A Due Obedience shall be paid to Your Orders in sending Invoices for the future with all stores that go from hence.

Capt<sup>t</sup>. Donald Campbell has taken Charge of this Garrison & Capt<sup>t</sup>. Gardiner proceeds to Deve Cotah in a day or two in his Way to Camp all the other Officers are gone already except Mr. Percival who continues much out of order.

We now enclose your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. a Petition from a poor Woman which has been given into Our Board some time since. We have endeavour'd what We could to procure her right from the Person against whom she complains but he still declines doing her Justice We beg leave to have your directions how to proceed in the Affair.

Our Consultations & Monthly Accounts shall accompany our next address in the meantime We remain with a perfect Respect

THE HUMBLE PETITION OF SHEVA GONGA

SHEWETH

That in Mr. Floyer's Government one Gautakie from Tanjore that receives Rupees 300  $\text{₹}$  Month from the Company came to Tripopalore and wanting a habitation, Rangappa Mr. Floyer's Dubash interceded with great promises of the said Goutakies Generosity to your Petitioner to let him have her House to inhabit in for 8 days, which yo<sup>r</sup>. Peti<sup>r</sup>. was prevail'd on to Consent too, but a year was past when yo<sup>r</sup>. Peti<sup>r</sup>. neither had her House & Garden deliver'd up nor any Rent paid, upon which yo<sup>r</sup>. Peti<sup>r</sup>. apply'd again to Rangapa who shuffled her off by telling her that in a few days he Gautakie would go, and make her a generous recompence, therefore yo<sup>r</sup>. Peti<sup>r</sup>. took Patience till Rangapa died, and then she made her address to Mutookistna (a Debash of Mr. Floyer's) who reply'd He could not assist her further than he would lay her case before the Gov<sup>r</sup>. & told her to have Patience he should go out of the House, but your Petitioner found no veracity in his Words after that when Comrapa belonging to the Honourable Tho<sup>s</sup>. Saunders Esq<sup>r</sup>. came, your Peti<sup>r</sup>. apply'd to him who shuffled her off with promises of Representing her case to the Gov<sup>r</sup>. and one day before his Hon<sup>r</sup>. was going to Madrass being invited to Sadashavarow Reddys yo<sup>r</sup>. Peti<sup>r</sup>. threw herself at Comrapa's feet before several Reddys, and Austima Chitty, when he promis'd that after 15 days arrivall in Madrass the said Gautakie should be sent for and yo<sup>r</sup>. Peti<sup>r</sup>. not only have her House but as he was allow'd from the Company Rupees 300 a month that He should make satisfaction to your Peti<sup>r</sup>. and as yo<sup>r</sup>. Peti<sup>r</sup>. has found no truth in his promises nor in Gov<sup>r</sup>. Cockells Dubash (Davienaiica) there fore she humbly begs your Worship & c<sup>a</sup>. to take into Consideration how much she is distress'd not only that Gautakie possesses her house but has alter'd it to his Pleasure the illtreatment your Peti<sup>r</sup>. has receiv'd from Gautakie has surpass'd expression & would intrude too much on your Worship & c<sup>a</sup>'s. Patience to rehearse, if this matter can't be decided by the Worshipfull board yo<sup>r</sup>. Peti<sup>r</sup>. humbly begs it may be transmitted to Madrass & from yo<sup>r</sup>. Worship & c<sup>a</sup>. or from thence yo<sup>r</sup>. Peti<sup>r</sup>. hopes for relief which binds, as a poor Widow yo<sup>r</sup>. Peti<sup>r</sup>. that has nothing but that to depend on

(5000) Pagodas more, which we have not Cash sufficient to discharge We therefore request your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. will furnish us with an Immediate supply being in the utmost want of it.

The Gentlemen that came on boats are proceeded to Deve Cotah & We have wrote to Mr. Hopkins to return the Massollah's to us immediatly We should have furnish'd Chelingas from hence but that they have been so constantly employ'd in carrying stores that what are in the Place are all repairing.

We are to request of your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. Fifty Candies of Lead <sup>1<sup>st</sup></sup> first Conveyance that offers & are with great Respect

HONBLE SIR & SIRs

This waits on you in answer to your favour of the 9<sup>th</sup>. Instant which We have duly reced.

The Military stores reported to you some time since as gone to decay shall be survey'd again & such as are found repairable, We shall put in hand directly & what is otherwise We propose to sell by Publick Outcry as however useless in Garrison they will still fetch something, the account sales shall be transmitted your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>.

Mr. Alex<sup>r</sup>. Baird accepts of your Permission of resigning Our Honble Masters service & will proceed to Fort St. George in a short Time.

We now transmit you the account current of Salempores Midling which will acquaint you with the Nature of the gain of two thousand One hundred & thirty five Pagodas twenty four fanams & twenty four Cash (2135-24-24) on that Article ariseing only from the difference in the Valuation on the Debtor & Creditor sides but not from the sales.

The Storekeeper assures us that several Particulars in his List which was transmitted your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. for permission to write off are entirely Lost by Wastage & Deficiency of Weight & those of the Military Stores however Continued on his Books until now yet were gone to decay long since & none of them are in being at present.

Mr. Perceval readily accepts of your leave to do duty for sometime as a Military Officer in our Garrison.

The Widow's case being really such as We have represented to you We shall stop a small proportion of Gautakies monthly allowance in order to discharge his debt to her.

The Deputy Governor having had an Intimation of what Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. mention in regard to the steps taken by the French Emissaries to seduce Gautakie over to their Interest had given directions some days since to the Capt<sup>t</sup>. Commandant to secure him in the Fort which has accordingly been done he is Lodged in the Square as Commodiously as possible & you may depend on the utmost Care being taken to prevent either his or Ragapunts Escape.

