I.C.S., Collector of Chingleput District, Saidapet, R.O.C. No. 1264/Gl. of 1918, dated the 29th April 1918 to the Secretary to the Government of Madras, Educational Department, through the Secretary to the Commissioners of Land Revenue, Madras:-

In forwarding herewith a copy of the application of

M. Raghava Ayyer, a permanent Clerk on Rs.30/- in the Sub-

Sub-Collector's Office, Chingleput requesting that he may be exempted from Examination Rules for promotion upto Rs. 40/- and permitted to appear for all the Special tests for which an Upper Secondary Candidate may appear, I have the honour to state as follows:-

2. The individual was exempted from the Upper Secondary Examination for promotion to the post of a Clerk on Rs.15/- in Government Order No. 64 Educational, dated 25th January 1904. This exemption was extended in Government Order No. 939 Educational Misc., dated 13th October 1913 so as to admit of his appointment to any post in the lower division of the service in the Revenue Department as then constituted. The Sub-Collector now recommends (1) that further exemption may be granted so as to admit of the Clerk's promotion to Rs.40/- and (2) that he may be permitted to appear for the Special Test Examinations. Vide copies of his endorsement on the application enclosed and his letter No. Dis.449 D of 1918, dated 21st April 1918. In view of the candidate's good recruiting work, I strongly support the Sub-Collector's recommendation and request that the Government will be pleased to grant the request as a special case as the individual is deserving of the concession.

Magisterial Clerk, Sub-Collector's Office, Chingleput, to the Collector of Chingleput District, Saidapet, through the Sub-Collector, Chingleput.

I humbly beg to submit the following for your

Honour's favourable consideration and orders:-

2. I am the permanent 3rd Clerk of the Sub-Collector's Office, Chingleput on Rs. 30/-. I was exempted from passing the Upper Secondary Examinations in Government Order No.64 dated 25th January ¹⁹⁰⁴ (Collector's Dis. No. 102 R. of 1904) and my further exemption for promotion to any post in the Lower Division of the Service in the Revenue Department was granted in Government Order No. 939 Misc., dated 13th October 1913 (Collector's Dis. No. 738 R. of 1913). I understand that this order allows my promotion only up to Rs.30/-.

3. The Board was pleased to sanction my exemption to act as Suit Clerk of this office on Rs.40/- in Board's Proceedings No. 1496 L.R. Misc., dated 18th August 1916 on your Honour's recommendation (Collector's No.2990/Gl. of 1916, dated 4th August 1916) and Mr. Strathie again addressed your Honor in March 1917 to get me permanently exempted for further promotion. Again when the Suit Clerk's place fell vacant for the second time in July 1917, Mr. Brown was pleased to address your Honour to get me exemption for promotion in Sub-Collector's letter R.O.C. No.1514 Sup. of 1917, dated 20th July 1917.

4. The above papers will give a history of my official career ever since my entertainment in this Department. I had occasion to serve personally under the following Civilian Officers, and every one without exception, I may venture to submit without any least idea of boasting, appreciated my work and character.

5. I humbly beg to request that your Honor will be pleased to address Government to grant me exemption for further promotion to Rs.40/- As the Government had already exempted me from passing the Upper Secondary Examination, I also request that the Government may be moved to permit me to appear for all the Special Tests which an Upper Secondary Candidate may appear.

Endorsement by the Sub-Collector, Chingleput.

1. Submitted to the Collector, Saidapet.
2. I very strongly recommend that the applicant should be permitted to appear for the Special Tests as he requests. My opinion of the Clerk's work and the opinion of a good many of my predecessors are already on record in your office.

3. The clerk has been doing his best to help recruiting. Besides the general assistance which he has given me while moving about in Camp, he has himself been able to secure six recruits who have been enrolled and passed besides as many again who have been found unfit or though fit, below the standard size.

4. By delaying or debarring the entry of this clerk into the higher reaches of the service, Government are losing the services of a most diligent and able servant who would fill with credit, in due course, any office in the revenue line. While recognizing the difficulty of securing further exemption and the objections to grant it, I would respectfully urge that further exemption should be granted as requested in the first part of paragraph 5 of his petition.

