GENTLEMEN

We have Received Your's of the 26th. Ult^o. likewise the Packet that Accompanied it from the President and Council of Fort William.

Although Marmelon is under the Jurisdiction of S^t. Thomé and certainly one of the Dependencies of Madrass, M^r. LaMettrie may have permission to reside at his House there Untill You Receive our further directions in that Respect.

We Observe what You mention Regarding the Theft Committed by Maul Rauze's People to Prevent which in future, We shall in few days Appoint a New Polligar.

As the Expence of Maintaining the SeaPoys likewise the Horses that are kept with You for the Security of the Place and the Slaves Occasions our Paymasters Accounts into which they have been hitherto brought to Amount to a large Sum, We direct that the same in future is discharg'd by you and brought into Your Monthly Acc[ounts], likewise all other Charges You may be at.

We have R[eciev]ed Your Storek[eepe]r's Indent which as far as We have in our Power shall be complied [with] when Opportunitys Offer, Part of the Stationary As You Represent the immediate want of it, Accompanys this by Cooleys.

Linga Chetty informing Us that Part of the Chay Goods have been delivered at your Place, You must get them Packed immediately and forward them to Us, As you are furnished with Conveyances.

We have Received your several Letters of the 2^d. 3^d. & 8th. Instant.

We would have you send Us besides the Chay goods all the Cloth you may have on hand both brown & white, freighting the Same on any good Conveyances that can be Procured.

The Supply of Cash you have requested for advancing the [Mer]chants shall be transmitted you in few Days, & We shall discharge the Expences of the Troop for last month, as it has already been sent hither.

Inclosed We send you a Warrant appointing John Moore Master Carpenter of your Settlement, which must be deliver'd to him accordingly and as the Priviledges thereby allowed him are very extensive you must be carefull to Prevent his making a bad use of them.

DAVID DO BY THESE PRESENTS NOMINATE & APPOINT YOU JOHN MOORE MASTER
CARPENTER AND MASTER SMITH OF FORT ST. GEORGE UNDER THE FOLLOWING
REGULATIONS.

1st. You shall have the Purchasing of all the Timber and Plank and shall be furnish'd by the Company out of their Storehouse with what Iron &ca you may want for the Carrying on their Works at the Usual Rates Charged to their Servants.

2^d. You shall have the Payment of all the Carpenters Smiths &ca that may be employ'd under You with Eight Peons to Attend the Works who are to be Subject to Your Order and in Case You shall be in want of more Workmen for the Service You shall have Liberty to take them up wherever You may find them within the Limits of the Place.

3^d. You shall have a Palanqueen kept at the Company's Expence, with the Apartments formerly belonging to the Under Paymaster at Fort St. George, as likewise a Horse out of the Company's Stables when the Service shall require it and Your daily pay shall be One Pagoda to be paid monthly.

4th. In Case of Sickness or being any otherways incapacitated from doing Your Duty You shall have Thirty Pounds towards defraying your Charges to Europe.

5th. ALL CARPENTERS &ca Workmen employ'd under You, shall not be taken Away by any One Except by an Order from the Govern^r. but when the Company's Business does not Absolutely require their Service You must be carefull to Supply the Inhabitants whenever they Apply to you.

GENTLEMEN

We have Received Your Several Letters of the 9th. & 12th. Instant likewise M^r. Moses's Answer to M^r. Jones's Letter, Which We have perus'd, and our Opinion and Advice thereon is that both M^r. Jones & M^r. Moses should Reciprocally deliver Copys of all Papers and Accounts relating to their Affairs in partnership Also that M^r. Greenhaugh should be satisfied for the Money M^r. Jones Reced of him on Account of the House, as soon as Which is complied with, We shall give M^r. Jones a Permit to Captain Wills to Receive him and his Necessarys on board the Elizabeth, And with which It is our directions that You Acquaint him.

On the Ship Success that Sail'd last Night for Your Place We sent You four Chests of Rupees containing thirty two thousand, and some Packing Stuff for which You have Invoices and Bills of Lading Inclos'd also Invoice for Rupees thirty thousand (30000) sent You Overland Yesterday. We have Received here of M^r. John Smith the Sum of Fifteen thousand 15000 Rupees which was Advanced him when at Your Place for Disbursements and was more than He had Occasion for likewise of Major Lawrence the sum of Two hundred and seventy five (275) Pagodas paid him in part of his salary, which his Attorney Received for him here, therefore We shall duely Credit Your Settlement for both those Amounts.

