TO THOMAS HEATH ESQ^R.
CHIEF OF VIZAGAPATAM.

SIR

We have received your Letters dated the 24th. Nov^r. and 5th. December but as you had not then received the Letter We wrote of the 24th. November, We shall say no more at present on the Subject of your Investment than to direct that you order to be provided at Uppara or such part of the Country where you may judge they may be best executed,

These last mentioned must be wove with Borders with sixteen Handkerchiefs in the Peice and each Handkerchief must be something less than 2 covids Square —We say nothing as to the price of these more than to let you understand that We expect not to have so much Writing on this occasion as we have had upon the other part of your Investment. These Beeteelas are to be the best your Merchants can make and the Thread must be even and well twisted.

Your accounts have undergone an Examination by a Committee appointed for that purpose, and you have herewith Copy of their remarks thereon, by which it appears that there are sundry Charges from January to October amounting to Pagodas 485–5–10 more than you had Authority to make by the Regulations sent you in November 1761, which sum must therefore be repaid into the Companys Cash.

The Serjeant Major at the Head of your Gun Peons must be paid in future nine Pagodas a Month only, that being the pay ours receive here. The Names of your Military or Artillery Men must be inserted monthly in your Accounts.

Besides the Charges of Provisions and Batta given to the Vacqueels of different Rajahs there is a charge every Month of eight or ten Pags. for Batta to & from Sundry Places. Your connections or Correspondence with the different Rajahs cannot be so great as to swell your Accounts much, if the particulars are mention'd Monthly and We direct therefore that they be so when we shall be better able to Judge also whether those Charges are necessary.

Five Pagodas is the sum we pay here to an European who enlists, or renews his Time for three Years, you must therefore pay no more, and in future the Man's name must be inserted in your Accounts with the name of the ship he arrived in and the year when, indeed as it is not our Intention to add to the Number of Men with you, it wou'd be more agreeable to us to have all deserters that may come to you sent hither and you must never inlist any such People 'till you have advised us who they are.

There appears also to be charged in your Accts. 6 Packers Monthly instead of the two we permitted you to keep, and in our Letter of the 27th. January last Year, We direct therefore that you repay also into the Company's Cash the

Amount of the Wages of those four Men from the first of January last to the time you receive this We say from the first of Janry. as by our Orders of the preceeding November you had no Liberty to keep any. now We will endeavor to put you into a Method to form your Accounts so as to save us such trouble as we have lately had. You must Sir, upon the receipt of this turn back to your Accounts for the Month of December 1761, and to our Orders sent you the Month before, you are then to Form therefrom a Months Account of your Expences, and you are to let that be the standard.

If your Accounts for the last Month are not made up before you receive this, We expect that they are made out conformable to the following Method Viz^t.

The above must be sufficient to explain to you in what Manner We wou'd have your Accounts kept, and you are to lose no time in setting about this Material Service.

With your next Month's Account you must send us up that which you 'form' for December 1764, agreeable to our above Instructions, that We may keep it by us to compare with all others We may Receive.

SIR

We have received your Letters dated the 15th. and 22^d. of December, together with the Estimate of the Losses you judge the Salt Farmer must sustain, by the severe Storm which has lately happened with you, and We are the more concerned at this as you apprehend he will not be able to pay what he is indebted to the Company, you must notwithstanding secure to them as much as you are able.

When you have made an Estimate of the Expence of repairing the Damages occasion'd to the Works by the late Storm you may send it to us Though We see little probability that it will be ever carried into Execution.

You have herewith a List of the Investment not already ordered to be provided at Masulipatam and Bandarmalanka this Year,—You must pay due Attention to the remarks made therein.

Conformable to the Directions of the Company Notice shou'd be given what quantities and kinds of Goods are required that Proposals may be made by the different Merchants for the Provision of them, you must therefore lose no time in giving this Notice.

We send you Musters of our Madrass Morees, & also some Peices which were made lately at Bandarmalanka with the Assistance of these & the Remarks made on them We hope you will be able to establish this Manufacture, the Numbers of Peices against each Sortment is conformable to our Honble Master's List of Investment and of all which We wou'd have you procure what Quantity you can, We do not however intend to desist from contracting for the usual Quantity here, at least till We have had some Experience of what may be provided in your Neighbourhood.

You may receive what Chay goods the merchants have brought in over & above their Contract, provided they are equal to Muster.

The Accounts of your settlement from the 1st. of December 1761, to the 31st. of October last having undergone the Examination of the Committee of Accounts you have herewith their Remarks on them with the Orders passed in Consequence.

You have likewise enclosed Captain Watson's receipt for Pagodas 6700 paid him here to impress his People and purchase such Stores as he was in want of.

By this Ship We consign to your Honor &^{CA}. a Box of Gold value Pagodas 17,808-13-65 as ^{pp} Invoice and Bill of Lading enclosed. We beg the Favour you will be pleased to inform us particularly of the produce in your Mint or by Sale, and whether it be more advantageous to send Gold in Bars or coined into Mohurs, that We may be better able to supply you in future in the most advantageous Manner.

Enclosed also is an Invoice of eighty Hammocks for the use of the Troops embarked on the Revenge and We have charged the Captain of the Ship to Account with you for them.

SIR

We can say nothing in answer to your Merchants Petition of the 21st. January relating to the Turn'd Out Cloth more than to refer you to what we wrote the 8th. of December, and to acquaint you that the Abatement to be made on such as you shall take in must be ten 卐 Cent.

