In continuation of my letter R.C. No. 5178, dated 11th July 1916, requesting the sanction of Government for the continuance of the Women's College, Madras, for a further period of two years from the 1st July 1916 and with reference to G.O. No. 961, Educational, dated 14th August 1914, and G.O. Mis. No. 750, Educational, dated 8th July 1915, sanctioning the award of scholarships in the college during 1914-15 and 1915-16, I have the honour to submit for favour of sanction at an early date proposals for the award of scholarships in the college during 1916-17 and 1917-18. As the college is at present only tentative, my proposals have been confined to the requirements for these two years and I have assumed that the new staff proposed for the college will be sanctioned. When, however, the college is established on a permanent basis, the question of scholarships will require further consideration and it will then be desirable to consider a more complete and permanent scheme of scholarships for the college and to include them under the Government scholarships notification.

2. The number of scholarships recommended by the Principal for award during the current year and the probable number that may be required to be sanctioned in 1917-18 are exhibited in the statement herewith attached.

Fifteen ordinary scholarships in the first class and 11 in the third class have been recommended by the Principal for sanction but I consider this number to be too large in view of the special scholarships for widows and those taking the form of remission of fees also proposed for award and of the strength of the classes concerned. I would therefore recommend for sanction 10 ordinary scholarships in the first class and 7 in the third during 1916-17. Of the latter four are applications for renewals of scholarships sanctioned in the second year class in the Women's College during 1915-16, and two of the students have this year joined the Presidency College, Madras, one for Honours (Branch VII) and the other for Pass (Group II (b)) course.

The other 9 ordinary scholarships in the second class and the 4 widow scholarships in the first and second classes recommended by the Principal may also be sanctioned.

As for the scholarships taking the form of remission of fees, the scheme sanctioned in G.O. No. 961, Educational, dated 14th August 1914, may be extended during 1916-17 and 1917-18 under the same conditions and so as to be applicable to all the classes in the college.

With regard to the scholarships for 1917-18, the probable requirements have been shown in the statement now submitted, and the number actually required will be duly reported to Government for sanction in the usual course next year.

3. The extra expenditure on account of these scholarships during 1916-17 which amounts to Rs. 784 can be met from the savings expected under the provision for scholarships under "22-H. Education" in the current year's budget and the amount required for 1917-18 which comes to Rs. 7,452 will be included in the budget for 1917-18 under preparation.

In justification for the somewhat large expenditure contemplated, I may point out that the future development of female education depends on a supply of really well-educated women and that practically all the girls who enter the college do so with a view to a professional career in teaching or medicine.

The number of ordinary scholarships (7) recommended for the third class of the Women's College for 1916-17 bears a higher proportion to the total number of pupils in that class (11) than that in the other classes. These scholarships, together with those which take the form of remission of fees, will result in ten out of the eleven pupils in the class either getting scholarships or having their fees remitted. The Director is requested to state whether the number of ordinary scholarships for the third class during the current year may not be reduced, and if so to what extent.

With reference to Government Memorandum No. 3012-1, dated 16th September 1916, I have the honour to state that I have already proposed three scholarships less in the third year class than the Principal of the Women's College asked for and that on further consulting her I understand that she is very anxious to be allowed the scholarships taking the form of remission of fees as proposed by me. The number of such remissions is based on the number of students in the college as a whole and not on the number in the several classes. It therefore seems to me that, provided that the number of scholarships in the college is not regarded as too large, it may not matter how they are distributed among the classes. As girls proceed with their University course, a scholarship is likely to become a more urgent necessity and a parent may be willing to face the expense of the Intermediate course but find the B.A. course more than he can manage. I would also in this connection invite the attention of Government to the last paragraph of my letter under reference in which I have stated my justification for the long list of the scholarships recommended.

The Director of Public Instruction submits proposals for the award of scholarships in the Madras College for Women during 1916-17 and 1917-18 in view of the fact that he proposed the continuance of the college for two years in his letter No. 5178, dated the 11th July 1916. As sanction has been accorded in G.O. No. 883, dated the 17th August 1916, for the continuance of the college only for a further period of one year from the 1st July 1916, it is submitted the proposals of the Director of Public Instruction as regards 1916-17 only need be examined.

2. The Director of Public Instruction proposes the following scholarships during 1916-17:—

- (a) First class—Ten ordinary scholarships at Rs. 9 each per mensem.
- (b) Second class—Nine ordinary scholarships at Rs. 9 each per mensem (of these three are renewals).
- (c) Third class—Seven ordinary scholarships at Rs. 4 each per mensem (of these four are renewals).
- (d) First class—Two widow scholarships at Rs. 25 each per mensem.
- (e) Second class—Two widow scholarships at Rs. 25 each per mensem (of these one is a renewal).

(f) Remission of fees under the scheme sanctioned in G.O. No. 961, dated the 14th August 1914, under the same conditions but so as to be applicable to all the classes in the college.

Item (c) and the application of the scheme of remission of fees to the third class are new, due to the opening of the B.A. class. They seem to be unobjectionable.

3. It may be mentioned here that two more scholarships will soon be available by the endowment of Rao Sahib C. Ramanujam Chetti Garu.

4. Draft accepting the Director of Public Instruction's proposals for the award of scholarships during 1916-17 is submitted for approval. With reference to paragraph 3 of the Director of Public Instruction's letter it need not go to Financial.

In G.O. No. 961, Educational, dated 14th August 1914, Government sanctioned a scheme of scholarships for the Women's College for 1914-15 for the first year class (which alone was in existence that year). The continuance of the scheme was sanctioned in G.O. No. 750, Educational, dated 8th July 1915, for 1915-16 in respect of first and second year classes which were in existence in that year. On the 1st July 1916 the third year University class was opened, and the present proposals of Home (Educational) relate to the grant of scholarships for 1916-17 in respect of the three classes.

3. *Rate of the scholarships.*—Rupees 9, 9 and 14. These rates are the same as those allowed to boys under the General Government Scholarships scheme and may be accepted.

4. *Total expenditure involved in the scheme.*—For the circumstances under which the Women's College was opened, please see paragraphs 1-2 of letter No. 615, Educational, dated 27th May 1914. Attention is, in this connection, also invited to the Chief Secretary's (Mr. Butterworth's) note, dated 4th August 1914, on page 3 and the Director of Public Instruction's explanatory note, dated 13th August 1914, on page 4 of Notes to G.O. The proportion of the number of scholarships to the strength of the class according to the present proposals is one-third or less in respect of the first and second year classes, whereas in the third year class it is as high as seven-elevenths; and since in addition to the scholarships the Director is to be authorized to remit the fees in 25 per cent of the cases, almost all the students in the third year class will practically

have to pay no fees. It may perhaps be suggested to Home (Educational) whether a reduction in the number of scholarships for the third year class students will not be feasible. Subject to this suggestion, the proposals may, it is submitted, be agreed to in Financial.