Linga Chittee being Under a Contract with Us to take All the Hoñble Company's Broad Cloth, As He may have Occasion for any part of what is in Your Godowns it must be deliver'd to his People and You must Observe that it is not to be disposed of to any one else except in Small Quantities for the particular Use of the Inhabitants.

On the Success went Ensign Spear and seven Men belonging to Your Garrison, and Captain Heriot must be paid for M^r. Spear's passage, the Usual Allowance given to Officers for their travelling Charges & what is Customary for Dieting the Men. As We have thought proper to raise the Allowance of the Troopers half a Pagoda to each Man ₹ Month, the same must be Added to their Pay but continued in the Paymaster's Hands as A fund for their Cloathing, We have appointed the late Polligar of Madrass, Again to that Station & given him Orders to proceed there immediately. his Cowle shall be forwarded by another Opportunity.

The 16th. In the Evening imported with Us Our Hoñble Master's Ship Lapwing Who left England the 11th. September & We shall dispatch for the Bay in few days We have Received the Duplicate of Your Letter of the 15th. inclosing Invoice and Bill of Lading for five Bales of Broad Cloth by a Mussoola that Arrived Yesterday.

Herewith We sent You first Bill of Exchange for five hundred (500) Pounds Sterling, on Coja Miguel De Gregorio in favour of the Honble Company which must be immediately tendered for Acceptance, & for payment when due. The Letter of Advice Accompany's it.

GENTLEMEN

We have received your's of the 25th. and send You this by our Honble Master's Ship Lapwing, Whose Commander has our directions to remain no longer at your Place than to land the Coral and Silver he has on board consign'd to the Gentlemen residing with You, After which he is to lose no time in Proceeding to Bengal.

A Copy of our Honble Masters Commands by this Ship having been transmitted by the President to the Deputy Governour, such part thereof as it is necessary You should be acquainted with, He will communicate to You, & to which strict Regard must be paid, particularly, to what Relates to the stating the Account of Quick Stock, which must be forwarded to Us drawn out in the Form directed by the Honble Court of Directors upon receipt hereof, likewise all other Books and Papers that are to be sent to Europe, as We Purpose dispatching the Elizabeth the 5th. of Next Month.

We approve of what You have done with Regard to the Bill drawn on Coja Miguel De Gregorio by Marut Marcar which as soon as protested must be transmitted to Us.

We have Receiv'd the sixty five Bales of Cloth by the large Boat & two Mussoolas, and now return You the Tarpawlins that came with them, likewise those that accompanied the Five Bales of Broad Cloth, being in all nine.

Gundaveddy Vencaty Ramah and Nella Chittee, late the Honble Company's Merchants at Madrass, having this day deliver'd Us their Accou^{ts}. with the Company, We now send them You inclos'd to be examin'd in like manner as We directed those already forwarded You belonging to Tellesinga Chittee & Sunca Ramah & their Partners. Your remarks on which Whether they agree with the Books, We would have You send Us immediately as We intend transmitting Copys of the said Accounts by the Elizabeth to our Honble Masters.

GENTLEMEN

We have Received your Several Letters of the 25th. Ult^o. 1st. 3^d. & 7th. Instant, as also the Books and Papers, that came with the former, and by the first Sea Conveyance, shall send You the Sundries indented for by the Commissary of Stores.

The Rupees that are deliver'd the Merchants in advance must be at the Current Price, and as We approve of the method You mention of Debting them for what they Receive and giving them Credit for the Cloth they bring in, You will duely Observe the same.

At the Expiration of the limited time for the Exemption of Customs, We direct the continuance of that Indulgence Still for six months on Grain and Provisions, also on all Goods Brought in from the Country of Which You must give Publick Notice. But those Imported by Sea must Pay the Usual Customs. The Quit Rent and Scavenger's Duty We think it highly necessary should be collected therefore would have it done as You Propose, by shewing a Proper Regard to the Present Circumstances of the Inhabitants.

We take notice of the Mention You make of the Offers you have Received for Renting the Farms at Your Place, likewise of the method Prescrib'd by the Honble Company for the disposal of them, But We think proper to deferr letting them out as yet, Though When We may judge it necessary shall let You hear further from Us.

You have our Permission for receiving of Mr. Smith the Fanams he has Requested to refund, and We are

GENTLEMEN

We have receiv'd your Letters of the 26th. Ult^o. and 6th. Instant, and with the former the Copy of one to You from the Rev^d. Mr. George Swynfen representing the present insufficiency of the Church Stock to defray the Wages of the Servants belonging to the Church, and some other Expences which appear to be immediately necessary. Wherefore it is our directions that the same be done at the Honble Company's Charge, and that You have it accordingly executed.

