Abstract.

Health Inspectors - Director of Public Health's proposal to appoint reserve 15 per cent of the Cadre to L.M.Ps; and to exempt them from Vaccination training - Approved.

ORDER.

The Government approve the proposal of the Director of Public Health to reserve 15% of the Health Inspectors cadre for L.M.Ps and to appoint them as Health Inspectors in charge of the District headquarters ranges to assist the District Health Officer, in addition to their ordinary duties as Inspectors. They also approve the Director of Public Health's proposal to exempt them from the vaccination training prescribed in G.O. No. 656 Law (Education), dated 30th April 1924. These L.M.P. Health Inspectors will however, after appointment, be required to undergo the quinquennial course of training prescribed for sanitary inspectors and Health Inspectors in the Medical College.

2. Separate orders will issue in the Law (Education) Department modifying the Public Service notification accordingly.

Copy of letter R.No. 155-1/E-, dated 22nd April 1925, from the Director of Public Health, M a d r a s.

At the Conference of Health Officers which was held in this office between the 11th and 15th of March 1925, the opinion was un-
animously expressed that it would be to the advantage and
efficiency of the Health staff of the district if a reserve
Health Inspector with L.M.P. qualifications is appointed at the
headquarters of each district to assist the District Health Officer.
With this suggestion I am inclined to agree. The advantages of
having L.M.P. Health Inspectors are obvious in times of epidemic
such as cholera or relapsing fever. Being medical men, they
themselves can render medical help to the patients immediately
without delay. The Government have already in their order No.
(C) 656 Misc., dated 30th April 1924 recognised the L.M.P. Diploma as
one of the alternative qualifications required for appointment as
Health Inspector provided the holders of such diplomas are also
qualified as 1st. class Vaccinators and in Minor Sanitary
Engineering. I consider, however, that the vaccination training
need not be insisted on in the case of these men as they gain
practical knowledge of vaccination during their medical course.
Minor Sanitary Engineering qualification is, however, essential and
can be arranged for by sending up such men after their appointment
to undergo the quinquennial course of training prescribed for
Sanitary Inspectors and Health Inspectors in the Medical College,
Madras. With ~~their~~ their knowledge and training, the L.M.P.
Health Inspectors will be able to follow the advanced course of
training in Minor Sanitary Engineering which is given to the other
Health Inspectors. I trust that Government therefore will agree
to throw open Health Inspectors appointments to L.M.Ps., subject
to the qualifications in Minor Sanitary Engineering recommended
above. As it is proposed to appoint L.M.P. Health Inspectors
only at headquarters/~~in the stations of district,~~ stations of district, I would fix the maximum
of such appointments to 15 per cent of the cadre of Health
Inspectors. By fixing a limit of this kind to the numbers of
L.M.P. Health Inspectors, the claims of those Sanitary Inspectors

3/ who are already in the waiting list and those of the first class vaccinators in the districts who naturally look forward to become Health Inspectors, will be sufficiently safe-guarded. If Government approves of my proposal, it will be necessary to modify the Public Service Notifications issued with G.O.No. 656, dated 23 30th April 1924.

Appointment of persons with the L.M.P. qualifications as Health Inspectors from the Director of Public Health, R. 155-1/G1, dated 22nd April 1925.

(c) 1. In G.O.656 Law (Education) dated 30th April 1924 the Government laid down that candidates qualified as sub assistant surgeons will be allowed to be appointed as Health Inspectors provided they completed a course of training in Vaccination at the King Institute and qualified themselves in minor Sanitary Engineering.

(p) 2. In G.O.842 P.H., dated 2nd June 1924 L.M.P. candidates with second class Health Officer's training were allowed to be appointed as Health Inspectors on a starting pay of Rs.75 per mensem subject to the condition that a District Health Inspector so appointed would not be allowed to draw his next increment till he completed six years service.

3. In pursuance of the recommendation of the Health Officer's Conference the Director of Public Health proposes to appoint as Health Inspectors persons holding the L.M.P. diploma without insisting on vaccination training and minor Sanitary Engineering course as essential preliminary qualifications. The knowledge of vaccination picked up in their medical course is considered sufficient while the training in minor Sanitary Engineering is proposed to be imparted when they are deputed for the usual quinquennial training. It is also proposed to appoint these L.M.P. Health Inspectors in district headquarters, as personal assistant to the District Health Officers and to confine their strength to fifteen per cent of the Cadre.

