May it please your Excellency,

The humble application of S.Abdul Rahiman Khan Sahib, Amin District Munsif's Court, Villupuram, most respectfully sheweth:--

Your Excellency's humble applicant is the grandson of Subadar Major Sheerally Baig Khan Bahadur, Himmuthjung, Native Aid-de-camp to several Commander's in chief as well as to Governor of Fort Saint George who rendered meritorious service to the Benign Government and in recognition of which the then Government was pleased to bestow on the said Sheerally Baig Khan Bahadur Himmuthjung, a jahir, nowbut and a palanquin as a mark of distinction and also the then Government promised to guide the future prospects of the family of the said Sheerally Baig, your Excellency's humble applicant further submits that the income of the Jahir was not sufficient to maintain the --- members of the family who greatly increased in number sought the benign British Government's help to provide him with --- lucrative post and they have been provided. Your Excellency's humble applicant was consequently appointed in the year 1912 as a 3rd Grade Amin in the District Munsif's Court, Villupuram by late Henry Moberly I.C.S., the then District Judge of ---

South Arcot promising to bring him forward. Owing to the misfortune of Your Excellency's humble applicant, Henry Moberly I.C.S., was transferred and the prospects of your Excellency's humble applicant came to a stand still.

Your Excellency's Government was pleased to exempt the petitioner permanently for a clerk's post on pay not exceeding Rs. 35/- per mensem (Letter No. 236 Law Education) dated the 30th September 1921, from the Secretary to the -- Government of Madras -- High Court Dis. No. 1921 dated the 20th September 1921, District Court No. 3158 dated the 4th August 1921.

Your Excellency's humble applicant studied up to old Matriculation Class, and has a fair knowledge of in --- English and has acted as a clerk for a period of three months as Nazir's assistant for six months and as Nazir for a few days.

The family of your Excellency's humble applicant having since increased, he has to seek a better prospect and to have exemption from educational rules for a Dy. Nazir's post.

Your Excellency's humble applicant therefore ~~xxx~~ prays that he may also be exempted from educational rules for a Dy. Nazir's post on Rs. 65/- per mensem.

For which act of kindness and sympathy Your Excellency's name will ever be cherished in the heart of your Excellency's humble applicant.

Native Aide-de-Camp to several Commanders-in-Chief
As well as to Governor of Fort St. George:-

My dear Major Sheerally Baig,

I send you a sword and belt, which I request you to accept from me both as a friend and as Governor of Bombay. Your long service under this Presidency and your gallantry is still remembered by those under whom you acted. They agree with me that I could not connect so fine a blade, I now send which was a present from the Prince at Shiraz into hands that will better use it if ever opportunity offers.

My dear Major Sheerally Baig,

I have received your letter and felthappy with Mrs. Hislop to hear that you and your family are in the enjoyment of health. We received the very valuable pair of pearl earrings and Mrs. Hislop was very much pleased. We were much regretted in parting with so sincere a friend as yourself on leaving India. I have sent you a portrait of myself which I have to request you to keep in remembrance of me and I would like to have one of yours that I may do likewise whose heroic acts endeared to our hearts. You make an enquiry regarding the future of your family in the event of your decease. I can only tell you that the Government will do all in their power for the family of so distinguished and honourable an officer, the several battles fought and your length of service which are published in the Official Gazette testify the facts and you need not trouble yourself on the matters: Any thing in my power I shall heartily do for you. Please let me know the number of your children.

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Subadar Major Sheerlly Baig having served my three predecessors in office as Aides-de-Camp was attached in the same capacity for above five years and I feel gratified in the strong sense I have in his merit. I found him on all occasions faithful, attentive and obliging, The record of his military service proves for itself, but having recommended him for the high honor of Nowbut, it can hardly be necessary to add that I consider him worthy of every distinction that can be offered him, and he will ever have only good wishes with him.

Extract from G. O. deated Fort St. George 5th October, 1832, No. 239.