The Bengal Rice which You acquaint Us Damages so fast, must be expos'd to Sale in Small Quantities dailey in the Buzar and Sold at the best price that can be got for it. And as the present disturb'd State of the Country, will We imagine occasion a Scarcity of that Article soon, it is not to be doubted but this method will be more advantagious to the Honble Company than having it sent hither, as great loss would certainly accrue in transporting it to and from the Conveyance that might bring it.

The Slaves brought Us by the Chesterfield being twenty Six Men, Six Women and two Boys, amount to Pagodas Six hundred and forty six and sixty nine Cash (646 — 69.) for which you must give this Presidency Credit.

In a Petition sent Us by M^r. George Jones bearing Date the 26th. Ult^o., he represents having received from You an Order to deliver in Copyes of all Papers and Accounts relating to his Affair in partnership with M^r. Moses, and to satisfie M^r. Samuel Greenhaugh for the Sum paid by him in part for the purchase of the House belonging to M^r. Jones and M^r. Moses, which leads Us to imagine that You misunderstood, What We said in our Letter of the 19th. January, wherein You will observe, You were only acquainted with our Opinion and Advice on that Affair and directed to tell M^r. Jones that as soon as he and M^r. Moses had reciprocally deliver'd each other Copyes of all Papers and Accounts relating to their Affairs in Partnership, and M^r. Greenhaugh was satisfised on Account of the aforementioned Sum paid by him to M^r. Jones, a permit would be immediately granted M^r. Jones to be received on board the Elizabeth, which We conceive can no way bear the Construction of such an Order as he represents to have receiv'd, or that it was our intentions to have prevented his proceeding to Europe, as he imagines, had he refus'd complying with what it was our Opinion in Equity he ought to have done. Therefore to Us it appears that this must have proceeded from a misapprehension of what We wrote You, which as it may in some Cases create very pernicious Consequences, We cannot Sufficiently recommend to You to be more carefull of in future. At the request of M^r. Jones whom We think equally Entitled to a Copy of what has been Exhibited against him, as M^r. Moses to a Copy of his Letter of Complaint to You, it is therefore our Directions that You furnish him with a Copy of M^r. Moses's reply to his said Letter, as also of all the Papers that were delivered in at the same time.

As it is necessary the Company should have in Store at your Place some Arrack for the use of the Slaves and M^r. Westcott having tendered to Us Eighteen hundred and twenty Gallons which is now laying there, We direct that You receive the same and Credit this Presidency for it at the rate of Pagodas fifty 50 for One hundred and fifty Gallons.

Having thought proper to lessen the rent of the house inhabited by M^r. Westcott, You are therefore from the last of February to receive for it only after the rate of twelve Pagodas $\frac{1}{2}$ month.

The Fort S^t. George Ledger commencing the 1st. May 1742 and ending the 30^b. April 1743 We would have You sent Us by the first good Conveyance by Sea also a Set of Consultations for 1742.

The Polligars Cowle which You are to deliver to him comes herewith.

We are glad to observe the Differences between the Casts are accommodated and approve of your Decision in that Respect.

We have been a good deal Surprized at a Representation that has been made to Us of your having Abridg'd the privileges We granted to John Moor by Altering some of the Articles of our Agreement with him, which We must say We think was presuming too far, and that You ought first to have acquainted Us with it, and waited for our Orders for such a Proceeding before You had put the Same in Execution. The Motives that prompted You to which We require of You to inform Us with, and that You do not take upon You in future to alter any Agreements Made by Us without obtaining our permission for it.

Your Consultations and Cash Account for January which ought to have been sent Us the begining of last Month, and those for last month with the Paymasters and other Accounts of Expences for January the beginning of this, are not yet come to hand, which is not complying with our Orders and what must be remedied in future by sending them by the 3^d. or 4th. of every month at farthest, and at the foot of the Letter that accompany's them the Quantity of Cloth You may have on hand.

As We see very little occasion for a Person to act in the Capacity of Steward at your Place the Expences of the Coffrees and Seapoys must therefore be defray'd by the Paymaster.

We shall by the first Opportunity by Sea agreeable to your request forward You a Supply of Cash.

The President having in a private Letter transmitted the Deputy Governour by a Cattamaran the 12th. directed that one of the Companys of Infantry should be kept in readiness to march at a short warning, You must therefore as soon as You receive Advice from Major Lawrence when it may be necessary for them to proceed, give Orders to Captn MacDonald with his Company to follow the Instructions he may receive from the Major for that purpose and to carry with him as many Men of the Train as the Major may direct to accompany him.

