Letter—from the Hon'ble Sir ALFRED GIBBS BOURNE, D.Sc., F.R.S., K.C.I.E.,
Director of Public Instruction.

With reference to G.O. No. 443, Educational, dated 14th May 1913, I have the honour to request that Government may be pleased to sanction the estimate towards the cost of subsidizing games in Government colleges and high schools submitted with my letter read in the Government Order. The estimate is recast so as to show separately the recurring and non-recurring expenditure on account of each institution and is submitted as an enclosure. The total non-recurring expenditure of Rs. 9,166 may be met from the Imperial grant of 6 lakhs for educational hygiene, gymnasias, play-grounds, etc., and the recurring expenditure of Rs. 2,670 may be met from the recurring Imperial grant of Rs. 30,000 on account of colleges and training institutions referred to in paragraph 11 of G.O. No. 264, Educational, dated 27th March 1913.

2. It is submitted that the work of constructing a pavilion for the Teachers' College, Saidapet, may be entrusted to the Public Works Department, and the necessary amount of Rs. 2,550 may therefore be placed at the disposal of that department. All the other works (including that of improving the Presidency College grounds), which do not require any professional skill, may be ordered to be carried out departmentally.

3. It is understood that the estimated cost of Rs. 4,600 for providing the gymnastic ground of the Government Arts College, Rajahmundry, with an iron fence, approved in G.O. No. 147 W., dated 20th January 1913, will be met from the Public Works Department budget.

2. Except the buildings at the Teachers' College, the works may be executed departmentally. The former will be undertaken by the Public Works Department, in which department orders will issue regarding the preparation of plans and estimates.

3. Orders regarding the provision of funds will issue in the Financial Department.

4. The expenditure referred to in paragraph 3 of the Director's letter will be met from the Public Works Department budget.

[SUBJECT.—*Expenditure of Rs. 11,836 on games in Government colleges and high schools.*]

Letter from the Director of Public Instruction, No. 7903/12, dated 12th July 1913.

Please see G.O. No. 443, Educational, dated 14th May 1913. The estimate of subsidizing games in Government colleges and secondary schools for the current year amounts to Rs. 11,836. The amount of the recurring expenditure shown in the present estimate is higher than that of the original estimate given in column (iii) of the statement on page 4 of G.O. No. 443, Educational, dated 14th May 1913. This is

apparently due to the present estimate
having been framed with reference to the
amount of subscriptions *actually* raised by
the members of the clubs since the time of

the original estimate. According to that calculation the recurring expenditure should vary from time to time in proportion to the amount of the club subscriptions.

2. The estimate may, it is submitted, be sanctioned and the proposal to meet the expenditure from the special additional grant of Rs. 23,00,000 sanctioned by the Government of India provided under "22. EDUCATION" in the Civil Budget Estimate for 1913-14 may be approved.

3. With reference to paragraph 2 of the Director's letter, it is submitted that Item 81 of Appendix F of the Madras Treasury Manual, Volume II, pages 87 and 88. the department can undertake the construction of petty buildings and the execution of ordinary repairs to civil buildings up to a limit of Rs. 2,500 except in the case, among others, of buildings at the Presidency town. In the list submitted by the Director of Public Instruction the Presidency and Engineering Colleges and the Madrasa-i-Azam are in the Presidency town. The nature of the works contemplated by the Director of Public Instruction in connection with these institutions is not stated. If it is considered that this information need not be called for, the best course appears to be to entrust the works connected with them also to the Public Works Department, along with the construction of the pavilion for the Teachers' College. The rest of the works may be executed departmentally—please see for precedents G.Os. No. 926, Educational, dated 18th October 1912, and No. 9, Educational, dated 3rd January 1913.

Yes it is: he says in paragraph 2 of his letter on page 3 of G.O. No. 443, Educational, dated 14th May 1913, that the expenditure at the Presidency College is for improving the playing-fields, and as the only building he refers to is the "pavilion" for the Teachers' College the other expenditure is evidently for similar purposes, and not for buildings. So item 81 of Appendix F has no application.

The draft order may be accepted in this Department and the file passed on to Financial.

2. Under paragraph 847 of the Public Works Department Code, Provincial public works costing over Rs. 2,500 should ordinarily be entrusted to the agency of the Public Works Department. The proposed work at the Presidency College is estimated to cost Rs. 5,000; but, considering the nature of the work, the proposal to entrust it to the Educational Department need not perhaps be objected to. Funds for the purpose will, however, have to be provided under the head "Public Works in charge of Public Works Officers" and the expenditure accounted for by officers of the Educational Department as Public Works disbursers—*vide* paragraph 1779 of the Public Works Department Code.

3. Paragraph 4 of the draft may be accepted subject to Financial's concurrence.

Paragraph 2 of the Public Works Department note *ante*.—Paragraph 1779 of the Public Works Department Code, Volume II, should be read with paragraph 382 of the Madras Treasury Manual, Volume I. The expenditure is debitable to the head "45. CIVIL WORKS—PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT—WORKS IN CHARGE OF CIVIL OFFICERS ACTING AS PUBLIC WORKS DISBURSERS."

2. Paragraph 3 of the Public Works Department note *ante*.—No provision has been made for the work (providing the gymnastic ground of the Government Arts College, Rajahmundry, with an iron fence—cost Rs. 4,600) in the current year's Public Works Department budget. It is apparently the intention of the Public Works Department to re-appropriate the amount required from savings in the current year's budget.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE SECRETARIAT.

(a) If a paper is marked to be printed urgently, the Superintendent of the section concerned should sign the Press slip. The Superintendent should exercise a careful discretion in the matter.

(b) Each letter, memorandum, or order, or set of orders, in the file of correspondence should be headed in succession with the Roman numeral I, II, III, etc., the number being written in red ink or blue chalk above the item. The particular papers to be printed in the special issue-copies should be indicated by the Roman numeral (I, II, etc.) by which that item has been headed in the correspondence file. All matter, including marginal remarks or references, to be printed should be written in ink and matter which should not be printed should be encircled. Initials and signatures that are not quite legible should be re-written distinctly.

(b¹) For rules regarding printing of notes, see rule 315 of the office Manual.

(c) The number of copies and the details of distribution should be filled in by the Superintendent or Referencee concerned.

(d) In the absence of special instructions to the Press to keep matter standing for a specified period, ordinary papers of 8 pages and under will be kept standing for one week, and larger papers for two weeks only. The type of notes and of all confidential papers is distributed immediately after striking.

(e) This slip, properly and completely filled in, should accompany every paper sent to Press; it will be returned by the Press when proofs are furnished; it should be sent to the Press when a call is made for revised proofs or when a corrected proof is sent for striking. When finally returned by Press it should be filed with the original order or letter.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE PRESS.

(a) If, in the opinion of the Superintendent of the Press, a paper has been marked urgent unnecessarily, he should send the Press slip to the Registrar with a remark to that effect.

(b) Unless a note to the contrary is made against the matter, pencil entries should not be printed. The Superintendent of the Press may bring to the notice of the Registrar any instance of incomplete or careless editing.

(c) Signature copies of letters to the Secretary of State or to the Government of India should be printed on hand-made paper.

(d) This slip should be returned by the Press to the Secretariat when proofs are furnished; it will be sent back to the Press when proofs are returned corrected and should be finally returned to the Secretariat when struck-off copies are supplied.

(e) The names of the Secretary and Members should be printed in full when they occur on the right hand side, only the first time when they appear on the left side, the initials alone being printed later.
