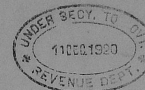

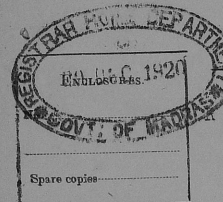

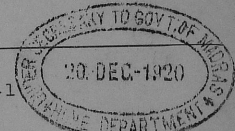

In its resolution No.294 Misc. dated 1st March 191

the Board passed orders that no special permission was

necessary

necessary for K. Pattabhi Ramayya, Accountant of my office, to appear for all the Special Tests.

Accordingly the Accountant appeared for the Criminal Judicial Test last year and failed but when he appeared for the Test again this year the Board of Examiners first objected in its official memorandum dated 13th October 1920 but subsequently permitted him to appear for the Test pending reconsideration and *orders*. I submit the Accountant's petition with enclosures and request that the Board may be pleased to consider his case and grant him the required permission.

2. The Board was under the impression that Article 4 of the Special Test Notification read with head-note 1 of the public service Notification conferred, on candidates who had passed the Middle School Examination in the first class and were confirmed before 30th June 1894, the privilege of appearing for all Special Tests. The Commissioner for Government Examinations whom the Board has now consulted considers that the special permission of Government is necessary for allowing such candidates to appear for the special Tests. Such permission is not required in the future - See

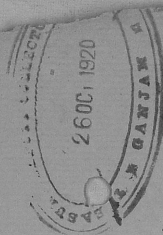
3. dated 16th November 1920. In the case now in question, and similar cases where candidates have already sat for the last examinations - before the Notification referred to above was published - ~~the~~ Board requests that Government will be pleased to issue instructions to the Commissioner for Government Examinations to value their answer papers. He thinks that such cases are not likely to be many and that they deserve consideration. A similar concession has just been granted in Government Order No. 1351 Home (Education) dated 17th November 1920.

I, Kolluru Pattabhi ramayya an accountant of your office beg to state as follows :--

I passed the old Middle school Examination in the I class. I was confirmed in the Government service in the year 1893. When I applied for exemption for the Criminal Judicial Test the Board of Revenue ^{was} ~~were~~ pleased to state (please see copy of its Proceedings attached) that having been permanently appointed to the public service before 30th September 1894 I need no exemption -- and that I am eligible to appear for the test. I accordingly appeared for the test last year. But the Commissioner however holds that the exemption granted with reference to the Public service notification does not carry with it the privilege to -- appear for the special tests and that I am not therefore eligible to appear for the test (Vide copy of his memo No. 4470 dated 13th October 1920 attached). However I appeared for the test this year with his permission which was granted pending final -- orders on my representation.

I submit that I passed Revenue and Account tests after necessary exemption from the Board and request that you may be pleased to take pity on my case and address the Government to -- grant me exemption to appear for the Criminal Judicial test as a special case and to communicate a copy of their order to the Commissioner ^{for} Government Examinations, if the Government -- hold that under the existing rules I am not eligible to appear for the test.

Resolution.

Under head note 1 to the public service notification, ---
candidates who passed the Middle school Examination in the first
class and were permanently appointed to the public service ---
before 30th September 1894 are eligible for promotion equally
with men qualified under Article 1 of the notification, i.e. they
are presumably to be treated in all respects as passed men. They
are now, therefore, eligible to appear for all the special tests
and no special permission to allow the clerk (Accountant) refer-
red to, to appear for the Criminal Judicial Test is necessary.

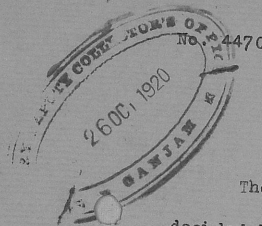