As We have determin'd that Vipary Church shall remain Vacant till our Hon^{ble} Masters pleasure is known regarding it, Our directions for putting the Danish Missionarys in Possession of it are thereby become void ; We would have you therefore look out for some Place for them.

The Honble Company's Sloop Grampus agreeable to what We wrote You in our last, Now carries You Eight Chests containing Sixty four thousand, 64000 Rupees, also as much of the Stationary you indented for, as We are at present able to supply You with, and Thirty Pipes of Madeira Wine the Price of which as We have dispos'd of it here is Fifty 50 Pagodas & Pipe.

We plainly observe from what You mention that the Dispensing with the Customs no ways answers the purpose that was intended by that Indulgence, and is only an Inconvenience, Wherefore We direct That the first of next month you fix the Customs as formerly on every Article except provisions on which no Custom must be taken.

The Gentlemen in Bengall having wrote to Us for a Quantity of Redwood, as We understand there is a parcell belonging to the Estate of M^r. John Hallyburton at your Place to be Dispos'd of, We would have You purchase it, and lade as much on board the Grampus and Bonetta, which we shall also [*sic*] dispatch to You in few days as they can take in, and the remainder Freight on any good Conveyances bound to the Bay. William Beawes lately arriv'd from Manilha (of her having left that Port upon the Governour there sending for Coelho and Heytor in Consequence of a Letter he received from Macao regarding her; That She does not properly belong to them; otherwise it is to be imagin'd they would have had no Occasion for Sailing away so Precipitately, and as they own themselves to be indebted to Vicente Roza what he charges them with and it is pretty Evident, it was with his Money they Purchased the said Vessel, We are of Opinion that the Title Gregorio Jacob has to one third of her (altho it is plain he bought the same of them) is not a Secure one as they could have no Power to dispose or Mortgage any part of her She being in reality the property of other Persons and for that Reason When You have Received what She and her Cargo may Produce it must be deposited in the Honble Company's Cash 'till it can be properly decided how the same is to be divided as We don't chuse to take upon Ourselves to do it.

Your Protests in behalf of our Hoⁿble Masters on Coja Miguel de Gregorio for non payment of Marut Marcar's Bill of Exchange, also the one deliver'd You by Don Manuel de Trasgallo were likewise duely Received, & We are not displas'd at that Affairs being terminated by Adrian Fourbeck's withdrawing his Petition.

Telesinga Chitty's Petition, for the Expence he was at in taking care of the Cloth he had provided We can by no means comply with, as the Cloth is never look'd upon as the Hoⁿble Company's till deliver'd into their Godowns, and with respect to the Difference in the prices of the Cloth provided by Sunca Ramah and Umbeltoddy Chity, We shall write further shortly. In relation to the Broad Cloth, You may acquaint Your Merchants, that when it arrives We shall then consider of the disposal of it, and that as to their request of being permitted to provide a proportion of fine Goods If they are willing to take off the Sum which has been advanced by our Merchants who We contracted with for that part of the Investment and is still Outstanding on that Account; We consent to their providing the same otherwise it must continue in the Hands of those with whom We have already engaged.

We shall by the first Conveyance supply You with some Fanams, which however must as usual be deliver'd out at thirty six for a Pagoda We shall likewise send You five or six Candies of Doodoes and Cash, which We are well convinced will be as many as You can possibly have occasion for.

We were not a little Surprized at reading the Memorial of some of Your Officers and more so at the manner of it's being Deliver'd You, From whence it might be imagined, You had no Commanding Officer at Your Garrison, as We find he was entirely Ignorant of it. Who certainly ought to have been acquainted with an Affair of that Nature before it was preffer'd to You. It is an Action which at the same time that it convinces Us of their little knowledge of Military Affairs gives Us room to believe them to be of turbulent Dispositions as what they complain of has never been once hinted to Us by any of our Officers, They being convinced of the necessity We were reduced to of paying them in that manner, agreeable to which shou'd those

If you can without loss of time load any Goods on the said Ships proper for the Canton Market agreeable to the Intimation in our Advices by the Portfield it will be very acceptable to Us and in such Case the Supra Cargoes have our Orders to pay the Amount of Such Goods out of the Bullion Consigned to them but you are on no pretence to detain them longer than the Supra Cargoes Shall Approve of.

Para. 18 . . . You must be particularly careful & Exact in adjusting all Accounts of Damage and short delivery of the Cargoes of our several Ships, and oblige the Commanders to pay for the same according to Charterparty, you are to Explain the Nature of such Damage and short Delivery, the Condition of the Package, and add such observations thereto as will enable Us to judge Whether the Owners are entitled to any Equitable Relief. You are to indorse the same on the Bills of Lading, & fully advise Us in your Letters of all Circumstances.

