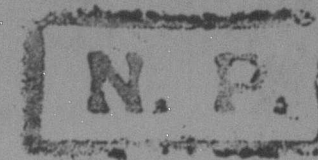

Approving the proposal of the Director of Public Instruction to increase the number of scholarships available for girls studying in higher elementary and secondary schools to 36 in each case.

Letter—from the Hon'ble Mr. J. H. STONE, M.A., F.R.H.S., C.I.E., Director of Public Instruction.

To—the Secretary to Government, Home (Education) Department.

Dated—Madras, the 1st July 1918.

The number of scholarships in girls' schools for the higher elementary and secondary grade is at present 24 and 18 respectively. There are in all 271 higher elementary schools and 39 secondary schools for girls and it is clear from this that the number of scholarships is quite insufficient to meet the increasing demand for scholarships. I have the honour, therefore, to propose that this number may be increased to 36 in each case, i.e., 12 additional scholarships for higher elementary and 18 for secondary. The ultimate annual cost of this proposal will be Rs. 6,912. If my proposal meets with the approval of Government, necessary provision will be included in the next year's budget.

Order—No. 992, Home (Education), dated 30th July 1918.

The Government approve the proposal of the Director of Public Instruction to increase, with effect from next year, the number of scholarships available for girls studying in the higher elementary and secondary schools to 36 in each case. The grant of these scholarships will be subject to the same regulations as those now in force.

[SUBJECT.—Additional scholarships for girls studying in higher elementary and secondary schools.]

From the Director of Public Instruction, R.C. No. 4470, dated 1st July 1918.

HOME (EDUCATION) DEPARTMENT.

The total number of Government scholarships at present available for girls studying in schools of the higher elementary and secondary grade is 42. Of these 24 are for distribution in higher elementary schools and the remaining 18 in secondary schools. The Director of Public Instruction now proposes that these numbers may be increased to 36 in each case. The proposal may, if it is submitted, be approved.

The Educational Conference held in March 1916 has made certain recommendations in regard to the grant of fee concessions in aided girls' schools and if these recommendations are accepted, additional stimulus will be given to female education.

2. If the proposal is accepted by Government the ultimate annual cost involved is Rs. 6,912 which is made up as follows:—

The following table shows the number of each kind of school for girls, together with their strength, and the existing, as well as the proposed, scholarships for each kind:—

Kinds of schools.	Number.	Strength (aggregate).	Existing scholarships.	Proposed scholarships.
(1) Higher elementary	271	39,479	24	36
(2) Secondary	39	6,868	18	36

The extra cost per annum is Rs. 6,912 ultimately; in 1919-20 when the scheme will be introduced it will be Rs. 936.

NOTES TO G.O. No. 992, HOME (EDUCATION), 30TH JULY 1918

2. The additional scholarships for elementary schools may be accepted. As regards secondary schools, attention is invited to Chief Secretary's note on page 29 of notes dealing with the resolutions of the Educational Conference of 1916. It was pointed out that outlay on elementary education should precede provision for scholarships in secondary schools. Perhaps the question of female education may be considered as special, and the proposed 18 additional scholarships may be accepted.

3. As regards funds, the amount will have to be taken from the Provincial L.E.K. increment of two lakhs for 1919-20, or charged against the Imperial recurring grant of 5½ lakhs for education given by the Government of India with effect from the current year.
