Cap^t. Thomas Stevens dated at Mauritius the 12th. of May 1753 (forwarded by
the Governors Express from thence to Bussorah and Aleppo) received in London
the 20th November following, that the Oxford arrived at that Island the 10th
May and that he proposed to attempt his Passage about the Cape intending if he
failed therein, to put for St. Augustine's. A Letter from the French India
Company also says that by a small Frigate dispatched from the said Island the
1st. September 1753 arriv'd at L'Orient about the middle of December they were
informed this Ship sailed from the former Place towards the end of the preceding
May and That the Hector having been dispatched late from Tellicherry had
wintered at the Isle of Bourbon from whence she was to proceed early for Europe.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

1. Our last Letters to you were under Date of the 24th January 1753 by the ships Falmouth, Egmont, Portfield, Elizabeth and Montfort, as they all sailed and were clear of the channel in a few days after their dispatch, We may reasonably suppose they arrived at Fort St. George in good time.

2. By the Bombay Castle and Chesterfield We received your Letters of the 21st and 24th March last, all the preceding Letters of the same season having before duly come to our Hands.

3. We have taken into our service this season seventeen ships. viz^t, the Lord Anson and Princess Augusta for China directly, the St. George to take in Wine at Madeira and from thence to proceed to the coast and Bay, the Grantham for St. Helena and the West Coast of Sumatra, the Essex, Ilchester, True Briton, Onslow and Triton to proceed first to Fort St. George to deliver the several consignments intended for your Presidency, and then to be dispatched without loss of time to canton, from whence they are to be finally dispatched for England, the ships York Denham, Norfolk and Anson are to call first at Fort St. George, and then to proceed to the Bay with the consignments for that Presidency, the Warren, London, Kent and Britannia will be consigned directly to Bombay.

4. The Princess Augusta, Lord Anson, St. George and Grantham are now under dispatch, the five ships for the coast and China will be dispatched by the Middle of next Month at furthest, the four Coast and Bay ships will follow about the 20th of January and the ships for Bombay about the middle of March.

5. The Gentlemen who are appointed to be the Committee of Secrecy this season are Richard Chaune, Roger Drake, William Mabbott and Christopher Burrow Esq^{rs}.

6. We now forward to you Lists of the arrival and Departure of shipping commencing from the time the last were transmitted to you, the Manifest of Private allowed to be shipped on the St. George, the victualling Bill and other necessary Papers relative to that ship.

7. You will receive this by the St. George Captain Robert Robinson Commander, on which ship We have consigned to you Thirty Chests of silver, one hundred Barrels of Gunpowder and about Seventy Tons of Lead for which and any other Particulars designed for your Presidency We refer you to the Invoice and Bill of Lading in the Packet.

8. The St. George to proceed directly from hence to the Island of Madeira to receive on board Three hundred Pipes of Wine, one hundred and fifty Pipes of which We have directed our correspondents to consign to you, and the other one hundred and fifty Pipes to our President and Council at Fort William.

9. You must cause a careful survey to be taken of the said Wine and if it shall appear to have suffered by bad stowage or unusual Leakage, you are to oblige the Commander to pay the amount of what We may have suffered thereby.

10. As the number of Persons in our service Civil and Military at your Presidency much exceeds that at Fort William, a larger Proportion of Wine may be necessary for you, We do therefore empower you to detain out of the one hundred and fifty Pipes consigned to Fort William any quantity not exceeding fifty pipes if it is really wanted and in that case only.

11. We have allowed Captain Robinson and the ship's Company Twenty Pipes of Wine agreeable to our usual Indulgence, if any more is landed in India, you must look upon the surplus as unlicenced Goods, and confiscate the same to the use of the Company agreeable to our former orders and you must forward to our President and Council of Bengal an exact Account of what is landed at your Presidency, that they may likewise take the necessary measures in case they shall find any exceedings.

12. Having made a larger Investment to Woollen Goods for Bengal than the ships designed for that Presidency can carry, We intended to lade the surplus Bales being Three hundred on the ship True Briton and as there will be Room in the St. George upon the delivery of the Wine before mentioned to stow all or the greater part of the said Bales, you are therefore to send them on board that ship and consign them to the President and Council at Fort William, and you are hereby directed to detain the St. George until the arrival of the Ship True Briton with the said Bales accordingly.

13. But notwithstanding the said Rules are provided for Bengal, yet if you can dispose of them to advantage, you are hereby authorized to do so, or if are informed they will sell well at Bombay for which place the sortment is as properly adapted, you may forward them to that Presidency by any good conveyances which may offer, in either of which cases the St. George is not to be detained longer than is necessary for the sending aboard the Treasure and any other consignments for Bengal, Our Reasons for giving liberty for forwarding the said Bales to Bombay arise from the Observation We have made of the large Remains of Woollen Goods in your warehouses, and the great and advantageous sales, which We are advised have been lately made at that settlement.

14. You must forward by the St. George to Bengal as much Treasure as you can possibly spare, observing to send it in such Proportions of Bullion and Rupees as the President and Council shall have advised you may be proper for that settlement.

15. The French East India Company having sent over one of their Directors as a Commissary to treat with Us for accommodating the Differences and Dissensions which have arisen between the two Companys on the Coast of Choromandel and for restoring and preserving perfect Tranquility between them, We have made a Progress in a Treaty for those good purposes as We are not without hopes will be attended with the wishes for success, of which you may depend upon being advised by the very first opportunity in the meantime you are to be upon your guard and carefully defend and preserve all our just Rights and Privileges against any attempts that may be made against them.

16. We have entertained seven Writers for the service of your Presidency who take their passage to you upon the ships of this season, their Names are viz^t., Samel Johnson, Waldegrave Pelham, James Macarmick, James Broadbent, William Aldersey, Robert Dowsett and John Hamilton.

17. We have embarked on this ship about sixty Military Recruits and shall supply you with more this season as the shipping can conveniently carry. We are

N^o. 18.OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL AT FORT S^t. GEORGE.

1. The latest Letters we sent to you last season, were dated the 29th of January 1753 by the ships Falmouth, Egmont, Portfield, Elizabeth and Montfort, viz^t., a General Letter and a Letter relating to the West Coast, and by the Falmouth a particular Letter concerning the New Charter, By the S^t. George lately Dispatched we writt [sic] you a short Letter under date of the 28th Nov^r last.

2. We have enclosed in the Packets by the Ships Essex, Ilchester, and True Briton three Packets directed to the President and Council in Bengal and three Packets to the President and Council at Bombay, which you are to forward to them by the first safe conveyances.

3. The several Letters that have come to our hands this season from your Presidency, are as follows, viz^t.,

General Letters under date the 3^d Novem^r, 1752, Triplicate of the 12th February of the 21st of the same month, and the 21st and 24th March 1753.

Separate Letters, Triplicate of the 3^d Novem^r, 1752 and 21st February 1753.

From the Private Committee of the 16th February 18th and 24th March 1753.

From the Deputy Governor and Council at Fort St. David of the 28th February 1753.

From Major Laurence of the 27th October 1752, 5th and 24th January, 16th February and 9th March 1753.

From M^r. Brohier the 18th February and 18th March 1753.

M^r. Hunter the 20th February 1753 and from M^r. Combes of the 18th of the same month.

4. We have taken into our service this season the undernamed Seventeen ships and have stationed them for the several Parts of India and China, in the following Order, Viz^t.

5. The Lord Anson and Princess Augusta consigned directly to Canton with all the Wollen Goods intended for the China Market this season the St. George for the Island of Madeira and the Coast and Bay, and the Grantham Storeship for St. Helena and Bencoolen, were dispatched from hence on the 28th and 30th of last month.

6. The Ships Essex, Ilchester, True Briton, Onslow and Triton are now under their Dispatches, with the several consignments intended for your Presidency, after the delivery whereof they are to proceed to Canton, to take in their returning cargoes for England.

7. The York, Denham, Norfolk and Anson will follow about the middle of January, the consignments for Bengal, but they will call first at Fort St. George, that the Treasure we have laden on them may be coined, and for other purposes mentioned in this or the General Advices, you will receive by the said ships.

8. The Ships for Bombay, viz^t. the Warren, London, Kent and Britannia will receive their Dispatches about the middle of March.

9. The Gentlemen of the Committee of Secrecy this year are Richard Chaune, Roger Drake Christopher Burrow and William Mabbott Esq^{rs}.

10. We refer you to the accompanying Lists for the times of the arrival and Departure of shipping, commencing from the time when the last were transmitted to you ended.

11. The Gentlemen appointed to transact our affairs in China are formed into the following setts viz^t.

For the Ships Lord Anson and Triton Mess^{rs}. John Misenor, John Burrow, Alexander Hume & John Mapletoft.

For the Stafford and Onslow, Mess^{rs}. Thomas Thomson, Sameul Blount, Thomas Sandys, William Tead & Benjamin Torin but the Cargo expected on the Stafford from the Mallabar Coast, is to be disposed of by Messieurs Misenor, Thomson and Hume, and the Produce thereof paid to, and Invested by the before mentioned five Gentlemen.

For the Princess Augusta, Mr. Samuel Harrison and Mr. Nathaniel Garland.

For the True Briton, Mr. John Misenor, Mr. Samuel Harrison and Mr. John Burrow.

The Ships *Essex* and *Ilchester* will be consigned to Mess^{rs}. Thomas Lill Mordecai Walker and Mann Horner now in China to bring home the Investment made by them, and to be filled up, if there shall be occasion for it, by Mess^{rs}. Misenor Burrow Hume and Mapletoft.

Mess^{rs}. Misenor, Harrison and Hume are to dispose of the Woollen Goods by the *Lord Anson* and *Princess Augusta*, and are to continue in China until the end of the year 1755 with a stock to make an investment and for other purposes.

Mess^{rs}. Misenor, Harrison and Thomson are to take charge of any ships that may arrive in China destitute of Supra Cargos.

12. The Freighters of Silver, Coral, Emeralds Pearls and such kind of Licensed Goods have as usual agreed that if any Ship or Ships on which such articles are laden, shall proceed to Bengal without touching at Fort St. George or on the other hand arrive at Fort St. George and do not proceed to Bengal, that the President and Council at either place, may forward such articles, agreeable to their consignment on any of our European ships at the risque of the said Freighters, but without any further charge to them.

13. As soon as the ships *Essex*, *Ilchester*, *True Briton*, *Onslow* and *Triton* have deliver'd their respective consignments, and you have laden, on our account, any goods that you apprehend may be disposed of in China to advantage, you are then to dispatch them for Canton without loss of time.

14. Although from your late advices, we have no great reason to expect you have made any Provision of Goods for the before mention'd purpose yet in case it may happen otherwise, the Supra Cargos of the ships on which you shall load any such Goods are to repay you the amount out of the Treasure consigned to them.

15. You are to give the Supra Cargos who take their Passage on the said Ships all the advice, Assistance, and Intelligence that they shall apply for or you shall judge necessary for the good of their respective voyages.

16. The *St. George* is ordered to the Island of *Madeira* to take in Three hundred Pipes of Wine, one hundred and fifty Pipes of which are directed to be consigned to you, and the other one hundred and fifty Pipes to Bengal besides which the said ship carries about seventy Tons of Lead for that Presidency.

17. But considering how much the number of our servants Civil and Military at your Presidency exceeds that in Bengal, we empowered you in our Letter by the *St. George*, to detain out of the Hundred and fifty Pipes consigned thither, any quantity not exceeding fifty Pipes, if it is really wanted, the remainder must be continued on board to be deliver'd according to its consignment.

18. Having made a larger Investment of Woollen Goods for Bengal, than the Ships designed for that Presidency can conveniently carry we have laden the surplus Bales, being Three hundred on the Ship *True Briton*, and as there will

be room in the St. George, upon the delivery of the Wine before mentioned to stow all, or the greatest part of the said Bales, you are therefore to forward them on the said Ship accordingly.

19. You are to observe however what we writt to you by the St. George, with regard to the said Bales, that you are authorised to dispose of them at Fort St. George, if you can do it to advantage or you are informed they will sell well at Bombay, for which place the Sortment is as properly adapted, you must send them thither by any good conveyances, in either of which cases, the St. George is not to be detained longer than is necessary for the sending aboard the Treasure and any other consignments for Bengal.

20. Our reasons for giving liberty for forwarding the said Bales to Bombay arise from the observation we have made of the large Remains of Woollen Goods in your Warehouses, and the great and advantageous Sales which we are advised have been lately made at that settlement.

21. To prevent such a cruel Disappointment as we have met with in the Colchesters Misfortune, owing to her late dispatch to you from Bengal, and as we shall depend upon having a September ship from Fort St. George, you are hereby authorised to detail any one of the four following ships consigned to the Bay viz^t. the York, Denham, Norfolk or Anson, suchship is to be returned to us as early in September as possible and you are to forward her outward cargo for Bengal by the earliest and best conveyances that offer.

22. As there are only Five Ships consigned to the coast and Bay, and one of them a small one we have reason to expect they will all be dispatched home the same season with full Loading of Bale Goods, and should it happen that you, and our servants in Bengal want any further Tonnage for your Investments, you must give as early notice thereof as possible, as well by Pattamars overland as by the first Sea Conveyances, to the President & Council of Bombay that they may send one of the ships consigned to them, if they can spare one in time to be dispatched in a proper season for saving her Passage home.

23. You will observe by the Charterpartys of the ships bound to the Coast and Bay this season that they carry no Iron Kintlage, and that therefore they are to have in lieu thereof their full Charterparty Kintlage in Salt Petre, Viz^t. Sixteen Tons for every one hundred tons they are respectively Let for.

24. The Bombay ships carry half Kintlage in Iron the other half must be made up with Salt Petre, but you must remember in calculating the Tonnage of any ship what we have formerly told you, that the Iron must be recokned as and for so many Tons of Goods as the Charterparty mentions there are Tons of Iron Kintlage argeed to be carried out and brought home.

25. As we have reason to expect the ships designed for the coast and Bay will be returned with as many Bale Goods as they can carry in that case, each ship is to have Forty or Fifty Tons of Salt Petre over and above the before-mentioned Charterparty Proportions on the Commanders requesting for the same.

26. We have consigned to you on the *St. George* and these ships the *Essex* *Hechester*, *True Briton*, *Onslow* & *Triton* to the value of Two hundred chests of Treasure about Twelve hundred and Thirty Bales of Wollen Goods (not including the three hundred Bales on the *True Briton* for Bengal) Four hundred Tons of Lead, one hundred and fifty Tons of Copper, and One hundred and Fifty Tons of Iron, besides Stores, and several other articles, for the Distribution of which on board the said Ships and the amount we refer you to the several Invoices.

27. In part of the Stores, you will receive by these ships, & the *St. George* about Six hundred Barrels of Gun Powder, and we propose to send you by the Four coast and Bay ships, the further quantity of about Four hundred Barrels.

28. It is impossible to supply you from Europe with the necessary quantities of Gun Powder, and the Hazard is too great in sending even the quantities you will now receive, and as we are satisfied nothing but skill is wanting to make it to as much Perfection as in England we are determined that it shall be made under your Direction at Fort *St. George*, and for that Purpose we have procur'd the most exact Models of a Powder House and Mills with all the various Parts in their due Proportions, and of every Machine and utensil used in the whole Process that you may from them cause proper works to be Erected and utensils to be made, the said models come in the ship *Onslow* with a very minute description of them, and the method of making Gun Powder.

29. But that you may set out in this undertaking properly we have appointed Mr. William Bishop to be Superintendent of your Powder works who is perfectly well acquainted with the whole Process of making Gun Powder, and we direct, that upon his arrival, which will be in one of the Coast and Bay Ships, you do accordingly set him to work, in the mean time you are to take particular care to prevent any Injury to the said Models, and we should rather the cases be not opened till he arrives, Mr. Bishops Pay, as Superintendent of the Powder Works, is to be one hundred Pounds a year, to commence from the time of his arrival, over and above his Pay as a First Lieutenant of the Military to which we have likewise appointed him, as mentioned hereafter.

30. You must make use of every good conveyance for forwarding to the Bay, as much of the Treasure consigned to you on these ships and the *St. George* as you can possibly spare.

31. Notwithstanding the Treasure, we intend to send on the Ships *York*, *Denham*, *Norfolk* and *Anson*, will be consigned to the President and Council at Fort William, yet you are hereby empowered to detain as much of it as shall be absolutely necessary for the use of your Presidency and no more, taking care to forward the rest as soon as possible, an early supply at that Presidency being of the utmost consequence to us.

32. You must observe to send the Treasure to Bengal, in such Proportions of Bullion and Rupees, as it shall be intimated to you will answer best, and you must forward the coinage with the utmost dispatch that the Bay ships may lose no time on prosecuting their voyages.

33. We now forward to you our Accountants Remarks upon the several ~~several~~ ^{several} Musters of Gold and Silver Coins received from you this season, to which you are to pay a due regard, particularly as to the inequality in the weight of Arcot Rupees, and you must at all times take the greatest care, that the Reputation of our Mint is kept up by the Exactness of the coinage with regard both in weight and Fineness.

34. We have sent you two setts of Bale Screws agreeable to your Indent, but it is uncertain whether they are exactly what you want as you were not explicit enough in the description of them in your Indent particularly with regard to their Lengths & breadths.

35. You will observe by the Invoices that we have agreeable to your Request, encreased the supply of Medicines, and we are satisfied that the quantitys now sent will be sufficient with good management to answer all the occasions of your Presidency.

36. The Governor and Council of St. Helena having represented to us, that their number of Slaves are so much diminish'd that they have not hands sufficient to carry on their Works, and desiring that Thirty Men may be sent to them, you are accordingly to send them that number of useful coffree slaves, as soon as you can conveniently.

37. We have consigned to you on one of these ships a Parcel of Books agreeable to your request, if any others may be necessary either on Divinity, Law, Commerce, or any other useful knowledge, acquaint us with the names of them, & you shall be supplied.

38. We now forward to you Lists of the Investment to be made the ensuing season on the coast of Choromandel all the directions and observations in it are to be particularly attended to & complied with, and we must here observe to you, that the cloth bought at and about Fort St. George and Fort St. David particularly the first mentioned Place, is much worse in all respects than it used to be, your utmost endeavours therefore must be Exerted to have the Fabrick improved, and when the intestine Troubles subside, which we flatter ourselves will be soon you will have the opportunity of effecting the same, as well as be able to reduce the Prices considerably.

39. You must remind the Presidency of Bengal as early as you have an opportunity, to supply you with the necessary Quantitys Salt Petre, for the Dispatch of such ships as take in or complete their Loadings at Fort St. George and on the other hand you must supply that Presidency with that Redwood they shall want for the Dispatch of their shipping.

40. The best means must be used, by an early and mutual intercourse between our Three Presidencys, to assist one another in sending home your respective Investments, in case of a want of Tonnage for that purpose at either Presidency, as well as for the Dispatch of all the Shipping on hand.

41. You must consider what to do with the surplus Pepper which may be ready at the West Coast, and give your Directions early according to circumstances, either that it may be sent home the Store ship or brought home in

any of the coast and Bay ships agreeable to what shall appear to you to be most for our Interest and we recommend it to you in case it shall be brought home in one or more of the Coast & Bay ships, to direct that it be shott among the Bales, in which case we shall pay only half Freight.

42. Being fully convinced of the sincere Intentions both of our President and Major Laurence to promote our Interest to the utmost of their Power, we shall not for the present, at least enter into a disquisition into the occasions of the unhappy differences, which it [is] with the greatest concern, we observe have arisen between them as hoping their own good sense will have so effectually pointed out their fat[.]tendency, that they will have subsided before this reaches you, and we desire that those Gentlemen will seriously consider, how much it is for the Interest of the Company, that there should be a mutual Harmony and good agreement between them, which we most earnestly desire may be cultivated with the utmost cordiality.

43. A good understanding likewise must be carefully cultivated & preserved between the rest of our civil and military servants and all uneasinesses & misunderstandings enquired into and Prudently obviated upon their first Discovery, to prevent the ill consequences that naturally attend them if neglected.

44. We have chosen seven Writers upon the Fort St. George Establishment, who will proceed to you on the ships of this season, they are to be ranked on the List in the order we now name them Viz^t., Samuel Johnson, Waldegrave Pelham, James Macarmkie, James Broadbent, William Aldersey, Robert Dowsett and John Hamilton.

45. In order to put a stop, as soon as possible to the pernicious custom of employing Black People in the Writing Business at your Presidency, you must keep all our servants constantly employed, and more particularly the younger sort, and if the present number is not sufficient for the various Branches of your Business let us be acquainted how many more are wanting, and you shall be fully supplied, attend to the Morals & manner of Life of all our Servants, and take particular care that they do not launch out into Expenses beyond the reach of their Incomes, especially upon their first arrival, and you are hereby directed to set apart one Day in each Quarter of the year, and oftener if you find it necessary, to enquire into the general conduct and Behaviour of all our servants below the council, and Enter the Result thereof in your Diary for our Observations.

46. We sent you on the St. George Sixty Two English Recruits for your Military, these Five ships will bring you about Three hundred more and we intend to embark on the coast and Bay Ships about One hundred Swiss, to be Incorporated in the Companys of that Nation now at your Presidency.

47. We shall send on the coast and Bay Ships as many English Recruits for the service of Bengal Presidency as they can conveniently carry, none of whom are to be detained by you, if you can possibly avoid it.

48. And as our Forces at that Presidency are too much reduced by the absence of the Party you have been assisted with, as well as your being under the necessity of detaining for some time past, the Recruits intended for that settlement you must as soon as the circumstances of affairs will permit not only return the said Party, but likewise forward as many other soldiers, as may be wanted to complete the Bengal Establishment, if you can safely and prudently spare them.

49 We have chosen the following officers for the service of your Presidency most of whom take their Passage on these ships, the others will proceed on the, Coast and Bay ships viz^t.

50. The said Officers are to succeed to the first vacancies that shall happen after their arrival, according to their Ranks, and in the order abovementioned, after those Gentlemen have been provided for, whom we sent out last year, and you are to give them commissions accordingly.

51. But notwithstanding the said Officers may not immediately succeed to the Stations intended for them yet their Pay is to commence upon their arrival, according to their abovementioned Ranks of Captains, Lieutenants and Ensigns.

52. Mr. William Bishop, over and above his Pay as a First Lieutenant, is to have a salary of one hundred Pounds a year for Superintending the Gun Powder Works, as mention'd in the 29th Paragraph of this letter.

53. The Nabobs affairs, we observe were in a very happy situation until the Difference between him and the King of Mysore, which cast an almost fatal damp upon all his former success, what the Event has been, we are not yet informed but as by your last advices a Train of bad consequences may be expected unless means have been found to reconcile them, we hope you have spared no Pains to accomplish so desirable an object, But if they should still continue at variance, we most earnestly recommend it to you, to use every Pacifick and Prudent measure to compose their Differences as soon as possible, as making them Friends appears to be a circumstance extremely essential for promoting the General Tranquillity & consequently the Interest of the Company in particular.

54. You were acquainted in our short Letter by the St. George that the French East India Company had sent over one of their Directors as a Commissary to treat with us for an accommodation of the Differences, which have arisen between the two companys on the coast of Choromandel, and for restoring and preserving perfect Tranquillity between them, and that we had made such a Progress in a Treaty, as we were not without hopes would be attended to be with the wished for success, of which you were assured of being advised by the

first opportunity, and in the mean time you were directed to be upon your Guard and carefully defend and Preserve all our just Rights and Privileges, against any attempts that may be made against them, We flattered ourselves that we should now have been able to advise you of the conclusion of that Treaty, but the Plan concerted with the French Commissary, having been transmitted to Paris, for the Information and concurrence of the French Company, he has not yet received Directions for putting a finishing hand thereto, the good news must therefore be deferred, until our next advices by the Coast and Bay ships, in the mean time, as you were before directed you must stand well upon your Guard.

55. We have entertained William James Tabby the son of Lieutenant Tabby mentioned in the 49th Paragraph of the Letter, and John Nilikins to be cadets in our Troops at the Pay of Twenty Pence a day each, to commence on their arrival at Fort St. George, and they are to be promoted according to their Behaviour.

56. Mr. Meyers one of the Ensigns mentioned in the 49th Paragraph of this Letter having produced to us a Machine of a new Invention for the more certain pointing and quick fir(ing) of Cannon by night as well as day, principally constructed by himself we have purchased the same and sent it under his care on the True Briton, the amount of which will appear in that ships Invoice.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL AT FORT ST. GEORGE

1. We writ you a short Letter by the Saint George under date of the 28th November, and more fully on the 19th of December by the ships Essex, Ilchester, True Briton, Onslow and Triton, We shall now proceed in the usual method to send you our further Commands and make some observations occurring to Us upon perusal of the several Letters which We acknowledged the receipt of in our beforementioned Letter of the 19th December last, and

FIRST OF SHIPPING.

2. The Ships Lord Anson, Princess Augusta, Saint George and Grantham sail'd from the Downes on the 6th of December, but the Lord Anson and Princess Augusta were oblig'd to put in at Falmouth from whence they sail'd again the 28th of the same Month.

3. The Essex, Ilchester, True Briton, Onslow and Triton were despatched from hence on the 20th December and sail'd out of the Downes with a fair Wind on the 27th and 28th of the same month.

