I have the honor to request that the R.A. Min. the Secy. of State may be moved to sanction the appointment of an additional Subordinate Judge of the lowest grade (salary Rs. 500 p.m.) for a period of nine months beginning with 1st July 1895.

2. From information which has been furnished ^{by the M. G. C.} it appears that, on the 1st Jan'y. 1895, the following cases were pending on the file of the Nellore D.C. Court: - 71 original suits of which 42 had been on the file for more than a year and 643 appeals of which 404 were on questions of title and 421 had been pending for over six months. For this unsatisfactory state of the Nellore Court, the late D.C. Judge Mr. C. Ramachandra Aiyer, who has since retired from the public service, appears to be mainly responsible.

Honorable Sir,

I am directed to bring to the notice of Government the state of the file of the Nellore District Court. There were pending on January 1st, 1895, 71 original suits of which 42 had been on the files for over one year, 643 appeals of which 404 were on questions of title and 421 had been pending for over six months. The High Court considers it absolutely necessary that a subordinate judge should be sent to aid in clearing off the arrears. The state of the Nellore Court is quite

inexcusable since the Sessions there are, as a rule, light and for it the late District Judge Mr. C. Ramachandra Aiyar is mainly responsible. At the same time Mr. K. C. Manavedan Raja, late acting District Judge, cannot be exonerated, for he did not do the amount of work he might reasonably have been expected to do during the time he was in charge. During the last quarter he only disposed of 52 appeals (of which 10 were dismissed for default,) 7 original suits and 31 small Causes. The Sessions cases were only six for the quarter though one tried in December was a long case lasting 10 or 11 days in which 56 witnesses were examined.]

2. In these circumstances I am directed to suggest that His Excellency the Governor in Council will be pleased to obtain sanction for the establishment of a temporary Subordinate Judge's Court at Kellore for 8 or 9 months from the re-opening

of the Courts there after the vacation.
3. The necessary proposition statement shewing the establishment required and a draft notification relating to jurisdiction will be submitted on receipt of sanction.

This is an application for sanction to the entertainment of a temporary sub-judge in helpee. for 6 or 9 months after the vacation. The accompanying table shows the growth of civil arrears in the District Court for which the retired Statutory Civilian C Ramachandra Aiyar is mainly responsible inasmuch as he occupied the Court from March 1888 to March 1894.

The High Court attaches blame to ~~the~~ Manavedan Raja also. This officer however had only had four months previous experience of the duties of a District & Sessions Judge.

2. On the 1st January 91 original suits & 643 appeals were pending. - In 1893, the average disposals per District Court came to 20 original suits and 348 appellate. - It appears therefore that it will take a sub-court at least 9 months to reduce the arrears to a satisfactory condition & that the High Court is not seeking aid for an unreasonable length of time.