Our Letter of the 8th. December says that you must make the Merchants pay double Duty upon such of the turn'd out Cloths as they shall take out of the Warehouse, we would not have you understand by this the [*sic*] we mean such as they had the last Year for as previous Notice was not given them they would with reason Complain, but you must make them acquainted that all which they bring in in time to come that shall be rejected by you for being short in measure, or badly Manufactured, shall be Taxed with the double Duty before mention'd.

We shall this day send you a supply of thirty thousand Pagodas.

SIR

For the more regularly conducting the Business of the Company's Investment, we have resolved that every Years Investment or Contract with the Merchants be concluded the 31st. of January, and that the Investment for the next Year Commence on the 1st. of February. That in the Contract with the Merchants two terms be limited for the delivery of their Goods Contracted for, one part before the 1st. of August, and the remainder before the 31st. of January, & if at the expiration of the last term the Merchants should not have delivered in Cloth to the full amount of the Advance made them, their Accounts must be closed & the Ballance paid in ready money, this done they may engage in fresh Contracts. but not otherwise.

We have great reason to think that the Merchants have been less solicitous to bring in Cloth equal to the Musters by which they Contract, because they

have been indulged with the Liberty of selling the turned out Cloth free of Custom & possibly may have made greater gains by the rejected Cloth than by that which has been taken in; to prevent this in future, we have agreed with our Merchants that all the Cloth which shall be rejected shall pay a double Duty to the Company, and this you also must observe as a Rule not to be deviated from on any Account, as we have already advised you, you must therefore acquaint your Merchants of this our Resolution; as well as that all Cloth short of Measure either in Length or Breadth is also to pay a double Duty as often as it is found deficient in either.

Enclosed is a List of Goods to be provided by you for the Current Year to be reckoned from the 1st. Instant to the 31st. January 1764, On receipt of this you will call your Merchants together & acquaint them that we are firmly resolved to put the Investment on the most advantageous footing for the Company that the Circumstances of the Country can possibly admit of, and that if they are not willing to engage on such terms we shall endeavour to find others that will, receive from them proposals, which must by no means exceed the Prices of last Year, on the Contrary we expect an Abatement, but if it should be necessary to continue the last Year's Prices, the Quality of the Cloths must be very considerably mended, This observation respects the Goods of every kind, but in regard to the Blue Cloth Midling, We must particularly take Notice that the Price is too large; Upon reference to our Books from the year 1749 to 1758 We find that the No. 1 has indeed sometimes Cost Pag. 61 ₹ Corge including the Charge of dying, but we also find that it has oftener been Invoiced, Viz^t. No. 1 @ 46—No. 2 at 45 & No. 3 @ 44 sometimes half a Pagoda ₹ Corge less and Pag^s. 13 ₹ Cargo for dying & these were the Prices in 1756, 1757 and 1758, We therefore expect to have this Article reduced at least to the old Prices.

The Advance to be made to the Merchants this Year is to be in the same proportion as last Year that is to say 25 ₹ Cent on the full value of all the Cloth Contracted to be delivered in the Year, this sum is to remain in the Merchants hands as an Advance, they are to be paid for their Cloth as they bring it in and the Advance is to be reckoned in payment of the Cloth brought in to close and Compleat the Contract.

We wrote to you the first Instant that you might take in such of the Merchants turned out Cloth as answered in length and breadth at an Abatement of 10 ₹ Cent some of this cloth we think might answer for dying such of it therefore as may be proper for that purpose must be dyed but we cannot help repeating that We are not satisfied with the last Years Price of P^s. 15. ., 18 ₹ Corge for dying.

As soon as you have received proposals from your Merchants you must transmit them to us and wait for our Directions thereon.

SIR

We have received your several Letters of the 19th. 23^d. & 25th. January to which we shall now reply.

But first we must inform you that it is our earnest desire that as nearly as possible the same general plan be pursued in all parts in the Provision of the Company's Investment. These general Rules are to be observed, viz. that the Contracts with the Merchants for the Year's Investment commence the 1st. of February and end the 31st. of January, of the next Year that two Periods be (be?) fixed for the delivery of the Cloth contracted for, that is to say one part before the 1st. of August and the remainder before the 31st. of January, that twenty five $\frac{3}{4}$ Cent be advanced to the Merchants on the Value of the Goods they Contract to provide in the whole year if you think them responsible Men which advance is to remain in their hands untill the Conclusion of the Contract, that the Cloth they bring in from time to time be paid for as it is sorted and accepted, and that the Advance be accounted for in the last parcells of Cloth brought in before the 31st. January, the Merch^{ts}. accounts are then to be closed & if the Cloth received should not amount to the full value of the advance the Ballance is to be paid in ready money, and a new contract and advance may then be made for the succeeding Year. Some Part of these Directions have been sent you before, but we repeat them here that you may see at one View the Plan we wish to have observed, pursuant hereto all the Goods that shall have been delivered in by your Merchants before the 31st. of January must be deemed the Investment of last Year, and their accounts must in manner above directed be adjusted to that time, and such Goods as you shall receive afterwards must be reckoned a part of this Year's Investment.