The Officers of the Bengal detachment say they have hitherto had diet money as well as subsistence & have apply'd to us for it but as We do not know whether it is agreeable to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. that We should continue that allowance We request to be favoured with your Orders relating to it.

The Stewards Account Remains are only valued in one general Sum & as We are in want of the Particular cost of each piece of Furniture We beg you will please to send us the General List with the Prices annexed to it so soon as we receive that & your Directions in regard to the General Articles to be wrote off We shall close Our Books & transmitt them to Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. without any further delay.

We beg leave to recommend the Contents of the enclosed Letter from Mr. Robt. Holford to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. Consideration & are with respect

Having the command of the Sloop Fanny belonging to Lieut Demar &c. Mr. John Murphey jointly which Vessell now lying at Porto Novo where I have ten of her Crew without any thing to support them or Pay their Wages or to secure my own & having acquainted the Attorneys of the said Lieut. Demar & Mr. John Murphey with the situation I am in but receiv'd no relief from them either by money or otherways & not knowing what to do in regard to a small part of her intended Cargo which I have on Board & have the said Gent's orders to dispose of it at Anjengo where I was to have gone after the Repair of the Sloop I therefore presume Worship<sup>l</sup>. Sir & Sirs to lay my case before you humbly requesting that you will favour me with your kind advice as I can only be directed by it how I am to proceed for the safety of the Vessell as also for my own Indemnification your taking my case into consideration will be an obligation never to be forgott by him who is with the greatest respect

HONBLE SIR &amp; SIRs

Your favours of the 24<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo and 7<sup>th</sup>. Instant now call upon me to acknowledge as well the Receipt of them as to assure your Honour & C<sup>a</sup>. of the due obedience I shall pay to the commands they contain.

The same Obstacle that prevented me before from making the enquiries so necessary in regard to the Investment have subsisted ever since till within this day or two but the Promise We now have of fair weather will I hope soon so effectually remove them as to enable me to perform that Task to your Honour & C<sup>t</sup>. Satisfac[*tion*].

All the information I have acquired in respect to Mr. Flaction whom you are pleased to enquire after, is, that he came out a Volunteer on the same ship with Capt. D'Illens, that under that denomination he proceeded from the Presidency to Fort St. David by the direction of the Honble the President (as he was advised by Capt. Brohier) & from Fort St. David hither, by the direction of the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. (as he was told by Capt. Gardiner) and to remain in this Place as an Officer till further Orders by which means he lost the early advantage of Procuring a Commission by not proceeding to Camp directly with the Rest of the Volunteers. This is the best account I have been able to collect of the Affair and shall only beg leave to observe to your Honour & C<sup>a</sup>. That although he has not yet been honour'd with a Commission, yet in my humble opinion he is as deserving of one both as a Geñt & a Soldier as any of those that have thus got the start of him.

Capt<sup>s</sup>. Innes & Greenville together with Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Spear & Clark arrived here the 7<sup>th</sup>. Instant & on the 9<sup>th</sup>. the three last of these Geñt proceeded to Camp whom Capt. Pascal is proceeding to follow.

Till I reced your Honour & C<sup>as</sup>. favour of ye. 31<sup>st</sup>. Ult<sup>o</sup>. I never once heard of the least occasion had been given the Pollygar to complain of his meeting any Interruption in Collecting the Duties he is entitled to, nor have I been able with the strictest enquiry since to discover he ever had or has any as otherwise I should have used my endeavours to have procured him all the relief such a case would admit of. With your Honour & C<sup>a</sup>'s. Permission I am inclin'd to think that he rather meant to have complained of the objection the Bound Renters make to his receiving more than his due for they say that one hundred and seventysix Caunees (176) specified in the cowle are equal to two hundred and twenty Valees (220) which is half the Produce of the whole Limits of Deve Cotah, Whereas his proper allowance in the King of Tanjore's time, never amounted to more than Forty Seven Valees (47) and therefore humbly apprehend there was a mistake committed in drawing out that Cowle relating to this particular. As this therefore in all appearance is the reall foundation of the Polygar's Complaint, the Redress of it lies intirely in the breast of your Honour & C<sup>t</sup>. who shall always find the greatest readiness in me punctually to put in execution which way soever you are pleas'd to determine the matter.

Lieut. Patterson and his party destined by Your Honour & C<sup>t</sup>. for camp were safely landed on the 11<sup>th</sup>. at Night, out of the Sloop Salangore and shall be kept in readiness to March on the first call Major Lawrence makes for them.

Such pressing and moving Applications have been made by the Killedar of Palam Cotah and the Nabob of Kirrapahs Vakeel, that I hope I shall not incurr Your Honour & C<sup>a</sup>'s. displeasure by yielding so far to them as to Consent to

Our Detachments staying a few days longer at that Place and the most prevailing reason with me for it is that without such assistance they will not be able to collect the Grain belonging to their limits which is to put them into a Capacity of reimbursing the Expences our Honble Masters have been at on the Occasion and may probably also give some Umbrage to the Kirrapah Nabob to withdraw or lessen the sense of the Obligation he may have conceived himself to lye under for your Friendly offices. I have however wrote two or three times to the Killedar in such Terms setting forth the necessity both of withdrawing our Troops, and of his discharging the Debt that I hope will bring him to a speedy resolution But not withstanding these reasons should your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. determine otherwise I shall pay an immediate Obedience to the first notice you will please to favour me with.

Our Honble Masters Sloop Dragon is still detain'd here by Contrary winds but as soon as they become favourable she shall be dispatch'd to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. with a Cargoe of Piles agreeable to the Request made by the Worshipfull Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. Council of Fort St. David. In the meantime be pleased to permit me to enclose the Monthly Papers for last month and to subscribe myself

HONBLE SIR & SIRs

We have been favour'd with your Letter of the 7<sup>h</sup>. Ult<sup>o</sup>. and by these Peons send our books ending the 30<sup>th</sup>. April last. Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will observe they are closed without giving our Merchants Credit for the Cloth sent up for some time past as the account sortment thereof was not so particular as to enable us to make the proper entrys. We take the Liberty to inclose copies of some Invoices for your Warehousekeeper which we shall be glad to have returned us with the account sortment on the back of each and if it be agreeable to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. we will constantly practice this method which we hope will prevent any mistakes in future.

