.

(d) In the absence of special instructions to the Press to keep matter standing for a specified period, ordinary papers of 8 pages and under will be kept standing for one week, and larger papers for two weeks only. The type of notes and of all confidential papers is distributed immediately after striking.

(e) This slip, properly and completely filled in, should accompany every paper sent to Press; it will be returned by the Press when proofs are furnished; it should be sent to the Press when a call is made for revised proofs or when a corrected proof is sent for striking. When finally returned by Press it should be filed with the original order or letter.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE PRESS.

(a) If, in the opinion of the Superintendent of the Press, a paper has been marked urgent unnecessarily, he should send the Press slip to the Registrar with a remark to that effect.

(b) Unless a note to the contrary is made against the matter, pencil entries should not be printed. The Superintendent of the Press may bring to the notice of the Registrar any instance of incomplete or careless editing.

(c) Signature copies of letters to the Secretary of State or to the Government of India should be printed on hand-made paper.

(d) This slip should be returned by the Press to the Secretariat when proofs are furnished; it will be sent back to the Press when proofs are returned corrected and should be finally returned to the Secretariat when struck-off copies are supplied.