You observe that notwithstanding the great Difference made in the Prices of the several sortments of Cloth between No. 1 & 2 in order to promote the Improvement of the Manufacture, the Merchants bring in chiefly the two lowest Numbers of the fine & ordinary in which they find their Account, as the lower Numbers contain proportionally a less number of threads or Punjums, to remedy this, you recommend, that in future Contracts the Difference should only be in the Prices of the several Numbers of each sortment, and not in the Punjums but that all which shall be brought in of each sort, shall be of one established Punjum. The Method we follow here differs from what you propose only in this, that instead of paying the Merchant Different prices for the three Numbers we contract by a Muster of each Sortment for only one Price of one sortment that is to say one Price for fine, one for Midling and one for Ordinary and all the cloth which proves remarkably inferior to the Muster upon sorting it brown should be rejected, and then the Cloth accepted upon such sorting after being washed is sorted into three Numbers for the Companys Account and this is the Method we intended should have been pursued at the Northern settlements, as you will find by our Letter of the 14th. May wherein we direct that the

but the Merchants as We understand refused to Contract in this Manner and offer'd proposals to provide Cloths of different punjums at different prices for each Number of Punjums, and we were at last obliged to accept of the terms as you find them, because the Merchants would not comply with those we proposed. for it is contrary to our Inclination to receive any Cloth inferior to 16 Punjum.

If therefore you should now find it practicable to introduce the method we use here, we would by all means have you do so, and in that Case your Contracts must run thus.

and upon sorting the Cloth Crown all that shall appear inferior to Muster should be turned out, and may afterwards be taken in if we shall think it proper at such an Abatement as may be judged proportionate to the Inferiority of its Quality, or if we should not think fit to take it at any rate the Merchant must then be charged with a penalty of 10 3/4 cent on the value thereof to the Company. As they must also for all Cloth short of Measure either in length or breadth, which must on no Acco^t. to be taken in this Condition our Merchants here have submitted to, and is absolutely necessary to prevent their making use of the Company's Advance to provide Cloths which they know must be rejected, and which they afterward may sell for Gain to private Merchants, but if you should find it impossible to introduce this Method, we should even prefer to the present Terms, the Plan you propose of fixing one Number of Punjums for each sortment as above viz. 16-18- and 24 Punjums sorting each into three Numbers for the Merchant's Account, at a different price for each Number provided those prices be equally advantageous to the Company concerning which we desire you will write us particularly after having discoursed with your Merchants. In the mean time we would have you proceed on the former plan that the Provision of the Investment may not be retarded.

In our Letter of the 5th. January we sent you a List of such of Goods to be provided as had not already been ordered on account of this year's Investment, as we intend this Letter to be a general Guide to you in the whole Year's Investment for the sake of regularity we now enclose a Compleat List of all the Goods we would have provided at Masulipatam and Bandarmalanka from the 1st. of this Instant February to the 31st. of January 1764 to which we refer.

In respect to the Contract you propos'd to make with Lachum Chitty Erapah for Superfine Long Cloth &c^a. we can only say that should the Qualitys be answerable to the Prices we shall approve it as the Quantitys & Sortments correspond exactly with our Directions, the Musters you promise to send us will enable us, when we receive them, to determine.

The usual Presents to the Merchants may be continued as well as those to the People attending at the Rivers, Collectors of the Revenues Circar Officers &c^a. But we cannot at Present fully comply with your Indent, the non arrival of the Walpole (on which ship the Woollen Goods for this Presidency were laden) leaving us extreamly bare of the Articles you desire, such as can be spared shall be sent you.

Such Warehouses and other Buildings at Bandarmalanka as are really necessary and proper for carrying on the Investment Lodging the Bales &c^a. must undoubtedly be Repaired or New ones Built, but first you will direct a Plan and Estimate to be made which you will transmit to us with such Information as may enable us to give you our Directions thereon.

The Washing Stones you Indent for shall be sent by the first Conveyance.

We shall also take the first safe Opportunity to furnish Mr. Heath with ten thousand Madrass Pagodas or more.

Mr. Richard Brickenden has our Permission to return to this Place agreeably to his Request, and we have appointed Mr. George Dawson to assist you in his stead.

The Apollo Ketch safely imported here, and we have landed 150 Bales from Bandarmalanka & 22 Bales of Chay Goods from you, which have been examined and we desire you will acquaint Mr. Dolben he has given us great satisfaction in the Care he appears to have taken in the Investment.

The Long Cloths Fine & Midling tho' good we hope may be improved, the Long Cloth Ordinary is better in Proportion to its Price.

Finding the Chay Goods so much better and cheaper than of late years, we now order you to provide double the quantity, but to receive none of the No. 3^s. The Romalls provided last year are chanked and conjee'd which is contrary to the Company's orders.

Our Allejars the Company have ordered none but as the Bale lately sent us is much superior to what was formerly provided we have order'd a few Bales and you are to be careful not to receive any of No. 3 all the Chay Goods to be sent home being expressly ordered to be of a Bright Red.

Although two Packers only were allowed at Bandarmalanka by the Regulation made in November 1761 yet as you represent that four more are necessary for the Bussyness of the Investment you have our permission to entertain them and to charge the Number employed since the Investment has been coming in.

We have examined the several Proposals you sent us for renting the Toddy and arrack Farm, and that made by Tadapala Ramanapah, being the highest Viz^t. Five thousand two hundred Rupees $\frac{3}{4}$ Annum we have accepted his Offer as you inform us he was the last Renter, and is a responsible Man and we enclose a Cowle for the same.