We have not yet began to repair any of the works Col<sup>l</sup>. Scott mentioned to us, should he call at Madrass and your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. approve of what he proposes to do here, We hope you will send a proper Person to direct the workmen as We have nobody Capable. The only part we can undertake is to build the Wall from Martin's Point to Torneroy's battery, which being plain Work can with the Instructions left us by Col<sup>l</sup>. Scott be well enough executed by the People We have, We mention this to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. as We think it a material Work and that the Cost will not be so great as the value of the Teak Timber now in the Palisadoe which are daily decaying and of no security to the Place

We shall pay due regard to your Orders relating to any of the Servants who may resign their employes here.

We have supplid Mr. Andrews with 30 Buckaneer Pieces for his Peons. with what other military accoutrements he desired, Musquetts we were unable to give him as Mr. Westcott had all the spare ones in the Garrison last year.

In our last we acquainted your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. with the Verbal grant We have obtained from the Nabob to coin our Copper.

The Rajah Viziamrauze has desired Mr. Pigot to request you will supply him with 100 Barrells of Gunpowder, we are to acquaint your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. that, that which you gave his People some Months ago was landed here and had safe Conduct to him, tho he was in a manner surrounded by the Moors; whither our Nabob was unacquainted with this or his politeness kept him from mentioning it we know not, but it is very certain he told our Neighbours the Dutch who suffer'd some small Guns sent from Metchlepatam to be landed, that he would pull down their Factory if he heard again they assist a Rebel.

The inclosed is a Petition we are desired to present you from Mr. Maul the surgeon for the Negrais with Mr. Hunter, the Poor Man has suffer'd so much by Illness as almost to lose the use of his Legs and as his necessities obliged him to apply to Us for the same allowance of 15 Pagodas p<sup>r</sup> Month which he received there we hope you will approve of our giving him the same and that you will permit us to recommend him to your favour.

I presume your hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. will before this have been informed that the French have obtained Phirmaunds from Salabat Jing for the Countrys of Conicole, Elure, Rajah Mund<sup>m</sup>. & Chicacul, as these were procured without the Privy or Consent of the Duanjee and other Officers of the Divan, they have wrote Jeffer Alli cawn not to pay any regard to the Perwanna, nor deliver up the Country; at present he opposes the French, but without [...] supported by some European Power I am affraid [he may] too soon give up the cause; and they become Masters of all country the consequence of which (without a speedy and powerfull assistance) will be the Loss of all our Trade in these Parts. I am in hourly apprehensions of their taking Possession of this Place and the More so because they know I am not able to defend it herewith comes the Accounts for December as also the Accounts of the Quick Stock. I am with the greatest esteem

Inclosed is copy of our last with duplicate of our Books ending 30<sup>th</sup>. April, the Returns of the Garrison & monthly Papers.

We are concerned to acquaint you that the Porto Bello Sloop arrived here the 29<sup>th</sup>. having been unable to make her passage to the Negrais, the Master of her deliver'd us the enclosed Letter which contains his Reason for bearing away. The Long time He has been beating [East] ward has so much shatter'd the sloop's sails & [that it . . . ] will take some Time to repair them, and [that we] here being of Opinion that Her arrival may be as soon if she departs hence the end of Janry as if she was to proceed directly. We shall therefore recommend to Capt. Grierson to wait for any further instructions You may have for Mr. Hunter which we hope You will approve.

The Military have been landed and the Serjeant delivering us a pay Roll for December due to the Detachment, We have complied therewith, and shall debt Account Current Fort St. George for the Same and observing an Increase in the Pay to the Men belonging to the Train we have ordered our own also to receive the same from the 1<sup>st</sup>. of next Month. The pay Master's accounts Current with the Detachment is inclosed and the stoppages will remain in his hands till your Orders relating thereto.

We have already wrote you by this conveyance and send this a part to inclose Copy of a Letter from the Rajah Viziam rauze which cover'd the several Letters [ . . . ] Provinces of My [ . . . ] Elore, Rajah-mundrum & Chickacul said to be granted to the French, these were soon follow'd by a Letter from the Nabob, which with Copies of the before mentioned and our answers to each comes inclosed.

Your Honour & C<sup>A</sup>. will believe by what we wrote the 23<sup>d</sup>. November that We were well satisfied the Rajah had a long time been tampering with the French. We are therefore the less surprized at his now taking off the mask. But his Neighbourhood to Us together with the desire we had of remaining in Peace, made us still continue our civility to him and refuse the Nabob all manner of assistance. Nay to this Hour many of the Rajah's Women and Relations are in our Town.

Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. can alone enable us to answer fully the Nabob's Letter, His family we believe you will approve of our protecting, and when we have discoursed with his son, we will write to you Express, for the present we will only add our promises to act in the most prudent manner we are able, with our request for two or three Subaltern Officers, the want of which We feal the greater as Capt. Crompton's ill state of health often confines him.

In regard to the Investment Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. recommend that none but Chially Cloth shall be provided & that it be at one Pagoda and half cheaper in a Corge than the Prices at Fort St. David. There are wove in the Chially Country Long Cloth of 12 & 9 Call the first to be had at Sixty three Pagodas & a half P Corge & the other at Forty six & a half but in what Proportion these rates are with those given at Fort St. David Your Honr. &c<sup>a</sup>. must be the best Judges as you have not been pleased to communicate to me at what Price it is purchased there. Of these two Specie of cloth alone, Ornachilum Moodily the Chially Merchant promises to bring in for the first Year six hundred Corge and to encrease the Quantity every year after wards. There are in the Bale sent you musters of these two sorts, which if your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. approve of I will immediately contract for that quantity.

