Read the following letter from H. NEWMAN, Esq., President of the Local Fund Boards, Kistna District, to H. E. STOKES, Esq., Acting Secretary to the Board of Revenue, dated Masulipatam, 17th September 1875, No. 173:—

WITH reference to paragraph 2 of the Board's Proceedings, No. 2,233, dated 10th August 1875, I have the honor to explain that no wards for in-patients were provided in the plans, because the Local Board had only resolved upon establishing dispensaries, and were not prepared to establish hospitals for in-patients at present.

2. Quarters, or rather rooms, for the Medical Officer employed were provided for. The Local Board originally intended to employ Native Hospital Assistants. But an order of Government having been promulgated to the effect that no officers below the grade of a Hospital Apprentice should be placed in charge of dispensaries, these latter officers were applied for. Those of them whom I have seen are East Indians. Mr. Leman was, it appears, strongly opposed to their appointment on the ground of their youth, and the absence of any proper accommodation for them in the villages.

3. The Surgeon-General was of opinion that they would be found to succeed, and obtain the confidence of the villagers, and to surmount the difficulties likely to be encountered at the outset. They have in fact managed to find quarters of some sort. I have only been able to visit one of them as yet. I was then very favorably impressed with the apparent progress made in obtaining general confidence. But as the Surgeon-General moves them away as soon as they become entitled to any promotion, having removed two out of three already, it appears to me that there will be found to be many objections to the employment of officers of this grade, for most of them are unacquainted with Telugu or with this country when they leave Madras. By the time that they have acquired some knowledge of the language and the customs of the people, they are removed. But if these gentlemen are employed, the provision of quarters is very necessary. They have families, and cannot live in the ordinary native houses, which indeed often cannot be hired.

4. It will be observed that I did not write that the plans had been suggested by the Surgeon-General, but that his suggestions had been considered. There was a correspondence between him and Mr. Leman at the time the dispensaries were first started.

5. As action in the matter is to be suspended pending the settlement of a standard plan, I have the honor to return these three* plans, and will await further orders.