HONBLE SIR & SIRs

We have received the Letter you did us the Honor to write us the 15th. January in regard to the deceased Mr. Robert Sloper, we must acknowledge ourselves much obliged to you for the attention you are pleased to shew towards us in communicating to us the steps that have been taken in regard to his affairs, but particularly in the Offer you are pleased to make us of administering the Estate of the deceased, which may be found under your Jurisdiction according to the Laws of England.

The Form which our Laws prescribe are first that search be made amongst the deceased's papers for his Will & if a Will be found the Person or Persons named therein as Executors must produce the same in the Court which is established here for that & other purposes of Justice, out of which Court a proper authority then Issues to such Executors to take upon them the Administration of the deceased affairs & in default of a Will the next of Kin or Principal Creditor may obtain such a Power, but we ourselves as a Governor & Council are not authorised to take upon us the Charge or administration of the deceased's

Estate, In order therefore that the Offer you are pleased to make us of suffering the deceaseds Effects under your Jurisdiction to be administred according to the English Constitution may take Effect we request that you will be pleased to permit a diligent search to be made amongst the deceased's Papers &c^a. for his Will, and if the same should be found, that the Executors therein named may be permitted to lodge the same in our Court here in order to their obtaining the Powers aforementioned and then proceed according to Law in the administration.

We have not received any Letters from you since our last of the 29th. December dispatch'd by Tappies in Duplicate, though by private Advices we have the Pleasure to learn that our Hon'ble Master's ships the Houghton and Earl of Ashburnham are safely arrived with you.

The Osterly after the surrender of Manilha (of which you have been advised from the other Department) having been dispatch'd for China the 26th. of October on the 1st. of November met with a violent Gale of Wind in the Latitude of 17 N^o. which obliged the Captain to bear away for Mallacca, from whence he was induced to return hither, as his want of Men & the Conditions of his Ship in other respects would have render'd an Attempt to proceed by the Pitt's Passage impracticable, not having any particular Employment for this ship on the Coast we now dispatch her to you in hopes that she will be able to return in time to proceed to China early the ensuing Season, & we take the Opportunity of sending by her some Cannon as you are more particularly advised in a separate Letter we have landed her Cargo intended for China except the Redwood and Lead.

As we would not have the Osterly run the least hazard of having a late passage to China we have ordered Capt. Vincent in case he shall find no Prospect of being with you by the end of the present Month to return to this Place.

We beg leave to refer you to the enclosed Copy of our Master Attendants representation concerning the Cause of the Leak which the Britannia sprung in this Road your Honour &c^a. will from thence be enabled to judge what degree of Credit is due to Capt. Deleas Statement of Facts.

It never was intended that the Owners should be at the Charge of Victualing the Troops sent on board the Brittannia at Cuddalore to be landed here, and if the Chief of Cuddalore did order them on board without making the necessary Provision it might be a want of attention in him but could certainly give no reasonable pretence to Capt^t. Delea to write to him in the rude and disrespectful manner which he did upon that & other occasions, the truth of the matter is that it did not suit Capt. Deleas Humour to perform that or any other Service.

Whenever your Honour &c^a. shall find it necessary to freight any Vessels round to this Coast on the Company's Accot^t. if you will be pleased to send us a Copy of the agreement you enter into with the Owners, we shall be careful not to exceed the Limitation, but when you signify to us only in general terms that the Vessell is at the Company's Charge untill her return to you we are to conclude that we are at Liberty to employ her untill the Season permitt her return, In respect to the Fata Salam we have already fully explained ourselves, and can take no blame on us for the accident which happen'd to her, in regard to the Brittannia we beg you will [b]e pleased to turn back to the letter you wrote to us dated the 27th. The Cloth used for Wrappers to Your Bales must always be taken from such of the Company's Cloth as have been torn or damaged at the Wash, this is the Practise here, and the Warehousekeeper receives them at the Price they cost the Company. If care is taken we see not how the Torn Cloths can well be more in Quantity than what are used for Wax Cloth & Wrappers, (particularly in the Long Cloth Ordinary) as it is near two $\frac{3}{4}$ Cent and thô we now permit you to sell at Outcry the Torn and damaged Cloths you have on hand over and above what may be necessary for the Package of your present Bales we expect that you make the Washers pay for all the Torn Cloths over & above two $\frac{3}{4}$ Cent in future as we are persuaded it can never amount to that unless they are very negligent.

The Committee of Accounts having on Examination of your Accounts pointed out some erroneous Entries, as you will observe by the enclosed Copy of their Report, you will cause the same to be rectified in the manner they recommend.

The Supra Cargoes & Agents for the English Nation a[t] Canton, have represented to us, that in their intercourse with your settlement at Macao, they have for some time past been subjected to such Difficulties & unfriendly treatment as neither they, or We, can conceive to have their Foundation in any orders from his most faithful Majesty, or from your Excellency. amongst many other instances, they mention this, That in 1760 the senate published an Order, by Beat of Drum prohibiting the Inhabitants of Macao, to Rent their Houses to Foreigners with their Consent, and even ordered, that they should not have leave to possess the Houses they had already rented of the Proprietors, without first petitioning the Senate in a very humble manner, which Custom still subsists and is extremely inconvenient to those who are obliged to go to Macao, and who are sometimes forced to remain in their Boats, till the senate assembles and grants their Petition, and then they are again obliged to Petition the Governor before the Proprietor of an House can admit them. This Treatment is very different from that, which is shewn to the subjects of his most faithful Majesty who trade from Macao to the English Settlements in India. We pass over many other Instances, as we do not intend this address so much by way of Complaint—for what is past, as that your Excellency being informed that the English are subjected to much unfriendly usage, and unreasonable Difficulties at Macao, may interpose your authority, to restore that harmony, and friendly intercourse which heretofore subsisted. We do not ask any thing in your Ports, but what has allways been granted in ours, and as such reciprocation is founded in reason, we cannot doubt of a favourable issue.

