I have the honor to submit the accompanying letter with its enclosures from the Superintendent of Police, Melore, asking for sanction of Government to defend at the public expense two civil suits against the Superintendent Mr. Egan, Inspectors Menead and Head Constable Chensee Sha in the District Munsiff's Court at Melore. In one of the suits the plaintiff A. Venkata macharla, Trustee of Ranganayakula swami temple alleges that Inspectors Menead acting maliciously and wrongfully prevented the march of a procession of the temple idol with music and drum on the bazaar high road on the 10th October 1894 and claims damages

damages therefor. It would appear from the précis of case forwarded by the Superintendent that Inspector Menend acting in pursuance of an order of the District Magistrate issued in 1889 asked the processionists to stop music when passing in front of a Muhammadan Mosque as he apprehended there would otherwise be a breach of the peace but they did not agree to this. The Sub. Magistrate just then arrived and instructed the processionists to return to the temple as there was likelihood of a disturbance. They accordingly went back.

In the other suit the plaintiff is one Venkayya Kapu who seeks compensation for alleged illegal arrest and detention in custody by the Superintendent of Police, Inspector Menend and Constable Chenzu Sha. Owing to the state of the feeling between the Hindus and Muhammadans the Superintendent stated that the District Magistrate issued an order that during the Hindu Dasera feast in September and October 1894 no one should put on a "Tiger" disguise. But contravention of this order Venkayya Kapu was seen parading through the city with the prohibited

prohibited disguise on the 5th October 1894. He was therefore arrested by the Police, charged and convicted by the Head Assistant Magistrate under Section 108, Indian Penal Code, and sentenced to 14 days' imprisonment. The conviction was upheld by the High Court on the revision side. Under these circumstances I request that the Government may be pleased to sanction the defence at the public expense of both the suits.
