From the Most Honorable the Secretary of State for India, to His Excellency the Most Honorable the Governor-General of India in Council, dated India Office, London, 16th December 1880, No. 425, Financial.

In a Financial Despatch of the 6th September 1871, No. 303, the Duke of Argyll directed the attention of your Government to an entry in the leave and pay certificate furnished to Mr. C. W. Wilmot, an Uncovenanted Assistant Collector at Rajmahal, in which it was stated that that officer's leave might be extended for three years without pay, and requested that as such entries were calculated to lead officers to suppose that they were entitled to have their sick leave extended for three years without pay, the attention of the various officers of account in India might be drawn to the necessity of such certificates stating correctly the period for, and terms on which, leave granted in India might be extended or commuted.

2. I now forward the duplicate of the leave and pay certificate issued to Mr. J. R. Thomas, Head Master of the Brennen High School at Tellicherry, in the Malabar District, Madras, together with a copy of correspondence* with that officer relative to an application which he has preferred for an extension of leave for the period of one year without pay.

3. It appears from the last pay certificate that the Director of Public Instruction reported that he had no objection to Mr. Thomas's leave being extended or commuted,—a remark which must be presumed to have referred to such extension as would be in accordance with the ordinary rules of the service.

4. The Officiating Assistant Accountant-General, while entering that report on the certificate, observed correctly that the leave of Mr. Thomas "may not be extended, but may be commuted into leave on medical certificate under Section 4 of the Supplement F, Civil Leave Code, for two years." He added, however, that "leave without allowances under Section 10 may be granted up to a maximum of four years if in continuation of furlough, or of three years if in continuation of leave on medical certificate."

5. Such an entry is calculated to lead to misconception. In certifying that there was no objection to the extension of Mr. Thomas's leave, the Director of Public Instruction cannot be supposed to have meant that that officer could remain absent from his duty for five years without inconvenience to the public service,—a statement which would have appeared to render necessary some reduction of the establishment.

6. An officer, however, who finds such a note on his certificate, may be induced thereby to suppose that he has a claim to the grant of any leave therein mentioned; and I request that instructions may be given in future that the record shall be limited to extensions or commutation which may be granted in the ordinary course, and shall not include special leave without pay, which is never allowed unless peculiar circumstances seem to justify an exceptional treatment of the case.