Para. 19 . . . And as there generally Appears a deficiency in the Weight of Lead, Iron, Copper and Elephants Teeth which may in part be Occasion'd by the different manner of Weighing the same in England and India, We have thought it proper to acquaint You with the Method us'd here. Whereby you may be able to form a Judgement, whether there is any real Deficiency or not Viz^t. Lead about 1^{lb} at a Draft, and no less Weights than 4^{lb} are us'd, but no Draft allow'd. Iron about 5^{lb} at a draft, weighing with no less Weights than 2^{lb} and for Draft 2 are allow'd. Copper and Elephants Teeth about 5 at a Draft weighing very near, and One Pound is allow'd for a draft.

Para. 40 . . . As We make no doubt of your being in Possession of the Fort St. George Books and Papers, We direct that you collect together all the Phirmaunds and Grants You can find from the Several Mogulls, Nabobs and their Ministers, with Regard to all our Priviledges in India and our Rights and Titles to our several Settlements on the Choromandell Coast. You are to get them translated by able hands, and fairly Copied in a Book, which must be forwarded to Us as soon as it can possibly be Completed.

Para. 64 We therefore direct for the future that in the Account of remains the several Articles be ranged under Distinct Heads such as Guns, Garrison Stores, Anchors, Grapnels, Cordage, Ironmongers Ware, &c^a. That the Several Sorts, Sizes, Weights & Natures of each Article be particularly distinguished and the English Weights of all Europe Stores Inserted.

Para. 66 And the better to Explain our meaning We have transmitted You a proper form, which must be Strictly Observed in framing all your future Accounts of Remains of Stores.

Instant, and for any Tinn that may be had to send to China on our Honble Masters Ships bound thither not yet arrived, You may give as far as thirty-six Pagodas a Candy, and with Regard to Elephants Teeth as the Sizes of them are so various, We can only Direct that if they can be procur'd at Such Rate as You may judge will yield a reasonable Proffit, we would have you purchase them, or any other Articles by which it is likely our Honble Masters may Reap any advantage.

Inclosed is an Extract of the List of Investment reced from the Honble Company by the Ships lately arriv'd, for your guidance in procuring the same, and which must be strictly kept up to. And as the fine and midling Salempores provided at your place have always been esteem'd most, We have allotted that Brach [*sic*] entirely to your Merchants, Who must be call'd before You and each Set now provide the same Sortments they did formerly; you must likewise use your endeavours to lower the prices if possible, as We find it will be very satisfactory to our Honble Masters and as to Sunca Ramah's Request to be allowed the same as Gundaveddy Vencaty Ramah, If what he has brought in equal's Gundaveddy's in goodness, We must insist upon Gundaveddy's lowering his price to what We give Sunca Ramah, as you acquaint Us they get their Cloth both from the same place, but if Sunca Rama's is Inferiour to what is provided by Gundaveddy and You are well assur'd he cannot make it better, for the price he engaged with Us, We then agree to his being paid the same as Gundaveddy but not otherwise. The Brown Cloth the Honble Company have Received of late, they much disapprove of, and direct Us to use all Possible means to prevent their having any more sent them. Wherefore We must recommend to You to be very Assiduious in getting Cur'd all provided by You As We shall direct

Mr. Andrews to consign the Vessels that may bring up his Bales in September to You, which as he has no Conveniencys for Washing them, You must therefore perform; and as the Honble Company are desirous to have all the Northward Cloth cur'd by You or Us, You must give Encouragement to all Washers to come and Settle among You, that you may be as soon as possible in a capacity for Complying with their said Inclinations. We have it not in our Power to comply with the desire of your Merchants for a proportion of the Broad Cloth being Positively Order'd to sell the same at Outery. And having also absolute Directions to use our utmost Endeavours to recover the Ballance that were due to them from their Madrass Merchants, when the place was taken, an Account of which is inclosed, the same must be therefore set about with the greatest Diligence.

The President having been inform'd that the Quantity of Redwood purchas'd of Mr. Fowke belonging to Mr. Hallyburton's Estate, was only One hundred and Seventy Candys, which is a very small proportion of what the President and Council of Bengal have wrote to Us for, he has ordered Mr. Starke to Contract for Two thousand Candys, Wherefore it is our directions that You pay to Austekery Narrain four thousand seven hundred and fifty Pagodas for the purchase of the said Redwood, and that as fast as it is brought in, You take all Opportunitys of forwarding the same to Bengal.

