I am directed to refer to my letter of the 6th November, regarding admissions to Oxford and Cambridge, and to say that the Delegates for Oriental Students at Oxford have recently had under consideration the new Statute granting exemption from Responsions to students holding the degree of B.A., or B.Sc. of an approved Indian University, if they have passed in one language. I am to say that it was then noted that in cases where the ~~ene~~ language required by the Statute has been offered, it is usually an Oriental language, and it was stated that many Colleges as well as the Non-Collegiate body are most reluctant to admit students who do not possess a knowledge of Latin or French. It was therefore considered advisable that the attention of the University and other authorities in India should be drawn to the fact that it will be difficult for Indian students to obtain an offer of admission unless they can show this knowledge of Latin or French, preferably by passing the Oxford or Cambridge Local School Certificate Examination.

2. I am to request that you will be so good as to give this matter such publicity as may be considered necessary and advisable.