4. The Ships York, Denham, Norfolk and Anson are now under their Dispatches.

5. Notwithstanding Fort William is the consigned Port of these ships the York, Denham, Norfolk and Anson yet their commanders are ordie'd to make the best of their way to Fort St. George, and deliver to you some Packets and consignments and to follow all such orders as they shall receive from you with regard to delivering all or any part of the Bullion consigned to Bengal in order to be coined and receiving Rupees in lieu thereof, together with such orders as you shall think proper to give them.

6. And notwithstanding the said Four ships are consigned to Bengal, yet to prevent being disappointed of a ship to be dispatched home in September next you are hereby authorized to detain any one of them for that purpose which you shall think proper.

7. If it shall happen that you are provided with a ship of a former season for your September Dispatch then the beforementioned Four ships are all of them to be forwarded to Bengal, if you are not so provided, the Cargo We have laden for that presidency on the ship you shall determine to detain is to be forwarded by any good conveyances that offer.

8. And We most-earnestly recommend it to you to use the utmost Expedition in forwarding the said ships and consignments to Bengal, where their early arrival will be of infinite service to us, as We hope you will agreeable to the Directions in our last Letter be provided with a sufficient quantity of silver ready coined, to load on all or the greater part of these ships immediately after their arrival we recommend it to you to dispatch them separately as fast as you can replace in each ship respectively the necessary proportion of Rupees in lieu of the Bullion you shall take out.

9. We were greatly disappointed in not having a September ship from you this season, had you attended to the power We gave you in our letter of the 8th Jan'y. 1752 for detaining any one of the Bengal ships. We should not probably have met with this disappointment, therefore in this Instance you are blameworthy, however We observe that you had taken all other prudent Measures and were sufficiently provided with Goods to have sent as a September ship as well as to have given early Dispatches to such others as were to complete the Loadings at Fort Saint George, but your Designs were most unexpectedly defeated by our servants in Bengal who by sending the Colchester at such an unseasonable time and detaining all the other ships so late have greatly prejudiced Us, and although We shall take such notice to them of their conduct as We hope will prevent the like Misfortunes again yet you are to press them by every opportunity to forward to you, as early in the season as possible all such ships as are intended to be filled up on the Coast, and to advise you in time of the ships so to be sent to you.

10. You will observe by the Lists of shipping transmitted to you that the Admiral Vernon did not arrive until the 20th of August, the ships Bombay Castle and Chesterfield were so late as the 5th and 14th of October and the Oxford and Godolph are not yet arrived, all owing to their untimely Dispatch from Bengal as before observed and which We the more particularly point out that you may be apprized of the Difficulties We are put to in making a Provision for this year's export, and consequently know of the great Importance of early Dispatches.

11. In Answer to your Enquiry with regard to the written clause in the charterpartys, by which it is provided that our ships shall not be dispatched from the Bay of Bengal before the 21st November nor after the 11th March, We say that the said clause no ways regards the ships to be dispatched from the coast of choromandel, and relates only to such ships as are dispatched from the Presidency of Bengal, and consequently will be no bar to your dispatching any ship in September or even before that time if you find it necessary.

12. And notwithstanding the Limitations mentioned in the Charterpartys, you as well as our servants in Bengal are at liberty to dispatch our shipping after the Eleventh day of March if you think fit, and if any ship shall happen thereby to lose her passage about the Cape We shall adjust the Demorage with the owners for such Loss of Passage upon her arrival in England, agreeable to the Charterparty and the usage of the Company in such cases.

13. We are much concerned for the misfortune which attended the Colchester, Delawar and our own vessell the Brilliant, We observe the Care you took for the refitting and repairing the two first, and we are not without hopes that the Brilliant will be again heard of.

14. We observe you purchased a Vessell of about Three hundred Tons called the Yorkshire Grey, for Ten thousand pagodas which you represent to be necessary to supply the West Coast instead of the Brilliant, if the latter should be again heard of and fit for service you must determine up on disposing of one or the other, unless you can give us good reasons to the contrary.

15. You are to lay out no more of our Estate in shipping of any Sort or size than shall appear to be absolutely necessary for our service and which you must make clearly appear to us to be so.

16. We observe you have permitted the Surgeon Carpenter and Gunner belonging to the Bombay Castle to remain in India, We hope you are convinced they will be of particular service to our Affairs for nothing else can satisfy us in the Liberty you have taken, and We shall rely upon your Promise not to allow of or promote anything of this kind without our Licence unless in extraordinary Cases.

17. We are disappointed in our Expectations of the Number of slaves which We had reason to believe the Delawar would bring you from Madagascar, you did well in calling upon Captain Dominicus and his Chief Mate to give you their reasons for bringing only Two hundred and sixteen out of the six hundred ordered which we should consider of upon that ships return to England.

18. In our last letter we acquainted you that We had reason to expect the ships designed for the Coast and Bay this season will be returned with as many Bales as they can carry, and in that case ships to have Forty or Fifty Tons of Salt Petre over and above the Charterparty proportions of sixteen Tons for every one hundred Tons they are respectively lett for, on the Commanders requesting for such Forty or Fifty Tons, we are now to add that you may go even further if the commanders desire it as We would chuse to have about one hundred and fifty Tons of Salt Petre laden on each of the said Coast and Bay ships provided it does not interfere with your Loading all the Bale Goods you possibly can.

19. Upon mentioning in the preceding Paragraph one hundred and fifty Tons of Salt petre to be laden on each Coast and Bay ship, We mean that is to be the quantity in each ship whether laden in Bengal or at Fort St. George or in parts at both places.

SECONDLY OF GOODS FROM EUROPE OR FROM ONE PART OF INDIA TO BE DISPOSED OF AT ANOTHER.

20. The Ships Saint George, Essex, Ilchester, True Briton, Onslow and Triton carried all the Goods, Stores and necessaries intended for your presidency this season, except some Gun powder and a few other articles which were not provided time enough for or could not be taken in by them, those articles therefore are laden on these ships as is likewise Chests of Gold for the particulars We referr you to the enclosed Invoices and Bills of Loading.

Anson

21. We sent you by the abovementioned five ships, one hundred and ninetyeight chests of bullion amounting to one hundred and ninetyfive thousand six hundred and seventysix pounds sixteen shillings, and three Chests of Gold to Thirty one thousand five hundred and seventy-six pounds, nineteen shillings and eight pence, We now consign to you by the ships Denham York and Norfolk the further quantity of six Chests of Gold to the value of about seventy six thousand pounds for what is intended by the Anson We must refer you to the Invoice.

22. The Bullion by these ships the York, Denham, Norfolk and Anson being. is consigned to Bengal, notwithstanding which you are to take all or as much of it out of the said ships as you shall think proper to be coined agreeable to the Advices you shall receive from that Presidency.

23. You were directed in our last to forward the coinage of the silver intended for Bengal with the utmost Despatch. We hope you have done so, that these Ships may proceed thither without loss of time.

24. You must make an estimate of what Money will be wanting for your Investment, the paying the outstanding Bond Debts if any are remaining, and of the various Charges and Expenses of your Presidency until the Arrival of the next Years shipping, all which must be calculated as near the Truth as the shipping nature of them will admit of and you are to provide for the same by detaining as much Treasure as shall be absolutely necessary for the several purposes, and not a Rupee more if you can help it all the rest of the Treasure must be forwarded to Bengal immediately that they may be enabled to make an early Investment.

25. You must be always very explicit in describing the several Articles Indented for, as well as the uses they are intended to be put to, as otherways you will find yourselves disappointed of them, for want of such a description in your last Indent, We have sent no brass nails or copper plates and but two hundred Buccanneer Guns.

26. We shall pursue our scheme of exporting an large quantitys of woollen goods as can be vended at the several Markets in India and for that purpose we have sent you this season about Twelve hundred and thirty Bales, which we flatter ourselves may be disposed of to advantage especially when the Troubles in the country have subsided, but if you find yourselves at any time overstocked, and are informed woollen Goods sell to more Advantage at Bombay than at your Presidency, you may send thither accordingly such quantitys as you cannot well dispose of by any good conveyances that offer.

27. Lead and Iron We observe afford us a good profit, We have therefore sent you as large a quantity of those Articles as the Ships could carry.

28. You must strictly keep up to the Method prescribed you for setting all Goods at publick sales, and transmitting to us from time to time the Accounts of such sales in the manner you have done by the Ships of this season, which are drawn out to our satisfaction.

29. You did very right in making the Enquiry mentioned in your letter of the 3rd November, with regard to the Importation of coralsilver, &c; whereon the full returns have not been made within the limited time which we shall take the due notice of here, and we shall agreeable to your Request for the future insert in the Manifests the names of the persons to whom the several articles are consigned, as well as by whom.

THIRDLY OF INVESTMENTS.

30. We have been so full in our Directions and observations in the Lists of Investment sent you by the Coast and China ships, that we have little more to say than to enjoin you to attend thereto with the greatest seriousness, to use your utmost endeavours to improve the Fabrick of the several sorts of Goods and to lower their prices, for at present upon many articles we lose very considerably and in great the profit upon your whole investment is too small to support the Expences of your Presidency even did you enjoy the profoundest repose upon the coast, and how far it falls short when the vast sums which have been lately expended are taken into the account, We need not acquaint you it is too obvious.

31. Considering all circumstances your late investment has been as considerable in quantity as we could reasonably expect, but difficient in quality as we have before observed as well as greatly too dear.

32. You must agreeable to our former commands strictly attend to the Conduct of our Servants at the northern settlements, as to the quantity, Quality, and prices of the several Articles procured by them, and you must take care that they are supplied effectually to carry on their Investments to the utmost extent.

33. We are not satisfied with the manner of making your Investments, it is conducted in too private a manner and leaves room for unfair practices, we therefore direct that for the future you receive proposals in writing from all such merchants who are willing to contract for your Investments in whole or in part, either separately or jointly, that you give at least a Months notice of the time you will receive such proposals and when you have examined them at a full Board, you are to agree with those merchants who will engage to furnish the Investment upon the vest [sic] and most reasonable terms, provided you are satisfied they are Men of sufficient abilities to perform what they engage for.

FOURTHLY OF THE TRADE OF INDIA TRANSACTIONS WITH THE COUNTRY GOVERNMENTS, ETC.

34. Our Intentions of making a settlement upon the Islands Negrais remain no longer a Secret, and therefore what relates thereto must be treated of in your General Letters for the future, unless it shall be found necessary to keep some parts of your Transactions more private, such therefore are to be communicated separately, we observe the ships you have already taken, in sending mess^r. Taylor and Westgarth thither, and that the French are using endeavours to render this project abortive, We observe likewise that Mr. Hunter whom we have appointed to conduct this affair under your direction, was by your last advices on the point of his Departure from Fort St. George, with vessels, Men, Stores, and Necessarys requisite for the undertaking, until we receive further accounts from you We can only recommend it to your constant care and attention to do every thing in your power to facilitate the Execution of this our favourite project and acquaint us from time to time with the progress

made therein, We are concerned Mr. Combes's Health would not permit his accompanying Mr. Hunter as We know his Abilities and Fitness for such undertaking, Mr. Hunter must always be properly assisted, and We hope you are satisfied Mr. Henry Brooke whom you have at present appointed instead of Mr. Combes is equal to the Importance of the Trust.

35. We observe by your Consultations of the 5th March that the King of Tavay in the Tanassereen Country, has made some proposals to you for opening and establishing a Trade and permitting us to make a settlement in his Country which carry an advantageous appearance, and as We are apprehensive if the French or Dutch should settle there it might be of bad consequence to the scheme Mr. Hunter is upon, We therefore recommend it to you to think seriously upon this Affair and if you find a settlement in that Country will be advantageous and may be made at a small expence, you may annex the Execution of the same to Mr. Hunters charge or take such other measures as shall appear to you to be most effectual, if there should be any unsurmountable Difficultys in settling upon the Negrais, the object now recommended to you will be of the greatest importance and must in such case be more particularly attended to.

36. The unhappy Disagreement between the Nabob and the King of Mysore has We find among many other Ill Consequences, been the occasion of your advancing great sums of Money for the maintenance of the Forces, of which but little appears by your last advices to be discharged, as We hope you have taken every opportunity of being re-imbursed so We earnestly recommend it to you and shall depend upon your utmost vigilance and care to prevent suffering by the Expenses which have or shall be incurred by your supporting the Cause of the Nabob.

37. Under this Head We should have given you our sentiments and Directions with regard to the Troubles on the Choromandel Coast, but upon account of the situation of the Treaty between us and the French India Company, We must reserve them, either for the supplement to this or a separate Letter.

FIFTH:Y OF FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS AND REVENUES.

38. You must spare no pains in forwarding the Works both at Fort Saint George and Fort St. David, but more particularly at the former place, which being now the seat of the presidency, it is absolutely necessary should be put in a respectable condition with all possible dispatch, and here We must recommend it to you to be attentive to rendering the Black Town so defensible, that the Country people especially the richer sort may be induced to resort to and reside there under our protection, as a place of safety and the sooner it can be effected the better.

39. We must remind you of our former recommendations to take the first favourable opportunity of levying reasonable contributions from such of the Inhabitants at Fort St. George as can afford it, towards the Expenses of the Fortifications.

40. Mr. Brohier's conduct in carrying on the Works has been entirely to our satisfaction and We are satisfied he would have made a more considerable progress in them had not the Troubles in the country thrown so many obstacles in the way.

41. Your next advices We hope will bring us an account of Colonel Scott's Arrival upon whose abilities with the Assistance of Mr. Brohier, We have a great dependance for carrying on and compleating at the necessary Works at your Presidency, in a manner that will render them defensible and useful without launching into great Expences.

42. As you represent Deve Cotah to be an old country Fortification, much out of repair and that putting it into tolerable order would be a work of time and great Expence, We shall depend upon your assurance of making no Additions and giving it such repairs only as are absolutely necessary, and that the least possible expence.

43. We advised you in Our last Letter We had sent you proper Models for a Powder Mill & of the Houses necessary to be erected for containing the same and making Powder according to the English method, you must therefore fix on a proper place for the Building them upon, whether Egmore Redoubt which we find is your present Powder House is convenient or not We shall leave to your determination.

44. That you may at all times have a dependance upon the goodness of the powder, We direct that every Barrel be proved in the presence of the Major and whatever shall then appear not to come up to the proper Strength and Goodness, be returned to the Powder Makers to be new worked.

45. We approve of your making use of the proper opportunity to free us from the annual Rent of Twelve hundred pagodas paid to the Government for our settlement of Madras, by applying to the Nabob for taking it off, and it is with pleasure We observe your Application was crowned with success.

46. We are surprized Mr. Bruton should set up so stale a Claim for Four hundred and seventy one Pagodas alledged to be laid out on the Garden House and Offices at Fort St. David, during his residence there, as he has produced no Evidence in support of his claim you did right in not complying with it and for the same reason We think there was no occasion for referring his Request to our determination.

47. As you have agreeable to our commands enquired into the pretensions of Jaggoo mentioned in his Petition to us and that you found his Father did build a Pagoda at Chindadrepetta, to which a certain Custom was paid by the Inhabitants, We do therefore agree to his receiving the same on condition however of his paying annually Two thousand Pagodas on account of his Debt to the Company which condition you must be particularly careful that he complys with.

48. You acquaint us that upon putting into Execution our orders to deliver the Church at Vipparee to the Danish Missionarys, the Executors of Coja Petrus deliver'd in a Remonstrance and protest which are enter'd

on your Consultations you should have made an Enquiry into the Allegation of the said Executors and given us your opinion thereupon, that We might be able to form a Judgement whether they have a right to any and what relief, and you are hereby directed to make such an enquiry and send us your opinion by the first opportunity.

49. Upon a persual of your Consultations of the 1st June 1752 We find that you have lett the several Farms there mentioned for the term of Five years, having as is there alledged made the necessary Enquiry into their values, this is by no means a satisfactory Method and We direct that for the future every Farm be put up fairly and publicly in the presence of our Governor and Council and sold to the best Bidders, who are in Circumstances equal to the undertaking, and that a Months notice at least be previously given of the Day of sale. As we cannot approve of your letting our Farms for long terms which We find most of them are We further direct that no Farm in future be lett for a longer term than one year until Affairs are in a more tranquil situation or you have our further orders hereupon, these directions are to be observed at every settlement under your care as well as at Fort Saint George.

SIXTHLY AND SEVENTHLY OF COVENANT AND MILITARY SERVANTS AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

50. We advised you in our last, We had entertained seven Writers for the service of your presidency viz^t., Samuel Johnson, Waldegrave Pelham, James Macarmick, James Broadbent, William Aldersey, Robert Dowsett and John Hamilton, they accordingly proceed to you some on the ships lately sailed, and the others in the ships now under Dispatch.

51. There are so many obvious objections against the Request you make for sending our Junior Servants to sea as Assistants for carrying on your own particular Trade, that We can by no means give our Consent to it and We are the more induced to refuse you as We are determined to have the Business at your presidency carried on by our own servants as much as possible without the Assistance of the Black people as was intimated to you in our last Letter.

52. You may depend upon the like protection and Favour as our other presidencys enjoy, and you may be assured We shall not remove our servants from other settlements over the Heads of any of our servants on your Establishment unless in extraordinary Cases, and it appears to us evidently necessary for the service of the Company.

53. We do now send you Lists of the several persons We have permitted to proceed to India as Free Merchants, in the seafaring way or in any other manner under the protection of the Company.

54. We have permitted Mr. Samuel Chandler to proceed to and reside in India under our protection to exercise his Profession of a Surgeon, and We recommend him to succeed to the first vacancy that should happen in our Service wherever he may be wanted or approved of, after those who have been already recommended are provided for, he accordingly took his passage on the prince Edward in April last.

55. We observe the Reverend Mr. Palk acts by your appointment as Pay Master and Commissary of the Army Employments very incompatible with his station as one of our Chaplains, We therefore direct that he be immediately discharged from those Military Employs, and apply himself solely to the Discharge of his Duty as a Chaplain.

56. It is with great concern We must observe to you, that We have reason to believe the late unhappy situation of our Affairs has afforded opportunitys to many of our servants to enrich themselves at the Companys Expence by unreasonable and unwarrantable profits in almost every office and Branch of Business, many practices have been hinted to us such as extraordinary perquisites arising from the letting our Farms the contracting for Investments, the supplying our Forces with provisions and stores and many others though not to so great an Amount, yet equally unjustifiable it has been likewise hinted to us that two of the Council attempted to commit a fraud by an overcharge in their accounts, and that notwithstanding the person who charged them therewith offered to make Oath to the Truth of what he asserted, yet no Public notice or Enquiry was made into the same, We are unwilling to give Credit to all these Hints, yet We are satisfied there is too much truth in them to be passed over unnoticed, and We direct that you immediately make an Enquiry into the profits every Person in our Service makes in his particular station, that you lopp off whatever shall appear unreasonable and make such Regulations for the general and particular conduct of our Affairs in their various Branches, that may as much as possible put it out of the power of any of our servants to injure the Company, whatever their stations may be, and We further direct that you make an enquiry whether there is any foundation for what We before hinted as to two of the Council and if you find there is, to acquaint us with the Circumstances of the case and the names of the persons concerned.

57. You are to give us a full and faithful Account of your proceedings in the Execution of the preceding Directions, and in particular We insist upon you sending us an account of the nature and amount of all and every the Perquisites, which have been and are received by our several servants in their respective posts and Employments.

58. The interest of the Company depends so much upon the Integrity, Frugality and decent Behaviour of our servants in general, that it is incumbent upon us not only to intimate that same to you but also to enforce it by our Commands which We now do by directing.

59. That the Governor and Council and all the rest of our servants both Civil and Military, do constantly and regularly attend the Divine Worship at Church every Sunday, unless prevented by sickness or some other reasonable cause, and that all the common soldiers likewise who are not on duty or prevented by sickness be also obliged to attend.

60. That the Governor and Council do carefully attend to the Morals and manner of life of all our servants in general and reprove and admonish them when and wherever it should be found necessary.

61. That all our superior servants do avoid as much as their several stations will allow of it, an expensive manner of Living, and consider that as the Representatives of a Body of Merchants a decent frugality will be much more in Character.

62. That you take particular care that our Younger servants do not launch into Expences beyond their Incomes, especially upon their first Arrival, and We lay it down as a standing and positive Command, that no Writer be allowed to keep a Pallankeen, Horse or Chaise during the term of his Writership.

63. That you set apart one day in every Quarter of the year and oftner if you find it necessary to enquire into the general conduct and Behaviour of all our servants below the Council, and enter the result thereof in your Diary for our observation.

64. We do not think it necessary to give such a Direction with regard to our servants in Council, because We are and always can be well acquainted with their characters without a formal Enquiry.

65. It frequently happens that when any of our servants have been dismissed or suspended abroad, or that they lay down our service and come to England under the pretence of severity or hard usage they have met with, they apply to Us for relief, but however willing We may be to render Justice to every person, We are seldom informed sufficiently of the facts to form a proper Judgment whether such Persons are entitled to relief or not and therefore We direct that for the future when you have reason to believe any of our servants have or do misbehave themselves in any respect whatsoever, so as to deserve censure, you do state the Facts as they appear to you of such Misbehaviour in Writing, and deliver the same by way of a Charge to the Misbehaving person and give him a reasonable time to reply thereto likewise in Writing, which done you must strictly and impartially examine the Evidence for and against such person, and determine whether he is or is not guilty of the charge against him; the whole of your proceedings must be transmitted to Us for our Information, together with your opinion thereupon and the reasons for such your Determination and opinion.

66. And you are hereby further directed never to refer any matters in Dispute either with regard to persons or Things, to be determined by us which can be decided by you, and in case of a Reference not without fully stating to Us all Circumstances in Writing and giving us your opinion thereupon, and the reasons on which you ground such opinion.

67. We approve of your proceedings for recovering what We had suffered, through the Fraud, Neglect and Irregularity of the late Mr. Empson in his post of Grain Keeper and at the same time We must recommend it to you to keep a strict Eye upon the conduct of all our Servants, and by the most prudent measures as much as in you lies, prevent all Embezzlements in the Goods and Stores they are entrusted with and oblige them to make good all Deficiencies, unless they shall appear to you to be unavoidable.

68. A small Chest of Treasure was shipped with our Permission on the *Drake* for Lieutenant Greenwell and was accordingly inserted in the Manifest by that Ship, but as no Demand was made upon Captain Fisher for the delivery of it, he inadvertently carried it to China, you must for the future give such orders to the Proper officers that Mistakes of this kind may be prevented.

69. We have received of Mr. Robert Goodere the sum of Twelve hundred and seventy nine pounds thirteen shillings and two pence, the value of Three thousand three hundred and thirty eight pagodas eight fanams and thirty five Cash at seven shillings and eight pence each Pagoda, being the Ballance of his account Current with the Company, dated the 28th September 1752 as transmitted to Us by the Admiral Vernon, and therefore you are to withdraw your Attachment unless you find he is Indebted to us in any other sum.

70. The Book of Standing orders which you transmitted to us by the Admiral Vernon reaches to the year 1721 only, We cannot suppose that the Book it was copied from reaches no further, and therefore you must send the reminder, of it brought up to this time as soon as you can get it transcrib'd, but if contrary to our Expectations you have no other, you must cause it to be completed out of Hand, as otherways it will be impossible for you to conduct our affairs with any Regularity, and agreeable to our commands signified to your Presidency from time to time.

71. You must always have the Book of Standing orders upon the Table whenever the Council meets, and you must for our information mention in your Diary that it does so lye before you.

72. We would have you for the future mention upon every Page of your Consultation Book, the day of the Month on which each Consultation is held that We may more readily turn to the same.

73. The Accounts of your Quick Stock received this season are calculated to the 31st December 1752 only, you must for the future cause them to be brought up to the time of the Dispatch of every ship, and without fail transmitted to us accordingly.

74. All other material papers must likewise be brought up to the same time, particularly the Lists of Christnings, Marriage and Burials your late ones ended on the 31st December 1752.

75. You must cause your Packets to be made up in as small a compass as possible, and sent in square Boxes instead of the Portmanteau cases which are usually sent, as being more portable, the Bombay Castle put in at plymouth and it was with great difficulty and loss of time the purser brought up the packet, which although it was of an extravagant size, upon opening appeared to be more than one half filled with cotton.

76. Upon looking over your Diary We cannot help observing that neither Mr. Cockel, Major Lawrence or Major Kinner have signed the several Consultations at which they are mentioned to be present, this evidently shows the Minutes were not regularly brought up as they ought to have been, and your Secretary appears very blameable for such an omission, We have been acquainted that the Multiplicity of Business at that time with the Hurry and Confusion attending the removal of the Presidency was the occasion of it, but even this is but a bare Excuse, and in order to prevent any thing of this kind in future We positively direct that the Minutes of every Consultation be signed by all the Members present on or before the next Board Day or at furthest

within a week after every consultation is held, this is to be observed as a standing order as well at the subordinate settlements as at Fort Saint George.

77. We observe you have not discharged all the Bonds you were directed to pay off by our Letter of the 23rd August 1751, but you are to comply with our said directions whenever you are likewise to discharge the Bonds and other claims mentioned in our letter of the 24th January last, we mean such of them as you are thereby directed to pay off.

78. We sent you our Commands last year to pay off both principal and Interest due to the China Mission for the twenty thousand pagodas deposited in our Cash some years ago, which you are punctually to comply with whenever you have a sufficient cash.