Our Honble Masters disapproving of our giving any Pensions and directing Us to send home at their Expences the Persons to whom We have granted them, as You will Observe by an Extract of their Commands relating thereto inclos'd, You must acquaint Capt. Morgan, and Mr. Graham with the purport of them and if they chuse to accept of the Compy's Offer We will provide them with a Passage by the first Ship.

Robert [Goodere] ninth, M^r. George Pigot tenth &

Mr. Samuel Greenhaugh Eleventh of Council [I] thought it for the Hon'ble Company's Interest to open the same which having accordingly done and taken a Copy of their Letter therein Contained, I now send You the same Inclosed, and am to desire You will as soon as possible let me know your Resolutions on this matter, and that You will use the speed[iest] means of Conveying this Advice to Mr. Saunders. The Members of the late Council will Continue their Several Employ's till such Persons as You app[oint] thereto may come to take Charge of them.

The Moors Army Commanded by Mahom[ed] Ally Cawn whom We join'd with part of our Garrison a few days past being much distress'd for Provisions, I think it is a very proper Opportunity to dispose of the large Quantity of Rice belonging to the Company now lying at Fort St. George which was purchas'd last year and has been represented to be much damaged wherefore I have procur'd a Conveyance for it which will be with You in a day or two and if you approve of it I think it would not be amiss to load on her One hundred and fifty Garce. And by her I propose sending You the Supply of Cash requested by the Deputy Governour and Council.

The Seventy Chests of Treasure by the Lynn I have sent for ashore and shall order it into the Mint immediately.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
AT FORT SAINT DAVID.

1. Our last Advices under Date of the 8th. of December went by the Ships Duke of Cumberland, Grantham Prince Edward and York; the two first Sail'd out of the Downs the 20th. of the same month.

2. The Norfolk Captain Nathaniell Hancock is consigned to you, under Orders. however to receive on board three hundred Pipes of Wine at the Island of Madeira, One Moiety of which We have directed our Agents to consign to you and the other Moiety to Bengall.

3. You are to direct a Survey to be made of the Stowage, and the Condition of the Casks, that the Commander may Account with You, for what may be wanting more than the Customary Leakage.

4. Captain Hancock and his Officers are allowed twenty Pipes of Maderia Wine on their Private Account, if any more should be landed at Your Settlement, it must be seized and sold on our Account as unlicenced Goods and you are to advise our President and Council in Bengall of the real Quantity landed.

5. For the other Consignments to you by the Norfolk We refer you to the Invoice and Bill of Lading in that Ship's Packet.

6. Although the Ships Kent Captain William Robson, the London Captain William Sedgwick and the Lynn Captain William Egerton are consigned to Fort William the Commanders have our directions to call at Fort St. David that the Bullion by the said Ships may be Coined which must be done with the utmost Expedition.

7. Concluding that You have Coined the Bullion sent you by the Portfield and the China Ships, We direct that You send to Bengall on the Kent, London and Lynn, the full Amount in Rupees, of the value of the Bullion by the said last mention'd three Ships and that You likewise send by the Norfolk an equal value with either of those Ships, and We further Direct that after the Dispatch of the said Ships, You continue to send by every Opportunity whatever you can to the Bay, our Intent being, that You should retain in your hands no more of our Effects than will be absolutely necessary for making Your Investment and defraying Your Charges.

8. That you may be enabled to dispatch home the more Ships, all of this season as well as the last carry out Whole Kintladge in Iron which You must observe to reckon into the Tonnage for so many Tons in Goods as the Charter Party mentions there are Tons of Iron Kintladge to be carried out and brought Home.

9. As the Ships thus carry out Iron, You are not obliged by Charter Party to load any Salt Petre, unless you are under a Necessity of doing it for want of other Goods, in which Case you are to put aboard as much as will Compleat the Charter Party Tonnage and no more.

10. In this manner you are to send Home as many Ships as you can procure Tonnage, for, observing always that those which have been longest in India are to be first Dispatch'd, and that the Surplus Tonnage if you have any must be laden on the latter Ships.

11. As it will be greatly for our Interest to have as formerly all our Ships dispatch'd from our several Settlements the same season they arrive, We Recommend it to You to act in Concert with our Servants in Bengall, and on the Mallabar Coast, the more effectually to answer our Intentions.

12. But if it shall happen notwithstanding your utmost Efforts any Ships should remain on your hands, she must be employed in such a manner as will at least Ballance the Demorage that will be incurr'd by her staying in India a Season Extraordinary, and if there is a necessity of detaining any Ship it must be the London.

13. You must early and with as much exactness as You can advise our Servants in the Bay what Number of Bales You expect to have ready for the returning Shipping and at the same time remind them of sending You a sufficient Quantity of Salt Petre.

