Raising the remuneration of the Superintendents of the — from Rs. 40 to Rs. 50, agreeing to meet the additional cost from Provincial funds and sanctioning the transfer to the Secondary and Training school for Mistresses, Triplicane, of the four scholarships remaining unawarded in the Queen Mary High school for Indian Girls, Vizagapatam.

I have the honour to request the sanction of Government in the circumstances explained below for increasing the remuneration of the Superintendents of the Brahman Widows' Hostel attached to the Government Secondary and Training school for Mistresses, Triplicane, and the number of scholarships tenable in the above hostel.

2. The present remuneration of Rs. 40 per mensem to the two Superintendents which was sanctioned in G.O. No. 785, Educational, dated 26th August 1912, was fixed at a time when there were only nine members in the hostel and when a single cook whose wages have been met from the supervision fee allowed to the Superintendents was found sufficient. At present, it is stated that there are as many as 30 widow scholars in the hostel and that with the further accession to its strength which is shortly expected the employment of an additional cook on Rs. 10 per mensem is absolutely necessary. It is further pointed out that it would not be possible for the Superintendents to meet the wages of the extra cook from their present remuneration unless it is raised from Rs. 40 to Rs. 50 per mensem. Seeing that one cook is allowed for every sixteen students in the Victoria Students' Hostel, Triplicane, I consider Miss Lynch's proposal to have an additional cook on Rs. 10 per mensem and to increase the supervising fee *pro tanto* to be very reasonable and accordingly beg to support it. The additional remuneration, if sanctioned, may take effect from the 1st proximo.

I may mention in this connection that it will not be possible for the widow scholars to pay the wages of the additional cook, since it is understood that the stipend of Rs. 15 sanctioned for each of them is just sufficient to cover the boarding charges which have been fixed at Rs. 10 per mensem and other incidental expenses on account of books, drawing materials, school uniform, etc.

3. As regards the increase proposed in the number of scholarships, the Inspectress reports that all the thirty scholarships sanctioned in G.O. No. 128, Educational, dated 30th January 1914, have been utilized and that fifteen additional scholarships are required to meet the cases of fresh applicants who are likely to number not less than fifteen. As an alternative she suggests the desirability of transferring at least as a temporary expedient five of the unappropriated scholarships out of the fifty scholarships allotted to the Queen Mary High School for Indian Girls at Vizagapatam—*vide* G.O. No. 683, Educational, dated 26th July 1912. I consider the latter proposal which is expected to meet the immediate requirements of the Triplicane school worthy of consideration and since the Inspectress of Girls' schools, Northern Circle, whom I have consulted reports that only four out of the fifty scholarships mentioned above have remained unawarded, I request that you will be so good as to obtain the sanction of Government to the temporary transfer of these four scholarships from the Girls' school, Vizagapatam, to the school at Triplicane. I beg to add that Miss Lynch's proposal to sanction fifteen additional scholarships for the latter school may be considered later at any rate after the above four scholarships have been awarded.

4. The extra expenditure involved by the first proposal will amount to Rs. 10 per mensem during the current year for meeting which a re-appropriation statement is submitted herewith. As for the amount required for the next year, I shall submit a re-appropriation statement on receipt of the civil budget estimate for that year.

[SUBJECT.—*Enhancement of the remuneration of the Superintendents of the Brahmin Widows' Hostel, Triplicane, and the transfer of certain scholarships thereto.*]

In paragraph 2 of his current letter the Director of Public Instruction has explained the necessity for employing an additional cook on Rs. 10 per mensem and the consequent increase in the remuneration of the Superintendents of the Brahmin Widows' Hostel from Rs. 40 to Rs. 50 per mensem. The remuneration of the Superintendent of the Hostel for Indian Christian students, Triplicane, which has only a strength of 11 is Rs. 40 per mensem and that of the Matron of the Indian Christian and the Hindu hostels, the former with a strength of 20 and the latter with 3, attached to the Government Training school for Mistresses at Karantattangudi, Rs. 25 per mensem including the wages of servants.

The present proposal to increase the remuneration of the Superintendents of the Brahmin Widows' Hostel, Triplicane, from Rs. 40 to Rs. 50, may, it is submitted, be accepted, subject to the condition that the payment of the increase in the allowance is contingent on the employment of the cook in question.

2. As regards the source from which the wages of the cook are to be met, it is submitted that it is usual to include them in the boarding charges of students. The Director of Public Instruction, however, explains that such an arrangement is difficult in this case. In paragraph 2 of G.O. No. 33, Educational, dated the 9th January 1915, the Government have, as a special case, agreed to meet the cost of the

The cost of the cook (Rs. 6) in the Indian Christian hostel is paid out of the remuneration of Rs. 40 to the Superintendent—page 2 of notes to G.O. No. 33, Educational, dated the 9th January 1915.

cook employed in the Hindu hostel at Karantattangudi from Provincial funds for a period of one year. The extension of the principle to the widows' hostel appears to be justified in view of the peculiar nature of the institution. It

need not, however, form a precedent for other cases in future. Submitted that the Director's proposal in this regard also may be accepted.

3. The proposal to transfer four scholarships from the Vizagapatam to the Triplicane school, as a temporary measure, may also be approved.

4. A draft order is submitted for approval. It may be sent to the Financial Department u.o. for acceptance. That department may also be requested to enter the necessary provision in the civil budget estimate for 1915-16 as requested by the Accountant-General in paragraph 4 of his endorsement on page 5 of current file.