79. We observe that instead of discharging the Bond for Thirty thousand Arcot Rupees payable to Lewis Madeiro's deceas'd you have at the Request of the Executors continued the said principal sum in our cash and granted a New Bond for it at the Interest of six Cent³ Annum, but this must be paid off as soon as you have a sufficiency of Cash.

80. As the Bonds for the two beforementioned sums of twenty thousand pagodas and thirty thousand Arcot Rupees carrying as interest of six Cent only all other obligations bearing an higher Interest are to be first discharged.

81. Notwithstanding you are directed to discharge the several obligations beforementioned when you have a sufficiency of cash, it is not our meaning that you should detain so much treasure as may at any time Distress our Presidency in Bengal, where a plentiful supply is always of great importance.

82. A Request of Shaumir Sultan, son of the late Sultan David deceas'd has been laid before us, wherein he desires payment of the principal and interest of a Bond for Twenty thousand Rupees, dated the 7th August 1745 given by the then President and Council of Fort St. George to his said Father, but as you have not acquainted us that Shaumir Sultan has made any claim upon you for the payment of the said Bond, and We very well remember there was a long intricate Transaction between Sultan David and our Presidency of Fort Saint George and Bombay on account of a Debt due from him to the Company originally contracted at Ispahan, which it is alledged was discharged at Bombay, you are therefore hereby directed to enquire whether there is such a Bond outstanding as abovementioned to state all the Circumstances of the case with regard to the beforementioned Debt to the Company, and give your Opinion upon the whole whether there is any thing really due and what it is to the Representatives of the said Sultan David deceas'd that we may send you the necessary orders thereupon.

83. We have made all the Enquiry we can as to the Debts of one thousand pagodas under the Head of East India Bonds and of Eightynine pagodas, eighteen fanams and five Cash under that of Henry Newman which stand in the Fort St. George Church Books, and find that those sums have been carried forward from year to year in the Church Legers as represented by the Church Wardens, copys of the Entrys whereof We forward to you in the packets by

these ships, but as no Journals to the said Legers were transmitted to us, we can give you no further information from any Books in our Custody, with regard to Mr. Newman who was Secretary to the Society for propagating the Gospel in foreign parts We can only inform you that he died insolvent, that the society suffered considerably by him and there is no foundation to expect any satisfaction for the Bonds which it is supposed may have been deposited in his hands.

84. You were acquainted in our last Letter of the 19th of December, of the officers We had chosen for the service of your Presidency. We have since then entertained David Blake, Randfurdie Knox and Robert Bannatyne to serve us as Ensigns, who are to succeed to such vacancys as shall happen after the Ensigns mentioned in our said Letter are provided for, but their pay is to commence immediately upon their arrival.

85. You were likewise acquainted that the five coast and China ships would bring you about Three hundred Recruits, We are sorry to acquaint you We have been disappointed in raising that number of Recruits on those ships, but however We hope these with the sixtytwo sent on the St. George and the party of Swiss will be a sufficient reinforcement.

86. We have only to add that We intend to continue a respectable Military Force, until Affairs upon the Coast are in a more tranquil situation, and as this will necessarily be attended with great expenses, We most earnestly recommend it to your best Care and attention to prevent our being burthen'd with more charges than are justly and fairly incurre'd frequently checking all the Military Accounts and enquiring into the Conduct of every person who has any connection with them.

87. A Party of Swiss are embarked on these Ships to be incorporated in the Companys of that Nation at your Presidency you are to make a particular Enquiry in what manner they were treated in their Passage, and acquaint us therewith as we are determined to resent any ill usage they may meet with.

88. It was our Intention that the Swiss Troops should enjoy the same Privileges as in any other Foreign services, and therefore We are pleased you put them on that footing, as it perfectly agrees with our Sentiments and the Directions We gave you last season.

89. We observe the Coffrees are usefull and behave well in the Military Service, and that you have thought proper to let them have an uniform and a monthly Allowance instead of Diet, which you assert is the cheapest way and more satisfactory to them, if that is the case We have no objection thereto, and We shall depend upon your care for making them useful upon the most moderate terms.

90. The Military Regulations which were sent you in the year 1748 were well digested and are so clear and explicit with regard to the various Branches of the Military Aconomy that they must always be the rule of your Conduct, and we think may be easily carried into execution, provided a proper harmony subsists between you and the Commending Officer. The appointing of officers We

observe has occasioned some altercations and Misunderstandings between you and Major Lawrence, it is most certain by the said Regulations that the Governor and Council have the appointment of officers, and it is necessary as you are proper Representatives it should be so; but then you are always to have a due regard to the Recommendation of the commanding officers, which must be examined in the most candid manner and determined by the Board, free from all passion, prejudice or private interest.

91. We would have a particular regard paid to all Major Lawrence's sentiments upon, and plans of Military operations, but still it is necessary they should undergo the Examination of the Governor and Council, who as our Representatives are to determine upon the Utility of them, which determinations We hope no private views or Misunderstandings will ever in the least Bias, and We persuade ourselves Major Lawrence likewise will throw aside all remembrance of past Misunderstandings and perform the Duty incumbent on him with his usual alacrity and like the Man of Honour We have always found him to be.

92. Upon the whole We most earnestly recommend to all our Servants both Civil and Military to act in their several stations with that steady zeal Unanimity and Duty which the Company as their common benefactor has a right to expect of them.

93. We explained ourselves fully in the 74th Paragraphs of our Letter of the 24th January 1753 with regard to the Rank of the late Major Kinneer, which you are therefore referr'd to in answer to the Doubts contained in your Letters now before us, the Explanation there given, is to be the rule you are to proceed by in fixing the Presidency of such Gentlemen who shall be from time to time appointed by us to that station, unless We give Directions to the contrary.

94. Mr. George Higginson one of our officers, here, having lent Ensign David Blake the sum of Fifteen pounds, you are hereby directed to stop the same out of his pay, in a reasonable time after his arrival; and when you have received the whole into Cash you must give us advice thereof, his Promisory note is transmitted in the Denhams Packet.

EIGHTHLY CONCERNING THE WEST COAST.

95. Your observations upon the management of Affairs at the West Coast agree with ours, the Expenses at that place are greatly Increased and at the same time the Investment of Pepper is in a most languishing condition. The Number of New Settlements it is apprehended are calculated rather to serve Private Views than to be of any Benefit to the Company, a neglect of Business in General and the Corruption of many of our servants are too obvious to be passed over. It was high time to put a stop to these abuses and therefore you were directed last year to send Supravisors with full power and authority to enquiry into the conduct of our Servants and the situation of Affairs there, and to make such Regulations as they should see necessary, and as We make no doubt of your having complied with our orders, We shall expect on the arrival of the next store ship to receive a satisfactory account of the Supravisors proceedings, in the mean time We shall only add that the last advices from thence confirm

us in our Opinion of the necessity of a through Reformation. We sent you on the Ships Essex and Ilchester two Copys of the letters. We have writ to our servants upon the West Coast this year, to which you are referr'd for our further sentiments upon this disagreeable subject.

SUPPLEMENT.

96. The Anson not being in readiness to proceed with these Ships as was intended her Dispatch must therefore be deferr'd until some time in next month.

97. We were in hopes that We should have been able before the closing of this Letters to have acquainted you that the French Commissarys were instructed and empower'd to put a finishing hand to the Treaty so long depending between the two Companys, but as that is not yet done We can only acquaint you that a few days ago the Copy of a Letter from the Keeper of the seals on France to the Duke of Mirepoic his Most Christian Majestys Ambassador here dated at Paris the 10th Instant was transmitted to the Administration wherein he accounts for the Delay by the many observations and Discussions which the Treaty transmitted from England has occasioned in the Court of Directors of the French Company and the Memorials which thereupon had passed between them and the French Ministry but that he was endeavouring to adjust them in order to be laid before his Most Christian Majesty and then he should send an answer to England, he likewise acquaints his Excellency that Mr. Godeheu sail'd the 31st December from Franch who was to signify to you the orders he had to endeavour to pacify the Troubles and the Desire of the French Company to see Tranquility re-establish'd between the two Companys on a solid and durable footing, that his Excellency might assure the English Ministry that the personal Dispositions of Mr. Godeheu are entirely pacific, and that it is with him alone that you are to treat in India, but that his Excellency was not to conceal that he was a steady Man who would not suffer any new Enterprizes on the concessions of the Company whether old or new till there may be some Limitations thereof settled in Europe, he adds that as he could not however having favourable thoughts of the success of the negotiation he presumed Mr. Godeheu would have no occasion to make use of Reprizals and acts of violence and that the French Ministry would soon be able to advise him that everything was settled and reconciled between the two Companies.

98. This being the present situation of the Treaty in case Mr. Godeheu arrives in India before We can send you any further advices and you find he acts with that pacifick Disposition he is represented to be of and as We flatter ourselves the French Company are equally desirous with us of an accommodation we apprehend it will not be difficult for you jointly with him to induce the Country Powers to agree to a Cessation of Arms to continue until you are acquainted with the Event of the Treaty here which We hope will be either by the Anson or some Vessell to be dispatched to you shortly for that purpose only. We mean such Cessation of Arms should be general and include all the contending Partys as other ways by withdrawing our assistance from the Nabob he may be crushed by the superior power of his Enemys and here we cannot avoid again taking notice of the fatal difference between him and the King of Mysore and acquaint you that it is our firm opinion that if the Nabob had delivered up Trichinopoly agreeable to his Engagements it would have been greatly for his own Interest, saved us infinite trouble and expence and more than anything contributed to the General Tranquility.

We hope an Accommodation between them is not yet too late, and We recommend it to you to endeavour to the utmost of your power, to procure one upon the best terms you can either by inducing the Nabob to comply with his Engagements, or giving satisfaction to the King of Mysore in some other Method.

99. His Majesty has expressed the most gracious and tender concern for the Interest and Welfare of the Company and has laid his commands on the Ministry to support in his Royal name the Negotiation with the French Commissarys for bringing the Differences between the two Companys to an happy conclusion, his Majestys likewise has ordered the French Ambassador to be acquainted with his firm Resolution of maintaining and supporting the Company in the full Enjoyments of all the Rights and privileges granted them by the Royal Charter, and his Majesty has given the necessary orders for rendering such support effectual, in case an accommodation upon equitable and reasonable terms should not be obtained from the French Company in consequent whereof a squadron of Men of War is prepared and ready to sail with a sufficient Number of His Majestys Troops on board.

100. As the Commander of the said squadron will call first at Fort St. David, you must therefore take care to lodge at that settlement in time, such Directions and Intelligence as may be necessary for his Conduct and most expedient for our service both with regard to the Landing and Employment of the Troops there, if it should be thought necessary, and the proper station for his Majestys ships.

101. A ship is actually fitted out and is ready to proceed from Embden to the Coast of Choromandel and the Bay of Bengal, in the service of a company erected at that place under the protection of the King of Prussia, on board of which proceeds one Mr. Harris an Englishman as Principal Agent, We give you this notice that you may be well upon your guard to prevent any Encroachments upon our Rights and Privileges, and that the Agents of the said Company may not meet with encouragement from any persons whatsoever under our Protection.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

It will be very material for our service that Colonel Scott should be at Fort St. George at the time of the arrival of the squadron of Men of War and the Troops now proceeding thither if he shall happen to be at Fort St. George to any of its subordinate settlements upon the Receipt of this Letter you must forthwith acquaint him it is our pleasure that he do not proceed to Bengal but that he continue at Fort St. George, Fort St. David or in the Neighbourhood thereof until the arrival of the said squadron when he will receive our further orders. The enclosed Letter to Colonel Scott is to intimate our pleasure to him as abovementioned, it must therefore be immediately deliver'd to him.

The enclosed Letter to our President and Council at Fort William is to direct them in case of Colonel Scotts being there to acquaint him it is our Pleasure that he do return to Fort St. George forthwith, and that they procure him an expeditious conveyance, you must therefore forward it to Bengal as soon as possible.

We recommend it to you to consider what preparations it will be proper to make for the arrival of His Majestys squadron that provision may not be wanting at reasonable Rates for such a Number of Men and that the Troops may have all necessary accommodations upon their Landing.

The said squadron will consist of four ships of the Line and Two Frigates and the Land Forces will be about Eight hundred in Number.

It has been intimated to us by some of our President Mr. Saunder's Friends, that he intended to return very soon to England, but We have that Opinion of him as to perswade ourselves, that nothing but an absolute necessity will induce him to lay down the Government in the present critical situation of our affairs, and as We have a great dependence upon his abilities, We hope We shall have the benefit of them by his continuing in our service.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

1. The Commanders of the ships Denham, York and Norfolk received their Dispatches on the 24th of January but the Lords of the Admiralty having issued out Press Warrant for manning the squadron proceeding to the East Indies many of the sailors left the said Three Ships, which occasion some loss of time before they could be remanned, however they are now prosecuting their Voyages, and will sail from the Downe with the first fair Wind.

2. You were acquainted in our former Letters that We have stationed the Ships Warren, Kent, London and Britannia for Bombay, but as it was necessary to get three ships immediately ready to be employed in Transporting some of the Troops His Majesty has been pleased to grant for our Service on the coast of Choromandel, We altered the Destination of the Three last named viz^t. the Kent London and Britannia from Bombay Fort St. George to be employed as Transports accordingly and therefore you are to look upon them as coast and Bay ships they will be ready to sail out of the Downs the first Week in March.

3. In lieu of the said three ships We have taken up for Bombay the Prince Henry Captain Thomas Best Commander, the Shaftsbury Captain William Bookey and the Warwick Captain Nicholas Webb each of them being of the Burthen of 499 Tons, which with the Warren Captain Alphonsus Glover are the Four Ships for the Bombay station. The Warren and Shaftsbury will be dispatched about the 21st March and the other Two Ships the beginning of April.

4. The Kent London and Britannia carry whole Kintlage in Iron viz^t. Sixteen Tons for every one hundred Tons each is let for which We mention to prevent any Mistakes in calculating their Tonnage as no other of the coast and Bay ships this season have any Iron Kintlage.

5. The four Bombay Ships viz^t. the Warren, Prince Henry, Shaftsbury and Warwick carry half Kintlage in Iron.

6. But be careful to look into every ships Charterparty and wherever you find Iron Kintlage stipulated for observe it is to be reckoned into the charterparty Tonnage for so many Tons of Goods as there are Tons of Iron Kintlage mentioned therein, agreeable to the Notifications you have already had from us.

7. The Anson not getting to Gravesend so soon as the Denham, York and Norfolk she could not be dispatched with them as was at first intended, it gives us an opportunity therefore of sending you this Letter, the said Ship is now under her Dispatches.

8. We intend to order one of the Bombay Ships which we believe will be the Warren to proceed first to Fort St. George to accommodate Lieutenant Colonel Heron and Mr. Orme with a passage which two Gentlemen We have appointed to the Stations hereafter mentioned, the said ship is to be forwarded to Bombay as soon as those Gentlemen and their necessaries are landed.

9. As the beforementioned three ships Kent, London and Britannia are an unexpected and additional Tonnage to be provided for by you and our Servants in Bengal, We give you this previous notice that you may turn it in your thoughts how to dispose of them in the last manner, We shall choose to have them all as well as the other ships of the season returned to us in the same season they arrive with the Investments of the two Presidencys, but if that is not practicable, We would have them employed in Freight Voyages or in any other manner so as they may earn their Demorage at least, until they can be sent home the following season, But as it may not be possible to Dispatch them home the same season or employ them until the next as beforementioned, We would then have one or not exceeding two of the said Three ships that can be first got ready sent to Canton on our Account provided they arrive at Fort St. George in time to be Dispatched to and return'd from Canton to England the same season we have thought it necessary give you by this conveyance this general view of our Intentions that you may take any necessary Measures that may occur to you and concert with Bengal Presidency accordingly, but we shall give more precise Directions by the ships themselves.

10. Notwithstanding any Directions in our former Letters for Loading Surplus Tonnage, you are to Load no more on as of the coast and Bay Ships than the Charterparty Tonnage (allowing for the usual Wastage) unless you can do it without prejudice to the Dispatch of others, the additional ships you will have on your Hands makes this caution necessary.

11. The amount of the Gold and other particulars consigned to you on the Anson is sixty-four thousand seven hundred seventy-nine pounds, nine shillings and six pence as p Invoice in the packet.

12. We have too great reason to believe that some unfair practices have been used greatly to our Prejudice in making Investments in the private manner intimated in the 33rd Paragraph of Our Letter of the 23rd Janry last. We therefore positively order that the Directions We therein gave for your future condi[...] in that Branch be most punctually obeyed, and that all proposal be received in Council and contracts made by them and We further direct that the orders We have from time to time given in regard the Publick Sales of our all Goods be inviolably observed and that no Person whatsoever be intimidated from bidding out on the contrary encouraged that Our Sales may be as free and open as possible, and that all Traders resorting to or residing at your presidency be allowed an entire freedom of Trade on paying the established Dutys and be at Liberty to dispose of their Goods as they shall think most to their advantage.

13. We have thought it necessary in the present critical situation of Affairs, to make some alteration in our council as well as for the present to enlarge it and we hope every Person appointed of the said Council will heartily and Zealously in their several stations serve us to the utmost of their Power and as they may be assured that a chearful and ready acquiescence with our commands will be highly acceptable to us, so on the contrary we shall not look upon those Persons in a favourable light who shall raise any Difficultys or in any manner retard or embarrass our Affairs on account of the alterations we have thought proper to make or on any other pretence whatsoever.

14. Upon the Receipt of this Letter the undernamed Persons are to be the Council for the management of all our Affairs at the Presidency of Fort St. George and they are hereby ordered and Directed immediately to take their stations in the said Council in the order they are here Named, and all our servants both Civil and Military are to give all due obedience to them viz^t.—

15. Our Commission for the beforementioned Council is sent in the Packet by the Anson, but if any other Ship or Ships shall arrive before her with this our appointment, you are to obey the same as punctually as if you had received our said Commission.

16. Although for the reasons before given, We have exceeded the Number of Members of which our Council has been generally composed yet for the future it is to consist of no more than Eleven Persons as usual therefore as Vacancys happen therein by Death, or the Removal of any of the beforementioned Members you are not to admit any others without our leave until it is reduced under the Number of Eleven Persons.

17. When the Council is reduced as beforementioned under the Number of Eleven, you are then at liberty to take in the next in standing unless their Behaviour or circumstances may render them unfit and except any Person or Persons who have been set aside by our former orders.

18. As it always has been and continues to be our Intention that the Major should be fixed to the Station of Third without rising higher in the Council, the next Members below the Majors station of Third are to succeed to such Vacancys, in their turn until our further Pleasure is known.

19. In case of the Death or absence of the Gentleman whom we have now appointed or shall at any time Nominate to be Major and Third in Council, that station is to continue vacant until you have our Directions thereupon.

20. Lieutenant Colonel Heron and Mr. Robert Orme two of our before-mentioned Council will take their Passage on the Warren, One of the Bombay ships, and as that Ship will be Dispatched about the Middle of the next Month we hope they will be with you soon after the arrival of the Anson.

21. If Mr. Pigott should be at Vizagapatam or elsewhere at a Distance from Fort St. George or Fort St. David he must have immediate notice to return, that he may enter upon the Duty of the station We have appointed him to.

22. During the absence of Mr. Pigott, Lieutenant Colonel Heron and Mr. Orme, the other Members of the beforenamed Council are to act and carry on the Business and are to take Place in the Order we have named them.

23. Notwithstanding Mr. Pigott's general Residence should be at Fort St. David so long as he continues Deputy Governor of that settlement yet upon extraordinary occasions he is to take his seat at Fort St. George as Second in Council, provided his Absence will be no Detriment to our affairs.

24. Major Lawrence is to continue joined to the beforenamed council, and is to be one of the Committee for Transacting affairs with the country Government and Neighbouring Powers, in the same manner as we Directed in our command of the 23rd August 1751 by the Durrington, and as we have a great Dependence upon his abilities we desire he will give his attendance in council and at the said committee as often as he can be spared from his other avocations.

25. We have entertained Lieutenant Colonel Alexander Heron an Able and Experienced Officer' to be Major of our Garrison of Fort St. George and of our Forces employed at and under our Presidency of the Fort St. George, he is to be Third of Council and to remain so without rising to a superior Rank therein as beforementioned he is also to have the command and cloathing of one of the companys agreeable to the 22nd Paragraph of the Military Regulations Dated the 5th June 1748 for all which stations his salary is to be Two hundred and Fifty pounds a year with the usual appointments for Diet servants and Pallankeen as Third in council to commence on his arrival at Fort St. George or Fort St. David, which salary and appointments are to be in lieu of all other allowances whatsoever, for the said several stations of Major, Third of Council and Captain of a Company, and to prevent misunderstandings We do declare it to be our meaning, that he is not to have any additional Pay for any service or Duty in regulating or commanding any of our artillery companys in case of a vacancy in the command of them, although Lieutenant Colonel Heron is appointed Third in Council he is not be Embarrassed with any other officers than the care of the Military.

26. Notwithstanding Lieutenant Colonel Heron is a senior Officer in His Majesty's Service to Lieutenant Colonel Scott and Major Lawrence yet as the two last named Gentlemen have prior Commissions in the Companys Service they are therefore to rank before him. Lieutenant Colonel Heron has been acquainted with this Resolution and has agreed to acquiesce with it and it is upon this condition only that We have appointed him to and he is to continue in the beforementioned Stations of Major and Third in Council. Colonel Heron is likewise to rank below such Officers in his Majestys service as are of equal or the same Degree with himself and you are to observe that all the Kings Officers are to rank before those belonging to the Company of the same Degree, our meaning being that Lieutenant Colonel Heron is to rank only according to his commission from the Company.

27. The Behaviour of Major Stringer Lawrence as Commander of our Forces having been greatly to our satisfaction We came to an Unanimous Resolution to present him with a sword enriched with Diamonds of about Seven hundred and fifty pounds Value, in order to express our grateful sense of his signal services to the Company in the Chief Command of their Forces in the Field under the Presidency of Fort St. George, You are to Notify our said Resolution to Major Lawrence, and when you receive the said sword which we hope will be by one of the Transport ships You are to present it to him at the council Board in our Name.

28. We have likewise agreed to make a Present to captain Robert Clive of a sword set with Diamonds to the Value of Five hundred Pounds as a Token of our Esteem for him, and sense of his signal Military services to the Company on the coast of Choromandel.

29. The Repeated Directions which have been given for writing off the General Books the Estates of Deceased Persons paid into our Cash as soon as may be after all Demands in India are satisfied must be very particularly attended to in respect of the assests belonging to such officers as die in our service and which are received by you in pursuance to the Military Regulations, that we may satisfy the Legal claimants here, who are generally very importunate.

30. Although we could not safely pay the Relations of Captain William Richards deceased the Value of Pagodas Five hundred which his Estate is credited for on your Books but not writ off, we have been prevailed upon in consideration of their necessitous circumstances to advance them one hundred and fifty Pounds on account, which we advise you of to prevent our suffering in case of any claims upon the said Estate in India.

31. On the 11th Instant the Oxford Captain Thomas Stevens arrived at Spithead having lost her passage about the cape from Bengal, she left St. Helena on the 5th of December last at which time our other expected Ships the Godolphin and Hector were not arrived there.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL

AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

1. You have been acquainted in our Letters of this season, that His Majesty has been most graciously pleas'd to order a squadron of his Ships, with a Body of Land Force on board, to proceed to the East Indies, to protect the Company in their commerce and their just Rights and Privileges; we are now to inform you, that the said Squadron is composed of the undermentioned ships, under the Command of Charles Watson Esq^r. Rea^r. Admiral of the Blue Viz^t.

2. The Land Forces his Majesty has graciously granted to us, as beforementioned, consist of Colonel John Adlercron's Regiment of Foot, of Eight hundred and fifteen Men, Officers included and a Detachment from the Royal Regiment of Artillery, consisting of seventy Eight Men, likewise officers included, commanded by Captain Lieutenant William Hislop.

3. The Detachment of Artillery take their Passage on our ships the Kent, London and Britannia, as do likewise as large Detachments from the Regiment, as the ships can conveniently carry, the number of Persons on each ship will amount to about one hundred and fifty Men, The remainder of the Forces will proceed on the Men of War.

4. Besides the Baggage belonging to the forces, there are Laden on our said Three ships sundry stores belonging to his Majesty Viz^t. Naval, Victualing, Ordnance and others, all which you are to take care, that the commanders duly deliver or account for.

5. The said ships Kent, London and Britannia proceed to Cork in Ireland, to take on board the Forces beforemention'd as do likewise the Men of War.

6. As there may be many occurrences which will require the attention and Regulation of some Person on the Spot, with regard to the embarking the Troops shipping the Stores and other Incidents, Henry Crabb Boulton Esq^r. one of the Court of Directors proceeds to Cork, being fully empowered by us to give the Commanders their sailing orders, and do whatever may appear necessary on the occasion, and if he shall think proper to send you any notices or intimations relative to the Business he is entrusted with, you are to give all due observance to them.

7. You are to make a strict enquiry, upon the arrival of the said Forces, in what manner they were used by the commanders of our ships, and if their Behaviour has not been satisfactory, you are to state the Particulars to us, that we may shew a suitable Resentment for any ill usage.