As the Charges & Expences on account of Detachments Expeditions &c<sup>a</sup>. had been all along brought under the two heads Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. take Notice of, I thought it a practice you had approved of as I had received no Intelligence from Mr. Dawson or any one that had been here before me to the contrary But as you have now been pleased to direct a different Method, I shall punctually pursue it in future and regulate all the past accounts agreeable to the Modell you direct to be observed.

The Reverend Mr. Robt. Palk arrived on our Honble Masters Sloop Dragon the 13<sup>th</sup>. Instant and on the 15<sup>th</sup>. in the morning set out for Tanjore. On receipt of your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. favour of the 8<sup>th</sup>. I Immediately communicated the Contents of it so far as related to Mehoffus Cawn to Major Lawrence and set about fixing Harcarrahs from hence to Syringam Pagoda and to Mahoffus Cawn's Camp, both for intelligence of the Enemy's motions & those of Mahoffus Cawn's Army that I might be able to send him all necessary & timely Notice for his safety, and dispatch'd a Letter to him on the subject to open a Correspondence of that Nature but I have not yet heard one sillable from him or Ensign Paccard as soon as they arrive to join the Command that are still waiting for him Here, I shall put in execution Your orders concerning the return of that Detachment to [*remaining portion lost*].

We have been favoured with your Letters of the 8<sup>th</sup>. Instant containing Your sentiments on our late annual address, as likewise on such parts of our former Letters as were before omitted. In a few days We shall acquaint you with our Merchants proposals regarding the Current Years Investment and as soon as We receive your permission for making them any Advances Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. may be confident our Honest and diligent Endeavours will not be wanting to forward that Work to the utmost extent our abilities will admit. All We have now to offer for your Consideration is the Ballances that are due to Irshapa Chitty & Linga Chitty which as you have directed us to cease for the present all further payments to our Merchants without your previous Notice We do not venture to discharge even these sums without first obtaining Your Permission, the Amount of the former is Pagodas 3226. 31. 62 and the latter Pagodas 2457. 3. 66. We might have hoped these would have given You sufficient proof of our Care to reduce all Debts at the end of the Year as scarce an Instance appears before us where the Merchants Ballances have gone home in their favour. It is a thing We cannot always promise therefore must express our disappointment that neither this or any other of our performances have drawn from you a Word of Approbation. Our Reasons for the overlateness of our general Books have been already given you which We are sorry to find have had so little Weight. And as to the annual Address We have only to the Presidency on the Dragon now at St. David as I imagin'd Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. would rather approve of her being employed in the meantime by carrying Piles for the use of that settlement than letting her lye idle, I shall also observe to fill her up with that Article on her Return to Madrass with the Detachment & send no more on freight till I have your orders for it.

The Rule you have laid down for my future Proceedings in respect to the Military & Seapoys that are to be kept on this Establishment I shall constantly make my guide. But I humbly presume at the same time that your Honour

&ca. don't mean by it that no more shall be entertained though on acct. of the Nabob when the strength of our Enemy in the Neighbourhood shall make it appear that so inconsiderable a Number are hardly sufficient defence for the Fort only, much less to prevent the total destruction of the extensive Limits belonging to it. This I flatter myself will be accepted by your Honour & C<sup>A</sup>. as a reasonable excuse for having not yet paid the Respect that is due to your favour of the 8<sup>th</sup>. Instant & for entreating Your Patience a day or two longer in regard both to that and the Monthly Accounts, & suffer me in the meantime to represent to your Honour & C<sup>A</sup>. that Capt. Pigou's command marched this morning in consequence of an order from the Major & the urgent necessity of things & the Enemy Our Neighbours have a force greatly superiour to ours a large body of them are this Instant posted on the other side the River & lye there ready to cross over and make inroads into our Limits & destroy our Villages as soon as he is gone Your Honour & C<sup>A</sup>. will be pleased to permit me to encrease both our Military & Seapoys as the means present themselves for our defence, according to the occasion I may discover for it, or direct hither such a reinforcement as you shall judge proper, as [ . . . ] Military, by being garbled by every detachment [ . . . ] this way, are become nothing better

than Invalids & the whole place one great Hospital—I also beg to know if your Honour &ca. will permit me to repair the Defences that were thrown up at the different Passes but greatly decayed to prevent the Enemy from penetrating to the Fort.

I have not time to add more as Intelligence is just come in that the Enemy are crossing the River over to our side with some horse amongst them, but that with all imaginable Respect

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

I hope I shall not incur your Honour &ca. displeasure by having deferr'd so long replying to your favour of the 8<sup>th</sup>. Instant as it has been entirely owing to the great variety of Incidents I have been forced closely to attend to for some time past occasioned by the unsteady & disturbed state of Affairs.

Your Honour &ca. will no doubt think me lying equally open to Imposition with the rest of Mankind and consequently to give wrong Names & Titles to things from Misinformation of others & therefore stand the better excused, if I have placed the Produce of one Country to the Credit of another which it seems I have been guilty of by assigning to Chellumbrum the Long Cloth of twelve Call at Sixty three Pagodas and a half  $\frac{1}{2}$  Corge that I am told was really made in Cheally itself or within the limits of it, not but Long Cloth of the same Number of threads was & perhaps still is made in several other places besides Cheally. There is also made there Long Cloth of Nine Call at Pagodas forty five & three quarters  $\frac{3}{4}$  Corge and Salempores of twelve Call at twenty seven & seven Eights; In obedience however to your Honour &ca's. Command I shall address the Gentlemen at S<sup>t</sup>. David on the subject, and communicate their answer as to Charges upon the Cloth only be pleased to admit it be equally laid on Goods provided at S<sup>t</sup>. David & this Place, I flatter myself that your Honour &ca. will then allow that the Difference of the first cost will hold on for ever. In Regard to Godown Rent is quite chimerical because I am apprehensive that the Investment at this Place will not so suddenly be increased as to require more room than three sides of the Virando of this Choultry especially as it cannot be supposed that any great Number of Bales will be suffered to lye here long, and as to any Expences on account of servants it must be very trifling whilst We can make Packers good enough out of Lascars for brown goods, no others being to be had here for want of Washermen Dressers &ca.