13. Subadar Major Sheerally Baig Sahib of the 3rd Regiment of Light Cavalry distinguished himself during a period of 44 years as a zealous, brave and active soldier. He was present at the storm of Bangalore in 1791, and at both sieges of Seringapatam under Marquis Cornwallis and Lord Harris, on foreign services in Ceylon, with Sir John Malcolm in persia and in Bengal receiving from that distinguished officer a sword as a mark of esteem, with the Bombay army from 1809 to 1813 in the course of which he signalised himself in a brilliant affair of horse under Lieut. Brooks near Naynese, and returning to Madras in 1814, served throughout the last Mahratta Campaign, in which he was immediately attached to Sir Thomas Hislop as an Aide-de-Camp, his services were noticed in general order of the 2nd February 1819, when he was presented with a palanquin and an allowance for its support. He has ever since continued to officiate as Aide-de-Camp at Headquarters, highly approved and commended by their Excellencies Lieut. Genl. the Hon. J. Abercromby, Lieut. Genls. Sir Thomas Hislop, Sir George Walker and the Hon. Sir Robert William O'Callaghan, and is now rewarded with the honor of the Nowbut and will be hereafter styled in the records of the Company, Sheerally Biag Khan Bahadur, Himmuth Jung.

16. The Right Honourable the Governor in Council has much pleasure in publishing for the information of the army the following extract of a despatch from the Hon. Court of Directors.

Letter from the Hon. Court of Directors dated 17th December 1845, No. 93, para 36. We have again considered the claims of Subadar Major Sheerally Baig, Khan Bahadur, Himmuth Jung, Native Aide-de-Camp to his Excellency the Commander-in-chief, an appointment which he has held on the staff of six successive Commanders-in-Chief and being of opinion on a review of the extraordinary length of service of 57 years and their distinguished nature and his having been three times been wounded, once severely and of high character which he has uniformly borne, that his services are such as to justify an exception in his favor to the general rule which prohibits special grant in such cases, we have resolved to authorise the grant of a Shotrium of land of suitable value for his own life and to be continued to his two next male heirs on the principle specified in our letter in Revenue Department dated 16th June 1841, No. 5. Under this authority conveyed by the Hon. Court, His Lordship in Council directs that sixty cawnies of land on shotrium tenure be granted to Subadar Major Sheerally Baig Khan Bahadur, Himmuth Jung, which will be continued to his two next male heirs, the value of share being reduced on the succession of next heir to two thirds and during the life time of the last to one third.

I am much gratified on the occasion of my relinquishing the command of the Madras army in testifying my high sense of the zeal and fidelity of Subadar Major Sheerally Baig, Khan Bahadur, Himmuth Jung, my native Aide-de-Camp, who has been attached to me in that capacity from the period of my arrival in India in May 1831, and has proved himself deserving of my warmest approbation. He accompanied me in two tours of inspection during which his activity, readiness, attention and intelligence rendered him of the most essential service. I have had great pleasure in introducing him to my successor in the command, Sir peregrine Maitland, and in strongly recommending him to his favor and protection. It is unnecessary that I should refer to his brave and distinguished services, as they are detailed in para 5 of the General Orders by the Government No. 239 dated the 5th October 1832.

I am the fifth Commander-in-Chief he has served as native Aide-de-Camp and I am confident that he will retain his high and honourable character under my successors.

I entirely concur in all that my predecessor, Sir Robert O. Callaghan has said respecting Subadar Major Sheerally Baig Khan Bahadur, Himmuth Jung. My native Aide-de-Camp and must have great pleasure in introducing him to my successor, Sir Jasper Nicolls, and in strongly recommending him to his favor and protection.

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I came to Madras on the 24th September 1842 and took up my appointment as Governor and Commander-in-Chief from which period Subadar Major Sheerally Baig Khan Bahadur, Himmuth Jung, was my military Native Aide-de-Camp. I have always considered and esteemed him to be a zealous, brave, active, intelligent and trustworthy officer. His service under the State extends to several years and I have never known a case of an officer of so lengthened a period and continued service and the record of his military service published in General Orders is highly satisfactory. I have always consulted him in matters connected with the army and found his advice to be of a reliable nature. I found that in matters concerning himself he was far from asking a favor of any kind. He presented his three sons to me and stated that his family consisted of his wife, three sons and two daughters. I have not the least doubt that the State would be justified at any future day, in the event of his becoming a casualty, to confer the military pay and allowance of so distinguished an officer on his family for their lives.
