Sir,

I have the honour to state that Miss T. Joseph who was deputed to England in G.O. No. 1029, Law (Education), dated 14th July 1921 returned to Madras on the 31st August 1925. I have in a separate communication recommended her appointment as Assistant Professor, Queen Mary's College in the Madras Educational Service (Women's Branch) ^{vice} since Miss Gunther on other duty as Professor in the same college.

2. With reference to para 2 of G.O. No. 1029, Law (Education), dated 14th July 1921, the period of deputation of Miss Joseph will count for pension, promotion and leave. She was in receipt of a pay of Rs. 230 plus 40 temporary addition

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at the time of her deputation.

Miss C.N. Nallamuthu Ammal who was junior to Miss Joseph was in receipt of a salary of Rs. 200 plus 40 temporary addition at the time of the latter's deputation. Miss Nallamuthu Ammal was subsequently confirmed in the Madras Educational Service on the 10th July 1922 and her pay in the cadre was fixed at Rs. 260/- per mensem and her pay in the cadre is now Rs. 320/- per mensem.

3. If Miss Joseph had continued in the college she would probably have been appointed in the Madras Educational Service. Dr. Gilbert Slater has spoken highly of the work of Miss Joseph during her deputation.

Dr. Quayle, Joint Secretary to the High Commissioner, has stated that Miss Joseph has taken a brilliant first class at the School of Economics and the Cambridge Teachers' Diploma with an endorsement as a specialised teacher in History and that the authorities at the London School of Economics have told him from time to time that they regard her as one of the very best students of any nationality they have ever had.

In the above circumstances, I recommend that Miss T. Joseph be permitted to draw with effect from the date of her joining duty pay at Rs. 360/- per mensem which would be her pay now had she been appointed to the Madras Educational Service along with Miss C.N. Nallamuthu Ammal.

Miss Joseph was appointed as officiating assistant Professor, Queen Mary's college, on Rs. 200-10-250 from 1-9-17. She was deputed to England for special training in 1921. One of the conditions of her deputation was that the period spent by her in England should count for leave, promotion and pension. On the 20th August 1921 when she left for England her pay in the department as Officiating Assistant Professor was Rs. 230 plus (temporary increase) of Rs. 40. She has returned and the D.P.I. has separately proposed her appointment to the M.E.S. As she was senior to Miss Nallamuthu Ammal who was promoted to the M.E.S. from 10th July 1922, the D.P.I. proposes that Miss Joseph should now be granted Rs. 360 per mensem, the pay which she would have drawn if she had been appointed to the M.E.S. on 10-7-22. If she had not gone to England but had continued in the ~~subordinate~~ service she would have drawn in July 1922 Rs. 240 plus 40 (temporary increase). The A.G. may be requested to state whether the pay proposed by the D.P.I. is admissible.

Finance (C.S.R.)

The pay of Miss. Joseph on 20-8-1921, the date on which she left for England on deputation, was Rs.230 plus Rs.40 per mensem (temporary addition) or in all Rs.270. The Secretary of State ordered that the period of deputation spent in England was to count for leave, promotion and pension. Her junior, Miss. Nallamuthu Ammal, was confirmed in the M.E.S. on 10-7-1922. If Miss. Joseph had not gone to England but continued in the subordinate service she would have drawn on 10-7-1922 Rs.240 plus Rs.40 or in all Rs.280 per mensem. It may be assumed that if she had not gone to England, she would have been promoted to the M.E.S. on 10-7-1922 in the scale of Rs.200-20-400-25-500. On this assumption her pay will work to:--

Rs.300 p.m. on 10-7-22, i.e., on change of cadre Rs.280 + 20 (F.R.22)

Rs.320 p.m. on 10-7-23.

Rs.340 p.m. on 10-7-24.

Rs.360 p.m. on 10-7-25.