Mr. Dawson having taken with him all the monthly Papers from the 1<sup>st</sup><sup>th</sup>. March 1752 to Ult<sup>o</sup>. September 1753 to form & bring up the Books to that Time [ . . . ] lye in my Power to do more in obedience to your Honour [ . . . ] regarding that article, than to rectifie, the Monthly Accounts since, conformable to the Model, You have been pleased to prescribe. I must therefore intreat that your Honour [ . . . ] will direct them to be compleated and sent me as soon as they conveniently can, that those ending last April 1753(?) may be brought forward.

The Limits of this Settlement are so extensive, [and] Experience has proved, that when an Enemy is vigilant the Number of Military and Seapoys Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. hath been pleased to limit for the Garrison of it, are by no means sufficient to preserve it from Insults, were they much [ . . . ] than they are, after the garbling has gone through, by three or four detachments & the Numbers that are constantly draughting off on account of Escorts to Officers & stores that are called away to Camp, by which Means & the sick & wounded. We have at present very few above two hundred seapoys left for our Defence Our Insufficiency in this Respect was fully manifested the Day before yesterday, Upon [pages in the original volume missing].

The Trevendaporum Renters having been again called upon absolutely refuse to take the prescribed Oath the Reasons they assign declining it will appear by one of the Enclosed Petitions, which we transmit you by their particular Desire, tho' We look upon them to be very little to the purpose and at best but a repetition of their former remonstrance. We request you will favour us with your further directions how to proceed in this affair, which when we are acquainted with shall immediately be put in Execution.

Mr. Hancock has delivered us an Indent of Cloathing for the use of Cuddalore Hospital which being to a Considerable Amount, We don't care to comply with without your approbation, therefore enclose it for your Perusal.

That from November 1752 to August 1753 the Villages of Trevendaporum have fell a Prey to the Enemy which your Petitioners have from Time to Time reported with account of their Losses and since 1753 have related the great miseries they have undergone by plundering of their Cattle &c<sup>a</sup>. also gave an acc<sup>t</sup>. of what was saved of the Produce.

Your Petitioners now take liberty to remind your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. they took the Cowle on Conditions and promise of being protected from the Molestation of any Enemys & borrow'd large sums to carry [ . . . ] Farm but besides their loss of their Cattle & Effects [ . . . ] Morattas carry'd away & destroy'd to the amount of 17000 Pagodas of Grain.

Lately your Worship sent round the Villages Two Persons to survey the crop on the Ground who have estimated, it to be about Pagodas [ . . . ] 50 which [sum] Your Petitioners suppose notwithstanding their [ . . . ] losses your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. mean to demand from your Petitioners but that sum from the last bad Harvest they have been obliged with other sums borrowed to [ . . . ] towards the current Harvest which will be much reduced by 3 large Villages between Pondicherry [and] Tritchinop'ly being destroyed and whose Grounds [ . . . ] fallow & but a part of the other Village's grounds occupied as some 1/3 and some 1/4 part, therefore the produce for the present Year cannot answer the Cowl[e].

Besides this your Petitioners have had a very sensible loss this running year by the Morattoes las[t] driving away their cattle which notwithstanding [his] intercession they recovered but  $2/3^d$ . of them how mischivous these Morattas have been your worship &c<sup>a</sup>. are not in [ . . . ] by their plundering & laying waste the Villages at Fort St. David.

We are concerned to find that our Report of the tents has not proved satisfactory & beg leave to assure you that we have taken all possible Pains to come at the truth, tho' without success, our Secretary demanded all the vouchers relating to those made by Mr. St. Paul of his Widow, her answer comes enclosed by which you'll observe she denies having any other Vouchers than the Indents & indeed it is our Opinion he kept no regular accounts as none were found amongst his papers at his Death. The Taylor can give no account how much each Tent cost as the Cooleys employed were paid daily & not so much each Tent, however, we suppose the Taylor's Cooley must have been pretty near the same here as at Madrass.

Our Export Wareh<sup>o</sup>. Kr. in answer to your Commands for paying for the torn & damaged cloth delivered in a Letter (Copy of which comes enclosed) by which you will observe he does not chuse to comply either in paying for it or being answerable for the Conicopies & declines taking charge of any more Cloth till you determine the affair he likewise refuses to assist at Consultation, by which your Honor & c<sup>a</sup>. may see the Necessity of coming to a speedy Resolution, as there is cloth in the Merchants hands w<sup>ch</sup>. considering the lateness of the Season it is high time should be sorted which it's not possible to do till Mr. Cooke resumes his Employ. We must take the Liberty to assure your Honor & c<sup>a</sup>. we are of his Opinion in regard to the impossibility of procuring a Conicopy of sufficient Credit to give reasonable Security for the Goods that must necessarily come under his Charge.

We must once more request to be supplied with Fanams as soon as possible as the Scarcity of them occasions great Complaints from his Majesty's Troops.

We have enquired of Lieut<sup>t</sup>. Davies concerning the Money found amongst Capt. Chace's Effects, he says, it could not have been the Compy's as the Money for the Payment of Trividy Garrison was left with him & was all expended before the Place was taken.

We have acquainted Cootah with your determination in regard to his Cowle for the weighing & measuring Dutys & his contended [*sic*] to pay three hundred Pag<sup>s</sup>. ꝑ annum. He has promised to deliver in a particular Acct. of the Debts annexed to his Petition.