We have received your Favour of the 26th. of March.

Major Duff of His Majesty's 89th. Regiment having applied to us for an advance of one thousand Pagodas for the subsistence of the Detachment of that Regiment under his Command, we have advanced the same, and agreeable to your desire have taken a sett of Bills of Exchange drawn by him for the same on Major Hector Munro at Bombay, the first of which is enclosed.

The Windsor arrived here from Bengal at the 14th. of last Month, and as the time which must be employed in landing the Consignments for the squadron would advance so far in the season as to render her Passage round to your Coast in the common Track impracticable, and by the Southern Passage she could not arrive in time to be of any assistance to the Ships of this season, we have therefore taken the Liberty to land the two hundred Tons of Salt Petre on board her consign'd to your Presidency which will enable us to dispatch a ship to Europe in August, and a further supply from Bengal may reach you in time to be as usefull in your next Dispatch as this could have been, had we not taken this ship of which we have advised the Gentlemen there and hope you will deem these Reasons sufficient We have opened the Packet for your Honor &c^a. by the Windsor to take a Copy of the Invoice and forward it herewith.

The Company's Supra cargoes in China have acquainted us that they have of late been subjected to many Difficulties and unfriendly usage at Macao and have desired us to represent the same to the Vice Roy at Goa. We have accordingly address'd a Letter to him on that subject which We enclose under a flying Seal for your Perusal as also a Copy of what the Supracargoes write us on this subject, requesting that you will be pleased to cause our Letters to be forwarded and support it by one from yourselves if you shall see proper.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We have received your several Letters by the Clinton, Houghton, Grampus Sloop & Snow Leopard dated the 10th. & 14th. of February & 4th. of March also one by the Fort St. George of the 17th. of March, with that of the 10th. of February. ¶ Clinton came the Packet from England for this Presidency by the Earl of Ashbumham.

The Supra Cargoes at Canton having wrote to us very pressingly for an early supply of Treasure this season we shall dispatch the Houghton thither in a few days with five Lacks of Rupees, and with the assistance lately received from your Honor & c^a. we hope to be able to furnish them to the amount of sixteen or eighteen Lacks for the Occasions of this year's shipping.

The Greyhound Snow will proceed to the West Coast with a part of the Stores for that Presidency as you recommend & the rest forwarded by the earliest opportunity The Articles you cannot spare to compleat the West Coast Indent for Medicines shall be supplied from hence as far as we are able.

The Windsor did not arrive here until the 14th. of last Month, and as the time which must be employed in landing the Consignments for the Squadron would advance so far in the season as to render her Passage round to the other Coast in the Common Track impracticable, and by the southern Passage she could not arrive in time to be of any assistance to the Ships of this season we have therefore resolved to land the two hundred Tons of Salt Petre on board her consigned to the Presidency of Bombay which will enable us to Dispatch a Ship to Europe in August and a further supply from you to Bombay may reach them in time to be as useful in their next Dispatch as this could have been had we not taken this step. After the Dispatch of our August Ship we apprehend we shall again be left very bare of Salt Petre even for the making of Gunpowder we therefore request your Honour & c^a. will please to make what Provision you can for us.

The Bills of Exchange you drew on us as advised in your Letters of the 14 of February were not dated, they have nevertheless been duely honour'd as well as that mention'd in yours of the 17th. of March, If you could in your future Drafts settle the rate of Exchange instead of leaving it to the Curr^t. Course here it would be much better, because whilst Rupees continue here so scarce as they are at present it is in the Power of any Person here to raise the nominal Rate of Exchange or what is call'd the Buzar Rice many $\frac{7}{8}$ C^{ts}. in one day by only intimating a Necessity or intention of purchasing a sum and although not a Rupee perhaps may be bought or sold at that nominal Exchange yet it passes as the Curr^t. Price and may involve us in Disputes with the Bill holders, however if you should find it difficult to settle the Exchange we must do it in the best manner we can

The Grampus Sloop shall be returned to you on the arrival of the first ship from Europe, with the Packet from your Presidency as you desire.

It is with great Concern we acquaint you that by private Advices from Canton dated the 8th. of January we learn that our Honble Master's Ship Elizabeth was destroyed by Fire, as she lay of Linting Bar and that the Captain, second Mate & thirty more perished in her, Five other Ships were laying there at the same time homeward bound, and two remain'd at Canton which were to be dispatch'd in a few days.

GENTLEMEN

We have received your Letter of the 8th. November 1762 and a Duplicate of the same with an addition without Date, we at the same time with the last, received a letter dated the 20th. of December from the Gentlemen then of Council at Canton our Answer to both is with Propriety we believe address'd to you.

We are sorry to find that the Ship Grosvenor had not reached you at the Date of the above Letters we address'd you by her the 10th. of September and now enclose a Duplicate.

We could have wish'd that the Exigency of affairs at Manilha had not necessarily demanded the detention of so much of the Treasure originally intended for China, but it was not in our Power to supply that service otherwise.

