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INSTRUCTIONS.

With the cognizance of the head of his office, or if he is himself the head of the office, of the head of his department: the applicant must present himself with 3 copies of the statement of his case in a cover sealed by his medical attendant at the seat of the Government under which he is serving, or at such other place as may be appointed by that Government where a committee of medical officers can be assembled under the orders of the Surgeon-General. The board should see that the applicant fulfils these conditions.

Before deciding whether to grant or refuse the certificate the medical board may in a doubtful case, detain an applicant under professional observation during a period not exceeding fourteen days.

If it can be avoided, the medical attendant on a case should not be a member of the board which considers it, and under no circumstances can he sit as president. He should, however, be required to attend the board to furnish any information whenever his presence is considered necessary.

The medical board, after a careful examination of the officer, and consideration of the medical attendant's statement of the case, will record in the proceedings as follows:—

(a) Whether change of climate in or out of India is necessary.

(b) The period of absence recommended in or out of India, care being taken that leave in excess of the period to which the sick officer is entitled by regulations is not recommended.

(c) In the case of an officer requiring furlough or leave of absence owing to illness caused directly by intemperance, the medical board, whilst recording their opinion, will confine their recommendation to the officer appearing periodically before fresh boards, or to the treatment of the case as one of discipline, whichever may be deemed necessary.

In urgent cases when a medical board considers it absolutely necessary that an officer recommended for change of air, either in or out of India, should proceed in anticipation of sanction, a recommendation to that effect should be made in the proceedings.

STATEMENT of the case of M.R.D. J. I. Muthuvarani Pillai as

He states that about five years ago he observed that he had frequent micturition and the quantity discharged each time was unusually large and on having the urine tested the specific gravity was high and sugar was detected in it. In December last finding himself weak and the discharge of urine being very frequent he went on one month and five days leave to himself and placed himself under native treatment for the first time the result of the treatment was that the quantity of the urine passed each time was very much reduced. At present he passes urine about eight times during the day and night and he has no thirst or excessive appetite. The tongue is furred but moist bowels are regular, he has an inclination to vomit, sleep is very much disturbed. About 20 days ago he observed a small pimple on

Whenever a medical officer considers an officer under his charge to be in such a state of health as to render a change of climate necessary, he will, with the cognizance of the head of the department forward the prescribed certificate and a statement of case to the office of the Surgeon-General with the Government of Madras with a view to his being brought before a medical board.

A medical officer, who may be called upon to grant a certificate to an officer when absent from his appointment, may—except in cases of emergency require the officer to obtain a statement of his previous medical history from his authorized medical attendant. When, under similar circumstances, an extension of sick leave is required, the medical officer in attendance will request the sick officer to procure a copy of the medical statement on which the original leave was granted.

Medical officers on leave at hill stations are prohibited from granting certificates to officers residing there to enable them to appear before a medical board. Such certificates will only be granted by the regularly appointed local medical officer.

The case of an insane officer recommended to be sent to Europe, or to an asylum in India, will be specially considered by the medical officer drawing up the medical history, and by the medical board with a view to distinct recommendations being inserted by both as to the necessity for a servant, or other escort, or any special accommodation being provided for him en route.

The following rules relating to the admission of patients into the Government Lunatic Asylum, Madras, are issued for the information and guidance of all medical officers:

I. No patient can be admitted into the asylum, under any circumstances, without a medical certificate of insanity (Form A) and an admission order.

II. Admissions into the Asylum are divided into two classes:—

- (a) Private—paying.
- (b) Public—non-paying.

NOTE.—Exemption from paying in the case of private patients is only made when it appears to the Superintendent that the friends or relatives are unable to contribute towards the maintenance of the patient.

III. The documents required for the admission of private patients are as follows:—

- (1) Two medical certificates (Form A) signed by two Physicians or Surgeons, of whom one should be a Presidency Surgeon or a Surgeon in the Government Service.

- (2) Admission order (Form B), one copy. This should be signed together with the statement attached to it by the relative or friend who places the patient in the asylum.

- (3) An indemnity bond to be executed before the patient's admission. Form and full particulars for filling in can be obtained on application.

IV. Medical Officers are prohibited from sending private patients to the Commissioner of Police, Madras, or to any Magistrate for an order for their admission to the Lunatic Asylum when such patients have friends or relatives competent to sign the order. The interference of a Magistrate or the Commissioner of Police is only necessary when a patient has no friend or relative competent to sign an order or is not properly cared for by such friend or relative if he exists, or is found wandering at large or is dangerous. In all other cases the procedure referred to in the preceding rules should be invariably adopted.

V. In the case of a public non-paying patient, the following documents are necessary:

- (1) Medical certificate (Form A), one copy signed by the Surgeon of the District.
- (2) Medical statement (Form C), one copy signed by the Surgeon of the District.
- (3) Admission order signed by a Magistrate.

He has rapidly lost flesh but is very weak and unable to move about freely even in the house. Pulse is 116 per minute and weak. There is a rise of temperature in the evenings. He is unable to travel at present owing to the carbuncle on the back and general weakness.

A clear opinion should be included in this statement as to whether, or not, or how far, the disability was contracted in and by the service and from the effects of climate, with the reasons for so concluding.

I Charles Arthur Lapereaux do hereby certify that M.R.D. J. I. Muthuvarani Pillai of the Bangalore Revenue service is in a bad state of health, and I solemnly and sincerely declare that according to the best of my judgment, a change of air is essentially necessary for his recovery, and do therefore recommend that he may be permitted to proceed to leave for a period of six months is necessary.

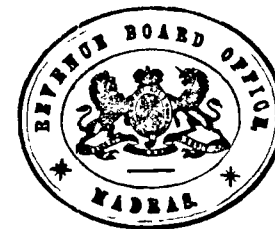