There are several French Deserters here who demand either to be entertain'd in the service or to have Passports to go to the Dutch or elsewhere, which we do not care to grant without your Directions, as we are apprehensive of Danger in having many in the service at this time when our Garrison is so Weak & such a Number of Prisoners in the Fort.

Coll. Adlercron has desired each detachment of his Regiment may be victuall'd 14 days after their arrival & to have the Kings Hospital furnished with Provisions constantly we informed him He should acquaint you with his Request & continue to supply him till we rec<sup>d</sup> your Orders.

Lieut<sup>t</sup>. Coll Bogshan & Major Lovett have deliver'd in each a Litter which they desire may be forwarded to you, representing their Incapacity of doing duty with Horses or Pallankeens in Garrison, they are both highly displeased at not having allowed as well a separate table for each, looking upon it as a dishonour to be quarter'd upon the Col<sup>l</sup>. indeed they seem to be displeased at all the Instructions we have rec<sup>d</sup> concerning them, as you have directed us to supply them with Palankeens & Horses when they take the Field We imagine it would be proper to set about providing them immediately as it will take up some time to get them ready especially Horses.

Coll. Adlercron informed the Depty Govr. it was his Majestys Instructions to him to command all the Compy's Troops and Garrisons in Consequence of which he desired the Returns of this Garrison might be made to him & that he expected to give the Parole at St. David the Depty Govr. informed him he could not comply with his Demand without his Superiors Orders, by this your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. may judge what a difficult task We shall have to keep up to your Instructions, of not letting them have any command in the Compy's Districts as they seem to think they have a right to command everything.

Having perused the Honble Presid<sup>t</sup>. & Councils Commands to you bearing date the 18<sup>th</sup>. Inst. respecting a quantity of damaged Cloth reced from this Settlement in the Month of March last w<sup>ch</sup>. in compliance with a standing order from our Honble Masters as therein quoted, they are pleased at all Events solely to take paying the amount, I cannot but be filled with, the greatest concern to find them still persevere in a Sentiment so little thought or deserv'd by me, however as what they have directed affects me particularly, I take leave to represent you with the needfull in my Vindication requesting a Copy of the same may be forwarded to them under your Cover.

On the 25<sup>th</sup>. Jañry I returned from Camp so extremely ill I was unable to move from my bed but by help in which sad condition I remain'd till the latter end of March without amendment consequently unable to attend any sort of Duty in my Employ all that while or did I appear at one Consultation as will appear by referring thereto, in this interim all that Parcell of Brown Cloth was brought in, stored & accepted, by Gentlemen who were equally empower'd in that Branch of Business with myself. This the Original sorting Books already sent them will evidently prove both with Respect to time & Person.

The Representations your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. have already made to this Purpose I promised myself would have been more attentively considered & have saved me the Necessity I find I am now under of answering a complaint so obvious to Reflection. I could not have had a finger concern'd in, or can any thing in that Affair tend towards me than merely that I bore the name of Export Warehouse-kr. but to this I would only pray a moments recollection, when the ordering me to Camp, keeping me there for several Months and afterwards making me answerable for what passed in my Absence, will doubtless appear an act too cruel & inhuman to be either imagin'd or suspected or can I think the Honble President and Council who are so well acquainted with the Paralel I bear to that case will ever insist on a Sentence so unnatural both to Law & Conscience; however that it is not exactly as I have mentioned I am ready to acknowledge that I was not in Camp when those Bales were brought into the Godown is certainly true, the Contrary appears in the beginning of my Letter, to wit " On the 25<sup>th</sup>. Janry I returned " But if the feeble Condition I returned in do at all merit a spice of consideration it cannot but convince them I was no more capable of attending the Business of my Employ, Than if I had remain'd at Trichinoply & in effect is most plainly to be proved by the Consultations & sorting Book that I was equally absent. The standing Order they have inserted I have now perused but as I can declare upon Oath if necessary that I never before heard or knew a syllable of it, Equity I trust will ever be ready to relieve me of all consequences from a Rule I was never acquainted with or even had Opportunity, (my Situation being generally such) of perusing had I been ever so desirous of it: It therefore adds not a little to my Concern to observe their Honor &c<sup>a</sup>s. Commands making me answerable are formed so immediately from a Circumstance I was ever before ignorant of the sense of which I would however recommend to their farther Digestion thereon persuading myself that till the Conicoply is proved guilty It will appear to have no affinity with the Point in question since neither fraud, nor Fault are yet to be alledged against him by any other Authority than bare suggestion, whether this be sufficient Grounds to make me accountable for a sum so considerable I appeal to their impartial Opinion; expressing only my Concern to find the most likely cause to w<sup>ch</sup>. these damages can be attributed (I mean the well known indifferent vessells on w<sup>ch</sup>. the Bales were sent) should prove a circumstance so little deserving any share in it as to be declared by them very improbable, notwithstanding what has been set forth by your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. relative thereto. I relye however they will on a more serious reflection be convinced (as no thorough Examination was made into it for many months after the Bales were landed) no Certainty can be had to the Contrary. They will also be sensible in cases where Goods are protested it is always done immediately while the truth is plain and indisputable. Nevertheless had it been so done I must remark that I never engaged to stand to any Damages arising in the Investment or any other Business nor did I expect it would be requir'd of me unless authentically proved to proceed from my own particular neglect, which too clearly appears in this Instance can be no ways deem'd the Case. Another Agreement made use of by their Honor &c<sup>a</sup>. & which I am indispensably bound to endeavour to invalidate runs thus " It would be very unreasonably to turn it " upon the Merchants hands for after it has undergone the usual Examination & is out of their Custody they are no longer chargeable." The Contrary of this is manifestly proved from Custom old as the Investment & which the Merchants-themselves cannot offer to deny that is all Brown Cloth after being sorted & accepted in the Godown is from that Instant delivered into the Warehouse-keepers Custody & becomes his Charge. Nevertheless after it comes to be dispersed amongst the Washers if at the opening of it efore it is put into water, any Number of Pieces appear to be either torn or damaged & all thō the said Cloth has pass'd the Compy's Chop such pieces be they to whatsoever Number have ever been laid aside and returned back to the Merchants who have always delivered a like Number of Sound Pieces in their room Instances of this I have many to produce since my own time both here and at Madrass & I make no

