READ—the following letter from J. G. HORSFALL, Esq., Collector of Ganjam, to the Secretary to Government, Revenue Department, dated Chatrapur, 23rd February 1889, No. 1041:—

With reference to Proceedings of Government, Revenue Department, dated 7th February 1889, No. 66, I have the honor to state that estimates are being prepared for the whole line of road from Berhampore to Govindapore *via* Digupudi and Pudamari, about 32 miles, as well as for the Suradā-Russellkonda road, 16 miles, and I trust that both these will be ready before it becomes necessary to commence work upon them. An estimate for reconstruction of road from trunk road to Kallikót, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles, amounting to Rs. 2,766, is now ready, as also for its continuation to Atagada for Rs. 38,800. Besides these there are ready estimates for special repairs for different roads to the amount of about Rs. 35,481. I have also called upon the District Engineer to have estimates prepared as early as possible for the continuation of the proposed road from Kallikót to Atagada to Boirani on the one side and to Buguda on the other side. Estimates have also been ordered for the roads referred to by Mr. Garstin in the sub-division. One estimate for a branch road from Kasibugga to Palasa is now ready (Rs. 3,600) and also estimates for special repairs to roads in the sub-division to about Rs. 10,000. I hope to be able to submit a complete programme in a few days.

2. At present, the number on works is slightly over 15,000, and as I understand the Suradā portion of the Rushikulya works is to be recommenced, there will be employment for 15,000 more on the Rushikulya works alone.

3. With reference to paragraph 2 of the order, I have already reported that I do not at present require the staff of civil officers to be strengthened. I shall, I think, with Mr. Carr's assistance, be able to get on for some time longer — at any rate until matters get much worse than they are at present. On the Gopálpur canal there are about 6,000 laborers employed on one spot and the remainder at two different places. These can be easily looked after by Mr. Elphinstone. On the Rushikulya, the laborers are scattered a good deal and no civil officer is needed at present. Public Works Department overseers, however, are much wanted. The Gopálpur works are within easy reach of the Gopálpur, Berhampore, Chatrapur and Ganjam markets, and on my inspection, yesterday, I found ample bazaars on the site. I have as yet received no complaints of insufficiency of supplies to the laborers employed on the Rushikulya works.

4. I do not consider it necessary to commence immediately relief works in Tekkáli division. Mr. Horne was waiting for food-grains in order to commence the Taptapani ghát, being afraid to collect large gangs so long as grain was not procurable. I received Government telegram, sanctioning purchase of grain yesterday and am despatching 1,000 rupees' worth of ragi from Berhampore, so that Mr. Horne will be in a position to commence work there in a few days. He has already commenced the sinking of wells.

5. Two overseers and a draftsman would be of great use in preparing estimates and plans of roads to be executed. I am unable to find capable men in this district, and much need their services.

6. From personal observation and inquiry, I find that a large proportion of the laborers who have come upon the work are of the ryot class. Of the emigrants to Rangoon, over 10,346, nearly all are ryots. I will report further on this point when the Engineers' replies to my references are received.

7. Rice to a small amount only is now offering at Cocanada at Rs. 5-12-0 per bag. The merchants say that it costs, including freight, over Rs. 1-4-0 per bag to land at Gopálpur and it does not, therefore, at present rates, pay them to import, as Cocanada rice is a drug in the market and is being offered at Gopálpur at Rs. 6-8-0 per bag. Orissa rice fetches from 7 to 9 rupees per bag.

One estimate for a branch road from Kasibugga to Pakara is now ready, Rs. 3600 and also estimates for special repairs to roads in the sub-division to about Rs. 10000. I hope to be able to submit a complete programme in a few days.

2. At present the number on works is slightly over 15000 and as I understand the Surata portion of the Rushikulya works is to be recommenced. There will be employment for 15000 more on the Rushikulya works alone.

3. With reference to para 2 of the order I have already reported that I do not at present require the staff of civil officers to be stringhanded. I shall, I think, with Mr. Carr's assistance be able to get on for some time longer — at any rate until matters get much worse than they

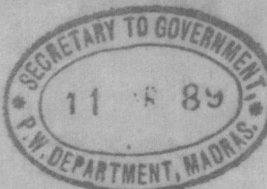
