The humble Petition of RAMASAMI NAIDU, late
2nd Class Constable, No. 601, Trichinopoly
District.

MOST RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH,

That Your Excellency's Petitioner was after a long service of eleven and half years dismissed by the Superintendent of Police under the Black Mark Rules as having 6 Black Marks outstanding against him on 28th August 1894 (*Vide* Exhibit No. 1) and the Inspector-General of Police to whom he appealed (*Vide* Exhibit No. 2) confirmed the said order in his Official Memorandum, dated 14th November 1894, (Exhibit No. 3).

The Petitioner begs leave to appeal to Your Excellency in the full hope that his matter will receive your kind and gracious consideration and justice will be meted out to him.

Madras Police Order No. 74 relating to Black marks runs thus :—
No. 74, Black Marks.

The following system of Black Marks will be used as far as possible, instead of the objectionable punishment of fining :—

- (1). One Black mark may be given at a time as a punishment for minor offences.
- (2). Three Black marks entail reduction.
- (3). Six Black marks entail discharge.
- (4). A period of six months' uninterrupted good conduct wipes off three Black marks, if no more are outstanding.
- (5). One year's uninterrupted good conduct wipes all Black marks.
- (6). The existence of a Black mark bars promotion, leave and other indulgences until wiped off by the requisite period of good conduct.

Note.—If leave is absolutely necessary to a man against whom there is a Black mark, it may be given without pay.

(7). When two or five Black marks have been recorded against a man, he should be carefully warned that the next will entail reduction or discharge, as the case may be.

(8). When dismissal or reduction is the consequence of the award of a Black mark, a short minute must be recorded on the facts of the case in which the Black mark is awarded.

(9). Black marks are registered in the usual way in the Defaulter's Books as "punishment awarded". Reference to defaulter's book and index at once shows the number and dates of Black marks.

(10). If it is found absolutely necessary to inflict fine or other punishment, a Black mark should also be added if it is intended that the punishment shall count towards reduction or dismissal.

I have the honor to submit for orders an
appeal petition from one Ramaswami Naidu
2nd Class Constable No: 601 Trichinopoly District
appealing against an order of Colonel Porten
declining to interfere with the man's dismissal
under the Black Mark Rules as he had been
awarded Six Black Marks. —

2. The man in his appeal does not claim that
his Black marks were wrong but states that
he had only 5 and not Six black marks
against him. This is wrong. His Black marks
were as follows:—

- (1) 6 April 1893. Fined 8 Annas.
- (2) 18 May 1893.
- (3) 30 May 1893.
- (4) 9 September 1893.
- (5) 11 September 1893.
- (6) 19 August 1894.

The man had Six black marks against him
and he had been warned twice in January
and March 1894.
given him.

Colonel Porteous expressly stated in his report
that he would not have confirmed the
of dismissal in this case had the man
been shown to have had a very indifferent
character. The perusal of the records will show
that the man in his appeal gave a false ac-
count of the circumstances which led to almost
his previous Black Marks. He made false
charges against his Inspectors and also made
false statements as to the facts which had
brought about his punishment. He had not
pleaded against any of them and so it must
be taken that they were properly awarded.

The man appealed to me to revise
Colonel Porteous' order but I declined to do so
and now have no recommendation to offer
in his behalf.