Copy of letter No. 449 D. of 1918, dated 21st April 1918, from the Sub-Collector, Chingleput, to the Collector of the Chingleput District, Saidapet.

I would take the liberty of inviting your attention to my endorsement Dis. No.399 D, dated 4th April 1918, on the petition of M. Raghava Iyer, Magisterial Clerk of my office. What I supported more especially in the endorsement was the

application of the Clerk to be allowed to appear for the Special Test Examinations. I would now request you, if you deem fit, to move the Government for his permanent exemption from examination rules.

2. The previous history of the clerk has been given in Mr. Walsh's letter Dis. No. 952/D. of 1913, dated 31st May 1913 to the Collector. I would also invite your attention to Mr. Strathie's letter Dis. No. 2 D Confidential of 1917, dated 20th March 1917.

3. It was my desire to make this clerk, Suit Clerk of my office on Rs. 40/- when Rangunatha Rao was transferred on 20th August 1917 but as that involved permanent exemption, you were of opinion that I might wait some time longer before recommending him. I have now had experience of this clerk for some 14 months. During that time I have never had occasion to find fault with him at all. His ordinary papers come up with the same promptitude and regularity whether the day is a holiday or has involved his presence in Court from 11 A.M., to 5 P.M. He is at all times available for reading of appeal records. He puts his work first and his own convenience second. His judgment is sound and his notes and endorsements always to the point. His work as a Jamabandy checking clerk, or inspecting the records of Magisterial and Taluk Offices is of a high order. He has a sound knowledge of all branches of Revenue and Magisterial work. Whether it be due to his long Magisterial experience in this Court or a natural faculty, he has the gift more than any other clerk in the division, of knowing what is irrelevant and avoiding

it and concentrating only on the real matter at issue.

4. His capacity for work and his driving power would make him a Head Clerk to be prized by any Sub-Collector. As a Sub-Magistrate he would be a treasure. I need not repeat what has been already said by Mr. Walsh and Mr. Strathie.

You are already aware of the work he had done and continues to do for recruiting. I would very strongly urge his further exemption so that he may go out and get the necessary training as a Revenue Inspector which is an essential preliminary to his further progress. His departure from this office would be a distinct loss but he is fit for ^{and} deserves a much better place than one on Rs. 30/-. Paragraph 4 of my endorsement Dis. 299 D/ of 1918, dated 4th April 1918 sums up my opinion in the matter and I commend his case for very sympathetic consideration.

2. The Board supports the Collector's recommendation that M. Raghava Ayyar, clerk, Sub-Collector's Office, Chingleput, may be exempted from the provisions of article 1 of Public Service notification to enable him to hold posts carrying pay not exceeding Rs. 40/- per mensem.

5. If the exemption referred to above is granted, the clerk will also be eligible to appear for such of the special tests as are prescribed for posts up to Rs.40/- (Vide note iii to Article 4 of the revised special test notification published at page 294 of Part I-B of the Fort Saint George Gazette, dated 14th May 1918).

Please see para. 1 of the Int. Collector's letter on page 6 of c.p. He recommends a permanent exemption, i.e. irrespective of any money limit with a man of such capacity & character, there shall obviously be frequent applications later on for further extensions of the exemption order. Further ~~such~~ such permanent exemption will ordinarily ~~enable~~ enable the Candidate to appear for all the special tests which is recommended by the Collector & the Board. We may therefore grant permanent exemption rather the ~~at~~ draft as to read "to admit of his further promotion in the Rev. Departt." as indicated in blue pencil in the draft.

Mr. Strathie speaks very highly of this clerk & has also spoken to the Secretary about him. He desires that permanent exemption may be given. There is no objection ^{to} in this ^{case} which is exceptional. If the Rev. Departt has no objection the draft as altered may issue.

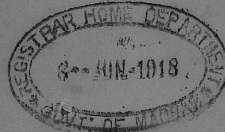