We are very sensible how important a Branch the China Trade is to our Honble Masters, and shall therefore contribute at all times our utmost endeavours towards the Promotion of it. The Gentlemen at Bengal having consign'd to us five Lacks of Rupees with this Assistance we shall certainly consign to you this season at least fifteen Lacks were silver procurable, we should encrease the sum very considerably but the scarcity of that article is such that we dare not give you any assurances of a larger supply, although we are not without hopes of collecting two or three Lacks more before the Departure of the latter ships.

By this Ship the Houghton which arrived from Bengal the 6th. of last Month we consign to you five Lacks in Treasure together with some Cotton and a small quantity of Redwood agreeable to Invoice and Bill of Lading enclosed herewith, you will also receive a Packet from the President & Council of Fort William.

The Osterly not being able to gain her Passage to China from Manilha returned to this Place in January we have sent her to Bengal on particular service & after her return shall dispatch her to you as early in the season as possible.

The Cotton sent to you last Year having been transhipped from the Royal Captain to the Essex & Osterly without being landed, the Weight of it could not be ascertain'd that which you will receive by this ship was the Portion intended last year by the Osterly.

The Redwood which makes a part of the Houghton's Invoice was laden before the receipt of your Letter of the 20th. of December, wherein you represent the Market to be over stock'd with that Article and we shall therefore desist from sending any more untill your further advices.

We shall observe the Precaution you recommend of having Birds Nest packed in Chests to prevent it from breaking if we should have a further supply of that Article to send you.

We have directed the Gentlemen at Manilha to assist you if they should have it in their Power with the means of transporting thither the Bale Goods intended for Sooloo which you rec^d. by the Royal Captain as you inform us they are not vendable at Canton, but we must refer to what they may write you on this subject.

Mess^{rs}. Dalrymple and Kelsall returned hither in the London from Sooloo the latter end of March having by the non-arrival of the Royal Captain and other Accidents been prevented from fulfilling the Intention of the Voyage. They however judged it expedient to enter into a new contract with the Sooloos in consequence of which we purpose directing one of the ships destin'd for China this season to call there and receive the Goods they have agreed to provide.

The Tilbury sail'd from Bengal for Europe towards the end of December, and the Drake & Hardwicke the 3^d. of March, The Earl of Ashburnham and Royal George were to follow in all that Month. The Clinton being arrived here is now under dispatch for Europe.

The Walpole was unfortunately taken off Ceylon in the month of September by a Squadron of French ships consisting of the Vengeur of 64 Guns, The Conde of 50 and the Fidelle Frigate of 18 Guns, They afterwards took their

Station off Ballasore Road towards the end of December where they continued till the middle of February without doing further Damage than taking two or three Country Vessels and retarding the Departure of our shipping.

We have in consequence of your desire address'd the Vice Roy of Goa on the subject of your Complaints should we receive any answer before the Departure of the latter ships we shall not fail to communicate the same to you.

We mean their Pay only not their Batta or Diet.

Lieutenant Richbell was included among those Officers for whom Major More rec^d. the Amount of their Passage Money, we should suppose that Major More has accounted with that Gentleman had we not seen a Note drawn by Mr. Richbell for eighty Rupees on that Accot. this money must be repaid into the Company's Cash, and you will please to make this known to the Commanding Officer of the Regiment, that the necessary Enquiry may be made whether the Error is on Mr. Richbells' side, or whether Major More omitted to pay him.

GENTLEMEN

As the purport of the Advices received from you will be particularly reply'd to in a separate Letter it is only necessary to acquaint you here that your Indents are now complied with by the Ships Houghton and London as far as the several Articles can be spared from our Stores no part of the Woolen Goods can be sent you untill we receive a supply from Europe which we may shortly expect.

It being necessary that the Houghton should arrive in China as early as possible with the Treasure she has on board consign'd to the Supra Cargoes, you will on no account detain her longer than may be indispensably required for landing the seapoys and Stores, and we must also enjoin you not to detain any of her Treasure unless upon the most pressing Emergency, as it cannot fail of being a very great Interruption to the China Investment should you be able to supply the supra cargoes in China with Treasure you will advise them by this ship of the amount.

The Royal Captain having missed the Island of Sooloo last Year and carried to Canton the Bale Goods intended for the former Place, which the Supra cargoes write us are not saleable at Canton, if it should be in your power to assist the supra cargoes with the Means for having them conveyed to Manilha we recommend to you to do so concerning which you will write them by this Conveyance and in that case you will dispose of them to the best advantage for the Company.

We shall dispatch the Honble Company's Ship London to Sooloo, where she may probably remain till the end of August, and then she is to proceed to you to be repaired, which you will cause to be done as compleatly as may be, and

she may then be employed on whatever service you may deem to be most for the Company's Advantage. In case you should have no occasion for her services she is to be return'd to us.

The Hector arrived here the 26th. of May from Tellicherry having received on board there 225 Candies of Pepper amounting to Rupees 25895-80 as she was by bad weather prevented from calling at Anjengo we have landed here The Treasure & small Arms she had on board for that Place & shall forward them thither by the first opportunity.

The Britannia having fallen to leeward of this Port the Captain was under the necessity of putting in at Mazulipatam. We have directed him to land the Military & Stores he has on board for this Place, & we shall order the Hector to call at Mazulipatam with the Treasure we intend sending in the Britannia to China.