doubt preceding Wareh<sup>o</sup>.kr<sup>s</sup>. the same in plain I affirm it to an Engagement they have been ever under, and what they have never yet scrupled to submit to provided only the Cloth has passed no Operation in the Washers hands which I apprehend cannot be said of any one Piece now in question, at least not while remained in my Custody. To add more in conviction of this Plea must I am persuaded be thought superfluous therefore shall content myself with requesting It may be sum'd up with all the rest of my Defence, submitting the Whole with the utmost submission and confidence to their Honour & ca<sup>s</sup>. candid Judgement I now return to lay before you what more concerns me in respect to the standing order they have transmitted, which as I am now & not till now acquainted with, it becomes me either to submit or declare the contrary, I therefore take upon me to do accordingly, acquaints. you that I judge it absolutely impossible to procure any Conicopoly in this Place capable of giving a suitable Security to the amount of Goods that must fall into his charge, it is a thing I did long since on my own accord endeavor at with<sup>t</sup>. Effect, and I am convinced no Black Merchant in this Place will engage in it, or is there scarce one in these Days to be found of sufficient substance some 40 or 50 Years ago when this Order likely took it's date & India abounded with Rich Familys it might if ever have been dispensed & complied with however no Instance thereof is known here to this day & I apprehend can not by any means be now introduced Conicopolys are nevertheless absolutely necessary & tho in the present case no Proof appears against them That it will always be so is more than I can take upon me to answer for, It is not to be imagin'd that my Eyes can be always upon them & consequently unreasonable I should be accountable for any Practices they may be seduced by Bribery or otherwise behind my Back, more especially with Respect to Calicoes which undergoe so many Hands in different Operations as render it impossible, to come under the Warehouse Lock & Key for many Months after Acceptance, and for these Reasons I beg permission to declare I will neither be accountable for their actions or any other Assist<sup>t</sup>. under me therefore as this is the first Notice I have rec<sup>d</sup> of such standing Order, if it is expected that I abide thereby I do now make it my earnest Request, that the Honble Presid<sup>t</sup>. & Council will be pleased to procure me a Person upon the Necessary security or otherwise bear me harmless as to any Errors or Abuses that such People may commit in either which Case I am both ready and desirous of continuing the Employ and will contribute all possible care in my Power to prevent Embezzlement or Imposition altho' I have little room to doubt but one of these will be thought reasonable. Nevertheless as I am desirous to avoid any future address on this subject I must here take leave to add if I am so unfortunate as not to meet with their Honor & ca<sup>s</sup>. Compliance or Digestion, I do then & in that Case only, make it my Entreaty that another Wareh<sup>o</sup>. kr. be directly appointed & I relieved hereby declaring myself in no Capacity of Circumstances to engage in such security & unanswerable for any Facts, that may be committed in the interim my Destiny afterwards I commit readily to their Honour & ca<sup>s</sup>. disposal remarking only before I conclude the Necessity for a speedy decision in consideration of the late Season & Quantity of Cloth now laying with the Merch<sup>ts</sup>. ready for acceptance besides what more may be shortly expected. Hitherto we have waited for their approval of the Musters but the Difficultys I am under from their Commands now rec<sup>d</sup> affords a fresh Impediment in the carrying on that Business as I must & do beg to be excused taking another Piece of Cloth into my Custody till I am discharged of all Claim & the Grounds I am to act on set on easier footing, The Present being such as I can neither answer to myself or my securitys in England. If I have not the same Indulgence here I can only assure you that I will to the utmost of my Power on foot discharge the Duty of Major to Coll Adlercron's Regiment I think my other Appointments are far short to one of my Rank but as this is Personal I don't mind it, but my other demand the Publick Cause is in question, on which Account I make no doubt but that you will recommend it in the strongest Terms to the Gov<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>a</sup>. at Madras, & that they will immediately order such assistance as will enable to execute my Duty agreeable to my Instructions.

The several sorts of large Timbers & Plank mention'd in the Indent which accompanied your Honors order of the 12<sup>th</sup>. April I was not able to procure after the strictest Enquiry & search as such were not then in Batavia. But to compensate in the best Manner I was able for this disappointment I did intend to have purchased a larger Quantity of such as was to be had which I

judged would be more agreeable to your Honours than bringing back the Money you was pleased to entrust me with. But herein I met with greater difficultys than I could have foreseen or prevented, arising from a continuance of blowing Weather by which many of the Rafts in going on board were drove away & entirely lost & such as were recovered attended with a very considerable Expence. By these accidents I got but little on board, tho I employed the best of my Abilities for that Purpose till such time as the Ship was ready for sailing & as your Honor's were pleas'd to order me not to make a Longer Stay than I could possibly avoid, & considering how late my Return would be to the Coast, I thought it most prudent to sail & I hope in this & upon all other occasions, that my proceed<sup>gs</sup>. may be such as will meet with your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. approbation that I may have y<sup>e</sup>. Agreeable to your request we shall relieve the Egmont from this Place & have accordingly station'd the Denham Capt. Meard upon that Service, of whose arrival we have just rec<sup>d</sup> advice we shall take Care to supply Mr. Brooke with Necessaries & Refreshments by her.