8. Upon the anchoring or arrival of Rear Admiral Watson at your Presidency, or any of the Companys settlements, we direct that he be saluted with Fifteen Guns which he will return Gun for Gun, and in case the Commodore, who wears a distinguishing Pennant, shall arrive at any of our Settlements, when the Admiral is not there, he is to be saluted with Thirteen Guns, who will likewise return Gun for Gun and you are to pay the Admiral all the Honours due to his Rank, and carry it to him on all occasions, with great regard and Friendship, and as you are to behave with all due civility and Respect to the several Commanders belonging to his Majestys Squadron, so you are to give them, as well as the Admiral all necessary help and assistance.

9. You are hereby directed to allow to Admiral Watson after the rate of Five Pagodas a day or Forty shillings sterling which we desire his acceptance of, to defray the Expence of House Rent, and for keeping a Table for himself and such commanders and officers as he shall think proper which allowance is to commence on his arrival upon the choromandel coast, and continued during his stay in India, and is to be in full consideration of all Expences whatsoever.

10. As his Majestys Ships will be in of stores, Provisions and necessarys during their stay in India, you are hereby directed to furnish Admiral Watson or any of his Majestys Commanders with such sums of money, as they shall require you to advance for those purposes, for which you are to take Bills of Exchange drawn by the Admiral Commanders or proper officers, for the amount of the sums so advanced, at the rate of six shillings and six pence ₹ Weighty Dollars, for the Stores on the Commissioners of the Navy, and for the Provisions, on the Commissioners for victualling the same, payable to us in money at Thirty days sight, taking four Bills of the same Tenour and transmitting them to us by different ships.

11. And you are hereby positively directed, to adjust all accounts, any way relative to the squadron, with the proper officers and procure Bills as before-mentioned for what shall appear due to the Company, for the Ballance of such accounts, or at least let them be so authentically certified, that we may not be put to the Trouble of Litigating such accounts in England, which we very frequently were, to Our great Loss, in the late War.

12. What we have said above, with regard to supplying his Majestys Ships with Money Stores, Provisions and Necessarys, and adjusting accounts with the proper officers, must be the Rule you are to observe, with respect to all accounts relative to his Majestys Land Forces, and Bills are to be drawn, at the same rate of six shillings and six pence ₹ weighty Dollar, upon the Board of ordnance, or such other of his Majestys officers in England, whose Province it is to discharge such Bills, or a just such accounts.

13. You are to carry it with great Respect to Colonel Adlercorn, who is appointed by his Majesty Commander in Chief and you are to treat all the officers of his Majesty's Forces in a Gentleman like and Friendly manner, and

take the utmost care to promote and cultivate a good understanding and Harmony between the Kings and our own Troops, as the general good of the service depends so greatly there upon.

14. You are to make an Allowance to Colonel Adlercorn of Five Pagodas or Forty shillings a day, which we desire his acceptance of, to defray the Expence of House Rent and for keeping a Table for himself, the Lieutenant Colonel, Major and such other officers as he shall think proper, which allowance is to commence on his arrival upon the choromandel coast, and continued during his stay in India, and is to be in full consideration of all expences whatsoever.

15. As it would be a Discouragement to his Majestys Forces, to serve with less Pay than our own, we have agreed, at our own Expence, to make good to them the difference, you are therefore to pay out of our cash, on the companys account, to the officers and soldiers of the Regiment under Colonel Adlercorn, after the following rates viz^t.

and to the Adjutant to the Regiment one shilling, a Day.

16. You are likewise to pay, on the Companys account the undermentioned additional allowances to the officers, cadet & Gunners of the Detachment from the Royal Regiment of artillery viz^t.

To one First Lieutenant, One shilling p^{d} diem
 One Second Lieutenant, One shilling
 Three Lieutenant Fireworkers, Eight pence, each
 Gentlemen cadets and Gunners, Two pence, each

17. You are to observe what we said before, that the before mentioned allowances are only to put his Majestys Forces with respect to pay upon the same footing with our own, and you are further to observe, that no advanced Pay is to be allowed to any other persons that as before directed.

18. You must take care that the said Forces are properly accommodated with Barracks or Places to live in, and in general that they be treated with Humanity, and as much care taken of them as of our own Troops.

19. You are to Furnish the Officers of the artillery with Boats and crews on their arrival, from time to time, as they may have occasion for them, and you are to provide convenient Magazines and Storehouses for the Reception of the Field Train with the ammunition and Stores belonging thereto, as well as for all other his Majestys Stores, so as they may be in the custody and under the care of their own proper officers.

20 The French Company have lately transmitted to us their Project of a convention between the East India Companies of France and England, for restoring union, and putting an end to the Troubles on the coast of choromandel, being in answer to that concerted here with the French Commissarys & transmitted to France so long ago as the beginning of November last, we are opening again our conferences with the French Commissarys, but we can form no judgment of what may be Event of them, however we think it necessary you should be informed of the different sentiments of each Company, as they may be of use to you, in Forming any Treaty with the French in India, and for that purpose we send you copys of the Two Projects.

21 And here we likewise think it necessary to acquaint you not only with the sentiments of the administration, but also own, with regard to the conduct to be observed with the French Company, which are contained in the following copy of a Minute of a conference held at Whitehall between the Right Honble the Earl of Holderness, one of Majesty's Principal Secretarys of State, the Right Hon'ble the Lord Anson, First Lord Commission of the Admiralty, and Mr. Chauney, Mr. Drake, Mr. Burrow and Mr. Mabbott together with Alexander Hume Esqu^r who was likewise present, on the occasion viz^t.

Whitehall 19th February 1754. The East India Companys of England and France, having hitherto confined themselves to act only as "auxiliaries to the Princes of India, with whom they are mutually in alliance and it being material "not to deviate from this Method of Proceeding and "to avoid, as much as possible, becoming Principals "in the War, the India Company will take care to "give the strictest orders to their Governors and "other officers in India, cautiously to avoid "whatever might be construed as an act of Hostility "against the French India Company, unless the "Proceedings of the French should force them to Reprisals.

22 This is to be the Plan, by which you are to Govern yourselves with regard to the Trobles in India, and we do hereby most solemnly enjoin you, to observe it with the utmost care and attention.

23 As it is impossible to give any particular Directions in the present Critical and dangerous situation of affairs, and as the various turns and Revolutions, to which they are continually liable, can only be attended to by Person on the spot, we think it highly necessary to appoint a committee, upon the Plan of that in our commands of the 23rd of August 1751 by the Durrington, but consisting of a larger number of Members on whose Integrity, Judgment and circumspection, the Welfare and Happiness of this company will greatly depend.

24 We therefore hereby order and direct, that for the better securing the Companys Rights, Grants and Possessions in the present troublesome situation of affairs Thomas Saunders Esq^r. President of Fort S^t. George or the President for the time being George Pigot Esq^r. second in council, or the second for the time being Lieutenant Colonel Caroline Frederick Scott, Lieutenant Colonel Stringer Laurence, Messieurs Henry Powney, Robert] Orme, Alexander Wynch and William Perceval or any Three of them, be a Committee to transact affairs with the country Government and neighbouring Powers, also with the French, Dutch and other Europeans, so far only as the Company may be Interested by their views, Designs and Policy in Government on the coast of Choromandel, the West Coast of Sumatra or any Places within the Jurisdiction of

our Presidency of Fort St. George but not to disburse any of the companys Treasure or cash without the concurrence of the Majority of the Council, at a Board duly summoned, the said Committee are to consider of the proper Measures, for the security of the Companys Rights, Grants and Possessions, and the support of such alliances, as have been made in consequence thereof with the Nabob Mahomed Ally Cawn or any other country Powers when they have formed with the greatest care the necessary Plans, they are to communicate them to Rear Admiral Watson, or the commander in chief of his Majestys Squardon for the time being, and to Colonel Adlercron, or the Commander in Chief of the Kings Land Forces for the time being and take their opinion thereupon, and in general to concert with those Gentlemen the necessary Measures for the most effectual carrying into execution such Plans, as the said committee shall propose to them, and all others of a Military nature.

25 We positively command that all the Members of this Committee, who are Resident so as to be able to attend, be duly summoned and meet twice in a week at least, and oftener, if it shall be necessary, they are to keep a constant correspondence with the commanding officers in the Field, and they are to enter all their Proceedings, Resolutions and correspondence in Books to be kept for that purpose only, and transmit them to us by every opportunity, and for the better carrying on the Business of this Committee, we direct that Mr. Henry Van Sittart be the Secretary thereto, we most earnestly recommend and enjoin the most inviolable Secrecy to be observed in all the Transactions of this Committee, as far as the nature & circumstances of the several affairs before them will admit of.

26 In case of the Decease of any of the beforenamed Persons the Committee are to fill up the vacancy or vacancies, with such Person or Persons, as they shall find best qualified for that Purpose.

27 In our Letter of the 15th of February last we intimated to you, in what manner we would have the ships Kent, London and Britannia employed, we now proceed to give you more precise Directions, as those ships are an unexpected additional Tonnage it will require your utmost diligence to provide for them, you are therefore to concert the necessary measures, with our President and Council of Bengal, to Dispatch them all home, as well as the rest of the coast and Bay Ships, the same season they arrive if it is possible, but if, upon due consideration, you find that cannot be effected, with regard to all the three ships, you must Dispatch home as many of them, as you can procure Loadings for, but it shall happen you cannot send any of them home, you are then, concert, with the President and Council of Bengal to find employment for them, until the next season, if it is possible, by letting them out Freight to particular Persons, making them general Freight Ships or any other manner you can, so as they may earn the Demorage at least, that we shall be obliged to pay the Owners for their Detention.

28 The returning to us the said three ships Kent, London and Britannia the season of their arrival or in failure thereof the employing them on Freight voyages, until the following season in the manner before directed, are the methods we would choose and most earnestly recommend to be carried into Execution but as it may happen that you and our servants in Bengal may not be able to comply with our Directions, for employing all the said ships on Freight or otherwise to earn their Demorage. We then direct, that one or not exceeding two of the said Three Ships, that can be first got ready, be sent to Canton,

provided you can dispatch them on or before the 23rd of August, but as much sooner as you can, so as they may be returned to us from thence the same season they arrive there.

29 You are to Expedite the Disembarking of the Troops out of the said three ships and the delivery of his Majestys stores that they may be ready to be employed without loss of time in our service as before directed.

30 You are to load or continue on board each ship intended for Canton, Twenty Chests of Treasure and any Goods which can be got ready without loss of time fit for that Market, and consign the same to Messieurs John Misenor John Burrow Alexander Hume and John Mapletoft Supra Cargos in the Commission for the Ships Lord Anson and Triton jointly with Messrs. Samuel Harrison and Nathaniel Garland Supra cargos of the Princess Augusta, which said six Gentlemen to be the Supra Cargos for transacting the affairs of the said ship or ships unless it shall happen that such ship or ships shall not arrive at Canton soon enough to be dispatched home the same season or shall unfortunately lose their passage thither, in such cases the said ships are to be consigned to Mess^{rs}. John Misenor Sam^l Harrison Alex^r Hume and Nathaniel Garland, who are directed to continue in China the year 1755.

31 You are to acquaint our said Supra Cargos, that they are to Invest the Produce of the said ships cargos in low prized Bohea and Singlo Teas, of which two thirds to be Bohea if to be procured or as near that Proportion as you can, and such a quantity of China Ware, as may be necessary for a Flooring and to make them sail worthy.

32 Among other articles consigned to you by the ships Kent, London and Britannia (for the particulars of which we refer you to the Invoices) are Forty Chests of Treasure, laden, in equal Proportions on the two first ships on the supposition of your sending Two ships to China, but if but one ships proceeds thither, you are to reserve the other Twenty chests, for the service of yours and Bengal Presidency, as it is our meaning, that the Treasure on each ships shall consist of Twenty Chests only.

33 We transmit you the necessary instructions to the Supra Cargos who are to take charge of the said ships, they are left open for your information but upon the Dispatch of such Ship or Ships you are to seal them up and forward them agreeable to the Directions, you are likewise to forward the charterpartys, and all other necessary Papers, for the Information of the Supra Cargos, although we have transmitted to you the said Instructions in Triplicates, but or at most two of them are to be made use of, our meaning being, by sending them on each ship, that you might forward them on the ship or ships that may be first ready to proceed to Canton.

34 We are well assured that the Commanders of such of our Europe ships as are employed in country voyages, load them, with their own Private Trade, in a most unreasonable manner, hence in a great measure have arisen the backwardness of the People in India to freighting such ships, and the Losses the company have generally sustained by paying more for the Demorage, than has been received for their Earnings you are therefore to take notice, that we have a Right not only to the Charterparty Tonnage, but to the Tonnage of the whole ship, excepting the Three Tons allowed to the commander officers and ships company for each one hundred Tons, as stipulated in charterparty, and as we do and shall insist upon such Right, you must take particular care to prevent

all Encroachments upon it, and if the commander and the ships company shall make use of more Tonnage, than they are as aforesaid allowed, you are to cause the surplus to be taken out, and you are hereby directed, to transmit to us an exact calculate of the Tonnage of the Private Trade laden upon, or received from every ship, that we may be able to do the Company Justice, as we certainly will against such Persons who shall encroach upon our just Rights in this particular.

35 We have given leave to the Commanders of the ships London, Kent and Britannia to carry the value of Thirty-five or Forty Pounds in Trading Guns, shott and Flints, to be disposed of only at Madagascar for Provisions on condition if their ships do not touch there, to deliver the same at Prime Cost to you, or to acquaint you, in what manner they have disposed thereof, You are therefore to call upon them for the said Guns, Shott and Flints, or an account of the Disposition of them accordingly.

36 You are to demand the Orlopes on board the said Three Ships, and either give the commanders Receipts for them, or Pay them the Prime cost, agreeable to the accompanying account.

37 We have laden and consigned to you on the London, Twenty chests of Treasure and Eighty Tons of Iron, on the Kent, Twenty chests of Treasure, Fifty Tons of Lead and thirty Tons of Iron, and on the Britannia, Fifty Tons of Lead, besides some few particulars, as will appear by the said several ships Invoices.

38 You are acquainted in the 20th Paragraph of this Letter that we send you copys of our own and the French Companys Projects for an accommodation, we add that we now likewise send you Translates of the French Companys Memorial of observations thereupon with some Remarks of our own, which being connected with the Two Projects will give you a just Idea of the Views & Pretensions of each Company.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

1. Our last letter to you went in Triplicates by the ships London, Kent and Britannia, under date of the 2^d Instant, on which day the Commanders of the said ships received their Dispatches to proceed to Cork, to receive on board the Detachments from Colonel Adlercron's Regiment, and from thence to make the best of their way to Fort Saint George, first touching at Fort Saint David, to land the soldiers or any part of the Governments stores there if it shall be thought necessary.

2. Four Letters of the same tenor and date are committed to the care of Rear Admiral Watson, who will distribute them upon different ships belonging to the squadron under his Command in order to be deliver'd to you as they shall respectively arrive and you will receive by this conveyance another likewise of the same Tenor and Date.

3. We likewise write to you on the 15th of February by the ships London, Kent and Britannia, also by the Anson, and We now enclose a copy of the said Letter for your Information and Guidance, in case this ship the Warren shall happen to arrive before the others.

4. Alexander Heron Esq^r. whom we have appointed our Major and third in Council, and Mr. Robert Orme seventh in Council take their passage on this ship, to enter upon the Duty of their respective Employments.

5. This ship the Warren is upon the Bombay Establishment and our only Intention in directing the Commander to call at Fort St. George is to accommodate the two abovementioned Gentlemen with a Passage and to carry such stores, Provisions and Necessarys belonging to His Majestys Land and Sea Forces as the ships London Kent and Britannia could not take in therefore as soon as the said services are performed and you have laden any Goods upon her, which you shall think fit, you must give Captain Glover orders to make the best of his way to Bombay, in which you are to be as expeditious as possible, that there may not be the least hazard of losing her passage thither, it being our Intention that she shall be the annual ship from thence to Canton early in the following season.

6. When the Warren has deliver'd at Fort St. George his Majesty's Stores, she will have room to stow a large number of Bales and other Goods, you are therefore to take the opportunity of forwarding such Woollen Goods as will not readily sell at your Presidency to Bombay on our account, if you apprehend they will go off more advantageously there, taking care that the assortments be as properly adapted for that Market as possible.

7. Although the soldiers by this ship are intended for the service of Bombay Presidency, yet if you think it material for our service to detain them upon the coast of Choromandel, you are thereby authorized to do so and the Commander is to obey your orders for landing them accordingly.

8. In order to send the Woollen and other Goods provided for our presidency at Bombay, which by the beforementioned Deviation of the Warren would have been left on our hands, We have hired the old Hardwicke for a sum certain to proceed to Bombay, where having deliver'd all her Consignments, she is to be sold on the owners account never to be returned again to England, she will be ready to proceed accordingly with the three Bombay ships the beginning of next Month.

9. His Majesty has been pleased to constitute and apoint Stringer Laurence Esq^r. by a Commission bearing date the 26th Febr. 1754 to be a Lieutenant Colonel of Foot in the East Indies, the said original Commission is sent in the Warrens Packet in order for your delivering it to Colonel Laurence accordingly.

10. We have entrusted Captain Glover with the sword mentioned in the 27th paragraph of our Letter of the 15th February as a Present from the Court of Directors to Lieutenant Colonel Lawrence, you are upon the receiving it to summon all the Council who are resident in such a manner as to be able to attend, and the President is to read to Colonel Lawrence the Resolution of the Court of Directors of the 6th February last, an attested copy whereof is transmitted you for the purpose in this ships packet after which the President is in our name to present the sword to Lieutenant Colonel Lawrence, and at the same time deliver to him the said Resolution of the Court of Directors.

11. The Right Honble Henry Fox Esq^r. Secretry at [. . . .] has signified his Majestys Pleasure to Alexander Heron Esq^r. that he has leave to enter into the service of the Company upon condition of his delivering up his commission as Lieutenant Colonel and resigning his Rank in the Army whilst he continues in our service, which he has accordingly complied with, a Triplicate of Mr. Fox's Letter accompanys this for your Information, and to prevent any Difficultys with regard to Rank among his Majestys and our own officers.

12. Mess^{rs}. John Fabry, Andrew Crotty and Stephen Smith proceed on the Warren to serve the Company as Cadets in their Troops upon the Fort St. George Establishment, who are to be preferr'd according to their Merit and Behaviour in the mean time they are to receive serjeants Pay.

13. We sent you by the Ships Kent, London and Britannia Copys of the Translation of the French Companys Memorial of observations, upon ours and their Projects of accommodation, We now send a copy from the original French one, which may be useful to prevent any Difficultys that may arise on account of different senses that may be put on particular Expressions.

14. An act having passed this present sessions of Parliament for empowering the Company to hold Courts Martial in the East Indies and at St. Helena, We herewith send you a separate packet containing the necessary powers and Instructions together with a Letter of Directions, dated this day for carrying the same into Execution, to which therefore you are particularly referr'd.

15. We have sent likewise a Packet of the same kind by this ship, directed to the President and Council of Fort William which therefore you must carefully forward to Bengal, by the first safe conveyance that offers.

16. Upon Colonel Adlercron's Landing at Fort St. George or any other of our settlements in the East Indies, he is to be saluted with Thirteen Guns and you are to shew him all the Honors due to his station as Commander in Chief of all His Majestys Land Forces in the East Indies.

17. Lest any Accident should happen to the Warren, We send a Duplicate of the Packet mention'd in the 14th Paragraph to Bombay to be carefully forwarded to you from thence by the first safe conveyance that offers.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL AT FORT S^T. GEORGE.

HIS MAJESTY having been graciously pleased to assist us with a Regiment of his Forces under the command of Colonel John Adlercron and they being under martial Law we thought it necessary for our service that the Troops in our pay should be subject to the same Discipline and altho' the Company are sufficiently authorized by their Charters to exercise martial Law in time of war or open hostility yet there being some uncertainty in determining what should be deemed to be war and open hostility and it being likewise necessary to prevent our Forces deserting and that they should be kept under due Regulation ever in time of peace so as to render them usefull as occasion shall require we have obtained an act of Parliament for Punishing of Mutiny and Desertion among our Troops and his Majesty in Consequence of this act has established articles of war for the Trial of offenders and the better Government of our Troops as well as his own.

THE ACT OF PARLIAMENT and articles of War as to the forces in our pay is to take place from the Publication of them at your settlement and so long as any of his Majesties Forces shall be there employed to act in defence of our settlement or to assist against companys enemies the power of appointing courts martial is Lodged in the Commander in Chief of the Kings Forces and the Court of Directors have power to authorize their President and Council to appoint Courts martial within the Jurisdiction of the settlement and to authorize them to empower the Commander in Chief of any Detachment of any of the Companys soldiers to do the like whilst detached from the settlement.

The several warrants or commissions for putting this act in Execution we send you herewith and as the appointing of persons to officiate as Judge advocates at courts martial you will find to be necessary we send you the form of such an appointment and we shall give you such Instructions with regard to proceedings at Courts martial as we are informed are necessary and agreeable to the Practice here.

The papers we send you are as follows Viz^t.

The Printed act of Parliament with the articles of war annexed.

A Commission under his Majestys Royal Sign Manuel authorizing Colonel John Adlercron and the Commander in Chief & c., to appoint Courts martial.

A Commission from the Court of Directors under the seal of the Comp^y. authorizing their President and Council to appoint Courts martial within their Jurisdiction.

A Commission from the Court of Directors under the seal of the Company authorizing their President and Council to empower the Commander in Chief of any Detachment of the Companys Forces whilst detached from the settlement to appoint Courts martial.

A form of an appointment of a Judge advocate.

Instructions for the proceedings of the Judge advocate.

Form of proceedings of Court martial.

The Printed act of Parliament and articles of war are evidence of themselves they being Printed by the Kings Printer by Publick authority and no other evidence can be had as the act of Parliament itself is kept with the Records of Parliament and the original articles of war signed by the King are Lodged with the Company and is the same evidence as is given at all Courts martial held by any of the Kings Forces.

Upon receipt of the act of Parliament & articles of war the same are to be published in the most notorious manner and with as much Pomp and solemnity as you can we think you should yourselves be present accompanied with some of the Principal Military Officers and attended with some of the Kings and our own Forces under arms and we think it will be proper to consult and settle with the Principal Officers the method of such Publication and an Entry should be made of it in your consultation.

AFTER the Act and articles are Published you must cause the forces in our pay to be mustered the first convenient opportunity and the articles of war to be read over to them and they must severally be asked if they are willing to continue in the companys service subject to these articles of war for the remainder of the time they have contracted for such as do not must be dismissed the service and an entry must be made of the names of such as shall willing to continue and of those that desire to be discharged.

If any of those that take their discharge shall afterwards Incline to Inlist again the articles of war must be read to such Person and his consent and submission to them had and an Entry made therof.

You are to keep the original warrant under the kings sign manual and to deliver a true and Exact copy of it to Colonel John Adlercron and from time to time to the Comanders in Chief & c., and you are at the foot or Bottom of it to write and sign a certificate that the same is a True Copy of the original warrant under his Majestys Royal Sign Manuel and that such original warrant is in your Possession.

You are likewise to keep the original Commission under the Companys seal which authorizes you to empower the Commander in Chief of any Detachment of the Companys forces to appoint Courts martial and you are to give a true copy of it to the Commander in Chief of every such Detachment under writing of it to the following effect.

We do hereby, certify that the above written is a true copy of the commission under the seal of the united Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies and by virtue of the Power and authority thereby given to us the president and Council at Fort Saint George. We do authorize and empower you A, B appointed Commander in Chief of a Detachment of the said Companys Forces to appoint from time to time Courts martial or any of the officers or

soldiers under your command and to do and Execute the several matters and things expressed in the above commission and for your so doing this shall be as well to you as to all others whom it may concern a sufficient warrant given under our hands at Fort Saint George aforesaid this day of

To be signed by the President and Major part of the Council.

It may be proper to deliver several of these in Blank to the Comander in Chief of the Companys Forces that in case he should have occasion to make Detachments from his main body he may give one to each Comander in Chief of every such Detachment filling up the Blank with the Name of every such Comander.

In like manner also the President and Council should give blank appointments for Persons to officiate as Judge Advocates to be lodged with the Comander in Chief to be issued by him as occasion sho^d. require.

The appointment of a Court martial is not done by any written order but the Comander in Chief who has the power of appointing a Court martial gives his orders by words of mouth to the Judge advocate to summon a Court martial to meet at such time and place as shall be thought proper.

As these our Instructions are framed from the best Information we are able to get so if in the Execution of them they shall be found defective you are at liberty with the assistance of the military officers to deviate and vary from them always taking care that you strictly and exactly keep up to the act of Parliament and articles of war and by no means to exceed the Powers thereby given.

And we direct you to transmit copies of the proceedings of all Courts martial and of all other your Transactions in consequence of this act of Parliament and articles of war and of these our Instructions.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL AT FORT ST. GEORGE

1. In our Letter under date of the 2^d. March, We gave you a general view of the situation of the Treaty between us and the French Company, and some Directions with regard to your conduct and appointed a Committee for the purposes therein mentioned. We are now to acquaint you, that We have better hopes of an accomodation between the two Companies than We have had for some time past, but whatever may be the event of the Treaty here, We would have you use your utmost endeavours to conclude a Provisional Treaty with the French Companys Agents in India, in order to put an end to Hostilities under condition that neither side do proceed to the Cessions, Retrocessions and Evacuations that may be agreed on till after the entire Consummation of the Definitive Treaty between the two Countries in Europe, under the approbation of the two Crowns. The Plans of the Treaties here and the observations made upon them which have been and now are transmitted to you, will sufficiently furnish you with Materials for forming an equitable and reasonable Plan for such provisional Treaty. But you are to take care not to agree in your provisional Treaty to a Cessation of Arms, without previously stipulating, that Metchlepatam and Divi Island with their Dependancies and the Grants to the French in the Decan Country, or the Province of Arcot be deliver'd into the Hands of the Moors, or if the French continue possessed of Metchlepatam, then & in that case Divi Island is to be quitted by them and remain in Our Possession.