The Houghton sailed for Manilha & China the 23^d. of last month, by her we consign'd to the Supra Cargoes five lacks of Rupees & by the Hector & Britannia we shall send them a further supply of six lacks.

Our Honble Master's Ship Neptune arrived here the 31st. of May, she left England the 31st. of January in Company with the Hawke & Plassey & parted from them about the middle of the same Month.

Our Honble Masters advise us that they shall consign to us by the Coast & China Ships 1990 Bales of Woollen Goods for your Presidency, We shall forward them to you by the first good opportunity that may offer after we have rece'd them.

HONBLE SIR & SIRs

We have received your several letters dated the 22^d. & 23^d. of September and 18th. of October last.

The Gentlemen at Bengal not having an opportunity of conveying to you from thence the several stores you indented to them for, sent a part of them hither on the Clinton We therefore now forward them to you by the Snows Greyhound & c^a. Leopard with such parts of your Indents to us as we can at present send according to the respective Invoices and Bills of lading enclosed & as they also acquainted us that they could not fully comply with your Indent to them for Medicines we have agreeably to their desire compleated it here. These Vessels being too small to carry over any Cattle, we must defer supplying you therewith till a more convenient opportunity.

The Greyhound Snow being intended for the service of your Presidency we have given directions to the Master to remain under your Orders—Mr. George Scott who arrived here from Bengal in the Houghton now proceeds to his station at Fort Marlborough in her. We have referr'd the Master to you for payment of his Passage.

Mr. Randolph Marriot returned here from Batavia in September last, and paid in a Ballance remaining in his hands of Pagodas 449-28 he at the same time delivered to us a Bar of Gold which having been assay'd we have carried the value thereof with the Ballance abovementioned to the Credit of Fort Marlborough as you will observe by our Account Current with your Presidency enclosed.

Mr. Marriot at the same time represented to us that having applied to Mr. Baars the Dutch Resident at Cuddalore for payment of a Bill of Exchange drawn upon him & Mr. Camper of Negapatam from Batavia for Pagodas 250 he protested the Bill on account of the non arrival of a Vessel belonging to Mr. Bouchier and others. We encloses the said Bill of Exchange with the Protest for non payment that you may take proper measures for recovering the amount at Batavia.

We received a Letter from the General & Council at Batavia dated the 1st. July 1762 in answer to that we wrote them by Mr. Marriot concerning Natal and Tappanoully, and the seizure of English Vessels on the Coast of Sumatra—Copy of their Letter & of the letters therein referr'd to are enclosed.

The Court of Directors having in their Letter dated the 2^d. of April 1762 advised that an Exchange of their servants belonging to the West Coast Establishment who gave Paroles not to serve against the French during the present War had taken Place, and enclosed the Certificates they had received in consequence. We now forward the same to you pursuant to their Directions with Extracts of such parts of their Letter as relate thereto.

The Certificates you advise in your Letter of the 22^d. September to have granted for money received into the Honble Company's Cash at Fort Marlborough have been duely paid.

In consequence of what you write us in your Letter of the 23^d. of September last concerning the Sum of D^{rs}. 260 - 80 received into Cash at Fort Marlborough in 1758 on account the Estate of Mr. John Gray deceased We have order'd it to be paid here to Mr. Forrest's Attorney. and shall debit your Presidency for the same.

Having several Blacks in Confinement for Crimes, we have embarked them on board these two Vessells agreeable to a List inclosed, and recommend to you to employ them at the Plantations as a means to prevent any further bad Effects of their Idleness.

We have not any particular service to propose by your dispatching the Plassey to Manilha and must therefore leave it entirely to your determination.

The Houghton sailed hence for China the 26th. of May, by her we Consigned 5 lacks of Rupees to the Supracargoes there, and the Gentlemen at Bombay having sent round to us the Hector and Britannia We shall by those Ships consign to them a further supply of six lacks.

Our Honble Masters Ship Neptune from England imported here the 31st. of May & Hawke the 16th. Instant.

The Clinton receiv'd her dispatches for England the 11th. Instant.

Having appointed Mr. John Smith to succeed you in the Chiefship of Vizagapatam, He now proceeds in the King of Prussia Snow with Mess^{rs}. The Ship Royal Captain being so unfortunate as to lose her Passage to Sooloo last Year, lays us under the necessity of sending the Neptune thither and of troubling you to go in her, that we may be assured of the Company's affairs there being managed in the best manner they can be under the Circumstances they now stand.

The Gentlemen at Manilha have inform'd us they intended to send to Sooloo a Sloop with the Sultan's son & the Cargo the Royal Captain carried from hence last Year If these Goods are not deliver'd before your arrival it must be left to your discretion whether they shall be included in the late Contract or otherwise disposed of and if either by this or any unforeseen accident it should be necessary to leave a Ballance at Sooloo you will engage the Natives to procure Sago, Mother of Pearls & Birds Nest for that amount for one of the Company's ships which will be ordered to call at Sooloo next season in her way to China & you may acquaint the Sooloos that they may load on her at Freight Swallow & such gruff Goods at their own Risk but none are to be receiv'd on the Company's Accot.

You will embrace the opportunity if any offers of settling the Sultan's account but if it cannot be done at present without difficulties you must give us the most particular Information of the measures proper for this end.

We shall give directions that the London convey to Sooloo the former Sultan from Manilha and you may make Provision for a Cargo of Cowries, Sago, Mother of Pearl & Birds Nest for her.