14. As the selling of Coast Piece Goods at the beginning of the September Sale will be greatly to the Company's Advantage We earnestly recommend it to you to use your utmost Endeavours to dispatch one or two Ships with a large proportion of fine Goods so early as to arrive in England some time in the month of June.

15. As by this time the Books and Papers taken by the French at Fort St. George, We expect to hear are in your Possession, We direct (if it has not been already done) that an exact List be made of them and transmitted to us by the first Conveyance and that at the same time You remark whether any are missing or not return'd by the French with the Reasons thereof. This order is not meant to delay your immediately sending Us such Books and Papers as were mention'd in our Letter of the 29th. of March last by the Severn.

16. We have appointed Joseph Cooper a Writer on your establishment, Who is to be employed in such a Station, wherein he may be most Useful to Us.

17. We have permitted the undermention'd Persons to reside in India under the Company's Protection. Viz^r.

18. Thomas Whitlatch, John Brohier, and Jacob Dawson in the Seafaring Way, John Page to practice Surgery, Wherever he may be wanted or Approv'd of, and Joseph Lowe (now in Bengal) as a free Merchant.

19. The intimations We received last year that a Spirit of Gaming prevail'd among our Servants at Fort St. David have to our Great Concern prov'd too true and we have had undoubted Assurances that it has been Conniv'd at and practiced by Mr. Floyer and many of our Superiour Servants to such a Degree as almost to engross their whole time and Attention, hence in a great measure the Extravagant Expences of your Settlement are to be accounted for, as well as the general neglect and want of Order in every Branch of our Affairs, to remedy which a Change of Hands is become absolutely necessary, We therefore Order and Direct that Mr. Floyer and Mr. Holt be immediately Dismiss'd from the Company's Service.

20. And We do hereby Constitute and appoint the undermention'd persons our Council for the management of all our Affairs on the Choromandel Coast Establishment Viz^r.

Thomas Saunders Esq^r. President and Gove^r. for all Our affairs on the Choromandel Orix and Sumatra Coasts.

Mr. Richard Prince Second and to succeed as President
in Case of the Death or Absence
of Mr. Saunders.

21. The Principle We go upon in Settling the Council as above is to rank every one according to their real Standing in our Service, and this is the method which in all Cases We intend to Pursue and You are to observe Unless you have Our orders to the Contrary.

22. Although We have left M^r. Croke out of the Council as above, We do not thereby mean to leave him out of our Service, but in Consideration of his Age and former Services We direct that he always Continue to rank as a Senior Merchant next under the Council and in lieu of all former and other Appointments Whatsoever, he be allowed Two hundred Pounds a Year.

23. Agreeable to the principle abovemention'd, We direct that M^r. Wynch and M^r. Westcott (late of Council) be ranked upon the List of Covenanted Servants precisely according to the Situation they would have been in had Fort St. George not been taken.

24. And as Vacancys happen in the Council We direct that the next in Standing be taken in unless their behaviour of Circumstances may render them unfit for that Station.

25. M^r. Pigot who was made a Prisoner at War upon the Surrender of Fort St. George to the French and thereupon came to England now returns to his Duty on one of the Ships of this season, If You think he may be of particular service to us at Fort St. George You may station him there.

26. The whole Council are to take the usual Oath of fidelity and the President must write to his Friends in England to give the Customary Security as must such of the Council Whose Friends have not already done so.

27. You are particularly to observe and follow the directions We sent You by the Portfield under Date of the 3^d. of November last.

28. We direct that You appoint one of the most able of the Council Chief of Vizagapatam.

29. And a very Capable person Chief of Ingeram on both of whom We shall very much depend for the increase of the Investment on Your Coast.

30. If M^r. Munro or M^r. Lightfoot apply to be taken into the Company's Service in their former Stations at Madrass as Surgeons You are to entertain them accordingly.

31. We have great Reason to doubt Whether the vast Sums of Money expended at Fort St. David since M^r. Floyer's coming to the Chair have been justly and fairly accounted for, We therefore positively direct that You do immediately make a strict Enquiry into M^r. Floyer's Accounts as likewise of all other of our Servants Who have been Concerned in transacting our Affairs and Wherever you find the Company have been fraudulently injur'd that You do not Suffer any of them to proceed to England until they have made Us full and Ample Satisfaction.