2. The Committee which We have appointed as beforemention'd are to have the General conduct of the said Provisional Treaty, and as it is likely the French will treat by Commissaries, We direct that the Commissaries on our part be Lieutenant Colonel Scott, Lieutenant Colonel Lawrence, Mr. Orme, Mr. Perceval and the Reverend Mr. Palk and that Mr. Vansittart be their Secretary.

3. The said Commissaries are to treat under the direction of the said Committee, and are to keep a regular account of all their Proceedings to be transmitted to us for our Information.

4. If the French shall appoint Commissaries of a superior Rank to those we have named above, that is, if their Governor and Second shall be proposed then our Governor and Second in Council must be two of Our Commissaries, and the five beforenamed joined with them to meet and treat with the French Commissaries, but you are to observe that the Treaty is to be carried on at some convenient Neutral place to be agreed upon between both Parties.

5. Neither the Commissaries or the Committee are to conclude such provisional Treaty, without the approbation of the President and Council.

6. You must be particularly careful to transmit to us full and explicit accounts of your own the Committees and Commissarys Proceedings that We may be sufficiently inform'd of all Circumstances and may in consequence with greater Facility be enabled to agree to a Definitive Treaty in Europe.

7. Although in the 55th Paragraph of our Letter of the 23rd of Jan^{ry}. last, We disapprov'd the Rev^d. M^r. Palk's Commissaryship to our Forces, We have been induced to appoint him one of the Commissaries to treat of an accomodation as beforementioned, not only as being more in Character, but as We are satisfied his being Master of the French as well as the Latin Language together with the knowledge he must necessarily have acquired with regard to the situation of the several places in Question, as well as the political views and Interest of the contending Parties during his being in the army, will render his services as a Commissary to treat of an accomodation very useful to Us.

8. As it will be necessary that the President and Council at Bombay, should be apprized of the time the Warren may be expected to arrive there, that a Convoy may be appointed to prevent the hazard she may otherwise be exposed to of being attack by Angria's Fleet, you are therefore immediately on the arrival of the Warren at Fort St. George, to send Notice thereof and of the time you shall dispatch her by Pattamars overland to Bombay.

9. Mr. John Laverock is entertained to serve in the Capacity of a Cadet in our Troops at Fort St. George, he is to be promoted according to his Behaviour and Merit, and in the mean time he is to be paid Serjeants Pay, he accordingly takes his passage in the Warren.

10. Eagle and Bristol two of the ships belonging to the squadron under the command of Rear Admiral Watson, having been disabled in bad weather on the Coast of Ireland, they are replaced by the Cumberland of sixty guns and the Tyger of sixty guns, which will be ready in a few days to follow the squadron.

11. Having applyed to the Honble Board of ordnance, to be informed in what manner Bills are to be drawn for money to be taken up for the service of the Detachment from the Royal Regiment of artillery, under the command of Capt. Hislop, we have receiv'd for answer that "The Board have desired Colonel Adlercron to assist the Paymaster in procuring money for his Bills of Exchange, if he shall have occasion for any, and have desired him in such case that he will please to approve such Bills by writing thereon APPROVED with his Name but if Colonel Adlercron should refuse so to do, then the Bills are to be in like manner approv'd by Capt. Hislop or the Commander in Chief of the artillery."

"The Bills of Exchange for the Regimental Pays of the Detachment, are to be drawn on James Cockburn Esq^r. Agent to the Royal Regiment of Artillery, and to express for what service Bills for other services are to be drawn on the Lieutenant General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the ordnance.

12. If therefore any money should be advanced out of our cash for the service of the Detachment from the Royal Regiment of artillery, you are to take Bills for the same agreeable to the beforegoing method, and you are to take care that all money so advanced be reckoned after the rate of Six shillings and six pence a Weighty Dollar."

13. In case the said Detachment or any part thereof shall proceed to Bengal, you must advise the President and Council of the beforegoing Directions that they may at agreeable thereto.

said invoice we have stated their accompt Current [for your] perusal & Government, in order to creditt them at once the full vallue of the wines to your address. You have likewise the accompt of the slaves & hoops sent us from time to time for your Government in that article.

The wines are all of the last vintage & of the very best growth & we doubt not their proving to satisfaction having taken all due care in the choice of them, as well as in securing the casks, as they are shipt so early we advised the Captain to order the casks to be spoil'd after stowed & put in a supper nail to prevent their fermenting so as to burst their heads [.....] being shipt so early probably may cause something more [.....] although they have been twice locked off. The [.] proving larger then the former, you will perceive [.] the price considerably these now being shipt eight [.] pipe cheaper than last year.

Having had great reason to be dissatisfied with the conduct of our servants upon the West Coast We last year Directed the President and Council of Fort St. George to send Two of our Covenant Servants from that Presidency forthwith full Power and Authority to Supravise all our Servants upon the West Coast, to put our affairs upon a good footing and lay down such Rules and make such Regulations for the future conduct of our Servants as they should think for our Interest, Not doubting therefore that our orders have been complied with and being determined you shall for the future act under the immediate Inspection and Direction of our said President and Council, We shall have no occasion by this conveyance to enter into many Particulars as We apprehend they cannot escape the Notice of the Supravisors however it will be necessary to send you some Advices, Observations and Directions for the General Management of our Affairs which We shall arrange under the usual Heads.

2. If the Supravisors have not finished their Commission and shall upon the arrival of the Grantham be on the West Coast they as being Invested with a superior Authority you will observe are Directed to open this Packet, otherwise our Deputy Governor and Council for the time being are to open it and it must be further observed that notwithstanding We write in a Stile as speaking to Our Deputy Governor and Council (a method We cannot well avoid) Yet if the aid Supravisors are on the spot it is addressed to them.

3. Messrs. Misenor, Harrison and Hume are to Dispose of the Woollen Goods by the Lord Anson and Princess Augusta and are to continue in China the year 1755 with a stock to make an Investment and for other Purposes.

Mess^{rs}. Misenor, Harrison and Thomson are to take charge of any Ships that may arrive in China in the year 1754 destitute of Supra Cargos.

6. We refer you to Lists transmitted in this Packet for the arrival and Departure of Shipping since those sent last year by the Walpole.

7. The Gentlemen appointed this Season to be the Committee of Secrecy are Richard Chauncy, Roger Drake, Christopher Burrow and William Mabbott Esq^{rs}.—whose orders or those of any Three of them are to be duly observed.

8. The Ship Grantham Captⁿ. John Oliver Commander by which you will receive this Letter is to call first at St. Helena from whence she is to be Dispatched as soon as she has delivered her consignments, and is then to make the best of her way to Fort Marlborough with the several Particulars mentioned in the Invoice for the use of our Settlements upon the West Coast. The Governor and council of St. Helena are directed to forward to you the Charterparty and such other Papers as are necessary for your Inspection.

9. You are to employ the Grantham to collect the Pepper from our several Settlements and in any other useful Services during her continuance on the Coast which We earnestly recommend it to you may not exceed Four Months from the time of her arrival that We may not pay Demorage.

10. You are to Load on the Grantham no more than Charterparty Tonnage (allowing for what is necessary to make good the usual Deficiencies by Drying) unless you shall receive orders to the contrary from your Superiors at Fort St. George whom you are to advise as early as possible of what Quantity of Pepper you may reasonably expect in the Season and at what times it will be ready and you are to follow their Directions with regard to Loading all or any part of the Surplus on the Grantham or on such other Ship or Ships as they may think proper for that purpose.

11. Upon the Bombay Castles calling at Fort Marlborough for Refreshments We observe you look out Four Chests of the Treasure which We had consigned to Fort St. George, this was a very unwarrantable Step and the more so as you had reason to expect the arrival of the Walpole every day with the necessary Supply.

12. We have had frequent reasons to suspect our Vessels have been employed more for the Benefit of Private Persons than the Company the Instance before us of the Cuddalore Sloops putting into and her long stay at Batavia is too convincing to leave any Room to doubt that it was a Scheme of Mr. Dunkleys who you have very justly suspended from our Service. This as well as other Cases had or will naturally fall under the Inspection of the Supravisors who will We make no doubt make the proper animadversions and prevent as much as possible such abuses for the Future.

13. You must keep a Watchful Eye upon the conduct of all Commanders of Shipping employed in our Service to see that they strictly do their Duty to us you did right in enquiring into the reasons of Captⁿ. Burman of the Brilliant Snows putting into Natal and representing to your Superiors at Fort St. George that it appeared to be done with a view only to his own Private Interest—Your

referring to your Superiors the Discussion of an exorbitant Demand made by Captⁿ. Durman for the Diet of some Coffrees and Prisoners during their Passage from Fort St. George was likewise right.

SECONDLY OF GOODS FROM EUROPE FORT ST. GEORGE & C^a.

14. We have complied with your Indents received by the Exeter so far as We were able consistently with reserving sufficient Stowage for the annual Supplies for St. Helena, the Invoices of this Ship the Grantham will shew you the Particulars.

15. We have consigned to you Twenty Chests of Treasure by the Grantham, which We hope you will receive entire as We apprehend our Governor and Council at St. Helena will not be under the necessity of detaining any of it, however if contrary to our Expectations they should be obliged to open one of the chests We have directed them to take out only so much as may be really wanted of which they are to transmit exact Account to you, and carefully Secure and Seal up the chest again.

16. We have not complied with your Indent for Fourteen hundred Weight of Brimstone as that Article may be had at a much cheaper Rate in India you must therefore desire your Superiors at Fort St. George to supply you with it from time to time.

17. Your Indent for Forty hundred Weight of [. . .] sorted, the Expression is so General that We could not form a Judgment of the Sorts wanted and therefore have sent you none in which we have been further determined by observing that there stands upon your Account of Remains Sixty four hundred Weight, besides, thirty hundred Weight sent last year by the Walpole for the future you must particularly mention both the Sorts wanted, and Remaining in your Stores and the same must be done with regard to all other Articles.

18. You must for the future distinguish in separate Columns what Stores are for use, and what for sale, and you are not to Indent for more Stores of a perishable kind than may be wanted to be used in a reasonable Compass of Time.

19. In your account of Remains you must for the future mention the condition of the several articles of Stores and whether they are or are not fit for Service.

20. The Bale of Cloth intended for you by the Exeter We find was by Mistake delivered at St. Helena, and that you received was designed for St. Helena which accounts for its not agreeing with the Invoice, you have mislead us in our enquiry into the reasons of there being such a surplus in the Iron by that Ship as is expressly mentioned in your Letter and upon your Consultations to be Four hundred and five hundred weight, Three Quarters and Thirteen pounds, until We found upon Examination that in fact there was a Surplus of only Five hundred weight, Three quarters and thirteen pounds, and which Surplus Captⁿ. Furnell alleges arose from mixing the ships Iron with ours. You desire directions how

you shall adjust Deficiencies and Surplusses on your Books, We answer Debt or Credit us for them according to circumstances and the Nature of the case. But never fail to give us a Punctual account in your Letters as well as in your Consultations of all Deficiencies and Surplusses with every circumstance attending the same.

21. The greatest care and attention must be exerted for procuring Arrack Rice and all other articles at the most reasonable Prizes and you must always give Early Notice to Fort St. George of your wants that the President and Council may either supply you or give the necessary Directions in what manner you shall act in getting supplies. The Great Quantities of Arrack and Rice which We observe have been lately bought at high Prizes makes the above Cautions and Directions absolutely necessary.

THIRDLY OF INVESTMENTS, AND FOURTHLY OF THE COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

22. We have for some years past been complaining of the great Decrease of Pepper at almost every Settlement upon the Coast, and have as constantly been amused with specious Reasons none of which excepting the Calamities in consequence of the spreading of the Small Pox for two or Three years we are persuaded are the true ones, and as We are fully satisfied from good authority that with a little application and good management Treble the quantity of Pepper may be raised to what has been lately sent us, it has pointed out to us the only method that could be taken for coming at the true Reasons for the Languishing condition of your investment and to put it on a good footing in future We mean the appointing supervisors as mentioned in the beginning of this letter, it is upon them we shall depend for the necessary Regulations and therefore shall avoid giving any Particular Directions until they have acquainted us with their Proceedings for fear we should for want of a clear view of our Affairs clash with and lessen the Authority of their Determinations and orders.

23. However we must acquaint you that next to the negligent and Loose manner of Transacting Business by the Deputy Governor and council We look upon the following cause to be the immediate occasions of the Disappointments we complain of Viz^t. The too frequent Removes of our servants from one settlement to another. The little care taken to chuse Persons properly qualified to take charge of a Residency, The not keeping up the Natives to a strict compliance with their agreements by obliging them to pay the stipulated Penalties in case of failures, and the not having regular Annual surveys and other intermediate ones taken by our own covenant servants instead of trusting to the Buggeese and inferior People on whom there can be no good Dependence, all which We make no doubt will appear so obvious to the supervisors that they will apply the Proper Remedies and you are to take a due regard to these our sentiments in case the supervisors shall have left you without giving any particular directions concerning them.

24 It will give us great Pleasure to be informed by the Supervisors that the Manufacturys for arrack and sugar at Fort Marlborough are in the good way you represent them and that the undertakers are assiduous and hearty in their Endeavours, we must here do them justice to acknowledge that the sample of

sugar sent us by the Exeter upon Examination appeared to be very good and in particular was Dry and of a strong grain which are very material qualities in the opinion of our sugar Refiners.

25. There seems to have been some Indiscretions in our servants at Moco Moco as well as in the Sultans which occasioned the late uneasiness and you acted very right in recalling Mr. Gun from thence against whom the Sultans were prejudiced and would therefore have not been able to have maintained a proper authority.

26. Mr. Dunkely gave great umbrage we find to the People at Puloo Pesang and his conduct thereupon your Enquiry seems in general to have been very dissatisfactory. These and other Instances which have occurred to us upon a Perusal of your advices and Diarys shew the necessity of appointing Persons of capacity, Experience and Temper, to be chiefs of our settlements which you must always carefully attend to in all your Promotions.

27. We observe that you have withdrawn from the Nassau Islands, being self convinced your Expectations of inducing the People to Plant Rice and Pepper there were too Sanguine, many of your other Projected settlements we believe will appear to be of the like kind or undertaken upon motives of Private Interest, and in particular that at Nattal from which even your own accounts give very little room to expect any advantages on the contrary there is too much reason to believe it will prove an Expensive Settlement and gratefully Embroil us with the Dutch, These new settlements were principal objects pointed out to the supervisors, we must therefore wait for their account of and Regulations concerning them before we can say anything further on this subject, expecting that we expect care has or will be taken by proper Representations to acquaint the Dutch Companys agents as well as the Natives that in withdrawing from such settlements we do not in the least recede from the just Right we have of making settlements with the consent of the natives at any Places on the West Coast not in Possession of the Dutch Company.

FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS AND REVENUES.

28. We have continually complained of the Expences of your Buildings and Repairs and the impositions of our servants in the conducting them, upon a Perusal of your last Advices we find the same reasons for complaint still subsist and we assured from Private advices which we can depend upon that we pay for Materials for Building and almost every other Article above Forty Cent more than any Private Person does, notwithstanding the Goods are also much worse arising from the Paymaster Paying for them in Bad Cloth at Extravagant Prizes, We are also well assured that the China Men will gladly furnish you with Bricks and Tiles at Prizes by which might be saved at least one fourth part of what we are now charged for them, We are likewise assured that the carpenters and other Workmen are deeply Indebted to the Paymaster who advances them their Wages in old cloths at extravagant Rates, and being them the Property of the Paymaster they are secure of not being turned out let them be ever so Idle or Slothful and We Burthened with a number of useless Hands.

29. We are likewise well assured we suffer greatly by the Dishonesty of our servants in the several Branches of our Revenues, The arrack, opium and other Licences would produce much more than they do if fairly sold but the truth is the Deputy Governor and our Principal servants looking upon the Farming these Licences as Perquisites intimidate all other Persons from Bidding against them and in course get them into their Hands at their own Prizes.

30. The Customs also on Goods imported would amount to considerably more than at present if duly levied and at stop put to the Importation of cloth by the Mander Prows, or at least Customs Levied on them which the Deputy Governor and our Principal Servants have defrauded us of by Buying them up in a clandestine manner, greatly to the Prejudice of the Importation of cloth from the Presidency.

31. We do not chuse to give any particular Directions for regulating these and many other abuses mentioned in the course of this Letter least we will have a much better opportunity than we can possibly have to make themselves Masters of every Fact, it is sufficient therefore to point some of them out and to acquaint you in general that we expect them to be honestly and fairly regulated.

SIXTHLY OF COVENANT SERVANTS, THE MILITARY AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

32. The only effectual Method to put our affairs upon a good footing for the future was to direct your superiors at Fort St. George to send Supravisors with full authority among many other matters to enquire with the utmost impartiality how far the Behaviour and Management of every Person in our service from the Highest to the Lowest station have either through Dishonesty, Negligence or any other ways contributed to the present disagreeable situation of our affairs upon the west Coast, and to Regulate whatever they find amiss, as we shall depend upon the said Supravisors discharging their Trust with Integrity and Diligence, we shall have the less to say at present either with regard to our servants or their accounts, However we cannot avoid mentioning that by must the greater Part of the Mismanagements of our several servants have arisen from the want of care and Attention in our Deputy Governor and councils for some time past, This has been the source of the Grossest negligence in all the officers, and of the Indolent Idle Behaviour of our servants in general, who never sett about any Business till almost the last Moment presses on them for Dispatch, and we are well assured that for want of being properly looked after and directed they do little or nothing for near Three Quarters of the year, To the same causes must likewise be attributed the great Deficiencys in the stores and other articles by the Boards not Inspecting into and obliging the Storekeepers and others (as it was their Duty) to adjust their accounts upon quitting their stations and on other proper occasions it appearing to us that several successions in offices have passed and no Remains regularly delivered over and received, Although we make no Doubt these Matters have naturally fell or will fall under the Eyes of the Supravisors and be properly regulated yet we think it necessary to Direct that our Deputy Governor and Councils for the time being and in future do observe the few following Directions as standing orders unless the Supravisors shall have substituted others of the same nature stricter and more peculiarly adapted to the purpose Viz^t.

That a Consultation be called and held at least one Day in every Week and oftner if it shall be necessary.

That the minutes of every consultation be forthwith drawn out and signed by the several Members of the Board before the next consultation Day, that they may be then read and approved of which is to be expressly mentioned in the Minutes that we may be satisfied this order is complied with.

But as it may sometimes happen the Proceedings of the Board may be very long and a Meeting be appointed too soon to allow a reasonable time for drawing up and signing the Preceeding Minutes, in such case only we dispence with the said order so far as it directs their being read at the next consultation, and Provided the Minutes of each and every Consultation be signed and approved by the Board in a Week at furthest after such Consultation is held.

That the Board be constantly attentive to the conduct and Behaviour of all our servants and observe and enquire whether they give due attendance and the Business is faithfully executed and regularly brought up in their respective offices and Employment and that one Day in every month be more particularly appropriated for that purpose and the Proceedings thereon fully entered on that days consultation.

That whenever it may be necessary to make particular enquirys with regard to accounts, the conduct of our servants, or any affairs of consequence, Committees are to be appointed agreeable to the Practice of our several Presidencys to enquire into and state the matters of Fact and Report the same to the Board for their Information who will by that means be better enabled to form a true Judgment in all cases of consequence.

That the Book containing the collection of standing orders (which has been directed to be drawn out) do constantly lye upon the Table at every meeting of the Board, and that every covenant servant have at other Times the Liberty of Inspecting the same that they may be acquainted with the Duty of their respective stations notice is to be taken in the Minutes of every consultation that the said Book is on the Table.

33. We would not be understood by the General complaints we have made to include every Person in our service upon the West Coast, that would be a Piece of Injustice and therefore very far from our Meaning as we are well satisfied there are many of our servants both capable and Willing to do us good service when affairs are properly regulated ; among the Foremost of whom stands Mr. Combes whose abilitys, Integrity and general Good Behaviour have not escaped our Notice, and here we cannot help observing that there has been a considerable encrease of Pepper at Manna since Mr. Carters residence there which we attribute to his care and attention.

34. For these Two or Three years past frequent mention has been made of the Misbehaviour of Mr. Dunkley, and from what appears to us his conduct in general seems to have been much to Blaim and in particular We think he was very justly suspended from our service for his going to and long stay at Batavia, but we shall not give our Final Directions concerning him until we are informed by the Supravisors whether they think him fit to be continued in our service or not, but if they shall have thought proper to Dismiss him we shall approve of their Determination.

35. Many of our covenant servants have not complied with our Repeated orders for giving security let such be acquainted that unless they forthwith write to their Friends for that Purpose they may depend upon our Resenting their Negligence by a Dismission from our service, You will receive in the Packet a List of the Names of the Persons who are to give security that you may call upon them accordingly.

36. We will not allow of your settling Pensions upon any Persons whatsoever without our express leave, if Mrs. Smith is in the Destitute circumstances you represent she and her Family must be sent to England at your Expence.

37. Upon a Perusal of the Minutes of your Consultation of the 31st July 1752 We find it asserted that the Company was answerable to Raddin Toomoon-gong for Mr. Charles Smiths Bond of one thousand Spanish Dollars, and as he was lately Dead his Effects were ordered to be sold to Discharge the same in consequence whereof we find nine hundred and five Spanish Dollars, Three Soocos paid into Cash, We shall not it is true suffer much by this Transaction but how the Company could be answerable for that Debt is to us inconceivable you are therefore hereby positively directed to give us your reasons for making such an assertion, and We do Declare that we are not and will not be accountable for any Private Debts of the said Mr. Smith or any other of our servants whatsoever, If the Four thousand Spanish Dollars owing to the same Person by Mr. Massey is under the like circumstances, we insist upon his Discharging it forthwith, and if the orders we gave last year for paying what we stand Indebted to Toomoon-gong have not been already complied with he is immediately to be paid off as we will not be embarrassed on account of his Fortune or affairs.

38. Your Accomptant having observed that there are several Heads standing on the General Books for Buildings which are not now in Being several Sloops which are lost, and never heard of, Many Debts owing the Persons from whom they are due either Dying Intestate or no Account to be given of them, with several other articles such as Sloop Louisas Cargo Benjar Residency, and articles under the Head of House Necessarys which it was desired might be wrote off, We hereby direct that the Supravisors or in their absence the Deputy Governor and Council do strictly enquire into the accomptants Representation and they are authorised to direct all those several articles to be writ of to account current Fort St. George if it shall be found reasonable.

39. You must for the future call upon and oblige our Storekeepers, Ware-housekeepers and all others entrusted with the keeping of Goods, Stores or any other articles whatsoever to adjust their accounts annually with the General Books upon the Exchange of offices likewise an account of Remains must be constantly and regularly taken and delivered over to the succeeding Persons, and we positively order that whatever Deficiencies appear over and above what the Board shall judge to be usual unavoidable and reasonable be paid for by the Storekeepers, Ware-housekeepers or others entrusted for the time being with the keeping of the Goods Stores, & ca. wherein such Deficiencies shall happen. This order is to be extended to every one of our settlements upon the West Coast, and is calculated to prevent our suffering so shamefully as of late by the Negligence and Dishonesty of many of our servants.

40. We have sent you by this ship Twenty Military Recruits and to prevent any Disappointment we have given positive orders that none of them be stopped at St. Helena.

41. The sending home Captain Hood was a right measure as well to Punish his Insolent Behaviour as to preserve that authority which the Board are vested with over the Military so necessary for the general Good, and We Direct that a watchful Eye be kept upon the Behaviour of all the officers and others who have any connection with the soldiery that all extortion oppression and illusage may as much as possible be prevented.

42. Your writing to St. Helena to Invite Lieutenant Joseph Kendal from thence to the Command of the Company vacant by the Dismission of Capt. Hood was very irregular as the application ought to have been made either directly to us, or to your Superiors at Fort St. George, But as you acquaint us in your Letter by the Exeter that you are in want of a good officer, We have given leave to the said Lieutenant Kendal to proceed from St. Helena to the West Coast on the Grantham, and We direct that he be immediately on his arrival appointed Captain of our First Company We are.

Of this Article there is Ten Bales receiv'd Bombay Castle, but as they are not yet examined, can give no opinion of them.

DITTO fine One thousand 1,000

There is only two Bales of this article receiv'd this year, which are not yet examined.

The Assortment of Patterns formerly receiv'd was objected to, for want of some larger ones among them and a greater variety; nor were there any of coloured Grounds, of which there should be Fifteen pieces of different Colours and Patterns in every Assortment of one hundred Pieces, particular care must be taken that they are not packed up Damp, which occasions their being spotted and mildewed; as also that the White Grounds are well cleared and not tinged with red.

You must be careful in what is above remarked, and that they be printed on very fine Cloth.

CALLOWAPORES must be of a bright red One thousand 1,000

DIMITIES FORT ST. DAVID None.

GINGHAMS small white None.