We observe your Honor &c<sup>as</sup>. Reasons for not complying with our Proposal for filling up a ship in Sept<sup>r</sup>. We shall therefore dispatch home in the beginning of Dec<sup>r</sup>. one of the ships of last Season compleatly laden from hence & send your Honor &c<sup>a</sup>. another of them in Janry half laden to be filled up from your Presidency agreeable to your request.

By the Permission given us this year by our Hon<sup>ble</sup> Masters in relation to the Quantity of Salt Petre to be laden on board of each Ship in order to return them as many as possible. We are in great hopes your Honor &c<sup>a</sup>. may be able to compleat the Tonnage of two Ships in Janry provided they were better than half laden from hence, which would be such apparent Benefit to our Hon<sup>ble</sup> Masters in preventing a large detention of their ships in India, that we dare say you will not be want<sup>g</sup>. in your utmost endeavors to effect it, of which we request you will give us the earliest Notice your Honor &c<sup>a</sup>. can as well as what Quantity of surplus Pepper the Gent<sup>l</sup> at Bencoolen are likely to have that We may proceed to the appointment of proper ships for such Purposes.

When Col<sup>l</sup>. valued at Pag<sup>s</sup>. 5856—12—22 so that there should be remaining no more than to the amount of Pag<sup>s</sup>. 3280—28—13. but according to the head of Ballance for the close of the Books your Honor &c<sup>a</sup>. will perceive there appears nevertheless to be still a Stock amos. to Pag<sup>s</sup>. 8574—30—54.

This difference is so considerable as cannot be accounted for by any Lights procurable from the recollection of either Mr. Dawson or the Storehouse Coni-copolys here & probably may have arose from a wrong Acct. taken at first from whence the subsequent Entrys were made but whether that be the true cause or not it is impossible as I said before to reconcile it by any help to be had at this Place & therefore judg'd it would be less displeasing to you to have them transmitted in the imperfect Condition they are than to be kept any longer in suspence by wast<sup>g</sup>. of more time in so fruitless a search after a Remedy which must entirely depend on your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. to afford & in the mean time the Books ending April last will be brought up fit to receive the transfer agreeable to whatever adjustm<sup>ts</sup>. Being acquainted the Hon<sup>ble</sup> President & Council in their Letter of the 3<sup>d</sup>. Instant have required an Explanation to be sent them of the several Losses on Rice, Salt Petre, & Redwood, before they can consent thereto, I take leave to beg the same before you, by which I cannot chuse but relye both they as well as your Worship & C<sup>a</sup>. will be well convinced the whole has arose from this one Effect unavoidable Waste & as such Presume to hope it will meet with their favorable Determination.

The Rice was purchased in July 1753 Quantity 55<sup>G</sup>. 333<sup>M</sup>. It was all Ship Rice & at the time of purchase not a little dusty, reced by Weight, moved from Cuddalore to the Fort where the far greatest part has lain ever since, & it may be concluded underwent some waste in bringing there. The first Grain of the whole Quantity delivered out was in Sept<sup>r</sup>. last by reason the market Price continued so low it could not be disposed of without great loss. The Circumstances consider'd hope it will suffice for this Article if I only point out the space of Time it has been on hand & the full Loss that has arose thereon to the month of Nov<sup>r</sup>. last past, when delivery of the Remains was made to Mr. Norris being no less than 18 Months space, for which besides the 3 Garce tender'd to be wrote off, in April a still farther deficiency has appear'd from that time to Nov<sup>r</sup>. 1 G 238 5/16 M making in all little more than 4½ Garce in 18 Months or to reduce it to it's just proportion I may say about 5½ <sup>¶</sup> Cent <sup>¶</sup> an total Loss; notwithstanding the Well known difference which always accrues from receiving by Weight & delivering by measure.

The Loss upon the Salt Petre & Redwood has been growing ever since this Place became the Presidency which by the Wareh<sup>o</sup>. Books left here is proveable so far back as the year 1748, prior to that are not with us. From that time there appears to have been reced here at different times, Salt Petre 13986 B. M<sup>ds</sup>. & Redwood 4801 Cy. 12 M<sup>d</sup>. 16 L<sup>b</sup>. but for neither of these Articles the least Allowance does not appear to have been ever made on the acc<sup>t</sup>. of Waste, all that has been hitherto charged to Profit & Loss appears for Boats stranded in the Surf & such like Accid<sup>ts</sup>. as their Honor & c<sup>t</sup>. will be well satisfied of the truth of this on a Reference to the annual Books in their Custody. They will undoubtedly be convinced of a Neglect commenced long before my time & tho' I do not pretend to think myself entirely clear of it for not making an earlier report thereof Yet I may assure them that I was induced to this Omission from nothing but a desire to avoid the Expence as well as farther Loss that must necessarily have attended the moving such bulky articles I therefore chose to do it at leisure as the People could be spared & at length accomplish'd it without putting the Compy to any additional Charge. If this regard had to them be disapprov'd I have only to say I am always ready to abide by whatever they may judge proper to direct on it.

The Salt Petre they are not ignorant is a dissolving Article & hav<sup>g</sup>. been mostly kept in a tiled godown It is not unlikely from the many heavy Monsoons which has passed, have been subject to leak tho' undiscern'd & altho' the Redwood be durable they well know It has had neither Godown to keep it in, or Guard to watch it nothing but the Wide Sandy Beach has been it's Lodgement for no less than 6 Years & I have been obliged to dig in different Places for near a mile in Length 2, 3 & 4 feet underground to get the Quantity now produced & some of it found in Places where the least discovery was not to be made of it Add to this the many violent Freshes which have from year to year run over it & I persuade myself it will not be thought improbable but some of it has been bore into the sea & may be more of it still remaining under Ground in vain to search for, under these several Circumstances I have only to add a Calculate of the Proportion which the loss bears to each article the better to enable you to an easy Judgement of the reasonbleness of them, being as follows, Viz<sup>t</sup>.—
