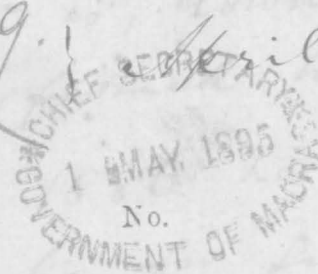

May it please your Excellency,

1. Your Excellency's petitioner was entertain-
ed in the Tanjore Police Force in 1871.
He was promoted to the grade of
Head Constable in 1880. For six years,
that is, down to the end of 1886, he
performed his duties most satisfactorily.
2. In 1886 he was awarded three black
marks for such venial offences as (1)
absence from duty for one day (2)
not keeping the arms of the ^{station} clean (3)
and failing to give a list of a wandering
gang within time.
3. Your Excellency's petitioner was
again recommended for promotion
in the time of J. E. Thomas Esq. on the
ground that he had obtained four
Red marks for detaching two dacoity
cases and one theft case and for
securing conviction in the said cases.
4. Your Excellency's petitioner was
then made Head Constable on
probation. But instead of giving him
independent charge of a station

he was posted merely as Section officer
in C/1 Division (Kumbakonam). During
his stay there he did much useful
work in conducting Police prosecutions
before the Magistrate.

5. During the period of Probation, he
was fined annas eight on the hasty
report of the Inspector. Your Excellency's
petitioner appealed to the Deputy Inspector
General of Police, & had the fine
cancelled so that the period of
probation was untarnished &
spotless.

6. When the appeal mentioned in
para: 5 was sub judice, The Deputy
Inspector General of Police ordered that
the petitioner should be removed from
station charge and the probation
should cease. The petitioner wishes
to remark en passant that he was not
doing station work. Secondly when
the fine was cancelled, he was
entitled to the grade of Stand. Constable.
Which was not given him.

7. He represented his right to the
grade of Std. Constable to the local
Authorities & to the Inspector General
of Police both of whom declined
to interfere.

I have the honor to forward an appeal
petition from Constable Kannaewami
Pallay of Tanjore District appealing
against an order of Colonel Porteous
declining to interfere with an order of
Colonel Kilgour by which the appellant's
reversion from his post as a probationer
Head Constable was ordered.

2. The man was 1st class constable and was appointed a Head Constable 4th class on probation in May 1893.

In November the Superintendent reported unfavorably of the man and in consequence Colonel Kilgour ordered his period of probation to cease. The man appeals against this

Colonel

Colonel Kilgour appears to have thought the man had station charge as a 4th Grade Head Constable but he really was doing duty as a section officer in Kumbakonam. That has, however, nothing to do with the matter. His immediate superior, reported unfavorably of the man and this officer is a 1st class Inspector one Srinivasa Chari of excellent character. The petitioner has nothing to say against him, and it may be supposed that he formed his opinion fairly after watching the man's work. The man was on probation and I submit it was perfectly within the discretion of Colonel Kilgour to order his probation to cease. It does not seem a case for interference.