32. As the pernicious Vice of Gaming has spread like a Contagion among all Ranks and Degrees of our Servants both Civil and Military, We are determin'd to put a Stop to it by making Example of Every Person infected therewith, You must therefore agreeable to the directions We gave You last Year make a strict Enquiry into the Behaviour of our several Servants as well the Military as Civil and send us a Particular Account of such Enquiry, and in the mean time Reprimand Suspend or

even dismiss them from our Service according to the Degree of their Guilt, Every Covenant Servant and each Military Officer are to be called before the President and Council and acquainted with these our Orders.

The Lynn carried you my last of the 13th. Inst. and I am now to acquaint You with the Grantham's having Arrived here yesterday with Benjamin Robins Esq^r. on board. The Duke of Cumberland Who came out in Company with her by their Unexpectedly falling in with the Coast of Guinea near Cape Verd the 16th. January about Eight o Clock at Night in thick Weather & by a fatal Change of Wind Succeeded by a Calm which obliged them to come to an Anchor very near the Shore where the Grantham rode the Whole Night and with difficulty got off in the Morning but the Cumberland parted her Cable & was drove in the Surf where She was lost, and when they left her which was near a month after they had not been fortunate enough to save any part of her Cargo from the Surf's continuing very high but had made the best provision they Could at Gambia an English Settlement on that Coast, for fitting out a Sloop and Long Boat to make a tryal on the Wreck, As soon as the Season of the year should permit. And as they luckily fell in with the Durrington the 5th. of March homeward bound under the line, on Whom they sent M^r. Torriano one of their Supra Cargoes to give the Information of this Accident to the Company the Assistance they will be Able to Send from so early Intelligence may be a means of saving her Treasure. Of her Crew only five Perished. Goodere will advise of the number at Ingeram, but few can be expected from Ganjam as M^r. We now Send you Our Hon^{ble} Master's Ship Swallow with Captain Scrimmour's Company of Soldiers consisting of Seventy one Men Officers included, we would have You Prepare Boats Sufficient to land them all together, they are Old Soldiers in the Service and we think Men You may depend on. In regard to the Pay of Your Garrison we consent to their having 12 fanams for each Rupee Agreeable to what You have Promised, till Such time we can procure Pagodas Sufficient to pay them in that Specie. As to what they say concerning Major Lawrence's Promising them 21 Shillings & 6 Pence ¶ Month, that Gentleman Assures us, is false, And that all the Officers must remember his Acquainting them they were to receive 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ Pagodas free of deduction which at 8 Shillings ¶ Pagoda was 20 Shill^s. and no more. We are in hourly Expectations of M^r. Saunders's Arrival, when Major Lawrence will set out for your Place, and We shall then write more Particularly on this difference in the Pay of the Military and give directions how it must be brought to Account in the Company's Books.

You must not keep this Ship longer than is necessary to put on board what Bales You have ready and We would have You Send on board her in Irons Lawrence & Carter the two deserters that have been Prisoners some time at your Place.

We would have Your Storekeeper and Military Storekeeper take an Account Remains of the Severals under their Charge inspecting the Same and distinguishing what may be Unfit for Use that the proper Indents may be made and what appears useles be dispos'd of, likewise the House Necessarys at Your Place.

Two of the Mussoolahs on which We sent You the Baftaes are Return'd with Forty Corge and five Pieces, don't forget to send Us Six or Eight Boats in the Room of these, that We may be able to give Proper Dispatches to the Ships in January.

We must recommend to You to get as much of Your Cloth cur'd as possible. We suppose the Gentlemen at the Bay will order a Ship to touch at Your Place on Whom You will send what Bales You may have on hand.

You will deliver to Linga Chitty's Gomastah One hundred Bales of Broad Cloth and Reserve for him the Remainder, Excepting such as may be wanted for Expences.

We have receiv'd Your Letter of the 17th. with the several Books and Papers that accompanied it by the Mussoolah.

As We have commenc'd paying our Military and Servants in Pagodas, we would have You do the same, and in order to Procure what may be necessary for this purpose, What Wares and Stores You dispose of must be paid for in Pagodas.

We are sorry to observe by your List of Cloth on hand that your Investment goes on so slowly & therefore must recommend to You to use Your best Endeavours with the Merchants to exert themselves as the Dispatch of the Ships to Europe draws near. What Bales You have ready, You must send Us by the Europe Ships expected from the Bay should they touch at Your Port.

We think it highly necessary to fix the Customs again on Grain imported by Sea, and would therefore have You commence levying them immediately giving Proper Notice thereof.

Having Occasion for some Horse furniture send us down by the first good Conveyance, What You may have more than is necessary for your Troop.

In the Present unsettled State of the Province We think it Probable that You will be applied to by some Persons of Distinction for Protection, In which Case We would have You gratifie them and behave to them with Civility.