The remains of the Musters which were not received at the London's departure must be transported to Canton & if you can obtain any other Specimen you are to do so.

You are permitted to call at Abai to take on board the Man left there for an Interpreter to the Royal Captain and if you meet the Goa Ambassador you will inform him that the Treaty concluded last Year if the Sultan approves of it shall be transmitted to the Compy.

Captain Steward has been paid one hundred Pagodas for your Passage to Canton.

We shall dispatch one ship from hence in September & we keep the Plassey for that purpose, as in course of her arrival she will enter first on Demorage. We think we may besides provide about two hundred Tons of Bales for a March Ship but concerning this we shall advise you further hereafter.

The Admiral Pocock we propose to send to Manilha that she may be their [*sic*] in readiness to assist in withdrawing that settlement, and as we are inform'd, Cotton is in no demand with you, we shall send to China the Cotton on board the Pocock consign'd to you, which we hope you will approve & we have taken the liberty to open the Packet address'd to you from Bombay by that Ship to take out the Invoice of the Cotton the amount whereof we shall put to your Credit.

According to this disposition there will remain three Ships on this side unprovided for, these may probably be dispatch'd to Manilha to bring away the Company's servants & Effects should the Receipt of the Definitive Treaty authorize such a measure & their arrival in time render it practicable otherwise they must proceed to you.

Your Honors &c^a. will perceive that many things may happen so as to break this Disposition, in any such case we shall give you as early Notice as possible.

By the Company's Invoice it appears there were two (not three) Chests of Medicines consign'd to us, and Capt. Rogers informs us that he deliver'd to you those two &

With our last dated the 2^d. Instant 3^r. Pattamar of which Duplicate comes enclosed we forwarded a Packet receiv'd from Europe by the Plassey for your Presidency. We now send you that received by the Falmouth & have the pleasure to acquaint you that the Deptford arriv'd here the 15th. and his Majesty's Ship Liverpoole the 18th. Instant.

The Admiral Pocock imported the 26 Inst. and brought us your favor of the 26 Ultimo.

The Boscawen & Osterly being unable to get out of the River of Bengal the Gentlemen there intend to dispatch them to Europe from thence, and as we shall have several ships on hand this year we purpose sending the Admiral Pocock to Manilha that she may be there in readiness to assist in withdrawing that Settlement when News shall be receiv'd of the Definite Treaty having taken place and as we are inform'd that Cotton is in no demand at Bengal, we shall send that, you consign'd thither by the Admiral Pocock to China in the Falmouth now under dispatch.

Our Honble Master's having inform'd us that they intend to dispatch the Lord Mansfield and a New Ship Maitland, to Bombay so early as that they may be sent round to us this season, and that they are then to be deem'd Coast and Bay Ships, and are to be provided for accordingly, and as they will probably be of the Number intended to be dispatch'd home from the Bay, We are to request you will send them round to us as early as possible after their arrival with you.

It is certain that the Company will sustain a Loss if our detention of the Salt Petre intended you by the Windsor should oblige you to keep a ship on demorage, but as we should not have been able without that Assistance to have dispatch'd home a Ship in September, in either Case one Ship must have lain on Demorage and it is the same thing whether the Loss is incurred here or with you. This however was not our motive for landing it here our reasons are explain'd fully in our letter of the 7th. of May.

We have taken the opportunity of sending a supply of Rice to Fort Marlborough by the Ship Prince Henry and Luconia Snows and they will proceed thither in a day or two.

The Hawke received her Dispatches for China the 20th. Instant.

In the Estimate you have transmitted to us of the expence in repairing the Company's Buildings at Vizagapatam, there are some that do not appear to us necessary, particularly the Hospital & Guard Houses, as it has never been our Intention to keep any considerable Garrison there. You have our permission to lay out as far as five hundred Pagodas in repairing the Godowns, and such other Buildings as are of immediate Consequence, to preserve them from decay.

The same reason makes it unnecessary also to give any particular directions on Lieutenant Smiths Report to you concerning Repairs to the Works & Military Stores required to put the Town in a State of defence. Your best security will be to maintain a good understanding with the Country Powers in your Neighbourhood, which must therefore be your constant and principal Attention—and if you should ever be in danger of an attack as it will be in vain to think of preparing to resist any Force of Consequence, you must secure the Company's effects & retire to Madras or Bengal as the Season may best serve, and remain always prepared as well as possible for such an Emergency.

Mr. Pybus is directed to supply you when he has an opportunity with some Barrels of Gun Powder principally intended for your small Arms and we shall furnish you from time to time with such other Stores as we have and may appear necessary.

We have a great demand for small Arms and our Stock is very small.

The remainder of your Indent for Stores shall be sent as soon as they can be spared.

The Villages of Chinnamanaick Pollan & Naidput have been let to Rent to Nella Chitty and Ramalinga for a Term commencing from the 16th. of October last to the 31st. July 1764 for Pagodas 1270. Our Principal Intention in obtaining the Grant of these Villages from the Nabob was on account of their being chiefly Inhabitated by Weavers to whom all possible Encouragement must be given that every means in our power may be employ[ed . . .] the Company's Investment and altho' you do not give us hopes of above 200 Bales by the end of January, we depend on your best endeavours to procure as much more as possible as we apprehend if we are not well assisted from the Subordinates that we may fall short of a Loading for next Dispatch.