DITTO, Blue, striped with variety of stripes and about one third part of each Bale check'd One thousand 1,000

DITTO red striped with variety of stripes and about one third part of each Bale check'd not to exceed Four hundred 301

DITTO CLOUDED None.

DITTO Check'd on a red Ground None.

We ordered Anno 1751, only Two hundred pieces and you have sent Three hundred and sixty pieces.

IZZAREES fine, N^o. 1 and 2, most of N^o. 1 Five hundred 500

We have ordered of this sort for several years past and cannot conceive the reason of your not sending any.

These Goods of late have been found very indifferent, and some so very bad that they turn'd to Loss, and the Chinnamanick Pollam Cloth though long complain'd of, and We expected would have fallen off much from the former quality, and We recommend it to you to keep them up to the Goodness they were formerly of, the measure must be also well regarded that the Length be not less than Thirty-six yards and would be better if Thirty-seven yards. There is great reason to complain of the Damage in these Goods, many pieces in almost every Bale being folded up with a number of holes in them, and this was not only evident here, but as a farther proof we have annexed to this Investment some Extracts of Remarks receiv'd from and signed by all the Merchants at Hamburg, where there is the greatest Consumption of these Goods ; and the Buyers here as well as very great loss and disreputation to the Company—The Vizagapatam Cloth, though not near so bad as the Ingeram, are worse than they used to be, and are full one yard shorter than the Invoice lengths ; must take particular care, that none of them for the future measure less than thirty six yards and if all Longcloths could be made thirty-seven yards long it would be more advantageous; we have still more reason to complain of the Damage in these sorts than in the Ingeram—The Salem Cloth though they are not quite so good as heretofore, yet there is not much reason to complain of their Quality ; we therefore direct you to provide as many of this sort as you can get; but we must observe that they have fallen off in their Lengths one yard and an half within these two or three years past, we therefore recommend it to you to keep them up to their original Lengths—The Madapollam have in general turned out very ordinary and dear, and except you can procure them much better and cheaper, send none of them.

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The middling Cloth from Madras proved pretty good, but if they could be made thicker, they would sell much better.

DITTO Fine Ten thousand	10,000
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The fine Ingeram and Vizagapatam Cloth proved good, but we observe there has been no fine Madras Cloth sent since the year 1751 Seven; of these three sorts we direct you to send a larger quantity.

LONGCLOTH Superfine about six pagodas, let them be as thick as possible you can procure ; they must be made up square, as formerly order'd Eight hundred.

N.B. This sort proved very good.

DITTO Blue deep dye, ordinary and Middling Four thousand. These still continue to be very thin and ordinary you must therefore take care to amend them.

We would have all the Vizagapatam and Ingeram Cloth washed either as Fort St. David or Madras More care must be taken that the Gunnys and Wrappert are good, and you must also comply with the Directions given you as to the

Package of all the goods you send. If you can increase your investment at Vizagapatam and Ingeram we earnestly recommend it to you provided it does not advance the Price.

Though this remark has been repeated it still requires your attention.

For several Years past this article has fallen much short of the Quantity Indented for, without any reasons assigned for the same; you are therefore to exert yourselves in procuring the full quantity, by encouraging an encrease of the Manufacture thereof.

In the two last articles you must continue to exert yourselves in procuring the quantity ordered, and in all the Romals to send the greatest variety of Checks possible.

The Remarks on the Longcloth will in General serve for the Sallampores, but we can't help taking notice, that the Fort St. David Middling Sallampores were exceeding bad and though they cost a great deal more than the middling Madras Sallampores yet the latter sold for three shillings a piece more. This shews how necessary it is for you to send more of the Madras and fewer of the Fort St. David except you can procure the latter sort of a much thicker and better quality and cheaper.

Although we have for several years past recommended you to keep up the Sallampores to the length of Sixteen yards yet we observe that not one Bale of those received by the Admiral Vernon are more than fifteen yards and a half long, which is a great prejudice in the sale of them.

You are not to send any Brown Cloth, unless it is unavoidably necessary for the Dispatch of a ship.

We have repeated our orders for the two last articles several years but have not receive'd any ; we therefore direct you to assign your reasons for the same.

By the Britannia we receiv'd Two Bales, and by the Warwick Anno 1752 one Bale of middling Ingeram Cloth under the Marte I 2 M which were very good and what you must by all means encourage the Manufacture of, as they are better in Quality than the fine Cloth from Fort St. David. If you can procure one thousand or fifteen hundred pieces of the same quality and Price they would be very acceptable.

It is a great objection to the Ingeram and Vizagapatam Cloth that they are one sixteenth of a yard narrower than most other sorts for which reason you must by all means procure them to be made of equal breadths with those of Fort St. David and Madras.

In the fine Cloth those of Vizagapatam and Ingeram are preferr'd to those of Fort St. David ; though the difference in the price is inconsiderable, those of the mentioned place sell full of thirty Cent under the price of the former.

More care must be taken that the Bales and Tickets of the Ingeram Cloth answer as to the Sortment and the Tickets put into the Bales, must be laid under the first piece, that they may be easily found, and you must take care to send the Goods agreeable to Invoice there having been great mistakes made for several years past.

Notwithstanding this Remark has been often repeated yet we find more reason this year than ever to complain not only of the Ingeram but of all the other sorts, which shews great neglect.

As the Prices of the Long cloth and Sallampores still continue to fall here, you must exert yourselves in order to keep up the Quality and at the same time to reduce the price, which has been rising upon us for several of the most considerable articles indented for and to lose no opportunity for increasing the Investments annually made at Vizagapatam and Ingeram in proportion to the reduction of those of Madras and Fort St. David for the several reasons now given you ; and should you find the quality improved, the price reduced and such Plenty of cloth as to effect the several Quantities directed to be bought, and that more should be waiting to complete the Tonnage of such ships as you are to dispatch for Europe next year, you are in that case, to fill up with a proportionable Assortment of ordinary and middling Cloths.

You must send a Bale of every other sort of Goods brought home by all the European ships from your coast, which you have not complied with nor have you given any reason for it. You must also send a few Bales of the several sorts of Long cloth Vizagapatnam, Ingeram, Madras and Fort St. David, without any conjee or stiffening, taking care to press the Bales as close as you can and distinguish them in the Invoice.

You must likewise send us a Bale of every sort of Muslin manufactured at and about Vizagapatam or Ingeram, where we are informed they are very good also a Bale of every sort of Goods made at the Northern settlements of a new Fabrick or Sortments, which have not been usually sent to Europe.

We shall order our servants at the Bay to supply you with some fine Jugdea Baftaes, which must be printed with a variety of beautiful Patterns, but not in the expensive manner of the Madras Chints; you must continue to make them all while Grounds and the Colours more lively with as much variety as you can.

We again repeat our orders of last year, in relation to the several articles, as well of White as Colour'd Goods, in which our Orders have been either partially or not at all supplied Viz^t. That you use your utmost Endeavours to procure the same, and that where they prove ineffectual, you fail not from time to time to assign the reasons of any deficiency therein—This Direction must be strictly complied with.

SALT PETRE, as General Letter.

Put the Commanders in mind that they lay sufficient Dunnage on the Salt Petre before they stow the Bales, it being of that penetrating nature it often the Damages the Cloth, as it has formerly happened.

The following is the Extracts from the Remarks receiv'd from the Merchants at Hamburg as abovemention'd viz^t.

“It has been found for years passed, that many of the coast Goods particulars the Longcloths and Sallampores, by reason of the stiffning used in the East Indies (amongst the Materials of which stiffning there must probably be some shap stuff) and also from the Callicos not being thoroughly dried before they are packed, that they have been so much Damaged, that not only a great number of Pieces have been found full of Holes, but also the parts adjoining to such Holes are quite perish'd, so that when the Callicoos come to be prepared for printing they decay and become unfit for use—Hence it is that but few Bales have been sold without the seller having been obliged, on account of such Damage to make more or less Allowance to the Buyers, all which could be proved by a Number of Certificates if requir'd—And such Damages is in particular more frequent amongst the V and I sort than the other sorts—There are likewise frequently Pieces in which the Holes must have been discovered, even in the Indies because the Holes appear to be carefully mended again, nay there are Instances that in the several callicoos here and there Pieces have been sowed in.

“It is in particular taken notice of that since the year 1751 till the last “Septem^r sale 1752 of the Quality of the Long-cloths and Sallampores have “proved worse and worse from time to time—That also the assorting path “not been attended to in the East Indies with that exactness as formerly “was practiced, so that the third and common sorts are often times better “than the second sort, and the latter better than the first, and other sorts are “often times better than the second sort and the latter better than the first, and “other sorts again which do not belong together have been mixed together, by

“which the Buyers are deceived and exposed to Losses Upon the whole, it is to
 “be observed, that all such Irregularitys prevent the sale of that Commodity
 “to the detriment of that Branch of Trade, and the making other Fabricks
 “flourish.

Since We have prepared this List of Investment the cloths by the Ships
 Bombay Castle and Chesterfield have been exactly measured and do send you
 herewith the true Measures of each particular sort by those ships, which plainly
 shews the just cause of our Complaints upon this article—The prejudice to us
 is not only the Loss of so much Cloth but by this means half a Piece of
 Longcloth will not serve to make three Garments as it formerly used to do.

And the said Part-Owners and Master do, as aforesaid, covenant and agree. That there shall not be laden or taken on Board, the said Ship, by the said Master, Officers or Seamen of the said Ship, or any of them, or any other Person whatsoever, to be carried in the said Ship, for or towards the *East-Indies*, or elsewhere within the Limits granted or allowed to the said *Company*, or to be carried from one Port or Place to another there, or to be brought from thence, or elsewhere, to or towards *England*, any greater or other Quantities or Kinds of Goods, Merchandizes, Bullion or Effects, than what are for the said *Company's* Account, or expressly and particularly allowed by the said *Company* in Writing under their Common Seal ; Nor shall they, or any of

them, carry or Transport in the said Ship to the *East Indies*, or elsewhere within the said Limits, to stay there, or carry, or suffer to be carried, or transported from one Port there to another, or bring Home from thence, or from *Saint Helena*, any Person or Persons but the said Ship's *Company*, and such as are then actually in the said *Company's* Service, Except by and with the especial Orders, or Licence, in Writing, of the said *Company*, or their Governors, Presidents, Agents or Chiefs; and if it shall appear that any Goods, Merchandizes or Persons, have been carried in the said Ship, contrary to this Agreement, such Goods, Merchandizes, Bullion and Effects, and every part thereof, shall be deemed and accounted to be, and the same are hereby declared to be Unlicenced Goods, and the same shall be taken, held and enjoyed by the said *United Company*, and their Successors, as their own Goods and Chattels, and to and for their own proper Use and Behoof for ever; And moreover, the Parties offending herein shall be subject and liable to such Pains and Penalties, as any law of Statute made in that behalf enacts or directs; and furthermore it shall be lawful to and for the said *Company*, and their Successors, to retain to their own Use and Behoof, Fifty Pounds *Sterling* for every Passenger, or other Person, that shall be carried in the said Ship, contrary to this Covenant, or the true Meaning thereof. And it is agreed, and the said Part-Owners and Master do hereby consent, That the said *Company* shall and may do all or any such Acts as they shall think fit, for the preventing or discovering of all or any unlawful, unlicenced or clandestine Trade. And it is hereby declared, covenanted and agreed as aforesaid, That neither the Master of the said Ship for the time being, nor any of his Officers or Seamen shall, during the Voyage, have any trade or Dealing with any Planter, or other Persons, residing in the Island of *Saint Helena*, on Board the said Ship, but may for such Things as shall be bought or sold in the open Market-place, or Bazar built and appointed for that purpose, upon Pain of Forfeiture of Ten Pounds *Sterling* to the said *United Company* for Breach of this Covenant, to be paid, or at the choice of the said *Company*, deducted out of such Freight and Demorage as shall grow due for the said Ship in this present Voyage; Except Nevertheless, and it is further agreed, That for promoting the good Estate of that Island the Master of the said Ship for the time being shall, during his stay there, take and receive from the said *United Company's* Governor and Council, and they shall accordingly deliver, for the Use of the Ship's *Company* 3 Hundred Weight of fresh Beef, alive or dead, for every Twenty Men the Ship is obliged to carry by this Charter-party; for which he shall pay after the Rate of 28 Shillings for every Hundred Weight, of One Hundred and Twelve Pounds, in Arrack, Sugar, or other necessary Provisions which the said Island shall want, and the Ship can well spare, on reasonable Terms to be agreed on between the said Master, and the said Governor and Council: And in case of the non-observance, or breach of this Covenant, the

And that the said Master, or the Master of the said Ship for the time being, shall receive on Board the said Ship, all such Passengers, Merchants or others, as the said *Company's* Presidents, Agents, or Chief Factors and Council there, by Writing under their Hands, or the Hands of the Majority of them, shall appoint and direct to take their Passage from one Port to another, within the Limits aforesaid, and transport them accordingly, providing them fitting Lodging, and Room for their Provision, during their Continuance on Board; Provided always, That all such Passengers, Merchants, and others, shall first contract and agree with the said President, Agent, or Chief Factor and Council, at the respective Places where they shall take Shipping, What they, and each of them shall allow and pay for their said Transportations, lodging, and Room for their provisions: All which Sum and Sums of Money so agreed for, or which the said Passengers shall pay, shall wholly be made good, and applied to the Use of the said *United Company*, and no Part thereof to the Use of any others whomsoever. And the said part-owners and Master do, as aforesaid, covenant, That all and every the Passengers, that shall at any time be taken in on Board the said Ship, and carried from Port to Port within the Limits aforesaid, shall be civilly and kindly treated and used; And in case any of them shall be abused, assaulted, imprisoned or ill treated, the said Part-Owners and Master shall, for every such offence, forfeit to the said *Company*, the Sum of Fifty Pounds Sterling, to be paid, or, at the choice of the said *Company*, allowed to the said *Company*, out of the Freight and Demorage hereby payable. And in case any Monies, Bullion, Diamonds, or any other precious Stones, Musk or Ambergreese, for Account of other persons authorized or licensed thereunto by the said *Company*, or their Servants, shall be carried from Port to Port in the *East-Indies*, or elsewhere within the Limits of the said *United Company's* Charter, all the Freight due from the same, shall be paid for the Use and Account of which the said Master shall be allowed one Fourth Part, for his Care and Pains in looking after and preserving the same, So as he make a faithful and speedy Discovery, upon Oath, if required, of the whole so put on Board the said ship, and carried from Port to Port, as aforesaid, together with the Names of the persons unto whom the same be long, and to whom, and when, and where delivered. But if he conceals any Part thereof, in such case no allowance shall be made him

AT A COURT OF DIRECTORS OF THE UNITED COMPANY OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND, TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES, HOLDEN THE 29TH OF NOVEMBER, 1752.

WHEREAS We the said *Court of Directors* being willing to give all fitting Encouragement to the Commanders, Officers, and Seamen, on Board the Ships which shall, from Time to Time, be Employed to and from the *East-Indies*, and within the Limits of the *Company's* Charter, We do hereby Declare as follows, viz.

That the Commanders, Officers, and Seamen, may export in Bullion, or such Goods as shall be allowed by the *Court of Directors*, or any Committee appointed by them, each of them the Sums or values hereunder-mentioned, so as the same be for their own proper use and Account, and not for the Account of any other Person or Persons whatsoever; and so as the same be invested in the Goods and Merchandizes hereby declared to be allowed, and not in any of the Goods or Merchandizes reserved for the Trade of the said *Company*, except as hereunder-mentioned. *Provided*, That each Person, Exporting all or Part of the said Sums or Values, or importing the Produce of them, do not take up more of the Ship's Tonnage, than the limited Proportion allowed to such Person, as his part of Share of the *Charter-Party* Allowance. *Provided also*, That the Commanders, Officers, or Seamen, shall not be allowed to dispose of their Privilege to any other Person or Persons whatsoever, or to make Use of the Privilege allowed to any other, viz.

The Commander Three Hundred Pounds, Chief Mate Sixty Pounds, Second Mate Forty Pounds, Third Mate Thirty Pounds, Purser Thirty Pounds, Fourth Mate Twenty Pounds, and to all other Chief Officers, as Surgeon, Boatswain, Gunner, Carpenter, Steward, and Quarter-Master, each Fifteen Pounds, the Midshipmen Ten Pounds upon every Hundred Tons, the Ship they serve in shall be Lett for; and to all other Seamen the Value of Ten Pounds only each Man, be the Ships more or less in Burthen.

A DESCRIPTION OF THE MODELS FOR MAKING GUN POWDER, VIZ.

No. 1.

Is the Engine to prepare the Charcoal, Brimstone and Petre for the Horse Mill Stones.

And after the Charcoal is ground as fine as can be on the Stones, as in the Model, it is put up in one of the Hoppers which you reserve for that use only, and so likewise the Brimstone the same in the other Hopper. These two Engines go with the same Horse or Bullock as the Stones which the Model directs the Reels of which Engines must be closed with the Wire that is sent with them what falls through the Wires is took up, and is fit for the Composition, but that which falls at the Tail must be ground again till all goes through. The Petre is only ground on the Stones (and so fit) for the Composition without Dusting.

When the Composition is made it is carried to No. 2 which is two Stones rais'd on the Edge, and another Flut which We call the Bed Stone and there ground till the Workman thinks it is come to a sufficient Body, and then carried to No. 3 which is the Corning Engine, which is a frame to carry Twelve Sieves the first of which is made and fixed to the Model according to the Scale which is one Inch and a half to the Foot as is all the rest, where it is put in small Quantity in each Sieve with a Piece of Lignum Vitæ Roles, which turn'd to about eight Inches Diameter and one Inch and a half thick in the middle and thinner at the outsides, and as the Sieves turn, that keeps continually rolling on the Powder, and so brings it to a Grain, the Grain falls through the upper Sieve which is Parchment punch'd as in the Model, the Dust which doth not come to a Grain, goes through the Hair Sieve which the Parchment Sieve stands in, and falls into the Trough that is under the Sieves, which Dust is took up when it lyes three

or four Inches thick in the Trough and put in the Press, which must stand at the end of the Corning House to be near the Sieves ; the Press must be worked by a Windlass to bring the Dust into a Body which will not do by the single purchase of the Leaver, the Press is made with a Door to open at the fore part with a Wedge to drive out at one end, joints at the other, there is a false bottom to lay loose on the Sell of the Press with Mortise cut in the under Edge to put a Leaver or Hand Spitce under to get the Powder out of the Press ; if the Powder was pressed on the Sell of the Press there would be no getting it out, but as the false bottom lyes loose on the Main Sell, the Powder comes out with it easy; when so done it is put into a Trough that stands near the Sieves, and broke into small pieces with a Wooden Mallet, and put into the Corning Sieves again and so till all is done, then it goes to No. 4 which is a Dusting Engine, which Reel must be covered with Canvas to take out what Dust is remaining after Corning from that if occasion be to separate the Grain it goes to the separating Engine, which is joining to the Dusting Engine, which makes Four Sorts of Grain, with Three Sorts of Parchments punch'd with three different Sizes, and a hair Sieve on the lower one, all which materials as Parchment for the Corning Engine and separate Engine and her Sieves with Punches to make them, you will find sent to compleat the Work. Great care must be taken to keep the Gudgeons and Brasses well oyl'd. One Brass of a Sort will be sent with Directions for what designed. Take especial care the Dust which falls into the Trough of the Corning Engine does not get to the lower end of the Crinck if any does it is very likely to blow up. I have made the Model with a Piece of Wood to go fast on the Crinck and to nail a piece of good parchment on it which goes round with the Crinck and keeps the Dust from getting through the hole of the Dish which is made fast to the Trough and it's common to tie a piece of Canvas over that to keep it more secure, and never let there be too great a Quantity of Dust in the Trough at a time least it gets through the Hole.

COPY OF THE PROJECT OF AN AGREEMENT OF ACCOMMODATION
BETWEEN THE ENGLISH AND FRENCH EAST INDIA COMPANIES.

WHEREAS several differences and dissentions have arisen between the East India Companies of England and France on the Coast of Choromandel, in consequence of the Measures they have separately entered into with the Princes and Governour of the Indian Country, whereupon Acts of Force and Violence have ensued, notwithstanding the Peace subsisting between the Two Crowns of England and France, And Whereas it is for the Mutual Interest and Advantage of both Companies, to establish and preserve Tranquility in those parts, they have with the Consent of their respective Sovereigns named and appointed the following Persons their Commissaries for accommodating and adjusting their Several Differences and Disputes, that is to say the English East India Company and the French East India Company who being fully authorized on both sides, have agreed to the following Articles.

ARTICLE 1.

ALL Acts of Force and Violence shall from henceforth absolutely cease between the Two East India Companys of England and France, and perfect Tranquility and Good Agreement shall be restored and for every Established between them, for the better maintenance of which as it is their meaning and intention to confine themselves for the future to Views of Commerce, they hereby Stipulate strenuously to avoid taking part in any Disagreements, Disturbances or Quarrels that may arise between the Princes or Governors of the

Indian Country, and to endeavour, by their Good Offices only in case such Disputes should happen, to bring about a reconciliation between the contending parties, and in case likewise of any Variance or Rupture between either of the Companys and any of the Indian Governments, the other Company shall if desired, employ it's Good Offices for adjusting and Settling the same in an Amicable Manner.

ARTICLE 2.

ORDERS shall be sent by the respective Companies as soon as possible after the Signature of the present Agreement to their Governors and other Officers in the East Indies, strictly requiring and enjoynng them to carry into immediate Execution the Stipulations hereof, and forthwith to cease All Acts of Force and Violence against each other, and, so soon as the Nabob shall have acceded to this Agreement, to withdraw all the Troops together with their Artillery, Stores, and Ammunition belonging to or in the Pay of either Company, into their respective Limits and Territories.

ARTICLE 3.

It is hereby stipulated and agreed, that all prisoners taken by the troops under the pay of either Company, shall be reciprocally restored, it being, however to be understood, that this stipulation shall not comprehend and includes the Restitution of such prisoners as were taken Mahomet Ally Kaun, and afterwards consigned and entrusted by him to the care and Custody of the English Forces, and may be actually remaining in their possession, The English Company engages however to use their Good Offices if required thereto by the French company for a mutual release of all the prisoners, and that all the Artillery taken on either side in the province of Arcot, during the late troubles be restored. It is moreover agreed, that all Deserters on either side shall be at full liberty to return back to their former Corps, on condition of paying the just and Lawful Debts they may have contracted, during their residence amongst those to whom they deserted.

ARTICLE 4.

It is Agreed by the Two Companies, that Trade shall be carried on in their Respective Settlements, on the same footing as before the Commencement of the late War between the Two Crowns, which was happily put an End to by the definitive Treaty concluded at Aix la Chapelle the 18/29 day of October 1748 and that no higher Duties or Imposts be exacted by either Company from the other, under any pretence whatsoever, on any Sorts of Goods, Commodities and Provisions, than were usually and regularly paid at that time.

ARTICLE 5.

MOHOMET ALLY KAUN shall be acknowledged by both Companies to be Nabob or Prince of the Province of Arcot, and be treated as such, and the French Company hereby engage not to give any Countenance Aid or Succours directly or indirectly to any other Person pretending a right to be Nabob of the said Province, or to favour or foment any disturbances that may be raised in opposition to the Interests and Governments of the reigning Nabob or his Successors, and in order to avoid giving Umbrage or Cause of Jealousy or

Suspicion to the said, Mahomet Ally Kaun, they promise to send effectual Orders that the Family of Chunda Sai shall not be permitted to reside at Pondicherry, or in any other Town Place or Settlement belonging to the French in those parts, but shall be safely conducted to any other place which they shall choose, so as not to give cause of Jealousy to the reigning Nabob. The Nabob on his part shall engage to maintain and preserve the English and French Companies in the quiet and peaceable possession of their Ancient Territories, as well as of all those that they shall acquire by the present agreement, and to confirm them in the Enjoyment of all their former Rights, Privileges and Immunities, without attempting any change or Innovations therein on any Account or Pretext whatsoever.

ARTICLE 6.

THE Present Agreement shall be communicated to the Vice Roy of Decan, to the Nabob of Arcot and to the King of Tanjore by proper Persons Commissioned by the Two Companies for that purpose, and they shall be invited to accede thereto, and upon Notification being received of the Nabobs Accession, he shall be put into Possession of Gingy and Vallepore with their Dependancies, as also of Covelong Chenguelpattah and Trivide, and in general of all other Places, Towns and Territories situated in the Province of Arcot, actually in the Possession of either Company, excepting their Ancient Possessions and such Acquisition as by Virtue of the 8 Article of this Agreement the English Company is entitled to make in the Poonamallee Country, and also excepting Villanor and Valldour, which it is agreed may be held by the French in Consequence of the same Article.

ARTICLE 7.

It is agreed that Bawhoor Fort shall be demolished and the Lands thereto belonging, restored to the Moorish Government.

ARTICLE 8.

PONDICHERRY with its Ancient Territories together with Alillanor and Valdaour and their Dependancies shall be left in the Possession of the French Company, on condition that the last mentioned Places shall be obtained and held by Grant from the Indian Government, for procuring which the English Company engage bonafide to employ their good Offices, and provided also, that the new Acquisitions do not approach nearer to Fort St. David's than the Ancient Boundaries of the French Territories did before the late War. AND it is hereby further stipulated, that the English Company may with the Consent of the country Government, for obtaining which the French Company shall engage bona fide to employ their good Offices, extend their Territories in the Poonamallee Country and other parts situated near Fort St. George in the same manner and proportion as the French shall extend theirs about Pondicherry.