4. The proposal to appoint L.M.P. candidates as Health Inspectors without insisting on the two qualifications referred to above at the very outset may be approved. But it is not very clear whether these officers are to do the work of personal assistants to the District Health Officers in addition to their ordinary out-door taluk work, whether it is proposed to sanction additional posts of Health Inspectors to

to accommodate these L.M.P., candidates or whether it is proposed to distribute them among the existing staff as vacancies occur. The Director of Public Health refers to 'reserve' health inspectors with L.M.P. qualifications being appointed to assist the District Health Officers. It may be mentioned that definite orders have not yet been passed on the Director of Public Health's renewed proposal to sanction 28 additional posts of Health Inspectors. The strength of the staff of Health Inspectors in the District Health Scheme stands at 220 - excluding the Health Inspectors working in the Agency. At 15 per cent of the cadre the appointments proposed to be reserved for the new L.M.P. Health Inspectors will be 33 and if the new posts proposed are also taken into account the number will be 37. If the object is only to provide each District Health Officer with a personal assistant it is not understood why it is proposed to 'reserve' such a large number of posts for them.

5. The Director of Public Health may be requested U.O. to clear up these points. The Director of Public Health's letter reads as if nothing more than a modification of the Public Service Notification, is desired; but this is not quite clear. Will not the acceptance of this proposal involve additional expense, and if it does, how much? We have no reserve 'Health Inspectors now; is it proposed to create a reserve?

The phrase "reserve health inspector" is misleading. It is not proposed to create a reserve staff of Health Inspectors but to reserve 15 per cent of the Health Inspector's cadre to L.M.Ps and appoint them as and when vacancies arise. These Health Inspectors with L.M.P. qualifications will be in charge of ranges as other Health Inspectors but will be stationed at Headquarters of the District Health Officers. The proposal does not involve any additional expenditure.

The reservation of 15 per cent of the Health Inspectors posts for L.M.Ps will therefore result in some extra cost immediately though there will be no ultimate extra cost.

As however the proposal is put forward on administrative ground Finance need not perhaps object to it and may accept the draft order.

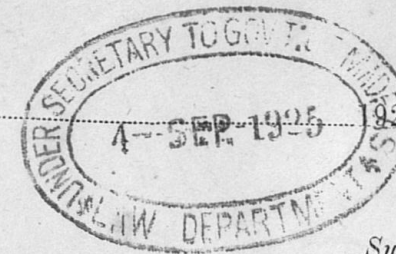

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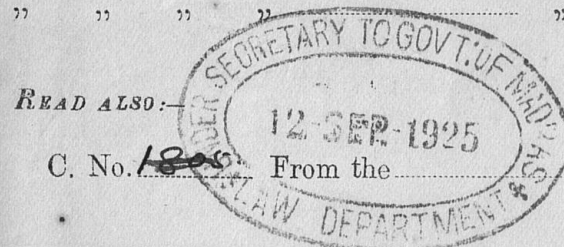

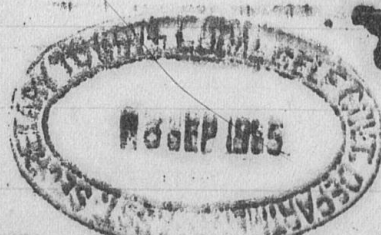

In the table appended to article 3 of the Public Service Notification published on pages 34 to 47 of Part 1-B of the Fort St. George Gazette, dated the 15th January 1924, as amended by notification No.131, published on page 402 of Part 1-B of the Fort St. George Gazette, dated the 6th May 1924, under the heading "Public Health Department", the following shall be added as note under (iv) against item "(5) Health Inspectors":-

"Note - L. M. Ps who are appointed as Health Inspectors in charge of the District headquarters ranges, are exempted from the vaccination training prescribed in G. O. No.656, Law (Education), dated the 30th April 1924; they will, however, after appointment, be required to undergo the quinquennial course of training prescribed for Sanitary Inspectors and Health Inspectors in the Madras Medical College".
