Sir,

Submitted to Government, Law (Education) Department, with the following remarks :-

Mr. Sadasiva Reddi was first appointed as officiating District Educational Officer, Cuddapah, in the Madras Educational Service in February 1923. In June 1923 he was posted as Principal, Coimbatore College, in the Indian Educational Service. While at Coimbatore, there were complaints against him and the permanent Director, after personal enquiry, has noted that Mr. Reddi is not fit to be confirmed at ~~present~~ -- if ever in the Indian Educational Service.

Attention is also invited to R.R. No. 32/24, dated 17th November 1924 from which it will be observed that it has been decided to post Mr. Sadasiva Reddi as officiating Lecturer in

History, Government College, Kumbakonam, in the Madras Educational Service in May 1925.

I see no reason to recommend a higher rate of pay to Mr. Sadasiva Reddi.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit the following facts for your consideration. I am History Honours graduate of the Madras and the Oxford Universities. My collegiate career in Madras as well as in Oxford was not entirely uneventful. I was the recipient of several prizes and scholarships while studying in the Christian College, Madras. In St. John's College, Oxford, I competed for an open senior scholarship and was awarded the same on the results of the competitive examination. After taking my degree I underwent at Oxford the full course in Anthropology and took the Diploma therein with distinction standing first at the examination. I am also registered as an Advanced student for the Doctrate in Philosophy of the Oxford University and was specially permitted to continue my research in India.

In 1922 soon after my return to India I applied for a post in the Indian Educational Service but the Director was pleased to offer me an appointment in the Madras Educational Service as a lecturer. As I felt then that offer's whose qualifications were decidedly inferior to mine were offered posts in the Indian Educational Service I naturally declined the offer as prejudicial to my future prospects. Again in January 1923 I was offered another appointment in the Madras Educational Service as a District Educational Officer. Realising that there were no vacancies in the Indian Educational Service just then and confident that the next vacancy in that cadre would be given to me, I accepted the offer and was appointed as District Educational Officer at Cuddapah in February.

In June of the same year, I was posted as Principal of the Coim-bature College in the Indian Educational Service and continued in that post and in that cadre till the 15th of December 1924 when the Government reduced the Principal's post to the Provincial cadre. Subsequently in January I was transferred to Anantapur as District Educational Officer in the Madras Educational Service.

I have the honour to submit that the immediate prospect of being taken into the Indian Educational Service alone induced me to accept service in the Madras Educational Service. Except for the first four months of my service, I have been all along in the Indian Educational Service and my present reversion comes as a painful shock to me.

Even now I might have consoled myself with the hope that my reversion would be of a temporary nature if it had been found necessary in the exigencies of service but the post of the Principal itself was reduced to the lower cadre and the contemplated provincialisation of the Educational service removes all future prospects of promotion. I beg to invite your kind attention to the great disparity between the pay I drew as Principal and the pay that I am now drawing which is but a poor return for the trouble and expence incurred in undergoing a long and costly course of training in a foreign country. I may also be allowed to point out that I am a native of the Ceded Districts and belong to the most backward community in the most backward districts of the Presidency. I beg to point out that it is impossible to maintain oneself with any degree of comfort on the inadequate salary I am now allowed to draw and the Government may therefore in their kindness grant some additional allowance to compensate for the large reduction in salary which I have sustained, and for the loss of future prospects. I beg to submit that my present pay might at least be fixed at the rate of pay I last drew in the Indian Educational Service.

Notes after discussion with the D.P.I.

AS a general rule where confirmation in the I.E.S was not guaranteed or ~~assured~~ ^{assured} no claim for higher initial salary on reversion to M.E.S can be sustained and Government should not now grant any concession.

This general principle covers the cases of Messrs. Chettur and Sadasiva Reddy.

2. The case of Mr. P. Ragavachari is slightly different as he acted for five years and when the provincialisation of services was not contemplated; the decision ~~is~~ ^{was} so long pending that some concession in his case would appear justifiable.

It is therefore suggested that the average salary for ~~5 1/2~~ ^{5 1/2} years in the I.E.S or Rs. 500 as initial salary whichever is lower may be fixed as the initial salary in the M.E.S

3. In the case of Venkataraman as it would raise the case of large number of other officers it is inadvisable to make a concession in his particular case though he has a fair case.

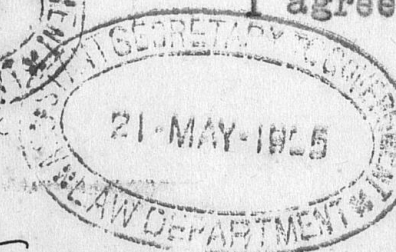