ARTICLE 9.

IN the Tanjour Country Deve Cotta with its Dependancies may belong to the English Company, and the French may possess Nagore with its Dependancies.

ARTICLE 10.

THE Two Companies of England and France, agreed not to enter at present into the Discussion of their Reciprocal Claims and Pretensions upon the Island of Dice, the City of Massulapatam and the Country about it or dependent thereon, but that all the said Territories shall be evacuated by the Troops of either Company, who shall happen to be in possession of the same, and delivered up to the Moorish Government in integro, and that all the Forts and Fortifications whatever that have been raised by either Company during the late Troubles, on the Lands appertaining to or dependent on the abovementioned Places, shall be entirely demolished excepting only such as by Mutual Consent and Agreement shall be left standing for the Benefit and at the Request of the Moors, who shall be put in immediate possession thereof. The two Companies shall be at full liberty without impeding the Right already acquired by any others European Nation to establish Factories at Massulapatam, and to have all Magazines necessary for the Security and Convenience of their Commerce, but neither Company shall be at liberty to keep any greater Force in that place, than what may be absolutely necessary for their defence against any Insult of the Inhabitants, and the Numbers of which shall be regulated and Settled by the Governors for the time being of Fort St. George and Pondicherry.

ARTICLE 11.

THE Two Companys agree, that an Humble Application shall be made by each of them to their respective Sovereigns, that they would be graciously pleased to extend their Royal Favour and Protection towards them; by approving and confirming the present Agreement.

COPY OF THE TRANSLATION OF THE PROJECT OF A CONVENTION BETWEEN THE EAST INDIA COMPANIES OF FRANCE AND ENGLAND FOR RESTORING UNION AMONG THEMSELVES AND PUTTING AN END TO THE TROUBLES ON THE COAST OF CHOROMANDEL.

WHEREAS the separate Measures taken, on each side, by the East India Companies of France and England with the Princes and Governors of the Indian Country, have occasioned Differences and Dissentions which notwithstanding the Peace at present subsisting between the two Crowns have brought on Acts of Hostility on the Coast of Choromandel and whereas it is the mutual interest of Both Companies to restore and preserve Tranquility in those parts; they have therefore with the consent and agreement of their respective Sovereigns appointed Commissaries for putting an End to all these acts of Hostility and for adjusting and reconciling the Differences and Disputes at present remaining between them, that is to say, the Company of France and the Company of England who being fully authorized on both sides, have agreed to the following articles.

ARTICLE 1d.

The two Companies engaged and promise, that from the day of Notification of the present Treaty being made in the East Indies, there shall be a Cessation of all Acts of Hostility between them, that they will, each of them recall all the Troops, they have on foot in the province of Carnate, or which may be employed there in whatever place it may be, either against each other or their respective Allies into the Places of their own Settlement, or such as they are actually in possession of. That they will mutually restore and without Demand of Ransom all the prisoners and artillery taken on either side during the late Troubles, that they will restore likewise *as well at present, as for the future, on the first Requisition made for that purpose, the Deserters of each Nation*, after the Debts they may have contracted, shall be discharged and upon condition that their Lives shall be saved—The two Companies promise to restore and preserve a perfect Tranquillity and good Understanding between each other and the Saubah of Decan, the Nabob of the Province of Arcot, the King of Tanjour and other powers of the Country, that have been concerned in the late Troubles, shall receive a joint Invitation from the two Companies to accede to the presents Treaty copies of which shall be dispatched by the first vessels sent by either party with orders for its being published and carried into immediate Execution and an Exchange shall be made on both sides of the Duplicates of the abovementioned Instruments and Orders, to the Intent that they may be sent by the Ships of each Company and carried into Execution with the greatest Expedition.

ARTICLE 2.

As it is the serious Intention of the two Companies to maintain Peace and good Harmony with each other, and as their meaning is, for the future, to confine their views to objects of Commerce, they hereby stipulate and engage studiously to avoid taking part in any Discussions, Troubles or Quarrels that may arise at any time between the Chiefs and Governors of those Countries, where they have their Settlements—To make use of no other means but those of their good Offices for putting an end to such Disputes; to furnish them with no Troops or Succours, but with the mutual consent and agreement of the Governors, belonging to the respective Companies; To employ likewise in case of any Rupture, between either of the Companies and any Chiefs or Governors of the Indian Country, their good Offices for reconciling such Differences an application made to them by the other Company for that purpose. They promise and engaged to carry on Trade in their respective Settlements in the same foot, as it was before the Commencement of the late War, which was terminated by the peace concluded at Aix la Chapelle

*The words underlined may be changed, if the English Company does not choose to agree to a Cartel for the future, and in that case the following words taken from the 3d Article of the English Project, may be substituted in their place: It is agreed that the Deserters on both sides shall have full liberty to return to their former corps.

the 18/29 October 1748. That neither Company shall, on any pretence whatever, demand higher Duties or Imposts on any Sorts of Goods or Merchandize than such as were customarily and regularly paid before the War. By virtue of the present Treaty the two Companies disclaim any acceptance, both now or hereafter, of any such Moorish or Indian Dignity, as might give the Officers, employed by them in India, any authority over the Possessions of the Princess of the Country.

ARTICLE 3.

The two Companies shall keep all the possessions, they had before the late Troubles. The English Company shall hold their new Settlement of Devecotta, with its Dependancies in the Country of Tanjoure. The French Company the Grant, that has been made to them of Nagore with its Dependancys, in the Country of Carical. The French Company shall likewise hold Vilnour and Valdour situated near Pondicherry, in the provinces of Carnate, together with their Dependancys, on condition nevertheless that these Limits do not approach near Fort St. Davids, than the ancient Limits did ;—The English Company shall have it in their power to extend their Territories about Fort St. George in the same manner, as the French shall do theirs about Pondicherry ; and the two Companies shall at *bona fide* with the Indian Governors for procuring to each other respectively the secure and quiet possession of these new Territories. All other Towns and Places, in the Country of Carnate, now in the actual possession of either Company, or to which they lay any Claim by virtue of Conquest, Grant, Donation, or by what other manner soever, shall be restored under the Conditions hereafter mentioned, to the Nabob of Arcot, particularly Trichanopoly by the English Company and Gingy by the French, as likewise Bahour, after the Fort has been demolished.

ARTICLE 4.

The Nabob of Arcot shall not be put in possession of the places, which are to be restored to him by virtue of the preceeding article, but by concert between the respective Governors of each Company for that purpose. It being however to be understood that the French Company does not engage to make the above-mentioned Evacuations, till Restitution shall have been made of all the French Prisoners and of the artillery taken on either side, during the present War. The aforesaid Evacuations shall not be effected, by either of the Companies, till the said Nabob shall have acceded to the present Treaty and ratified all its articles as far as they concern him and shall moreover have engaged to restore to all Indian Kings, Princes, Chiefs and Governors, who may have declared themselves *his Enemies or Competitors, or have enter'd into any engagement with either of the Companies*, or have acceded to the present Treaty all the Places which he may have gained from them by Conquest, nor until the said Nabob shall have confirmed the several Grants to be made to the respective Companies and promised to treat them both in his Government, without Distinction or Predilection, and upon the same foot as the most favour'd Nation.

ARTICLE 5.

Whereas many European Nations have had Factory at Masulipatam and have carried on there an open and free Trade under the Moorish Government, and as the exclusive possession and property of the said Town, if it belonged

to any particular Company, could not but prejudice the Trade of others; or at least give them great cause of Distrust and Jealousy, the Company of France therefore to give a proof of their desire of Peace, consent and engages to evacuate the Town of Masulipatam, as likewise the Isle of Diu (*resulting always the surplus of the Grants which have been made to them in the country of Decan*) to the intent that the said Island and Town be put into the hands of the Soubah of Decan, upon his Accession to the present Treaty in consequence of the joint Invitation to be made to him by the two Companies for that purpose, and be hereafter possess'd by the said Soubah and his Successors or by any other Indian Princes, to whom the Investiture of the said Country shall be granted, in exclusion to all European Nations whatever; it being however to be understood that this Renunciation shall be deemed null and void, if any other European Nation or Company should procure a Grant of the said Territory and attempt to possess themselves thereof on any pretence whatever, nothing however being meant hereby to derogate from the Right, such Nations or Companies may have settling Lodges or Factories there for the Security and Convenience of their Trade. The Two Companies however shall not keep either at Masulipatam or on the Island of Diu any greater Forces, than may be necessary for their Security against the Insults of the Natives, the number of which Forces shall be regulated by the Governor for the time being of the principal Settlement of each Company on the Coast of Choromandel.

ARTICLE 6.

The Restitutions and Cessions, stipulated by the present Treaty in favour of the Princes of the Country, shall be made by the two Companies with equal pace but not till after the Fortifications, which may have been raised by either of them in those places, shall be demolished, without destroying anything however of the ancient Fortifications, except where the contrary is stipulated by the present Treaty or any new Fortifications shall be preserved with the mutual Consent and Agreement of the respective Companies Officer in the East Indies.

ARTICLE 7.

In case that Peace should have been restored on the Coast of Choromandel by virtue of any Conventions made between the Moorish and Indian Princes and Chiefs, the two Companies do not mean to cause any alteration therein by the present Treaty and they hereby expressly declare their Dissent to any thing contrary thereto, it being however understood, that this Derogation shall in no wise be construed to extend to the Grants, possessions, Domaines, or any immediate and mutual interests of the two Companies, and if the Chief Officers of the said Companies in India shall have entered into any Agreements or Conventions among themselves, the said agreements and Conventions shall be in force and faithfully executed in every point relating to the Interests of the Moors, and null and void only in such particulars as are contrary to the Stipulations of the present Treaty with relation to the Grants, possessions and Domaines and the immediate and mutual Interests of the said Companies—If by reason of any local circumstances, the Chiefs of the two Companies in India shall agree in their opinion, that some particular agreements, they may have enter'd into together, relative to the immediate Interests of the said Companies, different from the Stipulations of the present Treaty, may be more to the advantage of the respective Companies, they shall in such case be empower'd to suspend the

Execution hereof in this point, till they shall in concert, have made their Representations, to the said Companies for their final determination thereupon, who shall nevertheless be both strictly bound to the observation of the present Treaty, as far as it relates to them, in case either of them shall refuse to abide by the abovementioned agreements.

ARTICLE 8.

The two Companies agree to present an humble address to their respective Sovereigns, that they would be graciously pleased to extend their Royal Favour and Protection towards them, by approving and confirming the present Convention.

DONE AT LONDON.

Secret and Separate Article.

If it should happen that any Difficultys arise with regard to the Cessions stipulated by the present Treaty in favour of the Soubah of Decan and the Nabob of Arcot, in consequence of a Refusal, on the part of those Moorish Princes, to accede to and ratifye the stipulations relative to themselves, then the chiefs of the two Companies in India shall concert together the best method of carrying the present Treaty into Execution but the Refusal of the said Soubab and Nabob to accede hereto shall not be made use of as a pretence for withholding the Evacuation stipulated by the present Treaty, which said Evacuations shall be made on the Requisition of the Chiefs of either of the Companies, excepting only the Evacuation of Gingy, which shall not be demanded till after the Restitution of the French Prisons and Artillery. And in the case provided for by the present Article, the two Companies mutually engage to demolish the Fortifications of all the places they leave. The present Article shall be kept secret between the two Companies, without being communicated to any Moorish Chiefs, or other Princes and Kings of India.

COPY OF THE TRANSLATION OF THE FRENCH MEMORIAL OF OBSERVATIONS UPON THE PROJECT OF A CONVENTION BETWEEN THE EAST INDIA COMPANIES OF FRANCE AND ENGLAND.

The two Companies are equally agreed upon the importance of restoring, Peace upon the Coast of Choromandel for their Mutual Advantage, in carrying on trade there, and that of France would not refuse to make some sacrifices for that end, but can never consent to a Treaty, the General Terms of which would tend to lower and degrade their Dignity; they would even refuse some advantages, which might be offered them if the manner of offering them carried with it any air of prescribing the law. They mean as little to receive, as to dictate,

the Law ; and if England will not concur in removing every thing, that may give an Air of Superiority, to either of the Companies over the other, or lessen its Consideration and Dignity in the Indies, the French Company will see with concern, this Project of Accommodation become quite Ineffectual.

From these Considerations, the French Company have been under the necessity of drawing up a New Project of a Convention, differing but little, in the main, from the English Project, but varying from it in the Terms of the several Articles.

The Intent of this Memorial is to show, why the English Project is not altogether admissible, and to add some Observations on that of the French Company.

The stipulation contained in the first Article of the English project, ought to be considered, as the Basis of a Treaty between the two Companies (viz.) that neither of them should interpose in the disputes of the Moorish Princes, which have been the cause and origin of all the hostile proceedings carried on by the said Companies, for such Interposition would naturally imply an intention of supporting, that Party they should at any time favour.

By the first and second Articles of the English Project the two Companies engage to put an end to all Hostilities, on either side, to withdraw their Troops into their respective limits and to take no farther part in the war between the Moorish Princes, which now actually lays waste the Country of Carnate ; The second Article moreover expresses, that the two Companies shall not withdraw their forces into their respective limits till such time, as the Nabob of the aforesaid Province shall have acceded to the Agreement made between the two Companies.

From hence it would result, that the continuation of Hostilities between the two Companies would depend on the will of the Nabob ; A Proposition directly contrary to the spirit of a Treaty, the Object of which is to restore tranquillity between the said Companies, independently of the will of the Indian Princes, besides from the Influence the English Company has over the mind of the Nabob of Arcot, they could dispose him to accede or not, and by that means, notwithstanding the Treaty, be Masters of Peace or War. Such a Stipulation therefore is evidently inadmissible, and must be considered as an error in terms.

In consequence of the Engagement for an Immediate Cessation, the second Article of the English project stipulates the retreat of the Troops, on each side within *their respective limits and territories*. This stipulation seems to be inserted, as the means of carrying into execution the Article for the Cessation of hostilities.

There can be no doubt, but that, if Tranquillity is to be restored, the first Condition should be the Immediate Cessation of Hostilities on both sides, but it might be very inconvenient to stipulate the retreat of the Troops into their respective Limits and Territories. By this stipulation, all the Places in the possession of either of the Companies, would be instantly given up, without any Assurance from the Moorish Princes of their acceding, or not, to the Treaty.

This Observation makes it so clear, that this can only be a fault in the drawing up that there is no reason to suspect, but that it will be rectified (upon an Explanation on both sides) without any difficulty.

The French Company cannot consent to the Third Article of the English Companys *Project* relating to the Prisoners, and even does not scruple to own the Offence they have taken at the nature of the Stipulation contained in it.

They cannot conceive how the English Company could propose to them the Restitution of all the Places, taken by them from the Nabob, when at the same time the Nabob is not bound to a Surrender of the Prisoners and Artillery taken from them by him, by which means they would treat with this Indian Prince upon Forms incident to the making of Peace, and He, on the contrary, would treat with them upon Terms, which ought never to subsist but during a State of Hostilities. A Stipulation which would appear now for the first time in any Treaty.

The French Company will certainly neither cease Hostilities nor quit the possession of Gingy, till an Engagement is entered into for the Restitution of all their Prisoners and Artillery.

It is to no purpose that the English Company has offered their good Offices for bringing about the said Restitution, on Requisition made to them for that purpose.

Such a Supplication would be too Humble on the part of those, who have in their hands Conquests to restore to an Enemy, who is not in a condition of regaining them by Force, which Circumstance shews, still stronger, the Indecency of the Proposal.

It would have been easy for the French Company in their Plan, to have inserted stipulations for their Good Offices in favour of the English Company, upon application made to them for that purpose, as, for instance, for the obtaining of their ally the Subah of Decan, a Confirmation of all Grants reserved to either Company; but nothing of this kind will appear, as it is a Language, unbecoming two nations, who treat on Equal Terms, and such as perhaps the Nation, who might think itself the Superior would disdain to make use of. But the King would by no means admit of such sort of Language in a Negotiation carried on under his Favour.

As to the Fifth Article relating to Mahomet Ally Kawn, after it has been laid down for a Principle, as in the first Article, not to interpose in the Affairs of the Indian Princes, it follows, that we are studiously to avoid doing anything that may prejudice the Rights of some, or the Possessions of others; On any other footing this Treaty would become an Heap of Inexplicable Contradictions and either Impracticable, or Arbitrary, in its execution.

Though it may be said, in justification of Mr. Dupleix, that the Nabob, against whom he has carried on hostilities, called down the resentment of the French Company upon him for his Infraction of Treaties, and for his behaviour towards them, during the War between the two Crowns, yet the consequence, drawn from the abovementioned Principles, will be as strong as ever (*viz.*) that

it belongs neither to this or that Company, to declare, or support, this or that Indian Chief as Lawful Nabob of Arcot, or to acknowledge or dispute his title, such Pretensions belonging to the Subah of Decan or principally to the Mogul, to determine upon.

But whatever may be the Rights and Claims of the Moorish Princes among one another, possession is however a clear matter of fact, and by the same rule that the Companies are not Judges of the matter of Right, they ought not to interest themselves about the possession in favour of one or for the removal of another. In short the Reigning Nabob is the Nabob of Traders.

Agreeably to these principles, which are a necessary consequence of that at first laid down, not to interpose in the Affairs of the Moorish Princes. The French Company will forget all the reasons of resentment which they may have, against Mahomet Ally Kawn, and disclaim any Design of dispossessing, him, they are ready to engage never to give any Disturbance to the Reigning Nabob about the Possession.

The two Companies well know, by their Experience in the Present Troubles, how Sudden and Frequent the Revolutions are in those Parts. If therefore Mahomet Ally Kawn should have lost his Government or his Life, or in short if, by any other Change, Tranquillity should be restored in the Country of Carnate. It is clear, that under such considerations, the stipulations of this Treaty can relate only to the Reigning Nabob of Arcot.

On supposition that he should be entirely dispossess'd, neither of the companies could attempt to reinstate him, without plunging themselves, more than ever, into War, and bringing on again all those Troubles, which it is the intent of this Treaty to put an end to. One of the most express Stipulations thereof saying, that no Troops shall be granted, nor any Measures taken, but those of Good Offices.

Neither would it be possible to enter into a New War, or under those Circumstances to acknowledge Mahomet Ally Kawn, without drawing upon you all the Indian Princes, who would think you meant to prescribe the Law to them.

The Company of France will not therefore engage to renew the Troubles, or to alienate the Indian Governors from her, in favour of a Prince, who has been for some time, and is now in the Actual War against them, They can't suppose that the English Company can require it of them, but however they certainly will never give up the Point, and if the Schemes of the English shall induce them, to continue the war in India, the French Company will rather choose to carry it on against a Prince who has been their declared Enemy, than to act in his favour, against any Princes, of whom they can have no cause to complain.

On the Supposition there made, that Mahomet Ally Kawn, should be deposed, the Situation of the French Company would be too advantageous, to incline them to give into the Proposal made by the English Company, but, at the same time, would not the English find their Advantage, by taking this opportunity, of getting out of a War, which they must, under these Circumstances,

carry on against the United Powers of the Indian Country, and which could not therefore but be a very Expensive and Dangerous One? What more advantageous could they desire than such Treaty, as would procure them Peace, Encrease their Possessions and secure to them a Favourable Treatment on the Article of Commerce?

This is the Object of the French Project, and it cannot be doubted but that the English Company will find their Account in this Stipulation, if their Affairs should have met with a Reverse, but even on supposition that their Affairs are either in a Prosperous, or Doubtful Situation, their views will equally be answered, as all the Places, now in the hands of the two Companies, are hereby to be restored to the Nabob of Arcot, and consequently to Mahomet Ally Kawn, if he be not dispossessed.

The French Company makes no scruple to acknowledge, that, by the Nabob of Arcot, they really intend Mahomet Ally Kawn, provided he be not dispossessed thereof; but however their Opinion is that, in consideration of the Revolutions which may have happened in India, it might be attended with Inconveniences to name him expressly in a Treaty, which is to be communicated to the Moorish Princes, besides, that this Designation of the *Nabob of Arcot*, as in the French Plan, is taken from the Second Article of the English Project. In short time must determine of the fate of the Province of Arcot—however all Doubtful Events will be in favour of Mahomet Ally Kawn. But it by no means belongs to either of the Companies to determine on this Point at all events, and against the Disposition of the Powers of the Country. This would be in effect, to claim a Right of giving the Law there, to perpetuate the Troubles and to act in Manifest Contradiction to the Spirit of the Treaty.

As to that part of the Fifth Article, which relates to the Family of Chunda Saib, as soon as it is agreed not to mention Mahomet Ally Kawn, it will appear that Chunda Saibs Family may likewise be entirely omitted, more particularly as, by the last Accounts from India, they have given up all their Pretensions to the Nabobie of Arcot, and a New Competitor is started up in the Person of the Phousdar of Velloor.

Besides, the other Stipulations of the Treaty provide sufficiently for the Security of the Reigning Nabob.

The French Company are not to send any Succours directly or indirectly against Mahomet Ally Kawn; and it surely must be considered as a Strong Proof of their good Disposition, to acknowledge him, and to give him no cause of distrust, that they stipulate the Surrender of Gingy and Other Places as mentioned in this Treaty. To make any further Demands on the French Company would be treating them with an Air of Command, not at all consistent with the present favourable Situation of their Affairs in India, and which therefore it is not reasonable to suppose they can submit to.

The Tenth Article of the English Project, relating to the Island of Diu and the Town of Massulipatam, seems liable to some Particular Remarks.

The Possession of that Island and Town are considered to be of such Importance by both Companies, that the Sacrifice made by the French Company

in putting these Places into the Hands of the Moors for exclusion to all other European Nations must be looked upon as the Greatest and most Undeniable Proof, they can give, of their Desire of Peace

But, at the same Time, they declare, that this Sacrifice, is not made, in consideration of the Claims set up by the English Company.

Their Pretensions to the Isle of Diu cannot be admitted, because they have never produced their Title, though they have been often pressed to it, during the course of the Negotiation on this head, which is a Plain Proof, that either they have none at all, or at most, as the French Company believes, that of a *Fee Farm Rent*, which never was complied with, and if it had, could not ever have conveyed such a Right as they pretend to.

The French Company, on the contrary, can produce a Letter from Mon^r. Saunders, Governor of Madras to the Subah of Decan, containing, an Offer of Some Troops, on condition that the Island of Diu should be granted to the Company; An Unanswerable Proof, that the English in India, who must doubtless know more of the Company's Rights, than those in Europe, agree themselves in acknowledging that this Island does not make part of their Territories, so that the English Company cannot set up any Real or Well Grounded Title thereto.

As to the Town of Massulipatam, it is from reading the English Project, that the French Company finds the first Notion of the English Pretensions to that place.

Though a Title cannot indeed be conveyed by a Simple Specification thereof in a Treaty, and though it cannot be conceived that this could have been the Design of the Person who drew up the abovementioned Project, yet as no one can foresee what Time and Accidents may produce, it would be Ill judged to let such In Accurate Terms remain, from whence it might be presumed, that the French Company acknowledged the Pretensions, whether Well or Ill grounded, made by the English to the Town of Massulipatam.

The Terms besides, in which this Cession is conveyed an obscure and require to be expressed with more Perspicuity, in order to avoid any Mis-Construction, that may be made, of the words made use of in the English Project. The Cession, made by the French Company, is merely of the Isle of Diu and the Town of Massulipatam. This is a Voluntary and Considerable Sacrifice on their part, and it will be in vain to require more of them from their Desire of Peace, of which they give sufficient Proofs, by agreeing to Surrender so valuable a Settlement, which they have fortified at so great an Expert.

From these Observations it appears, how necessary it was to draw up a New Project. That, which is now presented, contains Eight Articles and a Secret One.

The first Article Comprehend every thing, that relates to the Cessation of Hostilities, and to the Invitation to be made to the Powers, concerned in the late Troubles, to accede to the Treaty.

The Recal of the Troops on each side, is not to be made as Stipulated by the English Project, into the Respective Limits of each Company, but indistinctly into the Places actually possessed by either of them, to the intent that the Evacuations to be settled between the Governors of the two Companies in the Indies, may not be effected, till such time as the Nabob of Arcot shall have performed his part of the Agreement.

The Principal Stipulations of this Article are taken from the First, Second and Sixth Articles of the English Project.

This Project has not confined the Invitation, of acceding to the Treaty to the Subah of Decan, the Nabob of Arcot, and the King of Tanjore but has extended it to all the Princes of the Country, who were concerned in the Troubles.

There is an Addition likewise made of an Engagement, by which the parties are bound to send by the first Ships, belonging to either of them, the Instruments, of the Present Treaty ; this is a Stipulation, which though not expressed must necessarily be executed.

The Second Article contains the Stipulations necessary for securing the Good Harmony between the two Companies in their Indian Settlements.

The Most Essential of all, and that which serves as the Basis of the Whole Negotiation, is, That neither Party shall interpose in the Affairs of the Moorish or Indian Princes, this Stipulation is taken from the First Article of the English Project.

There is a Formal Dis-Avowal of raising any troubles against any of the abovementioned Princes in the possession of their several Governments, so that, by virtue of this stipulation, the French Company can never support any Competitor to Mohomet Ally Kawn.

