Sir,

With reference to item 51 of Appendix to the Madras Treasury Manual, Vol. II, I have the honour to request that the Government will be pleased to sanction the purchase of a teakwood insect cabinet, very urgently required, holding 100 drawers in four tiers of 25 each, as per plan enclosed for reference and return, at a cost not exceeding Rs. 975-12-0. As the work is of a very special nature, and as only those who are acquainted with similar work can be entrusted with it, tenders have been invited from competent cabinet makers, and the most favourable rate accepted. Penetentiary

Penetentiary were previously consulted if they would be able to supply the cabinet. The former reports that the work is of so different a character from the usual work undertaken there, that even if they are able to do it, it will take many months to complete and will probably be much more expensive than if made elsewhere, adding that they have very few workmen, and it is doubtful if some of the materials could be procured locally. The Penetentiary could not prepare the estimate or undertake the work, as they have several orders from Government offices on hand. In this connection, I have to state that with reference to paragraph 11 of G.O. No. 1226 dated 28th July 1924, orders for the supply of furniture and other articles are as a rule placed with the Penetentiary or the School of Arts. It is however found that the latter is generally unable to undertake any big work owing to scarcity of workmen. The Penetentiary generally supplies the articles required, though it ~~may~~ takes a very long time over big works. Though the Superintendent of Prisons states that every endeavour will be made to complete the cases ordered satisfactorily, he regrets he cannot take them back, as orders for such articles are not given by any other department. It will therefore cause much ^{waste &} inconvenience if through any fault in execution, any case should prove unsuitable to our purpose. In the circumstances I have to request that the Government will be pleased to authorise the purchase of specially designed cases elsewhere as in the present instance, provided that tenders are invited and orders placed at as favourable a rate as possible. Office furniture and works of an ordinary nature will continue to be ordered of the Penetentiary.

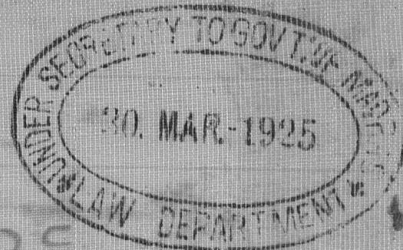