If any modification has been made in the article relating to the succours to be given to the Moorish Princes, by adding, that such succours shall not be given, but with the mutual consent of the two companies, this has been done, with a view to the respect due to the said Companies, as it may possibly happen at particular conjunctures, that the influence of the two Companies may prevent any attempts on the public tranquillity for the manufactures are concerned, and consequently the trade of the two companies, in preserving peace between the Moorish Princes.

If the two companies had observed the stipulations of the Second Article, they had prevented all the hostilities which have hitherto happened, and this is the true way of putting an end to and preventing them for the future.

The stipulation by which they engage to join, in opposing all attempts against their commerce, must be of common utility, the truth of this they must have experienced more than once in their settlements on the Ganges.

The stipulation about the Mutual Commerce to be allowed in the settlements of the two companies, is copied almost word for word from the Fourth Article of the English Project.

The stipulation containing the Renunciation of any title or dignity which might convey any Authority over the Possessions of the Moorish Princes, is a fresh proof of the sincerity of the intentions of the French Company, who by this stipulation which is entirely omitted in the English Project, give up all the Command granted to Mon^r Dupleix from the Kistna to Cape Comorin. This stipulation is necessary for preventing any interposition, on either side in the affairs of the Moorish Princes and consequently for preserving peace and good harmony between the Companies.

The Third Article relates to the places to be kept or restored in Tanjore and Carnate.

The Retention of the Ancient Possessions is taken from the Fifth Article of the English Project.

The Acquisition of Deve Cottah, with it's Dependancies, made by the English Company, by which they gain a Settlement in the Kingdom of Tanjore, where they never had one before, and the Accession of Nagore, with its dependancies, to the French Possessions in a Country, where they before had Karical, are taken from the Ninth Article of the English Project.

The Cession of Zillenoor and Valdaour, in favour of the French Company, and the Augmentation of the Territory round Fort St. George in the same proportion, in favour of the English Company, are taken from the English Article of the English Project.

If no mention has been made in the French Project of Poonamallee, it proceeds from their Ignorance of the Real situation of that country, and from their apprehension that such a stipulation might be Ineffectual, as it would really be, if the distance of Poonamallee from the Ancient Territory of Fort St. George were greater, than that of Valdaour from the Ancient Territory of Pondicherry.

The stipulation of acting *de bonne foy* with the Moorish Government, in order to obtain the Quiet Possession of their New Territories, is likewise taken from the English Article of the English Project.

The Cession of Bahour is specified, because the Demolition of that Fort stipulated agreeable to the Seventh Article of the English Project.

Gingy and Trichinapoly are likewise particularized, because the Whole strength of the province of Arcot lies in those two places.

There is no particular specification made of all the places to be restored, because they are comprized in the General Article for Restitution of all such places, as are not reserved to one or other of the Companies, and likewise, as by not knowing what those places are, and by mentioning some without the other, the force of the stipulation might be weakened.

The Fourth Article of the French Project contains all the conditions, upon which the restitutions, stipulated in favour of the Nabob of Arcot, are to be made.

The Principal Object of this Article is, the assurance given by the French Company, that they will never consent to the above mentioned restitutions, and particularly to the surrender of Gingy till the Nabob of Arcot shall have restored all their prisoners and Artillery ; the Justice of this stipulation need not be enlarg'd upon.

The Accession of the Nabob of Arcot ought to be previous to these Evacuations. This Disposition is the same as that expressed in the Sixth Article of the English Project.

There is an Addition made hereto, which is, that the Nabob shall give up all the places, he may have taken or conquered from any princes, Allies of either of the Companies. Without this stipulation the Invitation to be made to the Princes of the Country to accede to the present treaty, would meet with great difficulty in taking effect. For whatever power shall have influenced any Princes to take part in a War, cannot avoid stipulating, the Restitution of the places they may have lost, that they may not be in a worse condition at the Close, than they were at the beginning of the war.

The confirmation of the privileges and new possession to be granted the two companies by the Nabob of Arcot, is taken from the Fifth Article of the English Project.

It is likewise added, that the New Nabob shall treat the two companies upon an Equal foot, and in the same manner as the most favoured Foreign Nations—This stipulation is of common Utility, and obviates any particular and unknown Advantages which either of the Companies may have procured for themselves during the War.

The Fifth Article of the French Project relates to the Island of Diu and the Town of Masulipatam, which the French Company consents to give up to the Moorish Government ; which Renunciation however is made on this condition, that these places shall never hereafter be possessed by any European Nation—These Dispositions are, in the main, the same as those contained in the Tenth Article of the English Project, particularly, with regard to the power of having Factories both at Diu and Masulipatam under the restrictions therein mentioned.

The Sixth Article authorizes the demolition of all New Fortifications in the places to be restored, agreeable to the stipulation on this head of the Tenth Article of the English Project ; But by the same rule of Equity, the preservation of the Ancient Fortifications ought to be provided for, and moreover orders to be given that all these Restitutions and cessions be made with Equal pace.

There being an Entire Omission in the English Project of the Measures proper to be taken in case any conventions have been made in the Indies, that case is provided for by the seventh Article of the New Project.

It is thereby agreed that the Stipulations made in Europe, relating to the Mutual and Immediate Concessions and Interests of the two companies, shall have the preference of any Agreements made in the Indies contrary thereto, by confirming the Agreements made in Europe, the said Companies know what they do, but to confirm what has been done in India, would be approving what they never knew.

But as to those Stipulations entered into in India, with regard to the Moors, there the case is widely different, because these cannot be annulled, without endangering the peace, which is the thing they ought to produce. And as it is the object of the Two Companies not to raise any fresh Troubles, or revive the past, among the Moorish Princes, it follows from thence that all the Engagements these Princes may have entered into among one another, ought to subsist and be carried into execution. Tis with this meaning that the article in question is drawn up.

The Eighth Article of the French Project, by which the Respective Sovereigns of the two Companies are to be humbly addressed for their Approbation and Confirmation of the present Treaty, is the same as the Eleventh Article of the English Project.

The Object of the Separate Article is to establish Peace between the Two Companies, independently of the Accession of the Moorish and Indian Princes to this Treaty. It is hereby agreed that in case of the refusal, on the part of those Princes, to accede, the places to be given up on either side, shall be evacuated, but not by a formal Restitution to the Princes of the Country, but by directly abandoning them, and dismantling their Fortifications. The Stipulation nevertheless, with regard to the Restitution of Gingy is connected with the Restitution of the French Prisoners and Artillery, This Article is indispensably necessary, if the two Companies treat de bonne foy with one another.

The Design of the French Company, in this New Draught of the Project of a Treaty, has been to collect in each Article every thing relative to the particular Object thereof, to correct any stipulations that were, in their Nature inadmissible, to secure to themselves the Restitution of their Prisoners and Artillery, to avoid any wrong or In-Accurate Specifications, to clear up any Articles that might be obscure, Doubtful, or Equivocal, to express them in a manner becoming both the Companies, to supply all deficiencies on necessary Points, and, in short, to throw more Order and Perspicuity on the Whole.

If moreover the English Company shall be of Opinion, that any Articles can be drawn up with more Clearness and Precision, and so as to answer more fully the view of the two Companies. They will always find the French Company disposed to adopt whatever may be suggested to them on such Right Principles.

Care has been taken in the manner of drawing up this Treaty, that it may appear, that the two Companies have concurred with an equal desire towards the Re-Establishment of the peace, and that neither of them has assumed an Air of Superiority, or suffered it on the part of the other.

Upon the Whole, the French Company disclaims any further attempt to dispossess Mahomet Ally Kawn, they give up part of the Possessions they have gained in Carnate, and their still Greater Expectations, and in short lay aside their Claim to the Island of Diu and Town of Massulipatam. All the sacrifices made are on their Side; This they have done for the sake of peace, when at the same time it cannot be shewn that one single sacrifice has been made on the part

of the English Company. The French Company cannot be charged with the continuation of Hostilities, if the Work of peace and Reconciliation, now so near it's conclusion, should at last unfortunately miscarry.

COPY OF THE OBSERVATIONS, ON THE FRENCH PLAN FOR PUTTING AN END TO THE TROUBLES ON THE COAST OF CHOROMANDEL RECEIVED FROM MR. DUVELAER THE 12TH FEBRY, 1754.

I

By the First and Fourth Articles and by the Private Article it is insisted that all French Prisoners shall, without Ransom be released, and their Artillery resorted immediately, on the notification of the Treaty, and before they, on their parts do any one thing toward the execution of the other parts of the Treaty, and they particularly insist that Gingy (the only strong hold known at present in the Province of Arcot, to be in their possession) shall remain in their possessions till the above conditions are fully complied with.

It may be remarked what room those Articles may leave to defeat the Whole Plan, since after the French shall be in possession of all their Force, they may always find pretences to say, all the prisoners are not delivered up, and the same pretences may be made as to their Artillery, and this they may do or not according as they shall be circumstanced when the Treaty is notified, may it not therefore answer their purpose, if they be in earnest, in wishing for peace, to stipulate that the English Company shall receive from Mahomet Ally Kawn, if in being and from every other Person, if in their power, all the French Prisoners and Artillery, in his or their possession and that the said Company shall be obliged to deliver up the Whole so put into their possession to the French, so soon as they shall have evacuated Gingy, and every other Place, except such, as by the Treaty are stipulated to be reserved. The French obliging themselves to act in like manner on their parts towards the English and towards the Nabob.

II

By the Second Article, an Union is proposed between the two Companies to assist one the other in the Support of their Privileges of Commerce.

This may be interpreted an Alliance offensive as well as Defensive, and may be attended with great Inconveniences on either side, therefore ought to be left to the discretion of the Chiefs abroad how to act, and it may be recommended to them to act in concert, when obstructions are unreasonably given to the trade of both or either of the two companies.

III

By the Third Article the French treat our Title to Deve Cottah only as a place possessed by us, and their Title to Nagore as a Grant. This Distinction is not just, nor ought it to stand so in a Treaty.

IV

The Only Objection to the Fourth Article is what has been mentioned in the First. If the Expedient proposed be agreeable, the rest of the Fourth Article may stand. But there should be the same provision made in this Article, for restoring to the Nabob what is taken from him, as for his restoring what is taken from others.

V

The Fifth Article is of an Extraordinary Nature, and can on no Account be submitted to. The French pretend to a Vast Country round Massulipatam more than half the Area of a Circle whose Diameter is three Degrees in Latitude, in one of the Richest Spots of ground in the Mogol's Dominions being above 12,724 square miles or more than 8,143,360 Acres of Land. The Revenues and Profits which would arise to the French from such a Vast Acquisition would soon put their Company in a Condition to crush the English on that Coast, and indeed in every other Part of India whenever they please, and this in such a manner as to leave no room for Complaint afterwards.

The pretend to esteem it a Great Condescension, to put the City of Massulipatam and the Island Diu in the Hands of the Subah of Decan, and to permit other European Nations to have Factories in those Places. They make this Sacrifice out of love, as they pretend for Peace, whereas, it is most certain, that if the French remain Masters of the Land round Massulipatam, every other Nation settled in that City, or in Diu Island must be subject to such Terms as the French will please to impose on them, nor can the Subah of Decan, in such case, exercise any other Authority, in those two places, than what the French will permit. The advantages which will accrue to the French from this Situation are too obvious to need further Explanation and what has already passed as set forth by Letters to the Company of the 25th January 1751/2 and the 27th Decm^r 1752, shew plainly what the French will do, when they have it in their power. They endeavoured to get two of the English Factories demolished viz., at Ingeram and Maddapollam, and stood looking on, in hopes the Indian Government would have gratified them in their desires, and they have seized the Entrance into Maddapollam River, where they have raised a Battery to secure the possession of it, and thereby renders the English Company's Factorys useless—It is yet unknown how far their pretensions reach, by some Accounts, they have published, the Whole Country is theirs, or held under them, and the most Modest, say, they claim Diu Island, with the City of Massulipatam and an Extent of Ground Thirty Leagues each way from it, besides other Concessions made to them more to the Northwards. If therefore they do not agree to bring themselves within their Ancient Limits, as to these Pretensions, it will be to no purpose to treat further. It may be better to go on in the way, We are in, and be at liberty to enter into such alliances as may offer with the Country Government, which may, ere long, oblige the French to be more moderate in thier Views, to which nothing can contribute so much, as the having continually a good Force

ready, to act as auxiliaries whensoever a good occasion presents. This will always encourage the Natives to attempt shaking off the yoke, and will by Degrees render them more Warlike and better able to keep the French in order, it may be said they will do the same to Us, let it be so, it is far better that the Natives should be Masters of that Country, and give the Law to both the French and Us, than that We should remain there in. A mean declining Way receiving Laws from the French. The Credit of the English as Merchants, is superior in India to that of the French, and they will always have the Preference in all Indian Governments who are their own Masters, so long as they preserve their Mercantile Reputation.

VI

The Sixth, Seventh and Eighth admit of little Difficulty, and the Secret Article may be admitted without much if any alteration, except what relates to evacuating Gingy, the deferring of which is the more Extraordinary, as no good reason can be given, why the English Company should Evacuate Trichinopoly before the French Evacuate Gingy.

It is to be observed that throughout this Plan the Names of Mahomet Ally Kawn and the Family of Chunda Saibare industriously omitted as is also the name of the Poonamallee Country. In the Memorial there is a long and tedious deduction of Agreements to prove the impropriety of naming either, these arguments seem frivolous and founded, in some measure, on a false fact, for instance the French alledge, in justification of Mr. Dupleix, that the Nabob, against whom he carried on Hostilities, called down the Resentment of the French Company upon him, for his Infraction of Treaties and for his Behaviour towards them during the War between the two Crowns, Whereas it really it appears clearly by the Proceedings against Mr. La Bourdonnaye, after his return to France, that Mr. Dupleix from an Infraction of a Treaty entered into with the Nabob of Arcot, for putting the City of Madras into his (the Nabobs) possession was the First Aggressor, and the Source of their War with the Nabob may be dated from that time.

As for the not inserting the name of Poonamallee, their reason for it is the strangest that can be given for having it explicitly inserted. They say they don't know but that it may extend to a greater distance from Madrass than either Valdour or Villanoor do from Pondicherry the Question is not how the Land extends or what Figure it is of, but what the Quantity is to be.

WHEREAS the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have, by their Memorials of the 13th of November last, represented to His Majesty at this Board, that for want of an Establishment of Rank and Precedence between

His Majesty's Sea and Land Officers and likewise between the Sea Officers themselves, great Inconveniences had arisen both in the present and former Wars; and as several of the Flag-Officers, Captains, and Lieutenants, have made a Remonstrance upon this Head to the said Lords Commissioners, that they had taken same into their Consideration, and being of opinion, that if such an Establishment was made, as should comprehend all the Sea Commission Officers, and settle their respective Ranks parallel with the Army, according to the Quality and Truths of the Posts they should serve in, and should likewise ascertain the Distinction they have a Right to among themselves, it would be a Means, not only of animating them, to support the Dignity of their Rank in their respective Stations, but be likewise attended with many good Consequences to His Majesty's Service, and particularly with Regard to the Preventing Disputes and Confusion when the Sea and Land Forces shall happen to act together—And the said Lords Commissioners have thereupon humbly offered to His Majesty the following Proposals, VIZ.

I

That the Admiral and Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Fleet have the Rank of a Field Marshall of the Army.

II

That the Admirals with their Flags on the Main Top-most Head have Rank with Generals of Horse and Foot.

III

That Vice-Admirals have Rank as Lieutenant Generals.

IV

That Rear-Admirals have Rank as Major Generals.

V

That Commodores with broad Pendants have Rank as Brigadier-Generals.

VI

That Captains commanding Post-Ships, after three Years from the Date of their first Commission for a Post-Ship, have Rank as Colonels.

VII

That all the other Captains commanding Post-Ships have Rank as Lieutenant Colonels.

VIII

That Captains of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, not taking Post, have Rank as Majors.

IX

That Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships have Rank as Captains.

X

That the Rank and Precedence of Sea-Officers, in the Classes, abovementioned, do take Place according to the Seniority of their respective Commissions as Sea-Officers.

XI

That Post-Captains, commanding Ships or Vessels that do not give Post, rank only as Majors during their commanding such Vessels.

XII

That nothing in this Regulation shall give any Pretence to any Land-Officer to command any of His Majesty's Squadrons or Ships, nor to any Sea-Officer to Command at Land; nor shall either have a Right to demand the Military Honours due to their Respective Ranks, unless such Officers are upon actual Service.

And whereas the Lords of the Committee of Council, to whom His Majesty referred the Consideration of the said Proposals, have this Day reported to his Majesty at this Board, That they have no Objection to His Majesty's signifying His Royal Approbation thereof—His Majesty in Council is therefore hereby pleased to declare His Approbation of the aforesaid Proposals, and to order, that the said Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty do cause the same to be carried into Execution.

INSTRUCTIONS for the Person Officiating as Judge Advocate.

WHEN the Court is not which is to consist of a President being not under the Degree of a Captain and not less than Eight other Officers none of them under the Degree of a Commissioned Officer you are to Administer to the Members the following Paths which you will find in the printed Articles of War fo. 33.

BEGINNING in both with the President whom as a Token of particular respect you are to swear singly And then you may proceed to Swear the other Members by as many at once as may be convenient.

You are then yourself to take an Oath which the President is to Administer in the Words prescribed in the Articles of War fo. 35.

You are also to Administer an Oath to every person who hath anything to give in evidence for or against the Daisondr.

You are to take particular care to Record all Evidence that shall be given and what is offered by the Prisoner in his own Defence observing in your Minutes and Especially in all Care of that great Weight where Life is concerned. And what may make for the Prisoner as well as what is Urged against him. For instance in cases of Desertion You are to write down the time when the person received pay as a Soldier what time he deserted and where he was, when taken as a Deserter and any other things you shall find material.

AND if at any time the Court shall think fit in consideration of any Alleviating Circumstances/to mitigate the punishment and by the Letter of the Martial Law/i.e. In such Cases, where a Discretional power is rested in the Court/ You are to record the reasons that moved the Court thereto in a very particular manner that the person or persons to whom the return is to be made may be thereby Enabled to Induce of the fact with certainty. And you are also to be Exact in taking the particulars of the Sentence.

WHEN all this is done you are to draw out in a fair Character a Draft of the proceedings as near as the Circumstances will admit, in the following Forms which is to be signed by the President and to be Transmitted to the person By Virtue of whose Order the Court is held by the very first Opportunity and that as well in Cards where the Sentence is confirmed by the Commander in Chief upon the Spot as where the proceedings are to be Laid before a Superior power for Approbation of the Sentence in the former Case, you will express the said Commander in Chiefs Confirmation of the Sentence And in both you will Remember that it is not to be Executed or made publish till duly Confirmed by the Proper Authority.

As to any other matter, that may Occur you are to have Regard to the Act of Parliament of the 27th Gos. the 2^d And the Articles of War annexed thereon.

The Court being duly sworn by taking the Oaths in fo. 33 in the Articles of War.

H : H : of Company was brought Prisoner before the Court and accused of Desertion.

He acknowledged himself to be a Soldier and to have received pay.

Serg^t. R : K : of the same Company with the Prisoner being sworn deposed that he saw the Prisoner at Breda on the 18th or 19th of March 1747/8 and gave him a weeks pay since which time the Prisoner having Deserted this Depon^t. never saw him till he was confined in the Savoy.

S : S : private Soldier of the same Company being also sworn Deposed; that the Prisoner was a Serjeant with the Company at Breda and that he saw him there on Sunday Morning which to the Best of his knowledge was on the 20th of March 1747/8 but from that time had never seen him till the 10th of this Month when he was Prisoner in the Savoy.

THE Prisoner being called upon to make his Defence submitted himself to the Determination of the Court and prayed that they would take into Consideration his being a Young Man and his having heretofore behaved himself well abroad and laid that he Delivered himself up to Captain Ramsey at Duncannon Fort the 10th March 1748/9.

BEING asked if he could produce any Evidence in proof of this last Circumstance, said he had no witness to Support the Same Nor Cou'd the Court upon Enquiry find any Person who cou'd either confirm or invalidate the said Assertion.

THEN Ensign C : R : of the Cold Stream Regiment of Foot Guards was Sworn being Desired by the Prisoner to Speak to his Character and Informed the Court that during the little time he was in the Company with the Prisoner no Complaint was made of him but to the best of his Remembrance he bore a good Character.

SERJ^T. I : F : of Colonel Lambtons Company being called to the same point deposed that he has known the Prisoner Seven or Eight Years and never heard that he behaved himself Amiss but that he always observed him to be a Clean Soldier and a Sober Man.

THE Prisoner Implored the Mercy of the Court and added that he should be glad to Serve in any of his Majestys Regiments.

THE Court having Maturely Weighed and Considered as well the Evidence given against the Prisoner Serj^t H. H. as what he offered in his defence Is of PINION that he is Guilty of Desertion and doth therefore adjudge that he shall suffer death.

PRISONER—I : D : private Soldier of the Kings Company in the first Regiment of Foot Guards was brought Prisoner before the Court and Accused of Desertion.

HE acknowledged himself to have Received pay as a Soldier.

G : W : of the said Company being Sworn deposed that the Prisoner received his Pay on the 24th of October last but on the 27th of the Same Month being the next pay Day he was absent and continued so a fortnight Whereupon Lord Charles Hay Captain of the Company advertized him as a Deserter with promise of Reward for apprehending him and further that the Prisoner was taken on the 19th of the last Month as this Depon^t was Informed and believes by one: F : of Lieutenant Colonel Colletons Company and confined in the Savoy.

SERJ^T. R : W : of the Same Company with the Prisoner Confirmed every part of the foregoing Evidence upon Oath.

I : F : private Soldier of Lieutenant Colonel Colletons Company deposed that he took up the Prisoner on Sunday the 19th of last Month at his Lodgings at Highgate where he found him Ripping the Lace from his Regimentals that he made no resistance but came quietly to Town.

THE Prisoner being told it was now time to make his Defence acknowledged his Crime but prayed the Mercy of the Court hoping that Consideration wou'd be had of his Youth as he show'd be but Twenty Years Old in next Month and their Intercession with his Majesty that he might be sent to Serve in one of the Regiments abroad.

THE COURT having duly considered the Evidence given in support of the Charge together with the Prisoner I : D ; submissⁿ. and request **IS OF OPINION THAT** he is Guilty of Desertion and Doth Adjudge that he shall receive 600 Lashes with Twigs on his Bare Back.

PRISONER—H : B : private Soldier of Lord Robert Manners Company in his Majestys first Regiment of Foot Guards was brought Prisoner before the Court and accused of Desertion.

He acknowledged himself to have received pay as a Soldier and hath had the Articles of war read to him.

SERJ^t. I : W : of the same Company with the Prisoner being Sworn Deposed that on the 16th February last he gave the Prisoner his last half Weeks pay That on the 19th of the Same Month he missed the Prisoner and never Saw him or heard of him again till the 12th of this instant August when he was confined in the Savoy.

CORPORAL I : H : of the same Company being also sworn Desposeth that he went about the 10th or 19th of February last to warn the Prisoner to be present at a Review — That the Prisoner told him he cou'd not come his accutremments not being in Order but this Depon^t. made answer he must come nevertheless with his Belt and Bayonet and such Accutremments as he cou'd— That however the Prisoner did not come.

CORPORAL W : M : of the same Company Deposeth upon Oath that he went to look for the Prisoner at his Quarters on or about the 29th of February last he having Missed the Review, That he found him there and sat down to Drink some Beer with him That the Prisoner told him he wou'd Just Step out for a Minute and return to him again But that after he went out the Depon^t. Saw him no more.

THIS DEPON^t. being asked at the Prisoners desire whether he then Charged him with Desertion or talked of making him a Prisoner.

ANSWERED YES, that he told the Prisoner he came to see after him because he Missed his duty and that he must make him a Prisoner.

CORPORAL E : B : of the same Company being Sworn Deposed that he was sent to Shaftsbury to fetch up the Prisoner whom he received from the Goal there on the Twelfth of last Month and brought him up to Town accordingly.

THE PRISONER being told it was now time to make his Defence he says that his first going away was forgiven him and that he had a Furlow sent down to him which he produced to the Court and which was signed by Lieutenant General Folliott the same bearing date the 11th of March so hold good for Ten Days.

THAT Immediately after Receiving the Furlow he was taken Ill and continued so 7 weeks and as soon as he began to Mend being about 9 Weeks ago he was Charged with Desertion and taken up by the Mayor of Shaftsbury but upon pleading his Illness to Exempt him from imprisonment and a Gentleman of the Country having given £100 Bail for him he had Liberty of the Town

granted him. That he was now pretty well recovered when he saw Corporal M. who was going to London with some Recruits and desired him to acquaint his Serjeant that his illness had detained him thus long but that he would soon come to Town he called for Corporal M: in support of his assertion, but the Corporal being out of Town upon Duty the Prisoner desired the following Witnesses might be Examined.

R: B: private Soldier in Lieutenant General Folliotts Company being sworn Deposed that on Thursday in Whitesun Week last being the 3rd of June he in Company with five other Recruits and Corporal M: Saw the Prisoner at Shaftsbury who told this Depon^t. he had been Ill and that he would have gone with them and the Corporal to the Regiment if he had not been to go to Lord Ilchester the next day, and that the Prisoner Desired the Corporal to acquaint his Serjeant that this Illness was the reason of his having staid so long in the Country but that he should come to Town very soon and this Depon^t. added that the Prisoner looked very Ill.
